To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs. You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year and fix their compensations.

2 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

Section A Town officers' salaries.

" B Town officers' expenses.

" C Election and registration expenses.

" D Expense Town Hall and general office expense.

" E Police department, including care of tramps.

" F Fire department, including forest fires.

" G Health department.

" H Vital statistics.

" I Town proportions, trunk line maintenance.

" J Town maintenance, general highways, including permanent improvement by law, lighting and water and general expense of highway department.

" K Breaking roads and snowing bridges.

" L Library, in addition to amount required by law.

" M Town poor.

" N Memorial Day.

" O Other celebrations.

" P Damages and legal expenses.

" Q Interest on temporary loans.

" R State taxes.

" S County taxes.

3 To see what action the town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

4 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town the sum of \$15,000 if needed.

5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to purchase a motor truck and equipment to use on its highways.

6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to obtain State Aid for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.

7 To see what action the town will take in regard to the Mary Banfill fund so called.

8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of building Tarvia or other permanent highways in the villages of Conway and North Conway, agreeable to a petition of A. A. Phelps, A. D. Davis and others.

9 To see if the voters of the town will raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the reconstruction and repair of the road leading past the Ivy and Potter places, from the outlet of Walker's Pond, to the line of the town of Eaton, near the Davidson place so called, agreeable to a petition of Wm. F. Weeks and others.

10 To see what action, if any, the town will take in regard to collecting licenses of dogs.

11 To see what action the town will take in regard to Hanson's brook bridge, so called and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

12 To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

While our records show a somewhat decreased circulation, due to the partial closing of the library during the winter months to conserve fuel, and entire closing

for the month of October, the average daily issue is materially increased. In fact, it has been a year of increased activity in all ways, the library having tried to do its part in every way possible for the various war demands that have arisen. A large number of Food Emergency bulletins were distributed in the interest of food conservation; Conservation meetings held in the library rooms, which have also been used as headquarters for the Conway Red Cross Branch.

The two campaigns of the American Library Association for books for the soldiers and sailors were responded to liberally by library patrons, about two hundred books having been forwarded to headquarters for distribution among the camp and overseas libraries.

Attendance at the reading room has been unusually large, and the number of papers and magazines augmented by the gifts of several citizens, to whom our thanks are due.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY, CENTER CONWAY.

During the past season there was a perceptible decrease in the circulation of books, due in large part to the war and its many activities the home people entered into with such earnestness and zest.

The circulation has been 1,039 fiction, 691 Juvenile, and 327 miscellaneous.

Report of School Board

To the Citizens of the Conway School District:—

We submit our report which includes the report of the superintendent of schools, and a financial statement of our accounts for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1918. This financial report covers the transactions from Feb. 16, 1917, to Aug. 31, 1918. An itemized account from Feb. 16, 1917 to Feb. 1, 1918, was given in last year's report, so that this year we give the balances as reported last year and an itemized account from the time that report was issued until the end of the fiscal year, Aug. 31, 1918.

There is a now bill before the legislature which reorganizes the whole system of raising school money and apportionment of state aid. Therefore, in order that the school district may conform to the new regulations, the annual school meeting will not be held until we know just what changes are made.

In accordance with chapter 52, session laws of 1909, the School Board recommend to the Selectmen that the sum of \$1100.00 is necessary for books and supplies from Aug. 31, 1919, to Aug. 31, 1920.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the School Board and Citizens of Conway:

I have the honor and pleasure to submit for your consideration my first annual report of the progress and condition of the schools of Conway.

CONDITIONS DURING THE YEAR.

As this report is an important part of the history of the town and schools, it is proper that mention should be made of the effects of the Great War, as it has made its demands for material of all *kinds, including human material*. Some of the teachers left the work of teaching for the better paid positions in government service that were demanding helpers; so we have been confronted with a shorter supply of teachers and a demand for higher wages. How long this condition is to continue no one knows. But we cannot hope for lower prices on board, fuel, paper, books, and conveyance for some time; indeed some of these things are continuing to advance. It was found, during the summer, that male teachers in our high schools could not be obtained for the salary we could afford to pay; and it was decided to employ female principals. This has proved unusually satisfactory, and the work of the schools has not suffered. The supply of science teachers has not been equal to the demand, as women in college do not, as a rule, take the sciences, and we have had much difficulty in giving a strong science course. This, however, will be reviewed next year.

