Warrant for Town Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Boston, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Boston on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

(a) To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the improvement of highways and bridges.

(b) For the support of schools.

(c) For repairing roads and bridges.

(d) For maintenance of the poor.

(e) For memorial day.

(f) For all other necessary town charges.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the purpose of co-operation with the State and Federal Government in control of the White Pine Blister Rust, or act in relation thereto.

4. By request of the members of the New Century Club: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a suitable place for a town-dump, the one now in use on "Stanley Hill" near "Shedd's Ravine" to be abolished, raise and appropriate money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.

5. By request of the Chamber of Commerce: To see what action the Town will take in regard to fire protection, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in relation thereto.

6. To see what action the Town the take in regard to snow removal, whereby some or all the highways of the Town may be cleared of snow for automobile traffic, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in relation thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to increase the service of the Library or act in relation thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the "Wason Memorial Library" or act in relation thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,650.00 being the amount, with interest added, paid for the cement bridge, recently built at Paper Mill Village, or act in relation thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road, (subject to gates and bars), beginning at junction of Jerry hill road so-called, southeast of Chauncey's mill and running southeasterly to the road leading from Chestnut hill to Goffstown, known as the Eben Warren Corner, thence easterly to the Mountain road corner so-called to the road from West Bedford to Goffstown.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road, subject to gates and bars, from a point near Charles Upton's to Mont Vernon line, also from a point near the Brewer place in a southerly direction to Mont Vernon line, or pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the "Australian Ballot System" for the election of Town Officers, or act in relation thereto.

13. By request of the Trustees of the New Boston Cemetery: To see if the Town will vote to reimburse them for the amount of money paid out by them for building and cementing the stone wall built by them the past season, raise and appropriate money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounts on taxes paid on or before July 1st and on or before Sept. 1st or act in relation thereto.

15. To see if the Town will take any action in regard to observance of Old Home Week or act in relation thereto.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the use of the Town Hall for the ensuing year or pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money to meet the necessary expenses of the town, or act in relation thereto.

18. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other Officers heretofore chosen, or act in relation thereto.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Health Officer

January 31, 1928.

As Health Officer I want to thank the people of New Boston for their effort in maintaining sanitary conditions, also the care of diseases.

We have had one case of measles during the past year, which is the only communicable disease reported to me.

Mary G. Hurley, R. N., under the direction of the State Board of Health Division of Maternity, Infant and Child Hygiene, cooperating with the New Century Club and the townspeople, made arrangements to hold a child health conference in the town hall Nov. 17, 1927. Miss Hurley was unable to be present and the conference was conducted by Mary D. Davis, R. N., director of division.

Eleven children were examined, five were found with defects; four of the other six had defects corrected since the last conference.

At the conference Nov. 20, 1925, thirty-one children were examined. We do not understand why so few were brought in at this time as it incurs no expense to the parents, and if a defect is found it may be easily corrected in a child, while if not corrected may cause serious trouble in later life.

Report of School Board

To the Selectmen of New Boston and the inhabitants of the School District.

The School Board of the District of New Boston respectfully submit the following report:

During the past year we have made numerous alterations and repairs to some of the school buildings.

At District No. 8, in the High School room, the lighting and seating arrangement has been greatly improved. Two more windows have been added to the back side of the room and the position of the seats changed so as to do away with a great deal of cross lighting. The room has been painted and varnished throughout and an additional book case installed. The sink and pump down stairs has been thoroughly renovated and rebuilt.

At District No. 5, the school house has been washed and painted inside, also ceiling whitened, and a new cess-pool constructed as the old one was in terrible condition and a menace to health.

At Districts No. 13 and No. 2, no repairs to any extent were made.

This year a course of music has been placed in all the schools. A teacher coming from Goffstown every two weeks at a very nominal fee to carry on the work, which has shown some very fine results.

The School Board wishes to thank all the citizens of the district for their help and co-operation shown in the past year in school matters.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of New Boston:

The High School work is being carried on by the same teachers as last season. This makes the fifth year for Mr. Lyon, the fourth for Miss Eastman, and for Miss Dodge her third. This absence of yearly changes is rather an unusual experience.

In the elementary work, there is but one "new" teacher this year, Miss Ethel Foote, who has charge of the Primary room. There are five elementary teachers and three in High School.

Near the close of last school year, a change came about which made advisable the closing of No. 15. Two of the pupils were sent to Weare, the others came to the Village school. This has not resulted in any hardships for any one, and has resulted in a financial saving for the district. The enrollment in the elementary schools is about 110 at present. In High School there are 41.

