TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the town of Salem, in the county of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at six-thirty (6.30) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, such sums of money as may be needed for general purposes in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the town will take relative to refunding outstanding notes, given in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 7. To see what action the town will take relative to lighting the streets, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to accept a gift to be known as the John A. McVoy fund, in accordance with provisions in the will of John A. McVoy.

ARTICLE 9. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), for the purpose of providing police officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 10. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), or any part thereof, for the removal of snow from the highways.

ARTICLE 11. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), or any part thereof, for the use of Ernest W. Young post, No. 63, American Legion, to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1931.

ARTICLE 12. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800), or any part thereof, above the sum required by law, for the support of the Salem Free Public Library for the year 1931.

ARTICLE 13. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), or any part thereof, to maintain and improve the town common and the public square near Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 14. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred and seven dollars (\$807), to pay for the chlorinating system installed at the pumping station.

ARTICLE 15. By request. To see if the town will vote to continue the Millville Street road construction with gravel and tar, and raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 16. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), or any part thereof, to be expended in the continuance of the gravel and tar road on School Street.

ARTICLE 17. By request. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid on Pelham road and raise the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 18. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from the residence of Albert E. Searle to the residence of Ivan C. Reed on the North Salem road and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 19. By request. To see if the town will vote to install one (1) street light on Central Street opposite the Merrimack Wood Heel plant, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 20. By request. To see if the town will vote to install one (1) more street light on Highland Avenue, Centre Village, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 21. By request. To see if the town will vote to install one (1) street light on Pole No. 925 at Cowbell Corner and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 22. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), or any part thereof, for the purpose of continuing the gravel and tar road on the North Salem road from town farm corner.

ARTICLE 23. By request. To see if the town will vote to continue the gravel and tar road on Lawrence road from Foster's Corner to the new No. 9 school house and raise the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 24. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the residence of Frank D. Davis to the residence of George A. Cross on Brookdale Road and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 25. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair with cinders the Cluff's Crossing road from Broadway to Foster's Corner and raise six hundred dollars (\$600), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 26. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main on Cluff Road from the residence of George Bricault to the residence of Henry Pendergast and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 27. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from Kelley's Crossing down Broadway to the state line and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 28. By request. To see if the town will vote to install six (6) street lights on South Broadway from the Green Dragon tea room, north, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 29. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing additional fire equipment and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 30. By request. To see if the town will vote to adopt the policy in all future town warrants, of having

the name of the author or sponsor of each article printed therewith, in the warrant.

ARTICLE 31. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to installing water meters, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 32. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair the highway leading from Mosquito Corner to the corner at the foot of Providence Hill and raise five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 33. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the residence of Herbert Marshall on Pleasant Street to Hall's Crossing, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 34. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for the repair of the road from the George Duston Corner past the residence of Fred K. Duston.

ARTICLE 35. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400), or any part thereof, to be expended in further repairing and straightening Highland Avenue, Salem Depot.

ARTICLE 36. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), or any part thereof, to gravel and tar the road on Park Avenue.

ARTICLE 37. By request. To see if the town will vote to provide ways and means for swimming at Canobie Lake, either by obtaining the consent of the State Board of Health for restricted swimming, or by the removal of the water supply from the lake, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 38. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, to repair the road between the residence of E. G. Bailey estate and the residence of William A. Turner.

ARTICLE 39. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for permanent road repairs on Spring Street.

ARTICLE 40. By request. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Central Street from Main Street to the Merrimack Wood Heel factory and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 41. By request. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on North Broadway from Gordon Square to Gage's Crossing, or any part of this distance, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 42. By request. To see if the town will vote to lease or sell a strip of land opposite the Hotel Rockingham block near the entrance to Rockingham Park.

ARTICLE 43. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the residence of Herman Graichen to the residence of Jerry Bauters on Cross Street and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 44. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or any part thereof, to widen, grade and tar Cross Street from the state line to Brady Avenue.

ARTICLE 45. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the state aid road from where it now ends, near the residence of Horace Beaudet, to the state line on Cross Street and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 46. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900), or any part thereof, to resurface Pleasant Street, beginning at the end of the state road, and continuing toward the Pelham line.

ARTICLE 47. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main down Pleasant Street about two thousand feet (2,000) and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 48. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for repairing Salem Street from the Armenian church to the state line.

