TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

ROCKINGHAM, SS.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Casey's Casino on Railroad Avenue in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing.
2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges and for other necessary charges arising in said Town.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45, Department of New Hampshire, Grand Army of the Republic, to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.
4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, or committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the highways in ac-

cordance with the provisions of Section 4, of Chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Derry Public Library and for the maintenance of said Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Taylor Library at East Derry, and for the maintenance of said Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see what action the Town will take relative to the election or appointment of one or more highway agents in accordance with Chapter 14 of the Laws of 1913, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to place a hydrant near the residence of E. A. Corthell on North High Street and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a suitable sum of money to sprinkle or oil the streets and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will choose and appoint a committee of three or more to look up ways and means for the establishment of an Old Ladies Home, said committee to report at the Biennial election in November 1914, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to make a contract with the Gamewell Police Alarm Telegraph Company for a police patrol and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise by taxation, or otherwise, a sum not exceeding six thousand dollars to carry out the provisions of Chapter 162 of the Laws of 1913

relating to the so called Rockingham Road, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years the capital employed in the shoe business of James H., and John J. Wynn.

15. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years the capital employed in business of the Benjamin Chase Company.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase land at East Derry to enlarge the Town Cemetery and pass any vote relating thereto.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

There have been fewer general complaints the past year than usual as the citizens have partially learned what must be done regarding cesspools, sink drains, etc. The Board has leased a parcel of land of Warren Horne to be used as a dump.

There were seven cases of diphtheria, several of measles and four of small pox. This is the first time we have had small pox in town for about forty years, and we think the Board deserving of some credit in the way these cases were handled, by quietly reassuring the public the cases were being closely watched and carefully quarantined. Although right in the center of the town, no general unrest was felt, all places of business and schools continued as usual. The large expense of a forced vaccination was kept down. Dr. Sanders, attendant physician, did not vaccinate himself or any members of the family. The first case was moderately severe, the other very mild. All of course recovered as small pox is not the same disease today as it was one hundred years ago when sanitary laws were unheard of. The expense of these cases to the town was about \$650 dollars, where if a general vaccination had been ordered the expense of that alone would have been probably \$1500, as the town of Sanford, Maine, had six or seven cases at the same time and immediately appropriated \$5000 to care for same. We feel the board had the welfare of the town in mind in keeping the expense so low.

Very gratifying have been the results obtained during 1913. The wells have proved adequate for the supply of water that has been required. The placing of meters on services so far as we have been able has yielded splendid results and in nearly all cases has proved satisfactory to the consumer and most beneficial for the town. The subjoined report by the superintendent gives the summary of the year's work, and the present status of the Water Works plant.

TO THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS:

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit the annual report of the superintendent for the year ending December 31, 1913.

The close of another year finds the department in a good financial condition. We have paid all running expenses, \$2,378 86 for extensions, \$4,727 50 interest on bonds and Town loan, \$1,500 00 final payment of Town loan and carried \$2,974 42 over as a nucleus for the new year.

The pipe on High St., was extended 400 feet, on Pleasant St., 200 feet, and on Rollins St. 200 feet, all with four inch cast iron pipe.

Two old hydrants have been replaced with new Corey Steamer hydrants.

Ten services have been relaid.

It is hardly necessary for me to repeat what I have said in years past in reference to the meter system. A glance at the following table will show how the installation of meters has cut down the running expense at the pumping station.

The amount spent for fuel this year was \$1166.24 against \$1780.76 last year. A net saving of \$614.52.

The chief factor in this saving is the new smoke stack installed last year. With the splendid draft it provides, combustion is almost perfect, thus burning much gas, etc., that formerly escaped.

Each year I have advised a new pump. In all probability the old pump will be able, with constant repair, to do the

work, after a fashion, for a few years longer. But when one considers the fact that it has been in constant use since 1890; that it is an old style affair, worn in many ways beyond repair therefore run at a loss because of slippage and friction also that a modern pump can be installed with a guaranteed saving of one half in fuel, how long will it be economy to run the old pump?

With a modern pump, an increase in the capacity of the stand pipe and the pumping plant will be better able to meet the demands of a growing town like Derry.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY.

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:

The ninth annual report is herewith presented.

The library has been opened the same hours as in former years with the exception of fifteen days following the fire. This time was used in putting the library into condition again for the use of the public, in which work I was assisted by several persons whose support and sympathy I greatly appreciate.

I have reported the loss of books resulting from the fire as 679. This includes only those that were damaged so badly that they are of no further use. Besides these there are many which were less seriously damaged and have been retained, but the life of these volumes is shortened and many of them will have to be replaced before long. Thus one may easily see the damage cannot fully be stated in numbers.

