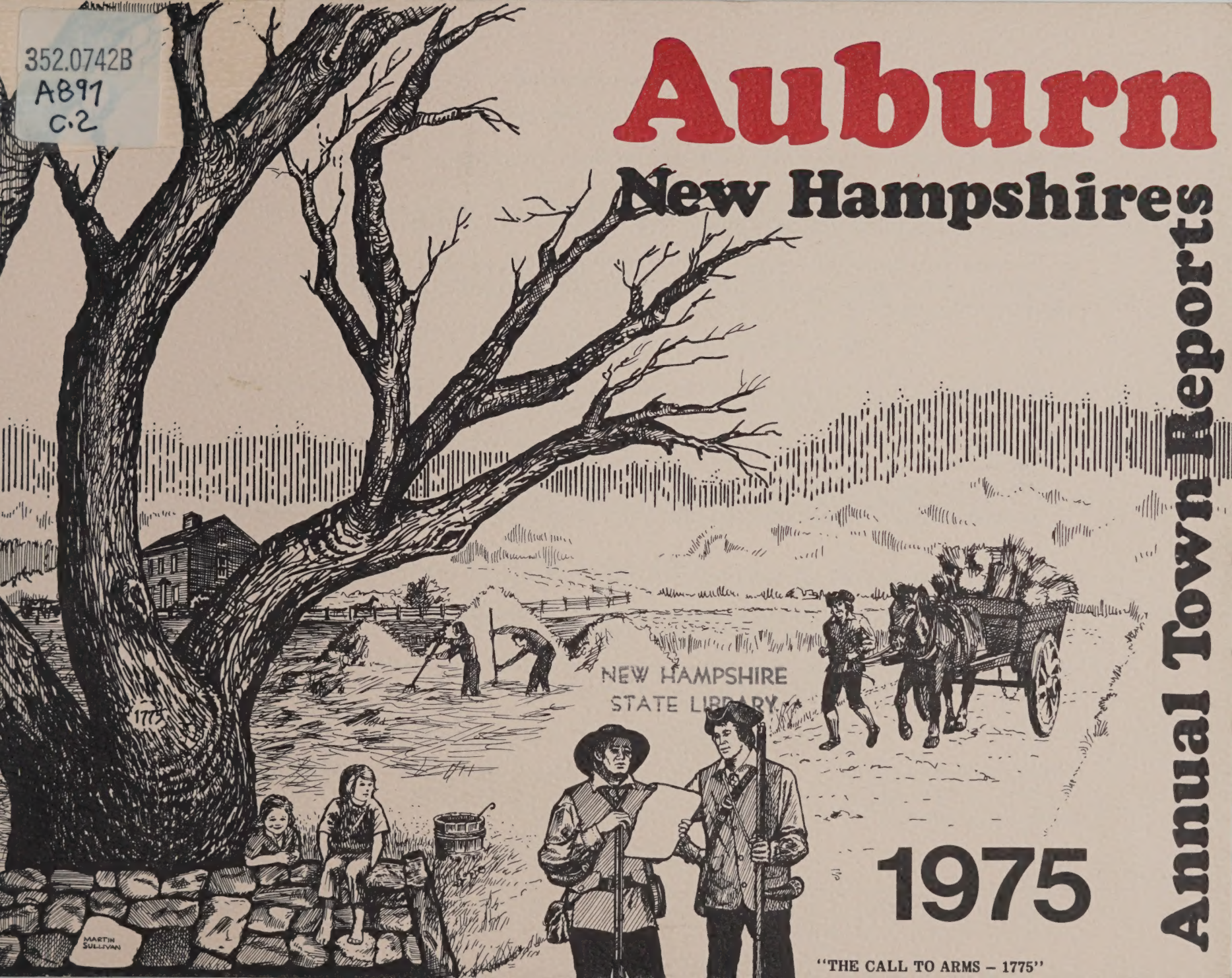

BURNING REGULATIONS

TO REPORT A FIRE DIAL 483-2521

The State of New Hampshire requires that written permits be obtained for all open fires at all times when the ground is not snow covered.

