REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

Work on the new water system was resumed early in the month of May, 1915. A large force of men started at Short Falls, in Epsom, and worked toward Suncook as far as the Buck Street Cemetery, while a smaller gang began on the rock excavation on Schoolhouse Hill and Chester Turnpike near the village. It was the purpose of the contractors to blast out all ledges so that when the main force arrived there would be no needless delay. In the latter part of May the main force was moved to Pembroke Street where they laid the 8- and 6-inch pipe. Next the men were moved back to Epsom to the point where work was left off on the 14-inch line, in the fall of 1914, and from this point work was continued along the line as surveyed by the engineers. The line was continued across the Suncook River near the silk mill and along the highway on the easterly side of the river until a connection was made, at Short Falls, with the section that had previously been laid. Thence another move took the force to Suncook where connections were made with the old system and the Pembroke Street line. From this latter point the remainder of the pipe was laid along Buck Street.

The new system, as now completed, consists of 4,750 feet of 16-inch, 6,552 feet of 14-inch, 59,833 feet of 12-inch, 10,931 feet of 8-inch and 10,514 feet of 6-inch pipe, or about 17.534 miles, all of which is equipped with the necessary blow-off gates in the low places to drain the pipe if need be.

The high places have been supplied with automatic air valves to allow the escape of air that may accumulate in the line and lessen the flow of water.

After turning the water into the new system we were troubled somewhat with small leaks as is usually the case

in a new pipe line of this sort, but since the pipe has become thoroughly saturated we have experienced very little trouble.

Owing to the lateness of the season when the Pleasant Pond water was ready for use the superintendent was unable to connect all who wished service. Sixty-five new patrons have been connected and those on the waiting list will be accommodated as early in the spring as the weather will permit.

The fact that such a large percentage of the people have become and are going to become users of the water is very gratifying to the Water Commissioners who wish to express their thanks to the townspeople who have made this undertaking a success.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Since the last annual meeting, there have been thirty-five weeks of school in eleven rooms in town, five being in the Suncook building. The district has been fortunate in an almost continuous teaching force, only thirteen teachers being employed in the year. There has been no change in supervisory district or superintendent. The latter has been zealous not only in the work for which he is salaried, but has been unwearingly helpful in all of the public affairs of the community.

Repairs have been made at all the buildings in the district except one during the year. An addition of slate blackboards has been made in four and some other things done in line of permanent improvements. Naturally it will be economy to do something each year, but no extensive outlay is anticipated under such a policy in the near future.

It had been planned to reshingle the old school building in Suncook Village, and make some other repairs that seem urgent for its preservation. But, during the summer, counsel for the Morgan heirs served notice that they claimed full ownership, and forbade the district from meddling with the property. While such an order was not accepted, it was deemed unwise to make the contemplated repairs until the title was determined, as it was also stated suit would be brought at the September term unless the property was at once vacated. The board has claimed no impairment of title by the district. It has held several conferences with the attorneys of the Morgan heirs, at which it was promised a proposition from them for giving up their claim would be submitted before this annual meeting.

To conduct eleven schools thirty-five weeks, in which instruction is given in those subjects only that are required

in the state course of study and for admission to the high school courses, to make repairs that are desirable for the up-keep of the buildings and to provide fuel, janitor service, conveyance of pupils, supervision, etc., requires an expenditure here of about \$1,000 in addition to the minimum amount required by law to be raised for school purposes, even when provision is otherwise made for the payment of high school tuition, bond and interest, books and supplies, and salaries of district officers. For the past few years the school expenses of Pembroke have been about \$10,000 a year. Constant efforts have been made in every school to keep up the work that is requisite in preparation of pupils for higher grades. Little beyond that has been asked. Suggestions have come from time to time for special instructors in such branches as music, drawing, manual training, elementary agriculture, domestic science and so on, but recent boards have not felt justified in incurring such additional liabilities without direction from the voters. The district has been ever ready to furnish money for the universally required work which at best, with the inevitable change in teachers, has not been too thoroughly done, although well done. An article has been inserted in the warrant for the forthcoming meeting relative to special instruction in music and drawing, that the sentiment relative thereto may be ascertained.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

To the School Board and Citizens of Pembroke:

I have the honor of submitting to you my third annual report of your schools. In this report I again call attention to some of the duties of the parents and citizens which, if performed, will add materially to the welfare of the school.

The work of your schools has improved during the present school year. The present teachers are earnest, faithful and efficient.

Your appreciation of teachers' fidelity has been shown by the great number of your visitations, which has encouraged them to do better and better work. You have a just ground for being proud of your schools.

A Foreword on Modern Education.

Modern education demands that the school shall enrich its curriculum by adding to its general preparation a preparation for the various fields of useful activity, among them home economics, housework and home management for the girls, and the industrial arts and sciences for the boys.

This enrichment will not reduce the present general training of the child whether in the elementary or high school. The fundamental aim is, after retaining all that is sound in the education that the pupil now receives, to provide specific training for some definite field of useful service.

School Gardening and Elementary Agriculture.

The Department of Agriculture at Washington, the state departments of many of our states, and the Patrons of Husbandry realize that if the United States is to keep on the soil the sons and daughters of farmers, or to induce

those born in town and village to become tillers of the soil, they must teach the children in our rural communities how to make farming financially and socially worth while.

The Department of Agriculture at Washington issues, for the benefit of the children in our rural schools, an outline for a series of lessons on raising corn. The state of Kansas, in order to improve its agricultural conditions, has prepared a text-book on Kansas Farming to be distributed among its school children at a nominal price; the educational department of New Hampshire has published a useful pamphlet on Gardening for the use of its pupils without cost to them.

The importance of these acts is the recognition, at Washington, Topeka and Concord, of the fact that if the United States is to have efficient farmers and contented and capable farmers' wives the principles of agriculture and gardening must be taught in our public schools.

Unquestionably the lack of knowledge in these branches costs our country millions of dollars annually. This loss, in a large measure, if not entirely, would be prevented by making instruction in these branches compulsory in our public schools.

A Word to Parents and Citizens.

Parents and citizens are cordially invited to visit the schools frequently, that they may get an accurate knowledge of the work of the schoolroom. By these visits they will more thoroughly understand the real problems which are to be solved daily by the teacher. They will clearly see the great hindrance to school work caused by truancy, irregular attendance, tardiness, and dismissals, the great school evils.

Report Cards.

Again I ask the parents to examine carefully the report cards brought home by their children. These cards are a record of the child's attendance, conduct, effort and scholarship.

You are also invited to confer with the teacher upon any item on the report card not understood.

Help make effective our school motto: "The home and the school should work together for the good of the child."

By a vote of the District you have made Pembroke Academy your approved high school.

We believe that it is due the management of the Academy to declare that never in its history has it done better work than is being done under the leadership of the able principal, Henry G. Blount.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation to the citizens, school board, teachers and pupils for their cordial support.
