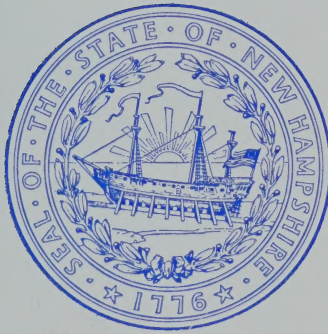

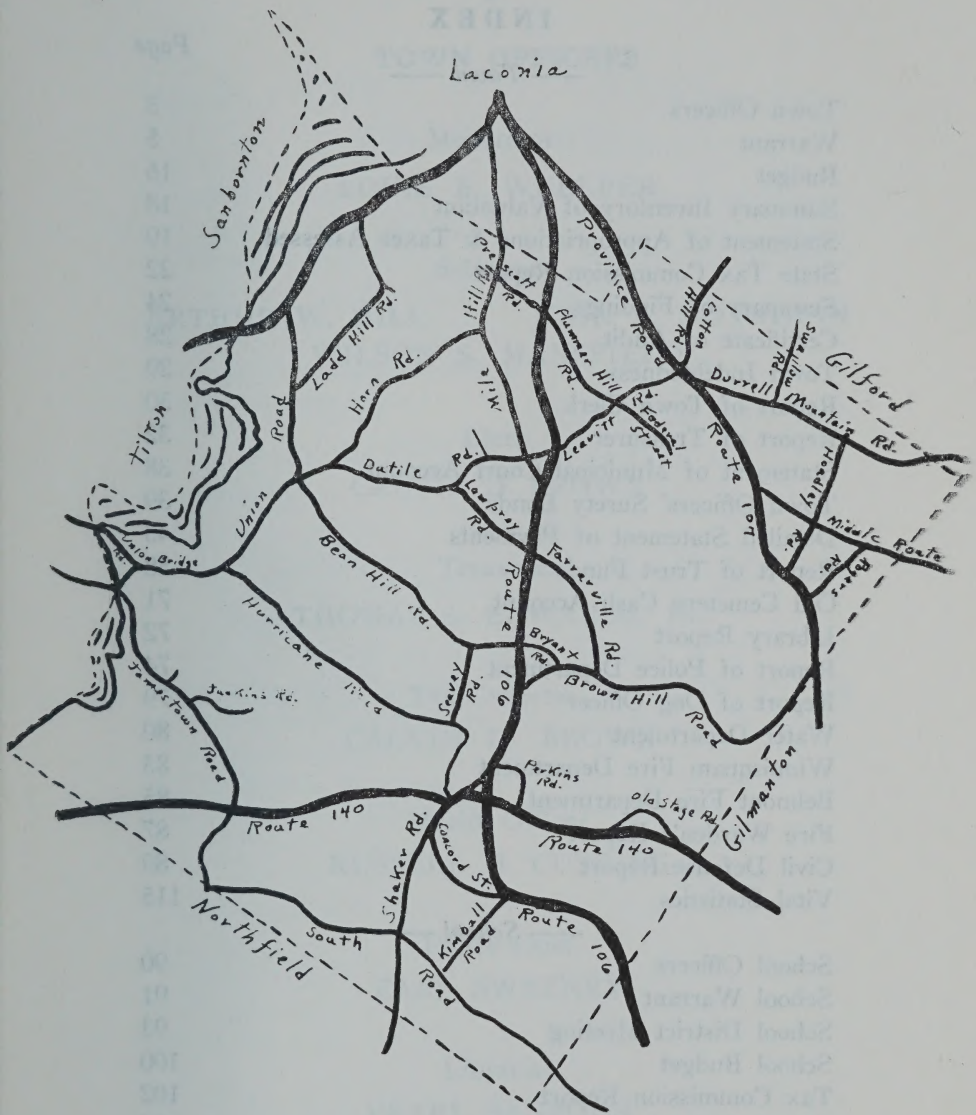

BELMONT TOWN WARRANT**The State of New Hampshire**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Belmont in the County of Belknap, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, first floor, in said Belmont on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of the Public Library for three years.

3. To see if the Town will vote to change the time and place for discussion of the Warrant in 1969 to the Saturday after the second Tuesday in March at 1 P. M. and to be held at the Roland Kimball Auditorium at the High School.

4. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee.

5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on all taxes paid within thirty days of presentation of tax bills.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of and on the credit of the town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.

7. To see what the Town will vote to do with the income from the John M.Sargent Fund.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to refinance and/or renew any loans which may become due during the current municipal year.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Collector of Taxes at the next annual Town meeting. The authority of the Selectmen to appoint the Tax Collector shall continue until the Town votes otherwise.

10. To see if the Town will vote, by ballot, to determine if they are in favor of having a three-year term for the town clerk. If a majority of those voting on the question vote in favor, at the next annual meeting after the vote of approval, the Town shall choose by ballot, a town clerk for a three-year term.

11. To see if the Town will vote to make the office of Road Agent an appointed one rather than an elected one, with the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent who is elected at the 1969 Town Elections to a definite or indefinite term of office at their discretion, with the provision that said Road Agent can only be removed from office for just cause, and after a public hearing.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck and plow for the Highway Department, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sum not in excess of \$10,000.00, as is required for such purpose, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, payable over a period not to exceed three years.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the creation of

a special unpaid committee to be known as a regional refuse disposal planning committee, consisting of three persons appointed by the moderator, such committee to join with similar planning committees, appointed by the City of Laconia and the Town of Gilford to form a regional refuse planning board as provided under RSA Chapter 53-B, to study the common refuse disposal problems of the three communities, and to study and report its findings and recommendations as provided in said chapter.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,050.00 to smooth and tar the unfinished portion of Dearborn Street from Johnson Street to Route 140.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the tarring of Plummer Hill Road, White Birch Road, Camp Foolishness Road, Four F. Road, Cotton Hill Road, Jewell Road, and Charlie Smith Apple Orchard Road between Routes 106 and 107, for a distance of 1.6 miles at a cost not to exceed \$9,000.00 and that TRA funds be used for the foregoing purpose.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000.00 for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing, altering and enlarging the town water system by acquiring such land as may be required, installing a new well, pump and pump-house with necessary equipment, laying a new main to connect the new well to distribution system, reconditioning the present well, installing meters on all present services, constructing an access road to the new well-site, and any other work incident to the foregoing. The Selectmen are authorized to borrow such sum by issuing bonds or notes of the Town payable over a period of 20 years. The expected useful life of such improvement is in excess of twenty years.

17. To see if the Town will vote to enact the proposed Zoning Ordinances published in the Laconia Evening Citizen on January 2, 1969, with the changes proposed at a public hearing held on February 18, 1969.

18. To see if the Town will enact the following by-law relating to regulation and licensing of games, rides and amusements:

No person or persons, groups, association or corporation shall conduct, hold, or operate any game of chance, or games, rides or other amusements, such as merry-go-rounds, ferris wheels, and the like, in the town without first obtaining a license therefor. Such license shall be issued by the Selectmen upon payment of a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) and upon satisfactory proof that the applicant is of good moral character, that all equipment used in connection with such games, rides or other amusements is in apparently safe condition, that applicant has obtained, at its expense, adequate police personnel to be in attendance, and that such game of chance, game, ride or amusement does not violate any law. Such license fee may be waived by the Selectmen in cases where the same are conducted by any bona fide religious, charitable, civic, veterans or fraternal organization which has been in existence within the Town for at least one year. Each game of chance, and each game, ride or other amusement conducted without license shall be considered as an individual violation hereof, and every day the same is conducted without a license shall also be considered as a separate violation. Each violation shall be punishable by a fine of \$10.00. This bylaw shall take effect upon its passage.

19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a town highway that portion of old Route 3, so-called, being the last 200 feet located at the northeasterly end of the same at its intersection with the new Route 3, near the by-pass interchange.

20. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following bylaw :

No person shall go about from place to place begging and asking or subsisting upon charity, or without suitable food, clothing and shelter and funds to procure such sustenance. Such a vagrant or tramp or vagabond shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each such offense, or sentenced to not more than two days in jail.

21. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following bylaw :

No person shall stand or climb on any bridge or its supporting structures, except the areas specifically reserved for the passage of pedestrians, and no person shall jump from any bridge or any of its supporting structures. Any person violating this by-law shall be fined \$10.00. This bylaw shall take effect upon its passage.