ARTICLE 49. By request. To see if the town will vote to install three (3) street lights in the vicinity of the Ararat Congregational church, bounded by Brady Avenue and Salem Street and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 50. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair Corliss Road and raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 51. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair Church Avenue and raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 52. By request. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Pleasant Street from the entrance to Rockingham Park to the residence of Mrs. Martha Parkinson, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 53. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main along Policy Street to the Salem-Windham line and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 54. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water system to, and including, the Canobie Lake section of Windham, after receiving permission from the town and state, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 55. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Leslea B. Dyer the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Leslea B. Dyer lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 56. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from the sons of Alonzo M. Tacy the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Alonzo M. Tacy lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 57. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Emma March the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Emma March lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 58. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Amos M. Spurr the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the John M. Spurr lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 59. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Amos M. Spurr the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Hazen Lowell lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 60. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Amos M. Spurr the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Amos M. Spurr lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 61. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Laura and Frederick Woodbury the sum of

one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Fred E. Woodbury lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 62. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from Alburton W. Clark the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Alburton W. Clark lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 63. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from A. G. Whidden the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Whidden lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 64. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of Alice M. Wight, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Alice M. Wight lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 65. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of Alice M. Wight the sum of sixty-two dollars (\$62), this money to be expended in the improvement of the Alice M. Wight lot in Pine Grove Cemetery. Said improvements to be made by the cemetery trustees.

ARTICLE 66. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of Frances E. Ross the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Frances E. Ross lot in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

REPORT OF THE SALEM FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Fire Department has answered during the year 56 bell alarms and 11 still alarms. The fire loss for the year was \$13,200.

In every case of serious damage, except in the case of Mrs. Johnston's house, the fire had gained so much headway before the alarm was sent in that nothing could be done except to protect adjoining property. In the case of Mrs. Johnston's fire another alarm came in just previous, and there was a slight delay in reaching this fire. The firemen did good work, however, and saved the property with only partial loss. This fire was set by lightning, and the department had four calls in this storm at approximately the same time, which demonstrated the need of additional apparatus.

I would suggest that some action be taken at the town meeting to take care of this situation.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350 to finish the shingling of No. 6 Schoolhouse.

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the purpose of installing electric lights at No. 6 Schoolhouse.

15. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450 for the purpose of installing permanent desks at No. 6 Schoolhouse in place of the portable type.

16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to reshingle the roof at No. 8 Schoolhouse.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The purpose of this report is to inform the citizens as to the work accomplished by the Board last year, also to give them some idea as to what will be needed in the future.

Woodbury High School is first. We have had the roof repaired, and it is in fair condition now. The walls of the auditorium, lower hall and classrooms were refinished with paint. The Board is making it a policy to have all walls painted instead of using the cold water stock which cannot be washed. The new fence was put up on the west side,

and cement corner posts were placed for protection to lawn.

This next year we are planning to do more interior painting and beautify the lawn. We find that this building is somewhat short of room, and it is a question as to whether or not this is a suitable time to make an addition, thereby making it possible to teach manual training.

Basketball was allowed in the auditorium this year by the Board, and a net was purchased to prevent any injury to the walls. New fixtures were also used. This was done so the boys could have a warm place for games and practice, and it has also added enough to the revenue of the games to help defray the expense of installation.

No. 1 Schoolhouse had the classrooms repainted last year, and we want to finish the halls this year. The outside paint is very poor, and we will ask for money to do this. The roof needs shingling, but due to the fact that there are others which are worse we will try to make it go another year. The desks need resurfacing, and we will try to accomplish that this year.

No. 3 Schoolhouse is in good repair and very few pupils attend, so it does not warrant any great expense.

No. 4 Schoolhouse is in fair repair. The shed needs shingling, and will be taken care of. The old box stove will be replaced by the new type "Jacketed Heater."

No. 5 Schoolhouse was remodeled last year and is now a very pleasant building. The "Jacketed Heater" proved a wonderful success. The roof is in bad shape and must be reshingled this year. The type of toilet is the only thing lacking in making this school up to the best standard for New Hampshire rural schools.

No. 6 Schoolhouse has needed a lot of repairs, and still does. Last year the inside was completely painted, and it made a wonderful improvement. The roof has leaked badly this year, and the rest of it will have to be shingled. There has been a demand for electric lights in this building for some time and we have an article in the warrant for the installation of same. The outside of the building needs paint, but we feel as though with all the other repairs necessary it would be better to wait another year. The grounds

are still very poor, and should be made attractive as soon as possible. The desks are in very poor shape and will have to be resurfaced. We would like to replace the portable type desk with permanent ones.

A very crowded condition exists here, and it will be only a short time before we will have to make room for more pupils.

No. 7 Schoolhouse is in fair shape with the exception of the desks, which are of all types. The "Jacketed Heater" here also proved a great success.

No. 8 Schoolhouse has had numerous repairs in the last two years, but the roof leaks and will have to be resingled. The furnace was found cracked and had to be rebuilt at the opening of school last September. The outside was painted and the chimney was repaired last year. The desks here are not in good condition and will have to be taken care of very soon.

