In the Epping town report for Feb. 1840 is the following:

"Paid to Rowena L. Thyng for instructing school in district no. 1 - 7-1/2 months at \$10.00 per month - \$75.00."

Rowena lived with an uncle and aunt Samual Lawrence and wife, at Red Oak Hill, some half mile north of the school.

The old Lawrence place where Rowena lived during the Whittier courtship was completely destroyed by fire Thanksgiving Day 1943.

The late Mr. and Mrs. William Woods lived there when they were first married. Mrs. Edmond Blair lived there when she was teaching at Red Oak Hill School.

The house was located near where Miss Elizabeth Swain's trailer now is on the Daniel Harvey property.


John Greenleaf Whittier, the then young Quaker poet, often was in Lee - a Quaker community - for visits with relatives by the name of Cartland.

An old oak tree was behind the barn, now gone. Cut in the bark were two hearts enmeshed. In one were the initials "J.G.W." and in the other "R.L.T."

In the house upon a cupboard door was a duplicate of the hearts.

It was generally believed that Whittier was the victim of a lifelong love tragedy as he never married.

Born in Fremont, N. H. in 1910, the son of Conrad Marcotte and Carrie Gardner, Philip A. Marcotte, known by everyone as Phil, moved to Epping in 1927 and married Beatrice Gage in 1932. He was the father of two children, Gail T. Marcotte and Mrs. Pamela Holmes. He and Beatrice raised two nieces, Mrs. Martha Keezer and Mrs. Katherine Gregg; and two nephews, Edwin and John Brackett.

He played semi-professional baseball as a catcher for years. He also was an avid horse lover. He trained and raced Standardbred horses. When he was no longer able to take an active part in training and racing them, he maintained an active interest.

He worked for his father, who was in the coal and ice business, before he started his employment with Merrimack Farmer's Exchange. He started out at the Exchange as a Grainhandler and was later promoted to Manager, and worked there for 35 years.

His first civic office was that of Selectman, to which he was elected in 1956. He served at this post for three years with Edmond Blair and George Moquin. He was appointed and served as Auditor for two years, and he was elected as Supervisor of the Checklist in 1966. It was in this position that he was serving at the time of his passing on May 10, 1968.

In an era of social upheaval, an era of new realities demands new values - or re-interpretation of old ones.

Such a view can free us from the sense of isolation, from the haunting questions; "Who am I? Where did I come from? What am I a part of?"

All of us are a very important part of Epping.

As Justice Oliver Kendall Holmes observed: "It is not so much where we stand, it is a question of in what direction are we moving."

May we, at this point, review our voting at last year's Town Meeting?

1. Are we taking care of our present needs?

2. Are we keeping the identity of Epping?

3. Are we preparing for the future?

4. Are we unwilling to accept the changes that are sure to be coming?

SONS OF GOV. WILLIAM PLUMER

George Washington Plumer and his brother Samuel went into general merchandising in Epping from about 1812 or 1813 until 1837, and were leading business men of this section, having stores at Gilmanton and Brentwood besides the one in Epping. The "Plumer Store" was well patronized and enjoyed the reputation of the utmost fair dealing.

It was located this side of "Plumer Crest" across the road from the old Town House.

In 1841, Samuel and J. J. Plumer were in business as partners. The town purchased the following for the Poor Farm, which was located where Hap Willard's is now, owned at that time by Thomas Folsom.

MINUTES 1968 TOWN MEETING

The following is a report of the annual town meeting of March 12, 1968.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator Claude Goodrich. The warrant was read and the following motion was made, to postpone action on articles 2 through 16 until March 19, 1968 at 7:30 P.M. This motion was put to a vote and carried in the affirmative. The ballots were then counted and the following town officers were elected: Selectman, Paul B. Evans, Town Clerk and Tax Collector, Beatrice G. Marcotte, Treasurer, Henry C. Holt, Auditors, Wallace deRochemont & Frank Langdon, Library Trustee, Richard F. Sanborn, Trustee of Trust Funds, Daniel W. Harvey, Overseer of Poor, Wallace deRochemont.

The postponed town meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Claude A. Goodrich on March 19, 1968 at 7:30 P.M. The moderator read the warrant.