Our circulation shows an increase of 93 over last years report. This increase would have amounted to about 1500 if it had not been for the fire. The daily average of 94.8 volumes is larger than it ever has been before and the library was never in such good condition generally as it was just before the fire.

One important set of books has been added, "The Photographic History of the Civil War" in 10 volumes. This is a collection of thousands of photographed scenes of the war with text by special authorities.

A picture collection was started last summer and a large number of pictures are already in order. A gift of about 200

photogravures and wood engravings of famous subjects by Mrs. F. N. Young made a valuable beginning. Pictures were also given by Mrs. W. G. Dickey and Miss Mabel C. Ray.

The number of books sent to the bindery was 2-3 less than last year due to the use of the book binding kit which we purchased last spring thus greatly reducing the binding expenses.

During the vacation season people leaving town were allowed three books which we loaned for the month. A good number availed themselves of this privilege.

A study card has also been introduced for the use of our patrons who desire to retain books longer than the usual time but not to exceed two months. Only books of non-fiction are thus loaned.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

It seems unnecessary to add much to the report of the librarian which is a sufficiently comprehensive statement of the work of the library for the last year, and of its present condition.

On the next morning after the fire, in viewing the condition of the books and furniture, one could hardly have believed that in fifteen days the library would be reopened and ready for business, which was true. This was made possible by the prompt action of the selectmen in securing other quarters for the library and town offices, which they had done within a few hours and before night all of the books had been removed, to prevent further damage from water still dripping copiously through the ceiling from the rooms above. As will be seen by the report of Miss Gaskin many of the books were wholly ruined and many others made unfit for further use. The furniture was in a bad condition, but the pictures were practically uninjured, including, we are glad to say, the portraits of Mr. Adams and Mr. Pillsbury.

From the librarian's statistical report it will be learned that the patronage of the library is still increasing, so much

so that had there been no fire the circulation for the last year would have been nearly 2900 which we believe is a better showing than can be made by any other library in the state, outside the cities, and in proportion to the population, not excluding even them. It has been evident for some time that very soon more room would be necessary, and we have the assurance that so far as possible that requirement will be met in the plans for the repaired building.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The School Board of the Town School District begs to submit to the inhabitants of the District the following report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1914, together with an estimate for the coming year.

The Supervisory District is composed of Londonderry and Derry. Mr. Chas. W. Cutts was re-elected Superintendent at a salary of Sixteen Hundred Dollars, one half of which is paid by the State and of the remaining \$800, Londonderry pays \$240, Derry Village \$80, and our district pays \$480. Under the very able supervision of Mr. Cutts our schools are making steady progress.

At the Oak Street School some time has been lost because of inability to heat some rooms. This is not the fault of the boiler but is due to the fact that in those rooms there is not sufficient radiation.

At the West Side School, there is urgent need of repairs to the roof. It will need to be shingled in a year or so.

The district schools are in very fair repair. In some buildings there is need for new desks and chairs and slate blackboards. These are being provided by the School Board as rapidly as our finance will warrant.

During the past year we have paid all current bills against the District and have paid \$1200 on note indebtedness. There remains now but \$2400 outstanding. It might be well to pay this amount in three yearly payments of \$800.

In years past we have received from the State a rebate of all high school tuition paid. This year we anticipated that we might not receive a rebate of all and the last District meeting raised \$306 for that purpose. But we were cut

down \$1055, which left us about \$750 short. This next year we think that we will have to have at least \$1800 for this purpose as the rebate is based on the average tax rate for the five years next preceding.

This year we shall ask the District to raise the sum of \$7500 at the annual meeting which sum provides for everything, including a payment of \$800 on District notes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DERRY TOWN SCHOOL
DISTRICT:

I submit herewith my report as Superintendent on the condition and progress of the schools.

The work of the school year of 1912-13 was successfully completed by the graduation of 35 from the eighth grade. Twenty-three were graduated from the Oak St. eighth grade and the remaining 12 from the various District schools. Most of these entered Pinkerton Academy in September.

The schools reopened in the fall with very few changes in the teaching force. Miss Shuman, who had been given leave of absence for the Spring term, returned to No. 5, and Miss Hamblett who had taught the Spring term at No. 5, was put in charge of the primary school at East Derry. In the other district schools there were no changes. Miss Palmer and Miss Webster, both experienced teachers, were chosen to fill vacancies, the former in the Oak St. school and the latter in the West Side school. Early in the Fall term the children of the two rooms at East Derry were put in one room, and Miss Hamblett was again transferred to the Kilrea school where Miss Shuman had been obliged to relinquish her work on account of ill health. The change at East Derry makes a much more satisfactory school, and, without impairing in the least the efficiency of the school, makes a considerable saving in expense.