22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as a Town Ordinance pertaining to landfill operations :

Any person, firm, company, corporation or person owning or controlling any land in the Town of Belmont and desiring to conduct a landfill operation to improve their land or merely to fill it, or to dispose of any waste material from within or without the Town of Belmont, for a landfill operation, if the material consists of any combustible matter, or of any material such as garbage or anything that would be offensive, attract flies or rats or other rodents, or anything that would cause discomfort to landowners in the area or would devalue the land involved and the area as a whole, then contact and obtain written permission from each of the following: The Board of Selectmen of Belmont, the Health Officer, the Fire Chief, and the Chief of Police. If permission is granted by all the above officials, the person

doing the landfill shall conduct such operation according to the restrictions laid down by them and under their supervision. If the above area of operation involves more than one-half acre of land, a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen to hear any objections from landowners within the town, and the time and place of such hearing shall be posted in two public places in town at least 14 days prior to such hearing. This ordinance shall not apply to any landowner conducting a landfill operation with normal fill materials such as, but limited to, dirt, sand, gravel, rocks and bricks.

Any violation of the above ordinance will be punishable by a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) per day for each day the violation continues. During the pendency of any hearing in court on criminal action instituted by the town or on behalf of the town to stop such a landfill operation, the landowner and others involved shall forthwith cease such operation until the said ordinance has been complied with, or the court case disposed of.

23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as a Town Ordinance, defining and controlling trailer parks:

Whereas, the Town of Belmont, in the interest of protecting the public health and safety of its inhabitants, and in the interest of insuring adequate fire and other municipal protection for inhabitants residing in trailer or mobile home parks within said Town of Belmont, the following regulations are hereby adopted as a municipal ordinance for said Town of Belmont.

Section 1. DEFINITIONS. As used in this ordinance, the following terms shall have the meaning(s) indicated below:

A. The definitions and regulations adopted by the State of New Hampshire, Department of Health and Welfare, in connection with mobile home and trailer

parcs, designated as regulations 1-57 through 13-57, being adopted, pursuant to the general authority to make regulations as they may be amended from time to time by the State of New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare, are herein incorporated by reference and made a specific part hereof, and adopted by the Town of Belmont, County of Belknap, and State of New Hampshire, as part of their ordinance regulating trailer or mobile home parks.

B. "Trailer or mobile home" shall mean and include any vehicle or portable structure constructed so as to permit the occupancy thereof as a dwelling for one or more persons, including those trailers or mobile homes which have temporarily or permanently become stationary through the use of cement blocks or other foundations.

C. "Trailer or mobile home park" shall mean and include an area of land on which two (2) or more occupied trailers or mobile homes are located, either free of charge or for revenue such as rent or lease, together with any buildings or structure or enclosure used as part of the equipment of such park.

Section 2. LICENSE REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful to establish, maintain, or operate any "Trailer or mobile home park" in the Town without first having obtained a license therefor. Application for such license(s) shall be made in writing to the Board of Selectmen on such forms as they may supply, and shall contain the name and date of birth of the applicant, the location of the proposed park, and the number of trailers or mobile homes to be accommodated. The above licenses shall be considered public records, and made available by the Selectmen for inspection upon request of any resident taxpayer of Belmont.

Section 3. PLAN. Each such supplication shall be accompanied by a plan or sketch, drawn to scale,, showing the size and location of all buildings or structures, either in existence or proposed for future construction; the location of streets and driveways and off-street parking, in being or proposed; and the sites for locations of trailers or mobile homes.

Section 4. SUPERVISION. Each trailer or mobile home park, while operated, shall be in charge of a responsible attendant of good moral character at all times, who shall be responsible, with the licensee, for compliance with the provisions of this ordinance relating to the conduct of such parks.

Section 5. SPACES. A mobile home or trailer lot shall be complete before occupancy is permitted. The minimum lot size shall be $\frac{1}{4}$ acre of land. Any enclosed accessory structure that is attached to a trailer or mobile home shall, for purposes of clearance requirements, be considered a part of the mobile home or trailer. No mobile home or trailer shall be located closer than 25 feet to a paved street or service buildings within the park. A minimum of 25 feet shall be maintained between a mobile home or trailer and its side or rear lot boundaries. The above releases any mobile home or trailer already installed before passage of ordinance as far as space requirements.

