THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the town of Hill, in the county of Merrimack in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Congregational Hall, in said Hill on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year and to see if the town will vote to make appropriation of the same as per estimate made in the town budget and such additional appropriation if any as voted in town meeting.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4 To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 5 To see what action the town will take in regard to a budget committee to serve with the selectmen.
- 6 To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as Hill-Danbury road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$946.50; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$496.02.
- 7 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165 for the purchase of the fire siren now on trial.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to build a town hall provided Federal aid can be obtained to cover all labor expense, and if so to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be found necessary for other charges.
- 9 To see if the town will vote to accept \$1000 from Tripeak Grange to be applied toward building the town hall.

10 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1000 for the purchase of woodland.

11 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the work of control of white pine blister rust.

12 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 to be used for the purpose of getting some new business into town.

13 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

14 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell or otherwise dispose of the town scales in such a manner that they will continue to be available for public use.

15 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the Hill Center school-house.

16 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