At the Oak St. School, it immediately became evident that another teacher would be required, and Miss Emery

also an experienced teacher, was engaged. In order to provide a room for her the children of the two 1st grade rooms were combined with two teachers in one room. This arrangement may not be best, but it seemed to be the only thing practical under the circumstances, and has worked out very well. After this adjustment none of the rooms in that building were overcrowded except the 1st grade room. Here were 59 children in charge of two teachers. Only one other room had over 40 pupils.

The first grade rooms at the West Side school were also crowded. There were in the 1st grade rooms in the two buildings the first month of school 144 children. Too many are sent to school before they are mature enough to do formal school work, and consequently must remain in the first grade two years. If the minimum school age were six instead of five, the children would progress quite as fast and the expense of one teacher might be saved. On the other hand, something can be said in favor of the lower admission age.

I wish to call attention once more to the number who fail of promotion. Last June 60 were reported as unpromoted in the Oak Street and West Side schools. To be sure this is a marked improvement over the record of the preceding year when 84 were thus reported. Still I believe a substantial gain would be made in the efficiency of our school work and incidentally a possible saving in money would result by the employment of a teacher to devote her time to individuals needing special attention. I therefore repeat my recommendation of a year ago.

I wish to call attention to the excellent attendance record of the Fall term. We were fortunate in the fact that no serious epidemic prevailed during that time, but this does not explain all. In many rooms there has been developed a pride in the matter of attendance record. As a result several rooms

have had perfect records for a series of weeks in succession. Much credit is due the teachers and a good deal also is due the children for this result. In this matter perhaps more than in any other way can parents cooperate with the schools by making sure that their children are regular and punctual in attendance.

The organization recently of a Parent-Teacher Association, I consider the most important event of the year. I am hoping that much good will result to our schools. The possible good that may be accomplished by such an association is almost limitless, and the organization should receive the active support of every one interested in the well being of the children.

There is some demand for a term of evening school during the winter months, and it would be well to give the matter some consideration in making estimates for the coming year. It is true that our compulsory attendance laws operate so to leave little necessity for such a school for the benefit of young people obliged to leave school before they have completed the elementary school. On the other hand, we have quite an adult population who would be glad to profit by such a school.

The changes made by the last legislature in the Child Labor laws and compulsory attendance laws are important. The general effect I believe has been good, yet in a few individual cases some hardship may have resulted. Under the new law, no vacation certificates can be issued so that no child under fourteen years of age can be employed at any time in the forbidden occupations. A child fourteen years old may have a labor certificate if he can qualify for it, but he must attend school when school is in session until he is sixteen years old unless he has completed the eighth grade before that time. In consequence of this law, fewer employment certificates are being issued and doubtless quite a num-

ber of children are compelled to remain in school, who, under the old law, would have left on becoming fourteen years old.

I am glad to add that the occasional inspection of our shops by the labor inspector indicates that the employers are carefully observing the law relative to the employment of child labor.

The school buildings will need considerable attention during the coming year. It is of very great importance that the buildings be put and kept in good condition. As far as possible they should be made attractive and no expense should be spared to make them thoroughly sanitary. A little change seems to be needed in the heating arrangements of the Oak St., school. The new heating plant seems to be sufficient but it is difficult to heat two rooms that are most exposed during very severe weather. Apparently more radiation is needed in those rooms.

The schools themselves generally are in excellent condition. Good work is being done in all. We are especially fortunate in having a strong corps of enthusiastic teachers and to them much credit is due for the successful work that is being carried on in our schools. An excellent spirit of cooperation prevails.

The following table shows the important figures for several years. The attendance records for the present year are for the Fall term, and will necessarily be quite a little changed when computed for the entire school year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

DISTRICT No. 2.

To the Board of Education of the Derry Special School District, No. 2:

I herewith submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools.

The schools have continued doing excellent work under the same teachers that had charge of them last year. Five were graduated from the eighth grade in June, all of whom entered the Academy in September.

The present eighth grade is unusually large, and if all the members successfully complete the years work, the grammar school will be rather small next year. On the other hand, the primary school is quite large. Hence it may be advisable to transfer the fifth grade to the grammar room next year. It may not be necessary to continue this arrangement long.

The new heating plant, that was installed during the summer, has given some little trouble, and consequently some time has been lost on this account. Some little changes and adjustments may be needed, and when these are made, I am sure the plant will prove to be adequate and thoroughly satisfactory.

The following are the most important of the statistics reported to the State Department for last year: Total enrollment 62; average membership 44.98; average attendance 41.61; per cent of attendance 90.28. The corresponding figures for the Fall term of the present year are as follows: Total enrollment 59; average membership 52.2; average attendance 49.16; per cent of attendance 94. Nine were not absent or tardy for that term.
