THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.] *To the inhabitants of the Town of Hudson, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March next, at ten-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose a Town clerk, three selectmen, and all other necessary officers for the year ensuing.

2nd. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the poor, for the building and repairing of bridges, and other necessary charges arising in said town for the ensuing year.

3rd. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of highways for the ensuing year.

4th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of highways in addition to what is now required by law to be raised and appropriated for the permanent improvement of highways under the provision of an Act entitled, "An act to provide for State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the State," passed by the New Hampshire General Court, January Session, 1905.

5th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Public Library.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

7th. To see what provision the town will vote to make in relation to furnishing the town with a hearse for the ensuing year.

8th. To see if the town will vote to observe "Old Home Week" and make appropriation therefor.

9th. To see if the town will vote to pay for the Electric

lights used in the Hudson Hose Co's. building, beginning April 1, 1910.

10th. To see if the town will vote to rebuild Taylors Falls Bridge and raise or appropriate money for the same; or take any other action in relation thereto.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

In the report of the trustees one year ago, mention was made of the building which was then in process of being constructed, and which was completed as early as May.

It was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies on the eleventh day of June, 1909, at which time it was formally presented by its generous donors to the town of Hudson, for the use and benefit of its grateful citizens.

The building is all that was promised or expected, and stands as a beautiful, appropriate and enduring Memorial to the worthy and honored woman in whose memory it was erected, by a bereaved husband and a venerable mother.

It is an honor to the town of Hudson and amply fills the place of a long-needed home for our public library, and we believe it will continue to be—as the years and generations pass—a lasting and increasing blessing to all her citizens who avail themselves of the privilege which it affords.

The books were removed into the new library building and placed upon the shelves, on Monday, June 7th. Wednesday, the 9th being omitted as a library day, the new library building was opened for the first time to the citizens of the town for the exchange of books on Saturday, June 12th, 1909.

Since the last annual report, there has been added 686 books, which increase the number as shown by the accession books, from 3,467 a year ago, to 4,153 at the present time.

Of this number about 600 were given by Dr. Alfred K. Hills, included among which were "The United Editors Encyclopedia and Dictionary," 40 volumes; "The Universal Authology," 35 volumes; "History of Egypt," "History of India," with many other valuable works.

Col. Wm. A. Crombie, of New York, a friend of Dr. Hills, gave the "History of Rome and the Roman People," Edition de Luxe, 16 volumes, a very valuable work. Also, two Royal volumes of "Picturesque Egypt," and other books.

Hermon F. Dane, of Nashua, gave a complete set of the "Journal of Proceedings of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge of the United States, and the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows," 23 volumes from its foundation February, 1821 to 1908. Also, "Journal of Proceedings of the R. W. Grand Lodge of New Hampshire," 2 volumes, from 1844 to 1880.

Mr. Dane also gave 6 other books making 31 in all.

Mrs. Charles Stickney of Nashua donated several books.

These 686 new and useful books make a very material

addition to our library both in numbers and usefulness, and all the donors are entitled to the heartfelt thanks of the trustees as well as the citizens of our town.

This large number, among the most popular periodicals published, contributed without expense to the town, are most thankfully received. They are very extensively read by a large number of patrons of the library, and add materially to its usefulness.

The monthly average of books loaned as appears by the report of the librarian has been 397.25 and the total number for the year, 4,767; an increase over the preceeding year of 959, or more than 25 per cent. It shows an increase for the last two years of over 82 per cent.

School Report.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the School District:

In submitting the Twenty-fifth Annual Report, your Board feels justified in asserting that the past year has been a most successful one. An efficient corps of teachers have rendered excellent service under the watchful attention of a painstaking Superintendent. As progress toward the ideals to which we are aiming in school work, the result of the year, we believe, is most satisfactory. Good attendance and earnestness on the part of the pupils has been the rule.

A few instances of lack of appreciation on the part of parents of the importance of keeping their children in school during the whole time the schools are in session, have come to the attention of your Board. Each particular case has received such treatment as the same seemed to demand. The attention of parents is called to the following section of our School Laws:

“Every person having the custody and control of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, or of a child under the age of sixteen years, who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, residing in a school district in which a public school is annually taught, shall cause such child to attend the public school all the time such school is in session, unless the child shall be excused by the school board of the district because his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or because he

was instructed in the English language in a private school approved by the school board for a number of weeks equal to that in which the public school was in session in the common English branches, or having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies."

