## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

*To the School Board of Auburn:*

Herein is submitted my fourth annual report. Attention is called to elementary school organization, activities and per pupil costs, and to the increased demand for high school education.

### ELEMENTARY ORGANIZATION AND ACTIVITIES

The only teacher changes occurred in the Bunker Hill and Village Schools. Miss Lydia F. Bellows was elected teacher for the year beginning in September, 1932. Miss Bellows is a graduate of Plymouth Normal School and a successful teacher of experience.

In June Miss Donahue withdrew from the Village School. This vacancy was filled by Miss Mentana Gatti who was graduated from Keene Normal School. Miss Gatti is also a successful teacher of experience.

With the exception of the Severance schools the average membership was slightly less than in the previous year. In all the schools the per cent of attendance and promotion was raised.

The Union Spelling Contest held in Chester on June 3, 1932, was won by the Auburn team, composed of Omer Bureau, Frederick Hanscom and Mary Mack. This team defeated the other four towns by a score of 298 out of a possible 300 points. Thus Auburn gained possession of the trophy cup for the school year ending in June, 1933. This cup is held by the winning town for one year and becomes the permanent possession of the town that wins it for three consecutive years.

The printed report of the School Nurse is called particularly to your attention. The further correction of dental defects through the clinic conducted at the Grange Hall for three consecutive days last May is most encouraging. The fact that this clinic was largely financed by the patronage at two school entertainments indicates the valued support of citizens and teachers. Under the present economic conditions the value of a school nurse, co-operating with school, town and state agencies, is greatly increased.

#### PER PUPIL COSTS

For the school year closing last June the per pupil cost in Auburn schools was reduced below that of the previous year by more than six dollars, while the per pupil cost for the elementary schools of the state as a whole was reduced less than two dollars.

Following are the elementary school costs per pupil for the last three years.

Due to several items of economy, but chiefly on account of a voluntary reduction in the cost of pupil transportation made by all drivers of school conveyance, an additional reduction is being made in the per pupil cost of the present year.

#### DEMAND FOR HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION

When the state law placed liability for the payment of high school tuition upon the towns that do not maintain a public high school, the number of graduates from rural schools, who attended high school, was limited in most cases to the occasional boy or girl who intended to go to college. Today the majority of graduates from the same schools in these rural communities enter and graduate from high schools. The

chief reason for this condition is found in the fact that admission to training courses in the leading hospitals, the diplomas of business and normal schools, and apprenticeships in numerous trades and industries are conditioned upon the completion of a high school course.

Nine of the eleven pupils, graduated from the Auburn schools last June, entered high school. This year Auburn is paying tuition on thirty pupils distributed in five approved high schools or academies in New Hampshire.

Your district in its annual meeting of last year provided the estimated sum of twenty-five hundred dollars to pay these tuitions. The district's liability now exceeds this sum by approximately four hundred dollars, which should be raised by special appropriation and made available before the fiscal year ends next June.

#### IN CONCLUSION

I wish you to know that your steadfast purpose to maintain unimpaired the standards of Auburn's schools has been an inspiration to your Superintendent and teachers.

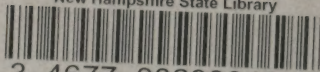
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
