NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

In accordance with the statutes (New Hampshire Laws of 1907, Chapter 147) you are requested to take measures to suppress the brown tail moth and the gipsy moth on your premises. The law declares these insects to be a public nuisance and orders their suppression by property owners. Suppression is enforceable by law up to a cost of one-half of 1% of the tax valuation of the property concerned.

Necessary measures must be completed on or before March 20

This notice is sent to all property owners in accordance with instructions of the Division of Insect Suppression, of the State Department of Agriculture.

The Brown Tail Moth

This pest is present in numbers on apple and pear trees and on many shade trees. Through the winter it occupies webs as big as a hen's egg, attached to the tips of twigs. All such webs should be cut off carefully, gathered up and burned.

The Gipsy Moth

The gipsy moth is found through the winter in the form of eggmasses attached to the trunks of trees, stones, piazza posts, or other locations. Each egg-mass is ¾ to 1½ inch long, is covered with fine hairs and is the color of chamois skin. Egg-masses should be painted with creosote. Scraping them off will not destroy them, because the eggs will hatch even though lying on the ground.

Obligation of Property Owners

If the insects described above are not suppressed on or before March **29** the duly constituted authorities have the right to enter upon property and to take such measures as may be necessary. The property owner will be liable for the expense in connection with such action within the limits prescribed by law.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges including town officers' salaries, expenses of town officers, election and registration, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, snow pathing, street lights, general expenses of highway department, town poor, Soldiers Aid, interest on temporary loans and on long term notes and on principal of trust funds used by town.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid construction.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to pay the note for the West Road construction.

- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.
- 10. To hear reports of auditors and committees and act thereon.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, to repair and tarvia the Brown Hill road, (so called,) from the South Danville line to the main road running from East Hampstead to Plaistow, N. H. (By petition).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a trustee of the Hadley Cemetery Fund upon the termination of the office of the present trustee.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to give the following discounts on property taxes, 3 per cent if paid before July 1st, 2 per cent before August 1st; and 1 per cent before October 1st.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to buy a piece of fire apparatus and what method they will adopt to pay for the same.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

It is my privilege to submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of the Hampstead Schools.

At the end of this report will be found interesting and encouraging reports which I have been privileged to bring to your notice, they are given by the Headmaster of the High School, the Supervisor of Music, and the School Nurse.

The number of pupils enrolled last year was 193. This number represents an increase of ten over the enrollment of the year before. The attendance averaged 94.5% of the membership. The state average for this period was 95.3%. Twelve pupils were neither absent nor tardy. Nine pupils completed the work of grade eight. All of these entered high school in Sept.

The following table shows the enrollment in the Hampstead Schools during the past five years:

There were no changes in the teaching staff in September and we are indeed fortunate to retain our teachers for another year. They continue to serve the schools by doing efficient and commendable work.

The Parent-Teacher's Association has continued to help the schools in many ways. First-aid material has been supplied to both schools and magazines for the high school. The association is to sponsor a dental clinic soon.

The class in "Textiles and Clothing" made a layette for the Red-Cross from material which the association furnished. The class is also doing other projects from cloth furnished by the association, thus helping the needy and at the same time meeting the requirements for their year's work. The class in Constitutional History provided a needy family with clothing as well as food enough to keep the family for several weeks. This was a practical demonstration of their value as citizens of the town. The orchestra at the high school

deserves special mention. It has been appreciated both at school assemblies and at a number of public gatherings.

One of our problems during each school day is play and its supervision. We try to make our play periods just as valuable educationally as our actual school program. From the time the first bus arrives in the morning until the last bus at the close of the day, the children are under the constant supervision of a teacher. The first grade is dismissed at eleven o'clock and in fair weather is given the opportunity to go to the play ground under the supervision of an older girl. They are again dismissed at three o'clock and go to the playground under the supervision of Miss Kean.

The medal presented annually by the Sons of the American Revolution to the boy or girl of the eighth grade, who by vote of classmates and teachers has best exemplified the habits of good citizenship was awarded last June to Dorothy Duston. In line with this annual award these ten citizen habits, cleanliness. cooperation, courtesy, dependableness, honesty, obedience, politeness, promptness, quietness, and truthfulness are beginning to receive equal or even greater importance than scholastic marks in rating elementary school pupils. Whenever a report card indicates a citizenship habit unsatisfactory or a failure in scholastic work, parents are urged to confer with the teacher and thus cooperate in securing improvement. It is to every child's advantage that the school and home have a mutual understanding of his needs.

