### Warrant for Annual Meeting

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; also to choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905, to raise additional money if necessary, or act anything thereon.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the J. A. Tarbell library in addition to that required by law.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes beside the highway, or act anything thereon.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the control of pine blister rust

to be spent in cooperation with the state, or act anything thereon.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, or act anything thereon.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to buy a truck for the use of the town, or act anything thereon.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of taking inventory April 1st.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to buy additional fire fighting equipment, or act anything thereon.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount of money necessary to buy a new road machine, or act anything thereon.
- 14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I am pleased to see an increase in circulation during the past year, but I would be very glad if the rest of the townspeople would avail themselves of our fine collection of books and magazines.

Fifty-three books have been added during the year; nine given by Mrs. Sewell Bracket, two by Miss Harrington, two by Leslie Eastman and two by Louise Eastman, and thirty-eight bought by the town.

The reading room has a very fine collection of magazines, the National Geographic being given by the Improvement Society, Better Homes and American Boy by Annie S. Holt, Review of Reviews by K. F. Putnam, the Christian Leader by M. M. Eastman, the Watchman-Examiner by Clintie Emery, the American and Ladies' Home Journal by Mrs. William Hatt, St. Nicholas by Charles Whiting, and the Literary Digest, Scholastic and Granite Monthly bought by the town.

A new furnace provides adequate heat, and so makes library day more enjoyable.

The floor received a coat of varnish in the spring, but owing to the lack of a suitable rug at the door, one would never suspect the fact at this time.

The card catalogue should be gone over and brought up to date, removing cards of discarded books, and adding cards for those acquired during the last three years. This would necessitate closing the library long enough to check up the books with the card catalogue, and then the new cards could

be added. As it is, many of the books on the cards cannot be found on the shelves, and a good deal of time is wasted hunting for them.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro:

I submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### School Organization

Miss Henrickson, now teaching her fourth year at Perham Corner, is the only one of last year's teachers on our present staff. However, Mrs. Herrick has returned to the service and is teaching the South School. For the North School we secured Miss Gretchen Smith, a graduate of the Plymouth Normal School last year, and for the Johnson Corner School Miss Helen Perley, a graduate of the Keene Normal School last June. Miss Bowden resigned after three years as music supervisor in the six towns of this Supervisory Union, and Lyndeboro is employing cadets from Keene this year. We hope this is a temporary arrangement, however.

The statistical report following shows an enrollment of 57 pupils last year as compared with 64 the previous year, but an increase to 71 for the current year. Both the South School and the North School are larger than they have been for several years. The per cent of attendance last year was higher than the preceding year and nearly one and onehalf per cent above the state average. Attendance this year is about the same as for the corresponding period last year. Tardiness was somewhat higher last year than the year before, especially at the Johnson Corner School. This year tardiness has been reduced to a negligible amount except at Johnson Corner where it has been excessive, but about half of the tardiness this year is chargeable to pupils from one family.

It is ten years since the school law first provided for a standard school of thirty-six weeks. Since 1924 no school in New Hampshire has had less than thirty-six weeks. School enrollment has increased and the per cent of attendance has been raised from 91 to 94.5. Pupils are staying in school longer—85 per cent now complete the eighth grades as compared with 75 per cent ten years ago; 67 per cent enter high school in place of 55 per cent; 43 per cent graduate from high school instead of 31 per cent; 23 per cent continue their schooling beyond high school instead of 11 per cent.

High School enrollment has increased from 12,087 to 16,097, an increase of 33 per cent in ten years, with only five per cent increase in elementary schools.

While every school in the state is open for at least thirty-six weeks, the number of days school is actually in session varied last year from 169 to 187. The average for the state was 177 and this average has been maintained for the past four years. The Lyndeboro schools were in session 176 days last year, a number which was exceeded by 96 towns and equalled by 21 others; 123 towns had fewer school days. Lyndeboro schools were closed two holidays (Labor Day and Memorial Day) and two days for Teachers' Institutes.

# Supervision

The division of my time between class room visiting or supervision, and office work does not vary materially from last year, and as usual a considerable part of the office work has to do with the tabulating and interpreting of the scores from standard tests. The Stanford Achievement Tests were continued last year as in former years and the results were in general handled in the same manner as indicated in last year's report.

The standardized test in silent reading mentioned last year was repeated in October 1929 and the

results compared with those obtained a year previous. The class work in silent reading during the year interval between tests laid emphasis upon the particular features in which the first test showed the pupils to be deficient, and the pupils who scored D or E on the first test were given special attention. The results of the second test indicate that our effors were effecive to a considerable degree, since there were 11 per cent fewer pupils getting scores of D or E than in the first test. This must stand, however, as a record of progress and not of complete attainment of the goal, for there are still at least 8 per cent more pupils getting D's and E's than would be expected in a normal group of pupils.

Besides these two series of tests given for purposes of measurement, several other types of tests are being used frequently by the teachers for diagnostic purposes. An oral reading test is used in the first three grades by means of which the teachers determine from time to time what progress each child is making and in what respect improvement should be made. Similarly two types of language tests are used at intervals through the year to check up on the pupils' progress in mastering the correct use of language forms.

While these standardized tests and many other less formal tests devised by the teachers are useful in certain fields, we must keep constantly in mind the fact that there are many more phases of education that do not yield to such exact measurement, and also the fact that progressive attainment in those phases not readily measured is probably more important in the equipment of our young folks for their future lives than the things we are thus able to measure.

# Medical Inspection

Dr. Hinds of Milford made the medical inspection early in October and reports the following:

No record is kept of the corrective work done in response to the notices sent to parents because there is no school nurse.

#### **Finances**

So far as the usual items of the budget are concerned there is no material change in the amounts proposed for 1930-1931 from those of previous years, except that high school tuition will require about \$300 more than last year because of the fact that there will probably be four more new pupils entering high school next fall than there are in the graduation class at high school this year. It is recommended, however, that the district meeting consider carefully the two following items and the recommendations of the School Board regarding them: First, there has been no insurance carried on the school buildings and the recommendation is made that at least \$500 insurance be placed on each of the five buildings; this would cost \$62.50 for a three-year term. Second, the Johnson Corner and North schoolhouses should be painted and the sum of \$200 is recommended for this purpose.

The support and interest of townspeople, School Board, and teachers is appreciated.