Section 6. OPEN AREAS. Each mobile home site shall abut or face a roadway of not less than 30 feet in width. All deadend roads shall have a turn-around.

Section 7. GARBAGE. It shall be the duty of the owner, his agent or caretaker, to provide for the collection of garbage or waste material at least once in every seven (7) days and to otherwise maintain the park in clean and sanitary condition, at the owner's expense.

Section 8. LIGHTS. The parks shall be kept properly and adequately lighted at all reasonable times, so that the grounds shall be safe for occupants and visitors, at the owner's expense.

Section 9. WATER SUPPLY. An adequate supply of pure water for drinking and domestic purposes shall be supplied by the owner, to the occupant of each lot.

Section 10. SEWERAGE AND WASTE DISPOSAL. It shall be the duty of the owner to provide adequate sewerage disposal systems for each lot or site, said system to be not less than the standards set forth by the State of New Hampshire Department of Public Health and the Water Pollution Board, from time to time in their respective regulations, and to require that all trailers or mobile homes are provided with toilet and waste facilities that are connected and in working order before and during occupancy.

Section 11. EXCEPTIONS. Nothing in this ordinance shall be constructed to prohibit the storage of any trailer or mobile home when said trailer or mobile home is not used for living or sleeping purposes. Existing mobile home or trailer parks are permitted to operate, provided they obtain a license within 60 days of passage of this ordinance. All licenses shall be renewable annually on the anniversary of their issuance. If existing parks expand, their expansion must meet the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. UNREGISTERED VEHICLES. Unregistered motor vehicles are prohibited in trailer or mobile home parks.

Section 13. PENALTIES. If upon inspection by the Selectmen or Town Health Officer, a violation is found, a period of seven days will be allowed for correction. If at the conclusion of such seven day period the viola-

tion has not been corrected, a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) per day will be imposed for each day of violation thereafter. The Selectmen or Health Officer may order a suspension of operation, until such trailer or mobile home park corrects said violation, Any person, firm, corporation or association violating any of the other provisions of this ordinance or otherwise refusing to comply with the provisions set forth above, shall be fined ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day such violation or refusal to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall remain uncorrected, and if so ordered by the Selectmen or Health Officer, shall cease operation and vacate all trailers or mobile homes until such violation is corrected.

Section 14. SEPARABILITY. If any part or section of this ordinance shall be later adjudged unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, it shall not invalidate any other part of said ordinance.

Section 15. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect as of the first day of April, 1969.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept as public roads by acceptance of a warranty deed thereto from Lorraine R. Sturtevant the following streets as shown on the plan of Pleasant Valley Estates: Pleasant Valley Drive, Sunset Drive, Sleepy Hollow Lane, Moonshine Drive, Leisure Lane, Mount View Terrace, Welcome Road, Whispering Terrace, and Holiday Lane, as soon as the same are in a condition satisfactory to the Selectmen and to accept all the water pipes, mains and other facilities situated under said streets and in the subdivision, as a part of the town water system.

25. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS
AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Belmont for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerks, Water Department, Library, Trustees of Trust Funds and Municipal Court.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1966 - December 31, 1967: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1966 and December 31, 1967, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$5,957.37 in 1967.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues of the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$777.92 plus a revenue surplus \$1,080.93, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,858.85.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1967, is indicated in Exhibit B-2

Water Department: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Water Department for 1967, is contained in Exhibit E.

Municipal Court: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the Municipal Court Account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit H.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1967, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices

and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements submitted by depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$1,442.63, from \$23,488.34 to \$24,930.97 in 1967, as shown herewith:

Recommendations

Board of Selectmen:

Again it is suggested that the Selectmen's record of expenditures should be kept up to date at all times and pages totalled and balanced monthly.

Treasurer:

All receipts of the Town and Water Department should be entered in the respective Treasurer's Cash Books and deposits should agree with cash receipts. Both Town and Water Department Accounts should be reconciled with bank balances at the close of each month.

Unredeemed Taxes:

Again it is recommended that all Unredeemed Taxes beginning with the Levy of 1959 thru Levy of 1964 be reviewed and the Tax Collector should deed all of the properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens to the Town at once.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Belmont for their assistance during the course of the audit.