Permits may be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden, Mr. Joseph Stacy, for grass, brush, campfires, etc. Permits must be obtained on the day burning is to be accomplished.

Burn when there is no wind, on rainy days and damp days, in a safe place and in accordance with the terms of the permit. Burn before 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. Keep some buckets of water close by; if wind develops, promptly extinguish the fire. All fires must be extinguished before you depart the scene.

PARKING DURING SNOW STORM

- A. From November 1 to April 1 of each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. or at any other time in such a manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parked in violation of section A hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five dollars for each offense.

DOG ORDINANCE

- A. **RESTRAINT:** All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the town, except when they are on the owner's or keeper's property or being used for hunting or training purposes.
- B. **PENALTY:** Any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for each offense.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Rockingham, S.S.

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Auburn on Tuesday, March the second, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- First: To bring in your ballots for:
- Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
 - One Selectman for three years,
 - Town Treasurer for the ensuing year,
 - Highway Agent for the ensuing year,
 - One Library Trustee for three years,
 - One Cemetery Trustee for three years,
 - One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,
 - One Auditor for two years,
 - One Auditor for one year,
 - One member of the Police Commission for three years.
- Second: To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration. (By Official Ballot)
- Third: To see if the Town will vote to pass the following resolution relative to the National Flood Insurance Program:
- WHEREAS, certain areas of Auburn are subject to periodic flooding from streams, lakes, etc., causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and
- WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, and 156A,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby;

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to;
 - (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
 - (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.
 - (c) Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
 - (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility, an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.

3. Appoints the Zoning Officer to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program. (On Official Ballot)

Fourth: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by the Board of Selectmen for the Town building code ordinance as follows:

The Zoning Officer shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (I) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (II) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (III) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage. (By Official Ballot)

Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Ordinance Governing Commercial Earth Removal Activities, proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

Permit Required

All existing and future commercial earth removal activities will require a permit issued by the Zoning Officer. In the case of activities in existence on the effective date of this Ordinance, the permit shall be issued upon payment of the fee prescribed herein. In the case of new activities, the permit shall be issued only upon written authorization granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Such authorization shall only be granted in accord with the provisions of Article IV and Article XI of the Zoning Ordinance. Permits issued under this Ordinance will be valid for one year unless revoked by the Zoning Officer for non-compliance with the terms of the Earth Removal Regulations stipulated by the Zoning Board of Adjustment as a condition for receipt of the permit.

Renewal

Permits issued under this Ordinance shall be renewed annually if the activities are to be continued.

Fee

The fee for the Earth Removal Permit shall be one dollar.

Violation

In any case in which the Zoning Officer finds that an activity subject to the provisions of this Ordinance has been commenced or is being conducted in violation of the provisions of this Ordinance or in violation of the terms of the Earth Removal Regulations of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, he shall issue a "stop work order" to the owner of the land.

The "stop work order" shall cite each provision or term being violated and each such citation shall constitute a separate offense under this Ordinance.

Concurrently with the issuance of the "stop work order", the Zoning Officer shall also notify the Board of Selectmen whose duty it shall be to take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance and terms of the Earth Removal Regulations by seeking relief in the courts or by any other legal action. (By Official Ballot)

Polls will open at 10 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, March the 6th, next at 2:00 P.M. at the Auburn Village School, Roy Seavey Memorial Gymnasium to consider the following articles:

- Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.
- Seventh: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may have come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.
- Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham Fund for schools or library.
- Ninth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, in the name of and in behalf of the town, gifts for the use of the town.
- Tenth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any and/or all property acquired by tax deed, by public sale with the right to accept or reject all bids.
- Eleventh: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to allow the Selectmen to pay up to this amount, to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of any persons responsible for setting incendiary fires, breaking and entering of any building, vandalism or robbery of any kind, depending upon the severity of the crime.
(This amount included in budget)
- Twelfth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal of Seven Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

To rebuild Cottage Avenue
(This amount included in budget)

- Thirteenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department to purchase additional monitors for the existing fire alarm system. (By request of fire dept.) (This amount included in budget)
- Fourteenth: To see if the Town will vote to change the names of Neal Street to North and South Neal, Allen Avenue to North and South Allen Avenue and a portion of Reading to South Reading Street.
- Fifteenth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the necessary funds from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new police cruiser to replace the present 1971 model.
- Sixteenth: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- Seventeenth: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

RECORDS OF THE TOWN MEETING – 1975
MARCH 4, 1975

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator C. Donald Stritch at 10:00 A.M., March 4, 1975. The Moderator read the Town Warrant Articles One, Two and Three. Donald MacDonald, Assistant Moderator read the School District Warrant. The ballot box was inspected and found empty. The polls were declared open and balloting proceeded under the direction of the Moderator.

