THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the thirteenth (13) day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To make appropriation for the amount required to be raised for highway purposes, under Chapter 80, 84 and 85 of the Public Laws. Town to raise \$606.-; State to give \$1212.-; Total \$1818.

4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$75 for Memorial Day.

5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for Public Library.

6. To see if the town will authorize the Select-

men to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

7. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99 Section 22 of Laws of 1933.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to repair the road from the Carter residence to that of Charles N. Robie's.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to repair the road from Mace's corner to the Blaney residence.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to Fire protection.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Contingent Fund.

12. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and renew and refund town notes.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The results of the various tests used to check on the actual work done, the characteristics of individual pupils, and the plans and accomplishment of the teachers cannot be told in these tables and a detailed statement of them would not only be too long here but would, of course, be out of place in any public report. The teachers have, as usual, planned their work with care and recorded their plans for the inspection of officials. More important, perhaps, than this they have with their usual care, taught by these plans consistently, except when modifying both plans and work in accordance with suggestions and direction on my part. Seven pupils entered high schools in September 1933 and are doing satisfactory work there.

For several years more and more effective steps have been taken in the matter of public health and sanitation. I am glad to commend the work accomplished since my last report on these matters. Our nurse is very faithful in her work, and wise in her cooperation with parents.

As her report shows, almost every pupil is vaccinated against small pox, and all who need it have been supplied with milk, and lately with cod liver oil, so highly recommended now by those expert in

matters of nutrition. Mrs. Sheehy has also succeeded in helping our pupils to see the need of clean persons and surroundings. In my report last year I took occasion to commend all the teachers. That commendation is still in order. When, by consultation or otherwise, we decide together that plan, procedure, rule or discipline can be made better, all the teachers willingly cooperate for the common good.

The East School is much too crowded for comfort. That good work is done there by the pupils may be credited to Miss Gerry, the teacher.

The North School and West School are not crowded, but they, as well as the East School, present their problems in the matter of plant, safety, morale and other ways.

The financial burden, even with state aid, involved in putting the three school buildings into first class repair is a large one especially when so may high school tuitions must be paid. Your expenditure of the limited funds for general repairs has been very wise, and I know you realize that much more should be done, even must be done, in the near future to keep the buildings in good repair. This problem is a serious one in nearly all school districts.

Almost a century of years has passed since the building of the North School. The others are newer but of very substantial age, and all have a place in the minds of many of our oldest citizens whose school days are still vivid in their memories. I am wondering whether there might not be found a group of such old pupils in each school who would be interested in beautifying the grounds with trees and shrubs, and in suitably marking the buildings with dates and names, all this, of course, not at public

expense but by voluntary expenditure of small amounts of money and large amounts of labor.

It is a pleasure to express my appreciation for the continuous cooperation of School Board, Parents and Teachers for the good of all our pupils.