Article 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Under this article the budget was read. It was explained that the employees retirement and social security was a necessary item and had to be included. A question of the increase in the police department was explained due to the officers pay and insurance. A motion was made to decrease winter maintenance this was voted on and passed. A motion was made to decrease town poor this motion was voted on and passed.

Article 3: To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for roads, bridges and sidewalks.

This article was taken up in the budget.

Article 4: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.

This article was taken up in the budget.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

A motion was made to accept this article. This motion was put to a vote and passed.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by tax title or otherwise either by private sale or public auction, providing that if such property is to be sold at public auction, then the same shall be advertised 15 days in advance of sale with notice thereof posted in three public places.

A motion was made to accept this article. An amendment was made to this article to read (to be sold at public auction or by private sale). The motion on the amendment was put to a vote and carried. A motion was made to accept article 6 as amended this put to a vote and carried.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$980.93 and the State to contribute \$6,539.55 towards Class V construction for the improvement to our town.

This article was voted on and passed.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for the purchase of 1,000 feet of 1-1/2 inch fire hose.

A motion to amend this article to read 2-1/2 inch hose. This amendment passed. A motion was in order to raise the amount to \$1,350.00. This motion passed. A motion was then made to accept article 8 as amended and passed.

Article 9: To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to the restoration of the so-called "Town Clock" located in the tower of the Epping Community Church.

There were several reports given and they revealed to the public that it was in serious condition. A motion was made to appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair restoration of the bell & clock. This motion passed in the affirmative.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 to provide and erect a chain link fence at the site of the Epping Town dump.

There was a lengthy discussion on this article after which a vote was taken to adopt this article and passed.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to purchase Visiting Nurse services for the inhabitants of Epping from the Exeter Visiting Nurse extension service.

A motion was made to amend the amount to \$3,784.00. A motion was made to accept the article as amended and passed.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the West Epping Mary F. Blair Memorial Building, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine.

A motion was made to lease the Mary F. Blair Memorial

Building to the West Epping Community Club for the amount of \$1.00 for 5 years and the club to give the Selectmen a receipt for the insurance on the building. This motion was put to a vote and passed.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to publish the property assessments in the Annual Town Report every four years beginning in 1972.

This article was voted on and passed.

Article 14: To see if the Town will appropriate funds for the tarring of the School House Road from the so called Beede Road to the end of the gravel road near the property of Arthur Hartford.

This article was tabled.

Article 15: 'To see if the Town will appropriate \$400.00 for complete annual auditing by public accountants of all Town Officers financial accounts.

An amendment was made to reduce the auditors salary to \$10.00 if the original article passed. A motion was made to accept article 15 and passed.

Article 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. A suggestion was made to reconsider the expenses to the Town Hall and other buildings and to raise the amount \$2,000.00 to repair the Town Hall. A motion was then in order to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to repair the Town Hall and passed.

The total budget was \$387,378.68 and a motion was made to accept the budget and passed.

Meeting adjourned.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

ON 1968 WARRANT

ARTICLE III

This year we have stayed nearer to the amount of money appropriated for roads, bridges and sidewalks. We had repairs made to the brick wall on the Main Street bridge.

We recommend a larger sum for summer maintenance for cutting brush and resurfacing some of the highways.

ARTICLE V

We borrowed \$173,000.00 in anticipation of taxes. All notes were paid before Dec. 2, 1968. We received a discount for prompt payment. Our interest rate was 3.9%. Interest amounted to \$3,421.65. We saved \$578.35 by early payment.

ARTICLE VI

We have taken some property for non-payment of taxes. Since last year, we have acquired deeds to other properties and plan to dispose of them as soon as possible.

ARTICLE VII

The money represented in this article, \$7,520.48, was used to complete the Dump Road from Rte. 125 to Rte. 87. We used some on Prescott Road and redressing the roads which were improved last year; namely, Main St., Prescott Rd. and the Dump Road.

ARTICLE VIII

This was carried out as the article stated. The Fire Dept. still needs more hose of different sizes.

ARTICLE IX

This is relative to the "Town Clock." This contract was let to Mr. Mahlon Burtt. According to Mr. Burtt, this work is very time consuming in obtaining replacement parts. At this time, it is nearly ready to reassemble and should be operating in a very short time.