BELMONT POLICE DEPARTMENT

Report for the Year Ended Dec. 31, 1968

At the 1968 Town Meeting, the people of Belmont wisely decided to upgrade their police services by authorizing the purchase of a town-owned cruiser and the hiring of a full-time Patrolman. This was occasioned by the large population growth. (Belmont is the second fastest growing town in the Belknap County, and the third largest in population), and the resultant increased demand for police services.

In carrying out this mandate of the Town Meeting, the town purchased a 1968 model police car from Woodward's Sales and Service, the lowest among eight bidders in response to specifications advertised by the Department.

There were 21 persons who expressed interest in the Patrolman position after it was advertised, and 14 finally filed application forms. After background and character checks, only 4 were found to meet the rigid job qualifications. Of these four, 3 took the series of tests, including I.Q., Physical Agility, and Aptitude Tests, supervised by the State Department of Personnel, and oral interviews with a board composed of one neighboring Police Chief, Charles Reynolds of Gilford, one local businessman, Matthew Mirski of Winnisquam, and one local professional person, Principal Lansing K. Reinholz of Belmont High School. Of the 3 finalists, one failed to achieve a passing grade and was disqualified. The other two, both local Special Officers, were deemed qualified for the position, and Mr. Gregory Harriman decided to withdraw in favor of Mr. Andre Paquette.

Patrolman Paquette was finally appointed on July 10, 1968, and after working one month in the field, was

sent to the five-week State Police Recruit Training School in Concord, N. H. He is now on call, twelve hours a day five days a week; 24 hours the sixth day, and has one day off. The Chief works the opposite schedule, and our five Special Officers supplement the force at peak periods, as always.

The hiring of a full-time Patrolman necessitated many changes in communications and record-keeping to facilitate co-ordination between two men working opposite shifts, and despite much advance planning, many problems developed which have been worked out.

After the selection, procurement of equipment, and training period, the department finally settled down to an orderly procedure in November. Consequently, many of the beneficial results obtained by hiring a second man will not show up in this year's report, but can be expected to be reflected in 1969 statistics. However, we feel that there has already been a considerable improvement in efficiency of local police services and those who operated businesses on the outskirts of town assure us that they appreciate the nightly checks by the cruiser.

Our thanks to the people of Belmont for recognizing and meeting this need, and we hope that we shall continue to merit your support.

Our second dry hydrant was installed at the river-bank in Lochmere just north of the railroad trestle at a cost of \$250.00

A new \$17,000.00 Farrar 1000 gallon pumper truck was delivered in September and has been equipped with hose, nozzles, First Aid kits, and all other necessary and special equipment, costing \$1,900.00. It proved its value at the Dr. Robinson fire on Lancaster Hill Rd.

Our four trucks were operated a total of 603 miles on emergency calls.

Our members put in a total of 926 man hours on emergency calls. At the present time the Department has 34 regular members and 8 Junior members.

A Junior membership was started in March. The boys were trained in the use of back-pack pumps and portable gasoline engine pumps and have given excellent performance on grass and brush fires. Five of the boys were awarded First Aid Certificates after completing Red Cross training.

The Fire Station was used as a meeting place by: The 4-H Dog Club, Happy Helpers of Belmont, The Mutual Fire Aid Association, The Lake Shore Drive Association, The Belmont Shores Association, The Belmont County Law Enforcement Assn., The Belmont Centennial Committee.

A Children's Christmas Party was held on December 22nd for all children in the Winnisquam Area. Santa Claus greeted 170 children, who were given presents, ice cream and candy, and a ride on the fire truck.

REPORT OF BELMONT FIRE DEPARTMENT**For the Year Ended December 31, 1968**

The members of the Belmont Fire Dept. would like to say "thank you" to all the people of Belmont for their cooperation and assistance during the past year.

This past year has been busy for the boys of the department. Attending fire schools, attending fire drills,, etc.

This year there was an increase of numbers of calls from 120 in 1967 to 181 in 1968. Calls broken down were: fire calls 71, Ambulance calls 55, Mutual Aid calls 14, Special Service calls 41 which brings the total to 181. The Town of Belmont received Mutual Aid assistance 5 times last year.