Ernest effort has been made on the part of your Board to impress and have impressed upon the minds of the pupils, the importance of treating their fellow-pupils with care and kindness while at play, and to respect the rights and well-being of others. The government of a large room of pupils with varied dispositions and home training, is no easy task, and teachers are instructed to use all patience, tact and kindness in the government of their pupils. Only in extreme cases should corporal punishment be resorted to. In such cases, however, it would seem the same is lawful, and in a reported New Hampshire case, one of the Supreme Court judges used the following language:

"The law clothes the teacher, as it does the parent in whose place he stands, with power to enforce discipline by the imposition of reasonable corporal punishment. He is not required to be infallible in his judgment. He is the judge to determine when and to what extent correction is necessary; and like all others clothed with a discretion, he cannot be made personally responsible for error in judgment when he has acted in good faith and without malice."

Teachers should receive the hearty co-operation of parents in their difficult tasks, and hasty judgment of teachers by parents should not be made in the presence of children, lest insubordination be encouraged.

Besides the minor repairs shown by the district Treasurer's Repair Account, your Board had the Webster Building painted at an expense of \$91.00, the amount expended for the same work in 1902 being \$168.06.

Acting under the instructions given at your last annual meeting, your Board sold the No. 2 school house for \$150.00.

An amendment to the school law at the last session of the General Court, makes it the duty of your Board to "state in detail the sums of money which will be required during the ensuing fiscal year for the purchase of text books, scholar's supplies, flags and appurtenances, and for the payment of the tuition of the scholars of the district in high schools and academies in accordance with Chapter 96 of the laws of 1901, and for the payment of all other statutory obligations of the district."

Upon these items your Board submit the following amounts:

Money for high school tuitions,	\$1,200 00
Money for text books and supplies,	300 00
Money for flags and appurtenances,	15 00
Money for outstanding legal obligations, maturing and interest,	216 00

The above amounts it will be necessary for the Selectmen to assess on school account in addition to money for general running expenses, including that required by law, and additionally voted at the district meeting, and the amounts voted for the salaries of district officers and repairs.

The schools maintained, number of weeks furnished, names and salaries of teachers, number of pupils in each school, etc., are facts at once attainable from the district treasurer's report and the page of detailed statistics to which reference is invited. Your attention is also called to the report of the Superintendent and music teacher herewith attached, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Superintendent's Report.

To the Committee of the School District of the Town of Hudson:

I have the honor to submit my third annual report.

THE SCHOOL WORK.

The work in the different studies has moved along satisfactorily in the channels outlined in my report last year.

I feel that, in reading, the purpose of the State Program of Studies has been fairly well achieved. The pupils have shown that a love of good reading has been cultivated by the eager interest and pleasure with which they read the books furnished them. Much more supplementary material is needed before all the classes are equipped as they should be, but, by interchanging sets among the schools, a good supply has been obtained.

The progress in handwriting has been most marked, which has been due chiefly, to the hard work the teachers have done in practising the muscular movement themselves. Bad habits of sitting and of holding the pencils and pens have been broken up, and correct ones insisted upon all the time. Definite results in this study have been produced in the large number of pupils who have developed very creditable skill in the muscular movement.

By eliminating useless topics and giving more time to essentials, the work in arithmetic has been improved. The teachers have been held strictly to the accomplishment of the work for each year as laid down in the Program of Studies. The attainment of the pupils was tested last June and the results carefully noted. While it is true that the results were not all that they should have been, a very fair showing was

made. Very likely the judgment and reasoning power of the pupils had not been properly trained. It is astonishing how little independent "thinking" a child may do in the process of "going through" a great many pages of the arithmetic. Of course, it is the business of the teachers to see to it that her pupils do think, and think until they acquire sufficient power to easily compute all the problems that the common affairs of life shall call for. The question was thoroughly thrashed out in two of our teachers' meetings. Later, in December, I tested the pupils again with better results. We have every reason to expect a higher average in the test by the Department of Public Instruction next June.