ARTICLE X

The chain link fence was purchased and installed.

ARTICLE XI

We feel that the Visiting Nurse is one of the most needed services ever offered to the townspeople. With hospital and nursing home prices rising to the present day level, this service has enabled many of our people to remain in their own homes in comfort and with the necessary care. It has saved the town hundreds of dollars.

ARTICLE XII

The town voted to lease the West Epping School to the West Epping Community Club for 5 years. We met with a committee from the club. They did not have the necessary money available for repairs, insurance and the lease. Negotiations ended at this point. After this, the protective covering was removed from the windows, vandals have broken windows and sash. Over all, extensive damage has been done to the building. The town has paid the insurance.

ARTICLE XIII

It was voted to publish the property assessments in the annual Town Report every four years.

ARTICLE XIV

Voted "NO."

ARTICLE XV

This was carried out as voted in the affirmative. This work was done by an accredited accountant, Mr. Herbert Hunt of Hampton, N.H. Mr. Hunt worked for the Municipal Accounting Division of the N. H. State Commission for 17 years.

Each year, the interest and dividends of the invested principal has been growing, most banks are paying 5% interest now, and the Puritan Fund (in which almost \$10,000 is invested) is paying over \$1,000 a year dividends. The library has benefited greatly from this increased income. Many new reference books, as well as children's and adult fiction and non-fiction, have brought up-todate our fast-moving historical events and changing methods.

Epping is most grateful to such far-sighted people as Caleb and Mary French and their generosity to the future citizens of the town and nation.

POLICE REPORT

I respectfully submit my Police report for the year 1968.

During my term of office, I have had the full cooperation of the Sheriff's Department, the State Police, and officers in neighboring towns in all matters. This is the first time in my twentyone years as your Chief of Police that unfounded charges have been levelled at me by any member of the Board of Selectmen.

The complaints which were made against our department seem to center upon traffic violations; however, the same problems are being experienced in other small and similar communities throughout the State of New Hampshire.

The total annual appropriation for the Epping Police Department is \$5,500.00. This sum is designated to pay for all expenses of the department including salaries of the chief and special officers. As a result of holding office, I am on call 24 hours a day. Needless to say, much of the work of the Police Department receives no publicity at all. Many hours are spent on routine matters, including patrolling of the town during the night and investigating crimes committed within the town; in many instances, no compensation is made for the hours spent on this type of duty.

The statistics shown above and extensive services made available by your library are made possible by many helping hands. The past year, our assistant librarians were Judie Murphy and Claire McNabb, and helper Beth Ingraham. This summer, while your librarian was at the University taking two more courses in Public Library Techniques, through the generosity of the Women's Club Scholarship, Mrs. Carolyn Lewis substituted and did a very able job. The Bookmobile visited us three times and supplemented our limited selection. Many special requests have been filled by the District Service Center and the State Library. The State Library has again allotted us one hundred dollars towards reference books, and this has been applied towards a new set of Collier's Encyclopedias. Free films are loaned to us for our children's programs. We have our own new movie projector, which I have learned to operate and enjoy very much.

The Friends of the Library purchased a new section of shelves for our reference collection, and under the presidency of Mrs. Louise Harvey, have held work meetings, adding to the usefulness and beauty of the library. More Memory Books have been added to the collection, and friends have donated many fine fiction and non-fiction books and magazines. The library started opening Monday mornings from 9 - 11 A.M. during the summer months and is continuing, so now library services are available 17-1/2 hours a week.

During a ten week period in the summer, grammar-school age children participated in a summer reading program. This program will be accelerated next summer so more children may take advantage of the opportunity.

The new lighted world globe has been placed in the library in memory of Mr. and Mrs. D. Watson Ladd by the family. A projector table for use in the Ladd Room has been ordered and is also given in memory by the Ladd family.

The table with discarded books near the door will be continued; all books not suitable for library use or too worn for circulation will be placed there and all income from their sale will be invested in new books.

In September, the school teachers of Epping and our Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Principal attended the annual tea given by the trustees. Many helpful ideas were forthcoming and your librarian is grateful. Mrs. June Cote's 4-H club again, this October, displayed their Deerfield Fair projects for evcyone's enjoyment who viewed their very talented efforts. We inite organizations to display their projects, talents, etc. in the liwary.