The schools of Hampstead were in session in the elementary grades 348 half days, the average for elementary schools of the state for this period was 354.8. The high school was in session 356 half days,

the average for the state was 358.08.

The School Nurse, Miss Helen Thomas, has continued her good work in the schools. She has made many home visits as well as the regular school calls in the interest of children's health. She has been generous in furnishing transportation to children at clinics and other remedial work.

Our teaching force is composed of persons well trained professionally and competent in execution of work. The tests which we apply reveal commendable work and a spirit running through the schools which cannot fail to bring satisfactory results. The interest of the pupils which is strong evidence of success in school work is manifest to a remarkable degree. The schools are well equipped for their work.

Anything that may be done to interrupt the progress of the schools would have disastrous results. To everyone interested in our national well-being the welfare and maintenance of our publicly supported schools is a matter of first concern. If our children and young people are given a chance to prepare well and thoroughly for the future our hope and confidence remain unimpaired.

A well-known educator has written the following: "The School Board Member is an important force in shaping the course of education. As such he is also a powerful instrument in guiding the destiny of the state, the nation, and society. A school may add immeasurably to the advancement of human welfare. To do this its administrators must be wise, energetic, and courageous. The compensation which they receive is not in money, nor even in honor, but is in the consciousness of having helped as fully as possible in training young men and women for the part which they are to play in American state and national life,

and for that larger part which America is to play in the affairs of the world."

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the School Board, Teachers, Local Organizations, and the General Community.

Hampstead High School compares favorably with larger schools in regard to the number of curricula offered and in the individual electives allowed. Only two pupils gave up high school during the summer vacation, proving that the curricula meets the needs of the pupils and holds their interest.

The school plant is in unusually good condition, having received the commendation of the State Department. The oustanding project of the year has been the construction of a cement walk from the main building to the M. A. Shop. This has been achieved through the cooperation of parents, teachers, and pupils. Help of various kinds was received, including gifts of money. Mr. Blanco very kindly assumed the responsibility for the actual cement laying. The expense for the town has been very small and a walk that will last for years has been constructed.

The athletic program for the year makes it possible for a large percentage of the pupils to participate. The interest which this play produces helps develop strong bodies and self-controlled individuals. The teams are chosen as a result of the supervised play of the whole school. A good showing has been made in competition with other schools. The base ball season brought six defeats and seven victories with 126 points for Hampstead and 118 for its opponents. More important than scores were the examples of sportsmanship and character development. The basket ball season indicates favorable results. The support given the teams is especially appreciated as it is necessary to compete with larger schools.

The Orchestra continues the good work begun last year. Interested citizens of the town have assisted liberally in the financial support of the organization. During the first sixteen weeks of the year, the Orchestra played at town or school affairs fifteen different times.

Accomplishments in Manual Arts and Home Economics were good. The following projects were completed:

81 worthwhile projects in Manual Arts.

252 jars of fruit and vegetables were canned in Home Economics.

13 meals served.

54 garments completed in sewing.

More pupils are taking Commercial work than the summary indicates as several are carrying typewriting as an extra subject without credit. Much good material including two of the very latest adding machines have been loaned the school by commercial agents and the Plymouth Normal School.

Industry has become the motto of the school. Application to business, responsibility for the welfare of the school and joy in effort are apparent throughout the school.

The teaching staff appreciates the support and cooperation of Superintendent, School Board, and the citizens of Hampstead.

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Hampstead Schools.

In the primary grades note songs, with simple, but beautiful tunes supply a foundation for further musical progress. These songs are used to develop a good singing tone, and correct monotones. Notation and rhythm are taught in the second grade. Two-part singing is begun in the fourth grade and a true sense of harmony is developed. Still richer harmony is experienced through the three-part singing in the fifth and sixth grades. The bass clef is introduced in the seventh grade and three-part music continued. Good part singing is being done by our High School Chorus. This chorus furnishes vocal music for many programs throughout the year.

The work in musical appreciation is being carried on very effectively with the help of the victrola, and picture charts of the instruments of the orchestra.

The operetta given by the High School Chorus has become an annual event. On November 16 they presented "The Maid and the Middy" by David Stevens and George Lowell Tracy. The cast consisted of fourteen characters; the other members of the classes acted as chorus.