The examination in grammar last June ranked "good"; those in history, physiology, geography, and civics ranked "fair," showing the character of the work done in these studies.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS

I have held six teachers' meetings during the year on the following subjects: Arithmetic (2 meetings); Grammar (2 meetings); Handwriting; School Register.

The main purpose of these meetings was to interpret for the teachers the work of the different branches as laid down in the program of studies, and to impress upon them their responsibility for the accomplishment of it. Incidentally, I brought before the teachers the corrected papers from last June's examination, showing the average for each school in each test and also the average for all the schools together in each question. By this means, we learned just where the children had failed in their year's work so far as the examinations could show. That knowledge has been of great benefit to the teachers this year.

The teachers attended the meetings in good numbers. They showed interest by the way they asked and answered

questions about the practical work of the school rooms. In advance of each meeting, I inspected the work of each teacher in the subject that was to be treated and in this way, kept before the teachers and myself a definite object to work for at all times throughout the year. These meetings will continue to be held once a month.

Your attention is invited to the following table—especially to these items: Percent of attendance; Length of school year in weeks of five days; Number of Pupils attending High School; Teachers; Figures for the years 1906 to 1909 are given.

A comparative study of these statistics for the years 1906 to 1909 will show in what respects the schools have gained or lost ground. During the year 1906 no superintendent was employed.

ATTENDANCE.

The per cent of attendance remained the same (86) for the years 1906 and 1907. In 1908 it crept up to 88 and in 1909 it reached 91. This gain shows progress that is fundamental as no other item can be considered of as great importance in the schooling of the children as regularity of attendance. Not all the schools have shown an advance in this respect. There is vast room for better figures in this item in the two small ungraded schools, No. 9 and No. 1.

The number of children entering high schools and academies shows no noticeable increase, but remains high.

LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR.

The average length of all the schools in weeks of five days shows a slight gain, the exact figures standing 33 for the year 1909 and $32\frac{1}{4}$ for 1906. While it is true that our schools are kept more weeks in the year than in the average for the schools of the State, yet, to quote State Superintendent Morrison's last report, "Here, as elsewhere, an *average value* does not tell the whole story.—56 per cent of the whole school membership of the state is in towns in which the school year is thirty-six weeks or over—It is to be hoped that this percentage will continue to rise until it reaches 100 per cent."

TEACHERS.

Teachers' salaries show a slight gain of \$1.75 per school month over what they were in 1906. The average salary per month in Hudson for the year 1909 was \$33.71. The average for the state in 1908 was \$36.01. The average for Hillsborough county was \$42.84. Eleven towns in this county pay their women teachers a trifle less than Hudson does. Twenty-one pay a good deal more.

The changes in the teaching force was as follows: Mrs. Wiggin was elected to the principalship of the Webster School. She came to us from Atkinson, N. H., but has, with-

in a year, left the State of Maine where she has a creditable record of many year's successful teaching. Miss Christine Burnham, also from the State of Maine, was elected as teacher of the 5th and 6th grades in the Webster School. Miss Maud S. Fay, who last year taught number nine school, filled the position left vacant by Miss Marion J. Walch.

Miss Ada Nutbrown was given charge of the primary room. She comes from Nashua and is a graduate of the Nashua Training School. Miss Elizabeth Andrews was engaged as teacher of number nine.

disposition to do all in their power to provide good schools for the town.

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

The music report follows:

Since undertaking this work several years ago, it has been my earnest hope that with the passing of each year the music department in our schools might improve.

At the present time I believe a large majority of the pupils enjoy music as well as any study; I am convinced that during the year just closed, the most satisfactory work of any since I began teaching has been accomplished.

We have striven to keep the pupils supplied with new and interesting material without undue expenditures for music.

During the winter term the advanced classes of the Webster and Centre schools exchanged music readers, thus providing both schools with new work which was appreciated.

It was necessary to purchase new music readers for the children at No. 1 school, and also for one class at the Webster building.

I am glad to be able to report a greatly improved condition in grades V and VI at the Webster school. The work of these grades has usually been far from satisfactory, but this year the program furnished the teacher has been faithfully carried out, and the children, instead of plodding along, listless and uninterested, have already finished work which we generally find them doing in May or June.

All the teachers are getting as good results as can be expected, and have given me great help by their co-operation.

I wish to thank all who have helped to make the year's work so pleasant and successful.