May I again express my thanks to the patrons of the Harvey-Mitchell Memorial Library for making my job such an enjoyable one this past year, and hope I may always be of service to one and all.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER



I believe with the enaction of the town law governing trailers, many of the problems concerning proper sewage disposal will be eliminated. In the past, trailers were placed very quickly on any type of land, sometimes spontaneously, making it very difficult to keep up with the many complaints or even to discover where the trailers existed.

One of the chief complaints was the inadequacy of the soil to filter out wastes from septic tanks and leach beds because of the high clay consistency of the soil or because of its swampy or wet location. Also there were many attempts to place too many trailers on very small areas of land, with no possible chance of proper sewage disposal. There has also been the problem of a great many trailers with no sewage disposal arrangements whatsoever, permitting the wastes to be deposited on the ground immediately under the trailer. One had an open hole dug in the ground five feet from the trailer. Many had no water or electricity. Also many trailers were set up too close to brooks, ponds and streams, where it would be impossible for the water not to be contaminated, thus breaching town, state and federal laws. As mentioned, I believe most of these conditions will now be avoided.

On a more positive note - with all the complaints from people throughout the United States, especially in the larger cities about inadequate and unsatisfactory water for drinking, many being forced to drink water from contaminated rivers and lakes. Epping probably has the purest water in the entire country. The four to five tests that are made each year from our town well supply show it to be free from all bacterial organisms that are harmful, with no drugs or additives that would destroy its taste or value. We should be proud.

I wish to personally thank those who have been cooperative intearing down old condemned uninhabited houses and sheds, which distract from the beauty and health of our town.

BICYCLE REGISTRATIONS

As the state law requires that bicycles be registered, we plan to license all bicycles in town after an inspection by an authorized agent. We feel this is mandatory for the safety of the children, as too many bicycles are not equipped with proper lights or reflectors when operating after dark.

LICENSING DOGS

Every year, there are a few people who do not obtain dog licenses as required by state law. In fairness to the great majority who do license their dogs, we feel we must strictly enforce this law this year. The deadline for licensing dogs is April 30. Owners of any dogs without licenses, and so apprehended, shall be liable for court action.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Your Planning Board is a study group. It is charged with investigating the effects of growth and change on the town -- and then proposing fair and workable solutions which will assure Epping a sound future.

Its primary concern is the wise use of land and other resources.

To carry out this assignment the Board had three major activities during 1968:

1. Making a plot-by-plot map of the town.

2. Studying, and later proposing, an ordinance to help the town comply with new state laws in regard to water pollution, and to adopt precautions for the protection of the soon-to-beinstalled sewage system.

3. Studying the present and past school population and physical plant, and projecting future school needs -- with emphasis on the possibility of additional school construction. This study was ordered by a vote of the 1968 School District meeting.

The ordinance was adopted by the town at a special meeting October 12th, after a series of well-attended meetings and hearings, discussed the situation, and helped write the ordinance. The school study will be presented to the town prior to the 1969 School District meeting. It consists of two segments, one outlining the history of recent school developments, and the other projecting future needs. Work on the map continues.

The Board has four basic operating policies:

1. To get as many people as possible involved in the planning process, through subcommittees, help from interested individuals, etc. Planning the future of Epping is far too big a job for the Planning Board alone.

2. To undertake projects which will be of service to individual citizens.

3. To give full publicity to all its activities.

4. That all meetings be open to the public. They are held alternate Thursdays at Town Hall.

In the two years of its existence, the present Planning Board has barely scratched the surface of matters requiring study. There is much to be done . . . but the Board does not want to go too fast, since hasty planning is usually bad planning.

Among the tasks to be considered in 1969 are:

1. Study our water and sewer systems, to determine their potential expansion and any possible problems.

2. Investigate the desirability and possibility of attracting new industry.

3. Review the building code in its entirety.

4. Survey present and potential water resources for use in fire protection.

5. Begin planning for the substantial changes necessary in the town's dump under the new state law which prohibits burning after January, 1971.

To keep the town informed of its progress in 1969, the Board will distribute a series of regular reports, in addition to the usual publicity on radio and in newspapers.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Committee has met several times during the past year. Members are: Louise Harvey, Chairman; Lorraine Rauh, Secretary; Kay Straw, Treasurer; Elizabeth Bourne and Richard Sanborn.