The polls were closed at 7:00 P.M. and the ballots were counted and declared by the Moderator as follows:

ARTICLE 9. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO DISPOSE OF ANY AND/OR ALL PROPERTY ACQUIRED BY TAX DEED, BY PUBLIC SALE WITH THE RIGHT TO ACCEPT OR REJECT ALL BIDS.

Dorothy Gilman moved Article 9 be accepted as printed. Seconded by Donald Dollard. Article adopted.

ARTICLE 10. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) TO ALLOW THE SELECTMEN TO PAY UP TO THIS AMOUNT, TO ANYONE GIVING INFORMATION LEADING TO THE ARREST AND CONVICTION OF ANY PERSONS RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING INCENDIARY FIRES, DEPENDING UPON THE SEVERITY OF THE FIRE.
(This amount included in budget)

William Blake moved that Article 10 be adopted. Wayne Marshall seconded. Mr. Blake moved to amend the article to read: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to allow the Selectmen to pay up to this amount, to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of any persons responsible for setting incendiary fires, **Breaking and Entering of any building, Vandalism or Robbery of any kind**, depending upon the severity of the crime". Passed. Article adopted with amendment.

ARTICLE 11. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE WITHDRAWAL OF TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000.00) FROM THE REVENUE SHARING FUND ESTABLISHED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE STATE AND LOCAL ASSISTANCE ACT OF 1972, FOR USE AS SET-OFFS AGAINST BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS IN THE AMOUNT INDICATED; AND, FURTHER TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO MAKE PRO-RATE REDUCTIONS IN THE AMOUNTS IF ESTIMATED ENTITLEMENTS ARE REDUCED OR TAKE ANY OTHER ACTION HEREON:

REBUILT SECTION OF NUTT ROAD

John Rolfe moved that article be adopted as read. Seconded by Wayne Marshall. Article 11 passed.

ARTICLE 12: TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO WITHDRAW FROM THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL FUND, THE SUM OF FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$15,000.00) FROM THE \$30,000.00 SET ASIDE FROM REVENUE SHARING (VOTED AT 1974 TOWN MEETING) FOR SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL USE. (THIS AMOUNT INCLUDED IN BUDGET)

It was moved by Mr. Lacourse that Article 12 be tabled. Second by Mr. Dutka. It was explained that an extension had been granted for dump burning for one year. Article tabled.

ARTICLE 13. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF FORTY-FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,500.00) FOR THE AUBURN VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT TO PURCHASE A RADIO AND MONITOR ALARM SYSTEM, WITH VOICE INSTRUCTION TO SIMULTANEOUSLY ALERT VOLUNTEER FIREMEN ALLOWING THEM TO GO DIRECTLY TO THE FIRE. (BY REQUEST OF FIRE DEPT.) (THIS AMOUNT INCLUDED IN BUDGET)

Daniel Trombly moved that Article 13 be adopted as read. Seconded by Carol Collins. Article adopted.

ARTICLE 14. TO HEAR THE REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND PASS ANY VOTE IN RELATION THERETO.

Mr. Wayne Marshall moved that the budget in the amount of \$166,351.96 be adopted, deleting the amount of \$11,000 under Town Dump making that appropriation \$6,000.00. Seconded by Mr. Dollard. Article 14 passed.

ARTICLE 15. TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE THE MEETING.

Herbert Chase, Selectman, introduced Mr. David Kuehl who was elected Selectman for three years. He recognized Russell Dutka who has served 12 years as selectman.