For some time there has been a frequently expressed desire that some arrangement be made for the teaching of music in the schools. This year, Mrs. Catherine Bartlett of Goffstown, who teaches music in the Goffstown Town Schools, was engaged to do the same work here, making two visits each month to all schools. This teaching combines instruction in the technical side of music, the use of the voice, and the learning of songs. There has been a fine response on the part of the pupils.

School costs for last year over the state indicate that the average total cost per capita in High School was \$134.82. In New Boston the cost was \$137.65. That is about \$2 more per pupil than the state average. However the district last year received \$380.00 from High School tuitions, also \$700.00 from the Smith-Hughes fund on account of the Agricultural Course. If we pro-rate this income over

the average High School membership of 37, this per capita return will amount to almost \$30.00 per pupil. If this were deducted from the total cost \$137.65, it will make the net cost approximately \$107.00 per High School pupil.

The average cost per elementary pupil for the state was \$73.84. New Boston's cost per pupil was \$74.88, or again about \$1.00 per pupil more than the state average.

This is not intended as a covert plea for increased expenditures—nobody desires that. A glance at the budget will indicate that the School Board is endeavoring to keep expenditures down. However, an amount should be provided each year to take care of some item—such as painting the Village Building, or blackboards, keeping in mind that in a few years some expenditure will be necessary for High School seating.

During last summer vacation a change was made in the High School room. Two windows at the end of the room, next to the church, were closed up (one space being made into a small book case) and two additional windows put in on the west side. Then the seats were rearranged so that now the lighting is from one side only, coming from the left. As it was before, there were windows on three sides, one which some pupils had to face. The new arrangement avoids cross-lights and also makes more economical use of the space. A new piano was bought for the High School. The pupils themselves paid \$100.00 on the purchase price.

The following statement regarding the High School has been made by Mr. Lyon at my suggestion:

The enrollment in the High School is 41, of this number 23 are girls and 21 are boys. There has been but one pupil leave school. As in the past two courses are offered namely, Academic and Agriculture. Both these courses permit graduates to enter the State University on certificate. A graduate of the Academic course may enter any college providing candidate has made preparation early enough in his course to fulfill special requirements of a particular

institution. All this means that the New Boston High School has the highest rating possible in this State and it also has the official approval of the New England College Entrance Board which governs entrance requirements of many colleges. Citizens of New Boston should be proud of the work the graduates of the public schools are doing.

It should be noted that the enrollment is increasing each year. The capacity limit has almost been reached. Two improvements are needed very badly. They are new desks and an addition to the laboratory. Seeing is believing, your inspection is invited. Progress demands that we keep our machinery up-to-date.

The agricultural projects for the past year were quite successful in spite of the unfavorable season especially for potatoes. However the boys results were above the average of those secured by senior farmers. Among the more prominent results were those of Paul Barss on a $\frac{1}{2}$ acre potato project. Paul secured a yield of 130 bushels of fine quality product. In poultry work, outstanding results were secured by Everett Leavitt and Howard Prince. Their flocks of several hundred chicks were raised to maturity with less than 10 per cent loss.

The agricultural classes aided in the setting of several thousand pine seedlings for citizens and fellow pupils. Noteworthy in this work was Laban Todd who set pines on his father's farm. A school forest would be a sane investment for the future. Some day a new central school building will have to be built. There are several towns in the state today reaping the benefits from this very thing. A donation to the School District of a piece of land for this purpose would be a fine act of public spiritedness.

The teachers consider the morale of the school very good. A majority of the pupils are attending school with an ideal and purpose. They are interested in their work.

Parents should make sure that absence is necessary and tardiness should be a rare occurrence. In these two items New Boston High School has been below the State aver-

age. Parents we ask for your support to correct this one black mark on the records of your schools.

Generous financial support from clubs and individuals has made possible a fund to be used for prizes as a stimulus for a public speaking contest. It is planned that this contest will be held this spring.

As there seems to be no other means of appeal to parents and those interested in education, opportunity is taken here to invite and urge that they visit school at least once a year.

The work of the schools, as the work on farms, or stores, or shops, or offices, goes on from year to year. Usually the changes that come, enter gradually. The upkeep of equipment and operating expense are constant, and are not a matter of choice. If investment ceases, business ceases. Schools do not differ in this regard. When a year is gone, the money appropriated for that year is gone also. So appropriations have to be made again. The young people come and go, some of them remain here to live and work and take their places in the life of the community, some go away to college or normal school, or other institutions of learning and training. They may not "come back" to stay, but the citizens and taxpayers have fulfilled their obligation to them and to those who remain, if they have provided schools, wherein something of learning, and appreciation of better things have been made possible. And, if some of those trained here, go away, and find their work elsewhere, bear in mind that others born and trained elsewhere come here to find their work, and thus the account may be evened up.

In closing a word of appreciation for the members of the School Board, especially, and others who have joined and tried to make the schools worthy of a modest pride.