The committee learned of funds that were available through the Spaulding Potter Trust Fund to help Conservation Committees get started, by enabling them to provide educational programs to let the local people know of our needs. We applied and received \$250.00 for this purpose. We have thought of many things that could be done in Epping, but we need the people in the community to help freely.

The "Scout Field", as we have known it for so many years, is a spot that has great possibilities as a camping and picnic ground. On the first Saturday in March, a schedule was planned to prune trees and clear brush. Such other programs will be conducted again and our call for help extends to all 4-H members, scouts, clubs and citizens who wish to enjoy working together for the betterment of their community.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

Herculano Silveira has been appointed Civil Defense Head by the Selectmen and approved by the State Civil Defense, Mr. George Moses, Director.

Civil Defense and the Volunteer Fire Department met recently at the Fire Station with Mr. David Hayden, Assistant State Director, to make plans for the future activities of Civil Defense in our town.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

All officers of the Town were audited including the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Clerk, Water Department, Library, Trustees of Trust Funds, Sewer Project and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Exhibit A-1 is a Balance Sheet as of December 31, 1968. The Assets and Liabilities are shown with the Liabilities exceeding the Assets, showing a Net Debt of \$387,547.46. Exhibit A-2 is a Statement of Appropriations, Receipts, Expenditures and Balances unexpended or overdrawn. Exhibit A-3 is a Statement of Estimated and Actual Revenues showing excess and deficits and the Budget Summary.

DEPARTMENTS

Exhibits B-1 through I show summaries of each department's receipts, expenditures and proof of balance. All monies were accounted for by reconciling with depository banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS

With minor exceptions, the records of the Town Officials were in good condition. The Trustees of Trust Funds are confused and have invested in a common trust fund, which is complicated and a lot of work to maintain. Your auditor suggested that each fund be invested in a separate account, therefore a better control would be maintained. The Tax Collector's records were not completed, but with the experience gained this year they will be in excellent condition in the future.

To the Town Officials, many thanks for the long hard hours you endured with us during the course of the audit. In Future years we hope the audit can be completed in two days.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epping in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epping on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for roads, bridges and sidewalks.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by tax title or otherwise either by private sale or public auction providing that if such property is to be sold at public auction or private sale then the same shall be advertised 15 days in advance of sale with notice thereof posted in three public places. Selectmen

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convert the West Epping Mary E. Blair Memorial Building into a "Fire Station" for housing two fire trucks and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for such conversion. Selectmen

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the West Epping Mary E. Blair Memorial Building, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats, showing streets or the widening thereof, or parks and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Register of Deeds of the County of Rockingham, a certificate or notice showing that said Planning Board has been so authorized, as provided in Section 19-29 inclusive. Chapter 36, RSA as amended.

10. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the Planning Board of the Town of Epping and rescind any authority given to such Planning Board by previous vote of the Town.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,000.00 for the purchase of 1,000 feet of 1-1/2 inch fire hose. Epping Volunteer Fire Department - Selectmen

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Chief to send Fire apparatus out of town and receive fire apparatus from other towns on a donated basis in accordance with provisions of RSA Chapter 154. Epping Volunteer Fire Department

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to provide additional accident and disability insurance for Police and Firemen Departments. Selectmen

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town. Selectmen

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$974.99 and the state to contribute \$6,499.96 towards Class V Construction and for improvement to our town. Selectmen

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinances, regulating the use of the Town Dump:

- (1) Any public dump within the limits of the Town of Epping owned or maintained by the Town shall be open at such times and under such conditions as the Selectmen may from time to time determine.
- (2) Any legal resident of the Town of Epping or any person owning real property in said Town shall be permitted to use any public dump under the terms and conditions herein set forth.
- (3) The following conduct and actions are prohibited at any public dump:
 - a. Dump picking; loitering; dumping over fence; shooting; dumping on roadway; dumping of junk vehicles or parts thereof, or logs, lumber, brush and trees.