This past year I have tried to do more inspection work which includes schools, manufacturers, places of assembly, issuing permits for installing burners, and followed by inspection, inspecting foster homes of which we now have eight in the town, having regular fire drills and fire prevention talks to school children, rechecking and recharging fire extinguishers at schools and other public buildings.

At the last Town Meeting in March 1968 the town voted to purchase a new fire truck. Specifications were drawn up and were put out for bid by the selectmen. Of the manufacturers that quoted prices, The Farrar Co. of Woodville, Mass., having the lowest bid and meeting the requirements of the specifications was awarded the contract for the new truck. The new truck is expected to be delivered to the town around the 15th of March. Everyone is invited to drop in at the fire station to see this new equipment and also see all our other equipment.

Remember when you call the Fire Department to report a fire or any emergency state clearly the name and location of the emergency.

Thanks again to all the people of Belmont, the Budget Committee and Selectmen for all their cooperation this past year.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For the Year Ended December 31, 1968

Robert Stevens, Warden Gerald H. Hight, District Chief

People cause fires. Our records show the the number of fires increases in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted match is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result - escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help :

1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
2. To *never* discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn—
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.

- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

For the Year Ended December 31, 1968

Your Civil Defense agency was able to procure a four-wheel drive military surplus "Jeep" vehicle for the Fire Department this year, which will be used for forest fire and rough-country rescue work. This vehicle has been on order for a number of years, and is the first one in good mechanical condition to become available.

Continuing the program of a strong Auxiliary Police Force, C. D. funds were used from our local budget to purchase new badges for the Police Department and Auxiliary this year. Matching funds from the federal government reimbursed the town for half the cost of a walkie-talkie radio and a mobile radio for the new town-owned police cruiser.

With the co-operation of Concord Headquarters, a shelter survey is underway to determine how much fallout shelter space is needed in town, and which public buildings, if any, can be utilized for this purpose.

The continuing interest of the Selectmen, Budget Committee, Police and Fire Chiefs, and the citizens of Belmont is appreciated for these vital programs.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING**March 9, 1968**

The Belmont School District Meeting was called to order at 2:10 pm., March 9, 1968 at the Roland S. Kimball Auditorium with approximately one hundred and twenty (120) present. Moderator Stanley F. Hill read the warrant.

Immediately thereon David Howland asked that Article 9 be acted upon.

Article 9: To see if the School District will vote to adopt as the checklist for school meetings the checklist of the town in accordance with R. S A.. 197:12a. David Howland made the motion that this be accepted as read. Motion seconded and passed.

Article 1: To choose a Moderator for the coming year. Stanley F. Hill and Frederick H. Sleep, Jr. were nominated.

Article 2: To choose a clerk for the ensuing year. Lansing Reinholz nominated Barbara Twombly.

Article 3: To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Phyllis J. Hoey nominated Norman Bolduc. Dorothy Pearl and Doris Paquette were also nominated.

Article 4: To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Roscoe E. Twombly nominated Maurice Simond, Jr. It was voted to ballot on the four articles listed above at one time. Ruth Annis and Robert W. Forsing were appointed to serve on the checklist. A reasonable time after everyone in the hall had voted, Mr. Hill declared the ballot closed and appointed the people on the checklist plus Patrick Young to count

the ballots. Mr. Hill announced that one hundred twelve (112) votes were cast, with the following results:

Moderator: Stanley Hill 73, Fred Sleep 37.

Clerk: Barbara Twombly 103.

School Board Member: Norman Bolduc 66, Dorothy Pearl 26, Doris Paquette 20.

Treasurer: Maurice Simond, Jr. 98, Robert Bordeaux 1.

Article 5: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Paul Sottak moved that the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and the compensation of other officers or agents of the District for the 1968-69 school year shall be:

Motion was seconded and carried.

Article 6: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Leonie Kolinski moved that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers chosen shall be accepted as printed in the Town Report of Belmont. Motion seconded and passed.

Article 7: To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Frederick H. Sleep, Jr moved that the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission audit the accounts of the Belmont School District as of June 30, 1968. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 8: To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Paul Lussier read each item in the budget, as has been done in past years and each item was voted on separately. There was little if any discussion on most items with the exception of the portion of item 200 concerning teachers' salaries and item 500 which concerned pupil transportation.

