qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall in The Massabesic Inn in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- First. To bring in your votes for  
Town Clerk,  
One Selectman for three years,  
Tax Collector,  
Town Treasurer,  
Highway Agent,  
One Library Trustee for three years,  
One Cemetery Trustee for three years,  
One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,  
Three Auditors.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

Third. To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the year 1934.

Fourth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town charges.

Fifth. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$976.50, the amount required to procure State Aid, and appropriate the same for the Hooksett road.

Sixth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the repair of highways and tractor, and appropriate the same.

Seventh. To raise \$1,616.67 for the third annual payment on road grader and snow plow.

Eighth. To raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the second annual payment of the Town debt.

Ninth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for railing embankments and bridges.

Tenth. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of bridges.

Eleventh. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 for the observance of Memorial Day and choose a committee for the same.

Twelfth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library.

Thirteenth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

Fourteenth. To see if the Town will vote to use the H. B. Burnham Fund income for school or library.

Fifteenth. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector deeds.

Sixteenth. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally, as permitted under the Laws of 1933, chapter 99, section 22.

Seventeenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for a new bridge at the so-called Schoolhouse Bridge.

Eighteenth. To see if the Town will vote to install hydrants along the road leading from Manchester line to the R. R. crossing, Reed St. and Allen Ave., for the water main proposed to be laid by C.W.A. project—each hydrant at a rental of \$35.00 each per year — to raise and appropriate money for same.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

*To the School Board of Auburn:*

My fifth annual report deals briefly with change in teaching staff, increased enrollment, reduced per pupil cost in elementary schools, and physical welfare activities.

There have been no changes in the number and location of schools maintained.

The only change in the staff of teachers occurred in the Village school. Following the withdrawal of Miss Mentana Gatti to accept a school in Massachusetts, Miss Eileen L. McQuaid—a graduate of Keene in the Class of 1931—was elected teacher of the Village school. Miss McQuaid, who has taught for two years in New Hampshire, holds a permanent teacher's certificate from the state. All Auburn teachers are now permanently certified in New Hampshire.

The total enrollment in the Auburn schools increased from one hundred forty-one to one hundred fifty-seven pupils. This rate of increase is common to the majority of towns in this supervisory union and is indicative of a change from urban to rural homes. At present your Number One school is filled to capacity; and the remaining one-room schools at Bunker Hill and the Village can accommodate few additional children.

While the average membership in your elementary schools has increased nearly ten percent over that of the previous year, in the same period you have reduced the per pupil cost nearly eighteen percent. This has been accomplished without crippling the efficiency of your schools.

Foremost among the aids to physical welfare are the services of your school nurse, whose constant co-operation in the activities of the Red Cross and in allocating state and federal assistance does not appear in her printed report. No

single feature of state and federal relief has a greater bearing on the health of growing children than the daily distribution of the milk ration. Through the initiative of our Governor federal funds were procured and free milk service was inaugurated in March, 1933, and is being extended through the present school year. New Hampshire's public and parochial schools are using daily over fifteen thousand bottles of milk. Other essential vitamin builders, such as cod liver oil, have recently been made available for school children. Such federal activity is no more a form of charity than is the free allotment of paper and pencils in our schools. Both are distributed in accordance with the child's physical or educational needs.

Last summer the installation of new chemical toilets was completed at the Severance School. The heating and ventilating facilities in this building are inadequate and are inferior to those in other schools in town. A recommendation would be the installation of an oil-burning ventilated heater in each of the two rooms. One of these heaters should be equipped with hot-water coils to provide radiation in the two toilet rooms and in the large coatroom.

The recent erection of a steel fence between the highway and playground at Number One school adds much by its protection to the physical welfare of the children.

In conclusion, commendation is due parents, teachers, and transportation drivers who so co-operated in maintaining the efficiency of your school at a reduced per pupil cost that the percents of both attendance and promotion were above those of the previous year.