- (4) Any legal resident or real property owner of the Town of Epping shall be entitled to obtain from the Selectmen without charge a permit to use said public dumps in accordance herewith and any permit so issued shall expire on the first day of May following the date of issuance.
- (5) Any person, firm, or corporation engaged or employed by any legal resident or property owner of the Town shall be entitled to obtain a permit without charge to use public dumps for the sole purpose of removing rubbish from the property of the owner or legal resident by whom said person, firm, or corporation may be engaged.
- (6) Any person, firm or corporation not a legal resident or real property owner of the Town of Epping shall not be permitted to enter or use any public dump within said Town without first paying a fee based upon the following schedule:
 - \$1.00 for each entry per pleasure vehicle;
 - \$2.00 for each entry per commercial vehicle of less than two-ton capacity;
 - \$5.00 for each entry per commercial of two-ton or greater capacity.
- (7) Any person violating any of the provisions of this bylaw shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10.00 for each offense. The Selectmen of the Town of Epping shall prosecute all violations upon notification by any town employee of a violation.
- (8) This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

17. To see if the Town will vote to have a re-appraisal of all properties in the town of Epping. Selectmen

18. To see if the Town will vote to hot top School House Road from Depot Road to the Arthur Hartford residence.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

1968 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

School District Officers were elected as follows:

Moderator - Claude A. Goodrich Clerk - Flora M. Goodrich Treasurer - Elizabeth A. Bilodeau School Board Member - Jack O. Lavoie

REVIEW OF WARRANT ARTICLES

The school district meeting was called to order by Moderator Claude A. Goodrich on March 9, 1968 at 1:00 p.m.

The Moderator suggested that Articles 1 through 4 are included in the budget and that we proceed to the budget.

Chairman Robert Kimball, suggested that we act on Articles 5, 6, 7 first because they would affect the budget.

Article 5 - To see if the Epping School District will authorize the Epping School Board to employ a physical education instructor and to see what sum of money the district will appropriate for his salary. Mr. Kimball moved that this article be tabled for one year due to economic reasons. Mrs. Averill seconded the motion and it carried.

Article 6 - To see if the Epping School District will authorize the Epping School Board to contract for a fourth school bus and to see what sum of money the district will appropriate for that purpose. Mr. Kimball moved that this article be tabled. Frank Lavoie seconded the motion and it carried.

Article 7 - To see if the Epping School District will authorize the Epping School Board to install rubber safety stair treads on stairs in Central School and Watson Academy. Jack Lavoie moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for this. Mr. Kimball seconded the motion and it carried.

The Moderator ruled that due to the fact that no legal checklists would be available until after Tuesday, March 12th, that the meeting should be postponed until Saturday, March 16, 1968 at 7:00 p.m. to take action on Article 8 and the rest of the warrant.

Moderator Claude Goodrich called the meeting to order at 7:15 p.m. on March 16, 1968.

The Moderator then proceeded to the unfinished business of March 9 by reading the motion made by Mr. Anderson and seconded by Mr. Kimball as follows:

ARTICLE 8

I move that the school district raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing twelve acres of land, a portable stage, gym equipment, folding chairs, classroom desks and chairs, and further, to authorize the school board to contract for the installation of resilient tile flooring, accoustical tile ceilings, lockers, glass basketball backboards, folding bleachers, for the painting of several interior and exterior areas, for the finishing of the gym floor and for the construction of necessary drives and walks; all to complete the construction and equipping of the present addition to the Carrie A. Odiorne Junior High School and to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary proper and advisable in connection with the foregoing matters. And in order to provide such funds, to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds for all or any part of the sum so appropriated in the name of and on the credit of the district under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments relating thereto; and to delegate the school board the authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal amount of each note or bond, and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable; also that the voting be done by ballot.

Voting was done by ballot with a checklist. The Clerk, Moderator and School officiated. Number of votes cast, 197. Necessary for a two-thirds majority, 131. There were 104 YES and 92 NO votes, one ballot voided. The motion was defeated.

Mr. Preston moved that the budget be increased by \$30,000 this year. This was seconded.

Mr. Lavoie moved to amend Mr. Preston's motion to read "and to place the \$30,000 in the Capital Outlay item in the budget." (Sites, Building & Equipment). The motion to amend was seconded.