Item 200 is considerably higher this year than last, and the voters wanted to know why. Mr. Lussier and Mr. Sweeney both explained it. The School Board has set a base salary of \$5,200.00 for new teachers, formerly it has been \$5,000.00. Experienced teachers receive a five percent increase yearly until such time as they reach the maximum. We also have a merit system, whereby the exceptionally gifted teacher receives an additional sum.

One other item this year is for another teacher in the high school, as the principal will receive his master's degree in June. This means that he is no longer required to teach, but can give his full time to the administrative needs of the school. Item 500 came under discussion as recently a new bus schedule has

been introduced. It has the advantage of allowing the younger pupils more time at home and less spent waiting for buses. However, since operating on this new schedule, seven children in the Winnisquam area who attend parochial school in Laconia have not been transported. Although we are under no legal obligation to transport them, it was felt that we should return to the old schedule. Plus the fact that the old schedule is not quite as costly, due to less miles travelled by the buses. While the vote to return to the old schedule was not unanimous, it was declared a majority and so passed.

Upon completion of the reading of the budget, Thomas Edwards moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eighty-two thousand, nine hundred twenty-one dollars and fifty-five cents (\$382,921.55) for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. Motion seconded and passed.

Article 9: This was acted upon at the beginning of the meeting.

Article 10: To see if the school district will vote to incorporate a kindergarten in the Belmont Public School System and appropriate \$6,800 for its operation during the 1968-69 school year. Seconded by Paul Lussier. This threw the article open for discussion. Mr. Lussier asked if he might read a report

of the school board's feelings about this proposal. Their report stated that the board felt at this time, with the budget unusually high, a kindergarten should not be incorporated in the school system. At a later date it might be to our advantage to do so. The school board felt that the committee in charge of the kindergarten has done an exceptionally fine job and they should be allowed to continue for at least another year. One other point was brought out, that being there is no space available in the school for a kindergarten. After his report, Mrs. Doris Paquette spoke for the leaders of the kindergarten, stating that they wished to go along this coming year as they had last year. After a short discussion, the vote was called for. Majority voted for the kindergarten to continue on its own, without annexation to the school system at this time .

Article 11: To see if the district will vote to appoint a committee to work with the School Board for the purpose of studying school building needs in the Belmont School District. Said committee to report back at the next annual meeting.

Mr. Royal Smith, Jr. said that as long as the Winnisquam Regional project had rejected Belmont and we would not be included in their group, he would like to amend article 11 as follows:

Moved that the committee that was established for the purpose of consultation and study with the Winnisquam Regional people, with the addition of the new school board member, be continued; that this committee's scope be expanded to include study of and recommendation on any suggested school programs that could feasibly answer Belmont's future school needs; and, that the committee shall choose a subcommittee of three from its own membership to actively seek out such proposals and meet

with interested groups in other towns studying such proposals. After discussion, this was amended to read "a committee of five" to work with the school board, persons who had worked on the Winnisquam Regional committee to be asked to serve first. The motion was accepted and passed.

Article 12: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Robert E. Bordeau moved that each teacher's salary be listed in the Town Report. As employees of the town, he felt this should be a matter of record. Mr. Lansing Reinholz stated that although he did not care whether or not his salary as principal was known, he would not care to have all salaries known.

We do have a merit system and publishing salaries would make for hard feelings among the teachers. Mr. James Rhodes said that if this was published we would be unable to obtain teachers. Mr. Lussier stated that anyone could come to the school board if they desired to know a particular teacher's salary.

They have this information on record. Mr. Patrick Young stated that Mr. Bordeau was elected by the town and, therefore his salary automatically showed in the town report, as all town officials; however, teachers are hired by the school board and as long as this information is on record, there is no need for it to be published. Mr. Hill called for the vote. Majority voted to withhold this information from the town report.