No. 9 Schoolhouse is in good condition. The exterior was painted last year and the interior will be taken care of this year. The water situation is the most serious problem here and, with the possibility of the town extending its main to this section, we do not think it advisable to spend a large sum, which it would require to improve the present well.

The old No. 9 Schoolhouse was sold to Mr. Herbert Seed.

The Board feels as though we are gaining on repairs of our schools, and hereafter a little each year will keep them in good shape. Our teaching staff have coöperated well this year, and we believe we are giving the pupils of Salem the best possible for a town of this size.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Salem:

It is a pleasure to present to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of the Salem schools. Reports are also presented by Headmaster Seward F. French of the High School, Mrs. Thompson, Supervisor of Music, and Miss Helen Thomas, School Nurse.

There were 642 pupils enrolled in our schools last year. This number is 41 less than during the year ending in June, 1929. The attendance averaged 96.33% of the membership. Again this figure is better than the figure for the preceding year. It is also above the average for the state. Seventy-one pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year.

Forty-five pupils completed the work of the eighth grade and 43 of these entered high school. If a high school is to hold the interest of a large per cent of those entering, it must offer vocational education. We already have good courses in Commerce and Home Economics. Mechanic Arts is also needed. This would be of priceless value to many of the boys of our school. The number of boys taking Mechanic Arts in schools offering it is phenomenal. At present such instruction is confined to city high schools. It is certain that village high schools will start this work within the next few years. We should be looking forward to its ultimate establishment.

Your attention is called to the table of statistics at the end of this report. It contains detailed information about the schools not easily printed in any other form.

The following table shows the attendance in the Salem schools during the last seven years and is presented to show the trend of our school population:

There were seven changes in the teaching staff at the opening of the present school year: three at the high school and four in the elementary schools. By an arrangement with Plymouth Normal School two senior cadets have been doing practice teaching at the Depot School. This plan was possible due to the fact that Miss McGary, the new principal at the school, is qualified to direct this work because of experience as a teacher at Plymouth and North Adams training schools. Both the general crowded condition and the fact that small rooms were available for extra classrooms made it possible to use this plan.

It is gratifying to know that the health instructions offered in the schools is actually improving the health of the pupils. The parents, teachers, school nurse, and pupils are removing many of the physical defects that hinder the mental and physical growth of the boys and girls in our schools.

Local organizations have assisted the school nurse financially in her work. This assistance has been used to remove adenoids and tonsils; glasses have been secured in a few cases. Statistics concerning this work will be found in the school nurse's report.

It is continually necessary to buy new textbooks. As old books wear out they are replaced by those that better meet the changing educational conditions. We have during the past year bought new Health books, Geography, History and Reading books. At the high school new chorus books for assembly were purchased. We have had to replace a considerable number of worn-out books as well as buy new books to take care of the needs of growing classes.

Schools are continually changing in curricula, methods, and management. If this were not so the educational system of a community would soon lose the support and confidence of its people. The Program of Studies for grades 1-6 has been revised by the State Board of Education and was distributed in the fall of 1930. This new program is greatly appreciated by the teachers.

According to our tests, steady improvement is being made in the routine work of the schools. Our principal

difficulties are in adapting work to the individual differences found among the children. Both achievement and mental tests have been given. These tests are a great help to the teachers in their daily instruction and give them a better understanding of both class and individual needs.

At institutes held in various parts of the state last fall, a headmaster of a high school was among the speakers. These headmasters were of the opinion that the product from the rural school found in high school is equal in general ability to that coming from the village schools. They believed it surpasses it in responsibility, in power to work independently and in general ambition.

The new heaters at No. 5 and No. 7 Schools have been very satisfactory. The use of coal in these heaters during the winter has been a great improvement over wood. No. 4 School should be similarly equipped. No. 5 building at Millville meets the requirements of a standard building except for the toilets. This building now has a classroom that is both pleasant and well suited to school work. The experimental stage in the use of chemical toilets in schools has now passed. I hope that before long we shall consider the matter of their use in the Salem one-room schools. Often under the best of circumstances this part of a school plant is difficult to care for; it may easily become unwholesome and offensive. With this equipment the one-room schools would be in good condition. A large number of the rural schools of the state are equipped with these toilets.

The school calendar in use in the elementary schools during the last three years has given us a school year of 350 half days. The average for the state last year was 355. The calendar used previous to 1927 provided for a school year of about 340 half days. The high school has been in session more than 360 half days, which is better than the average. The per pupil cost both in the high school and the elementary schools was about \$22 per pupil less than the average cost for the state. This shows that our operating cost is low in comparison to what is paid in many towns.