Donald Wright moved to adjourn.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

Last spring, after my appointment as Civil Defense Director by the Selectmen, I attended a seminar at U. N. H. to learn more of what Civil Defense was all about. I was joined by Orrin Chase for the weekend. We, in the seminar, agreed that the term "Civil Defense" is misleading to the majority of the people all over the country. Upon hearing it, most people think of war or nuclear attack. Please, Civil Defense will be here ready to help in any disaster whatever it may be. With your Town Report this year, there is a booklet entitled "In Time of Emergency". Please read through this booklet and I am sure that you will find a lot of helpful information.

Last year Civil Defense got a Surplus Army truck, and turned it over to the Auburn Fire Department. This year the Fire Department rebuilt the truck into a tanker capable of carrying 1000 gals. of water. If the truck had been purchased outside of the Civil Defense Office it would have cost the Fire Department many thousands of dollars.

Civil Defense has also purchased a full field kitchen at very little cost and it is available to any organization in town. We have tried this year to provide the school system with books and slides related to CD, but the State has held this up until further study by the Governor and Council. When this is approved it will be provided to the school at no cost to the taxpayer. Also, in the future, when the Civil Defense Office in Concord can fit us into their schedule, we will be trying to set up a disaster drill somewhere in town.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION REPORT OF SERVICE

NURSING

Skilled Nursing is available in the home by Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses which includes dressings, injections, special treatments, baths and rehabilitative nursing under the direction of the patient's physician. Homemaker-Home Health Aides assist under the direction of the nurses and therapists.

THERAPY

Registered physical, occupational and speech therapists are available for therapy at home. Social worker and nutritionist consultants have been added to the staff this year.

PRE AND POST NATAL ADVICE

The nurse is prepared to give advice and guidance to expectant mothers as well as instructions after the baby is born.

Immunization clinics are held periodically during the year and nurses are available at monthly drop in centers, to take blood pressure readings.

POLICY

This agency is voluntary and non profit and is certified to care for Medicare patients. Although many of the services are paid for through Medicaid, Medicare and other health insurances, there is a fee which is discussed on the initial visit. Adjustments can be made. There is no charge for maternal and child health visits made by the nurses. Anyone may request the service by calling the Visiting Nurse office at 622-3781, Monday thru Friday from 7:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. Necessary services are provided on weekends and holidays.

SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

As 1975 drew to a close, the Town of Auburn and the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission began their tenth year of a partnership which has been of benefit to the metropolitan area and the town, in particular. During the past year our regional planning and technical assistance programs have resulted in a number of direct benefits to the townspeople and their elected and appointed officials.

The Commission has just completed the drafting of an up-to-date base (street) map of Auburn to replace one prepared in 1966. We expect this map to become a popular item of use to the Auburn Fire and Police Departments, residents and visitors. An important feature of this new map will be the grid system and alphabetical index of street names which the older map did not carry.

We are now in the final stages of preparing a 1975 existing land use map. This document will provide a detailed illustration of the type and extent of growth and development which has occurred in your community since 1970.

On February 11, 1976, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission will present your Planning Board with a set of aerial photos of the entire town. These prints were made possible through the Commission's aerial photography program and are a product of flights made in May of 1975. Complete coverage of the community will be available at the Town Hall at the scale of one inch equals two hundred feet.

The Commission's Assistant Director met regularly throughout the year with the Auburn Planning Board and provided technical assistance on a variety of matters. The Planning Board, Board of Selectmen and Zoning Board of Adjustment were kept up-to-date with copies of new and amended state statutes relating to their respective responsibilities and given an opportunity to review and comment upon various pieces of proposed legislation.

At the request of your Selectmen we prepared a town map identifying all Class VI roads and obtained, without charge, landscape architect and site planning services to help them evaluate possible use of town-owned land. Pertinent information has also been made available to town officials regarding the application procedure to be followed in the event the town wishes to compete for a portion of the \$275,000. that is available to suburban Manchester communities under Title I of the Housing and Community Act of 1974.

In April, Mr. Roland White was appointed by the Selectmen to fill a vacancy on the Commission created by the resignation of Mr. Russell Dutka. Mr. White also took Mr. Dutka's seat on the Metropolitan Manchester Transportation Planning Policy Committee. Mr. Donald Marzluff was appointed as an alternate representative to the Commission's Board. Mr. Philip Hujar also represents Auburn's interests on the regional planning body and its Executive Committee.