Mrs. Jackson made a motion to amend the amendment "to vote on each item separately (Sites \$4,500, Buildings \$15,325, and Equipment \$10,175). This was seconded. There were 53 FOR and 82 AGAINST. The motion to amend the amendment was defeated. A vote was taken on Mr. Lavoie's amendment to the motion. 'The result was 97 FOR and 29 AGAINST. The amendment carried.

A motion was made and seconded that Mr. Preston's amended motion be voted on by a show of hands. This was defeated. Mr. Preston's amended motion was voted on by checklist with YES/NO ballots. The results were 96 YES and 81 NO. The motion carried.

Mr. Lavoie moved that the amended budget of \$385, 530.00 be adopted. This was seconded and carried.

Article 9 - On petition of ten legal voters: To see whether the District will authorize the construction, equipping, and furnishing of a four-classroom addition to the Central School, appropriate not exceeding \$65,000 therefor, determine how any such appropriation shall be raised - whether by taxation, transfer of available funds or by borrowing and, if by borrowing, to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds of the District under the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, and to take any action incidental to or connected with the foregoing matter or any of them. Mrs. Olivia Hartford moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Felix Restuccia seconded this and it carried.

Article 10 - Mr. Restuccia made the motion that the planning board work in conjunction with the school board to explore costs on a possible high school building and to project what we need for grade school additions. Ed Burtt seconded the motion and it carried.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF EPPING:

As our educational system becomes more and more complex, it becomes increasingly more difficult to write a comprehensive annual school report. A worthy discussion of any one of its numerous issues would make it much too lengthy and involved. Therefore, I have chosen to comment on only those issues which seem to be of immediate concern to the citizens of Epping.

A major problem here, as well as throughout the entire State of New Hampshire, is that of teachers' salaries. The traditionally non-militant New Hampshire Education Association and the National Education Association have assumed a new role and are now providing the leadership to any and all local teachers' groups in an attempt to substantially up-grade teachers' salaries, even to the extent of initiating a "Sanctions Alert" in New Hampshire.

At the time of this writing, neighboring communities and teachers are negotiating for starting salaries in the vicinity of \$6,000 to \$6,200 with some even higher. The school board is hopeful that the Epping teachers will accept a starting salary of \$5,800. If the teachers accept this plan, then I sincerely hope that the Epping School District will also endorse it by appropriating the necessary funds this March. Epping has been very fortunate in retaining so many of its excellent teachers in the past - let's continue this trend.

Epping High School continues to be classified as an approved high school by the State Department of Education. This sub-comprehensive title is primarily due to the out-dated Watson Academy facility. Contrary to public opinion, curriculum and staff alone do not qualify a school for comprehensiveness. If this were true, Epping would no doubt have received a comprehensive rating before now, as the staff is superior and the curriculum adequate. In fact, all of our high school teachers hold college degrees and, for the most part, are teachers with many years of experience.

As we continue to improve our educational program we must continue to increase our staff, regardless of classification. For example, in the 1969-70 budget, funds are being requested for a full-time guidance director who now serves on a part-time basis. In the area of Federal Aid programs, Assistant Superintendent Frank Games has informed me that our federally aided programs may be in for some changes. He states: "Last year the title programs were mentioned as a permanent part of Federal support to our education. However, we are faced with a dilemma when we are planning our projects in the various districts. The amount depends on the appropriations made by Congress and they do not always consider local priorities. For example, we received \$5,300 in 1966-67 under Title II for classroom materials and library books. This year, we are limited to \$2,069, and yet our needs in this area have expanded in trying to meet the individual differences.

Our Title I program, with remedial reading teachers in all elementary school districts, has been allotted a sum of \$15,812 for the school year 1968-69, which is \$2,700 less than in 1967-68. Yet a paradox is evident, in the fact that new title proposals have emerged in bilingual education, special projects for handicapped youngsters, grants for teachers to study in special education, and Title III innovative practices to develop pilot programs.

What a change in administration in Washington will do is yet to be finalized. A flood of new forms and criteria can be expected as a minimum transitional adjustment to the new party in power. At present, we have helped to plan a substantial Title III project in pre-school improvement of school readiness. Dr. Earl Goodman, in the Department of Home Economics at the University of New Hampshire, has drafted the proposal for the state ESEA committee to consider during March of 1969. This could be of vital concern to all our school districts beginning with Newmarket and Epping.