At the end of the school year a number of our best teachers decided not to return, so it was necessary to engage new teachers. So far as possible Normal teachers have been secured, and we have been unusually fortunate in the teachers selected.

The influenza has interfered seriously with the work of the schools. By order of the Board of Health, all of the schools were closed for three weeks, and people have been so alarmed by this fearful scourge that they have kept their children at home, even when the schools were in session. In view of the fact that the disease has been so fatal, one cannot blame parents for feeling as they have about the matter. But the teachers have been instructed to keep a vigilant watch for any symptom of disease and to promptly send home any pupil who has suspicious symptoms. They have also been cautioned to exercise the greatest care about exposing pupils to draughts and to see that the younger pupils have dry feet and are properly clothed on going out of doors. So, it would seem that the schools are as safe a place for children to be in as there can be made.

REPAIRS.

The repairs for the year have been as follows:— At Kearsarge—a lavatory with bubble fountain and running water has been installed. The North Conway schoolhouse has been shingled. Considerable money has been expended on the pump and water supply at Conway Center. This pump has given considerable trouble for several years, and I do not feel that the trouble is over. Some scheme should be devised to overcome the difficulties this presents. The pupils at North Conway have started a fund to put a floor in the room now used for basketball. The floor is much needed, as there is but a single floor now, and there are holes in this where there is danger of the pupils being injured. One side of the West Side schoolhouse must be shingled soon. Electric lights should be installed in the Conway schoolhouse.

TESTS.

Efficiency tests have not been given this year, as there have been so many new problems that I have had no time for this. I plan to give them, however, during the spring term.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL.

In the 7th and 8th grades plans should be made for introducing and carrying forward work that will give the pupils an introduction to high school work, thus interesting the pupil, and developing a desire for a high school course. This can be done without increasing the number of teachers and will in no way impair the efficiency of the work in the fundamental subjects.

MUSIC AND DRAWING.

We were unfortunate in losing the services of Miss Marion Stephen, who was offered a position with a salary much in advance of what we could pay. Under her leadership the pupils had made excellent progress, as the public exhibitions gave undisputed evidence. Through her energy an exhibit of reproductions of famous pictures was given, and the proceeds of this exhibit were used for the purchase of pictures for the Conway and North Conway schools, where they will be constant teachers of beauty and taste. Miss Harriet Butler was engaged to take this position in the fall term. But she was here for so short a time that she did not have time to develop the work. The supply of teachers of Music and Drawing seemed to be completely exhausted and for a time we have been without such a teacher. We have now engaged Mrs. Inez Lord, a graduate of the Boston Conservatory and a teacher of experience, and we trust that this work will now go forward with energy.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

Last June we had two high school graduations. Two pupils graduated at Conway, and five at North Conway. Fine programs were carried out with such success as to reflect great credit upon the work of both the teachers and the pupils. A most gratifying feature is the fact that most of these graduates have continued their preparation for usefulness by attending higher institutions of learning. Those who did not go away

to school are holding acceptably important positions. Fifteen pupils are attending Fryeburg Academy. For one reason or another some prefer to send their pupils to other schools. We hope to make our own schools so superior that no one will find an excuse for pupils going out of town for high school work. A number of tuition pupils from other towns shows that others are looking to Conway for high school privileges.

MEDICAL INSPECTION.

Last year the District voted to raise and appropriate \$100 for the object of medical inspection. The Drs. Shedd and Horn had generously promised to make the inspection free of charge, if a small sum was raised to defray the cost of stationery, cards, etc., and clerk hire. Before the schools opened Dr. George Shedd died. Then the influenza struck the country. So that this much-needed work has not been done. But I hope that it is only delayed, as the need for this inspection is more apparent than ever. The results of the inspection of the men called for military service showed that an alarming number of our young men, and particularly those from the rural districts, were physically unfit for military service. It is also pointed out that much of this physical unfitness is due to defects that could easily have been prevented or corrected if proper physical conditions and corrective measures had been applied in early life. Adenoids, diseased teeth and other conditions found in so many children, lead to serious conditions that hamper and impede people throughout their whole lives. Another small sum should be raised and this necessary work done at once.

ENUMERATION.

The enumeration of the school children last September showed a falling off of 36. This was due mostly to the effect of the war, as business at Redstone has been at a standstill and many families have moved away. With the return of normal conditions, with plenty of work in the quarries, the numbers will again increase.