Both Mr. Sweeney and Mr. Lussier thanked the townspeople for attending. They appreciated the interest shown in the schools and assured the voters that they were working for the best interests of all

concerned. If there are any problems, the board meets the first Tuesday of each month, and they will be happy to discuss any problems which concern the school with interested parties.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the Moderator adjourned the meeting.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1967 and June 30, 1968 are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$16,873.07 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968 are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$751.06, less a revenue surplus of \$741.00, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$37.06

Summary Statement of Receipts & Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is indicated in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Lunch Account is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Belmont is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1968, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1967-68 School Tax of \$238,737.72, plus an overpayment on account of the 1967-68 School Tax in the amount of \$2,000.00

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements is contained in Exhibit I.

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), there was a net overdraft of appropriations of \$751.06. Total expenditures exceeded budgetary appropriations as indicated herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R. S. A. 32:10) which has been adopted by

the Town of Belmont, in case of an emergency which necessitates making an expenditure in excess of budgetary appropriations, the School Board, with the approval of the Town budget committee, is required to apply to the State Board of Education for a certificate authorizing such emergency spending. The records do not indicate that this requirement was fulfilled.

Chapter 32, Section 10 of the Revised Statutes Annotated is quoted herewith :

“Exceeding Appropriations. In towns adopting the provisions of this chapter, no board of selectmen, school board, commissioners of a village district wholly within said town, or other expending agency shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditure of money for any purpose for which an appropriation or allotment made to it, except for the purpose of paying judgements rendered against the town or school district or said village district, provided, however, that in case of sudden and unexpected emergency the selectmen or village commissioners on application to the tax commission and the school board on application to the state board of education, after hearing, may be given a certificate of emergency authorizing them to make such expenditure or incur such liability, provided that no such certificate of emergency shall be granted unless the budget committee of the town has approved the expenditure. In cases arising during the year following the annual meeting where changes occur which make it unnecessary to use the amount appropriated for a specific purpose, an unexpended balance may be transferred by the board of selectmen or the school board or the village commissioners of such village district from one appropriation to another, provided the total amount expended for all purposes does not exceed the total amount appropriated at the town, school or village district meetings for all purposes.”

**Fiscal Accounting Records Prescribed for E. S. E. A.
Title I Funds:**

Regulations governing fiscal accounting records for "E. S. E. A. Title I" funds granted the District require separate accounts with accurate line item records of receipts and expenditures to be kept for each approved project. The use of separate purchase orders, as well as segregated vendor and payroll manifests are likewise required.

Accordingly, appropriate control and detail ledger accounts should be maintained for each individual program. These records should reflect the financial activities for the entire fiscal life of the program and are to be closed at the termination of project activities or after all obligations incurred have been discharged.

Disposition of unencumbered or unexpended funds should be clearly indicated on the records.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal), shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Belmont School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

At the close of the 1967-68 school year six staff members left the Belmont School System and Mrs. Ruth Cutting retired from teaching. This represents a 22% change in our faculty which is the same as the previous year and one additional teacher hired for the Junior-Senior High School to keep pace with expanding enrollments.

In terms of enrollment the present second grade has 75 pupils with only two teachers. This situation demands our attention in terms of adding a teacher to bring this class size to 25 per teacher. Also there are children who experience extreme difficulty with school work. If we are to give all our children an equal opportunity in education, consideration should be given to starting a special class.

In our elementary school the new reading program has been extended to grade two and will continue to be added to a subsequent grade each year. At this time we are pleased with the results from this program and believe that our elementary reading is gaining in effectiveness. Supplemental to our basic reading we are continuing extra reading help for second grade pupils who have reading problems. This program is financed by federal funds.

At the junior-senior high school the rotating schedule has been continued this year; also considerable progress has been made in expanding the school library. This not only serves as a place to get books but a work area with reference material readily available to pupils studying.

In the English Department efforts are underway to reach more students on an individual basis by attempting a three track program instead of a two track program.

We are pleased with the general attitude, behavior and efforts of our students, we are however constantly examining

ways to improve our methods to give our pupils the best education possible.

During the past year, many repairs and renovations have been accomplished in the Belmont Schools.

At the Memorial School, a large supply room was partitioned to establish an area for remedial reading. Compensating storage area was made available by enclosing an area on the first floor.

At the High School, it was found necessary to retread the main stairway. Also several areas were painted during the summer.

Many items of minor repair and painting have also been accomplished by the custodial staff.

I would like to express my thanks to the Citizens, the Board of Education and School Personnel for the help given me this yast year.