The scholarship medals in grade eight, donated by the Board of Trade, were awarded as follows:

Gold Medal—George Henry Coleman

Silver Medal—Emil Stanley Wiezeck

Bronze Medal—Michael Sudacozitz

All New Hampshire high schools use a program of studies which is approved by the State Board of Education each year. We have received valuable assistance from the State Board in the revision of our program, and it is without doubt suited to the educational needs in Salem. The State Board sends an agent to each high school in the state once a year for the purpose of inspecting the work of the school. Also at the end of each school year detailed reports on work covered during the year are required by the State Board. If the Program of Studies in use is approved and the inspection and work reports are satisfactory, the school becomes an approved high school for a period of one year. Woodbury High has received State Board approval each year.

Woodbury High School continues to be characterized by earnestness of purpose and good morale. You are referred to the accompanying report of the headmaster for details. The superintendent has kept in close contact with the school and testifies to the fine coöperative service of the staff of teachers and to the wholesome life of the entire school.

The work in all our schools appears to be of a good grade this year. This is due chiefly to the ability of the teachers and in no small degree also to the fine spirit and interest shown by the citizens as well as the School Board. In closing I wish to express my thanks for the hearty support of Parents, Teachers, and School Board in the work of the past year.

WOODBURY HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Residents of the Town of Salem:

It is difficult, I am sure, for us to realize that Woodbury High School has been a reality for nearly six years. Our enrollment for the present school year of two hundred and twenty-eight boys and girls is the largest in the history of the school with the exception of 1928. These figures are in keeping with my suggestion in the report of 1928. The sizes of the various classes seem to vary, especially in the Junior and Senior Classes, which are considerably less than in the previous two years. The classes of the first four years of the six-year system are unusually large. The future seems to point to a slight increase in enrollment.

The members of the faculty still include familiar names, some serving you since the opening of the school in 1925. The present faculty is as follows:

All departments seem to be progressing in their particular type of work. As you know, we were obliged to discontinue Manual Arts. This condition creates, unfortunately, a shortage of courses for the boys of the school. The choice of courses for girls at present is three, Latin, Domestic Arts and Commerce, while the boys only have Latin and Business. Until such time as it seems wise to return Manual Arts to our curriculum, we limit the opportunities of our boys and permanently keep the Junior Department of the school from being approved by the State Board of Education. A Manual Arts Course would not aim to make expert mechanics, but it would encourage many of our boys to realize the dignity and training involved in many of our trades. The question of Manual Arts for Woodbury High School is a serious problem for the people of Salem to consider.

The health work at the school under the direction of Miss Thomas continues as usual. The story of health advancement and cases treated during every school year is very interesting.

Mrs. Eva Thompson is continuing her usual fine work in the Department of Music. Music is one of our most important courses, and I hope in the future we may be able to have a regular course in the school.

The school library is in need of reference books. This is probably one of our greatest needs in the form of equipment. As rapidly as possible all departments seem to be reaching a point of efficient equipment.

The Domestic Arts Department continues to be popular. Miss Bangs has continued the extremely high grade work begun by Miss Turner. In connection with the usual Domestic Arts classes, Miss Bangs has made a real contribution in the development of noon lunches. Pupils and

teachers may now purchase for an extremely small amount soup, cocoa, sandwiches, ice cream, etc. This addition to the department is an aid to health which many of our parents appreciate. Noon lunches which have a warm dish are a valuable health aid.

Many people ask what becomes of our graduates? This is an important question. Below is a table showing the whereabouts of the class of 1930.

The number of persons taking post secondary work is extremely large. There is a larger percent of Woodbury High School graduates who continue their education following high school than is the average throughout the country. It seems quite possible that some of our graduates aspire to college work who, because of one condition or another, are not equipped for such work or position which require collegiate training. Two members of the class of 1930 who entered college this fall returned to high school for more work. Their attitude is commendable. The office tries to keep complete records of all graduates.

In concluding my report for the year I cannot refrain from expressing my personal gratitude for the splendid coöperation among all the agencies connected with the school system. Parents are making great sacrifices for their children and, with the continued effort on the part of the parents and the teachers, we should reach some degree of satisfaction.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

We have had about the usual number of cases of chicken pox, measles, whooping cough, with no deaths from any of these diseases. During the early part of the summer several samples of the town water were sent to Concord, N. H., for analysis. The report on these being far from satisfactory. The State Board of Health have for several years been urging the installation of a chlorinating plant. They finally insisted it was not safe to continue using the water unchlorinated during the summer months.

As health officer, I felt obliged to order the Water Board to install a chlorinating plant, even though the money had not been raised for the same.

There were forty deaths from all causes during the fiscal year ending December 31, 1930. No deaths from tuberculosis.