The State Department of Education is making an examination of elementary school standards. The results will establish recommendations for all the towns and cities of New Hampshire. The criteria will take final form in the foreseeable future. It is our hope that we will be among the accredited school districts when the evaluation program is available for our consideration. The principals are making a determined effort to provide the leadership we need for quality instruction in all areas of the curriculum."

In conclusion it might be appropriate to comment upon the tremendous growth we are experiencing in our Supervisory Union No. 14. Our total enrollment now is approximately 2,600 pupils this year. Sanborn Regional (Kingston-Newton) leads the way with 1,252; Newmarket has 516, Epping 512, Brentwood 145, and Fremont 135. Our transportation system is enormous with school buses transporting 1,900 children and covering well over 1,200 miles per day. School lunch programs are maintained in five of our schools with approximately 850 pupils participating in this program each day.

The operation of such a large and dynamic organization requires the services of more than 150 teachers, in addition to a countless number of non-professionals such as secretaries, custodians, school lunch workers, bus drivers, etc.

The total 1968-69 operational budget for this unit is \$1,963,273 - a sizeable business in any man's language.

Throughout the past six and one-half years, I have worked with at least eight school board members. All of these people have had one thing in common - an eagerness to improve the educational program for all the children of Epping. Mr. Robert Kimball was no exception. In fact, the community owes him a tremendous debt of gratitude, for without his untiring efforts and frugal financial management, Epping could never have completed and furnished the new facilities in such a first-rate manner. It was indeed a pleasure to have worked with Mr. Kimball.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Epping School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with your request. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1967 and June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$205,029.43 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated Actual Revenues: (Exhibit C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of 2,446.96, less a net overdraft of appropriations of 1,322.19, resulted in a net budget surplus of 1,124.77.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the activity in the Building Fund Account during the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit F.

Student Activities Fund: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the Student Activities Fund for the fiscal year 1967-68 is included in Exhibit G.

School Lunch Account: (Exhibit H)

A summary statement of the School Lunch Account is included in Exhibit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Epping is presented in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1968, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1967-68 School Tax of \$203,487.47, plus an advance on account of the 1968-69 School Tax in the amount of \$12,600.00.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements is contained in Exhibit J.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$3,154.20 to \$1,124.77 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, as shown herewith:

Recommendations:

Treasurer's Building Fund Account Cash Book Should Reflect Gross Funds Available:

The Treasurer's building fund account cash book should at all times reflect the gross amount of funds in the Treasurer's care. The records should adequately identify funds on deposit in checking and/or savings accounts and idle cash investments. Interest earned on invested funds should be properly classified when recorded. The account balance should be reconciled monthly with all deposits and investments.

All pertinent data relative to investment transactions should be kept in the Treasurer's files and should be submitted to the auditors along with the Building Fund Account cashbook, etc., for the conduct of the annual audit.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Epping School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, and the Citizens of Epping:

The World Health Organization has described Health in comprehensive terms as "a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being; not merely the absence of disease or infirmary."

It was rumored that Whittier wrote a poem to the woman but none appears in any of his published works.

In 1941 Epping celebrated the 200th anniversary of its separation from the town of Exeter. The old houses of the town were open for visitors. The Lawrence and Shepard mansions among them.

In clearing the attic of the old Shepard mansion, a small hair trunk and other receptacles containing deeds, letters, bills of sale, etc., going back some 200 years were found.

In this collection was a copy of the 1840 Epping Town Report. Folded within its leaves was a wide lined sheet of blue paper commonly used by clergymen years ago. On it was penned a four stanza poem without title but dated in ''Lee,'' N.H. 1843.

Horace Elisha Scudder 1852-1902, Editor of the Atlantic Monthly who was making a collection of Whittier poems, no doubt supplied the title. It is assumed that the Scudder copy had been made by him from an original draft in Whittier's own peculiar hand-writing.

The poem is as found in Rowena's trunk; in the Scudder papers and as found in Whittier's own hand-writing in the Essex Institute, Salem, Mass.

Rowena L. Thyng married Mr. George N. Shepard and went to live in the Shepard mansion on the old road to Pawtuckaway Pond now known as the Blake road in West Epping. They are buried in the cemetery at West Epping.