National Flood Insurance Program. At the March, 1976 town meeting you will be asked to consider three warrant articles relative to the National Flood Insurance Program. One of these involves a proposed amendment to your Building Code Ordinance. We encourage you to give all three articles a favorable vote. If any one should fail to pass, those of you who own property located within the Special Flood Hazard Areas identified by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development will not be able to obtain mortgages or improvement loans from any federally-insured or regulated lending institution. This sanction will apply only to lands and buildings located within the Special Flood Hazard Areas.

If these articles pass, and the town's application is accepted, any resident or property owner will be able to purchase federally-subsidized flood insurance coverage for structures and their contents. This type of coverage is not generally available at present. Purchase of the flood insurance is a matter of individual preference and is handled through your own broker or agent. Your endorsement of these articles does not, in any way, commit the town to any financial burden.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The format of my report for the 1974-75 school year, in conjunction with the Chairman of SERESC is more specific in nature and has a direct bearing upon the community of Auburn as well as other communities within the State.

It is our responsibility to help the handicapped. Moreover, it is required by state law. In New Hampshire, there is inadequate state money needed to do the job for these 'special needs pupils' whether they live in poorer or wealthier towns. This puts local school boards in a 'bind': its moral and legal responsibility to provide vs. its ability to do so.

What is required by the law and can we possibly comply with it?

The law applies to handicapped children from birth to age 21.

Handicapped conditions are those which reduce a person's capacity for education or ultimate self support. They fall into the areas of physical, intellectual and emotional.

These categories are not necessarily distinct, they may overlap and blend into each other. Each child's 'special need' is somewhat different and often involves help from a number of supplemental personnel and special education teachers - requiring a team effort from 'multi-disciplines.'

The law places particular responsibility upon schools to protect the rights of pupils and parents through fair and regular evaluation of pupils, parent permission prior to any special change in placement or program and process by which decisions may be appealed.

All in all, these are heavy legal requirements added to our moral responsibility and, except for foresight, planning and steps already taken, we might be totally unready and inadequate to the task.

Two years ago, eight school superintendents, including myself, began meeting with Arthur Jillette, of the State Department of Education, Special Education Section. Recognizing the unmet needs of many handicapped children, and in anticipation of the new law, they concluded that the best way to attempt to meet the challenge was through a joint effort.

Seven superintendents, with a planning grant, formed a non-profit corp. called the Southeastern Regional Education Service Center (SERESC) of which they and seven school board members were the Board of Directors. It has been my privilege to have Mr. Hughin Holt as representative of Supervisory Union #15 - Raymond - serve as Chairman of SERESC's Board of Directors.

The top priority for this year would be to provide extended testing services to schools through referral to SERESC. Representatives of most of the member school districts met periodically during the year and the summer, to develop comprehensive processes for the referral, evaluation and placement of pupils which were in compliance with the complex federal laws and state guidelines.

At the present, staff members from the various SERESC areas who have responsibility for coordinating special education programs are meeting periodically to plan for the next phase of SERESC's operations beginning next September. An effort will be made to develop more and better special education programming within the many SERESC school districts. Many pupils who do not now have adequate special help will then receive it in their own or nearby school district. A number of children who are now attending special schools away from their homes will be brought back into new programs in the area.

Using Federal Funds channeled through the state and SERESC there will be a concerted effort to find pre-schoolers, who need service. If we are to maximize the opportunities for these children to lead the best and most productive lives possible we must intervene and get the best help to them at an early age.

In my opinion, the District of Auburn has taken significant stride in the solution of problems faced by the handicapped child and his parent.

REPORT OF THE AUBURN SCHOOL BOARD

The Auburn School Board recognizes as its overall objective the necessity for providing programs and materials, within proper budgetary limitations, that will adequately serve the great majority of school age children residing in the town. The Auburn Village School represents the only opportunity our young people will have to develop skills and competencies that they will carry with them when they seek continuing education at the high school level beyond the borders of our community.

Auburn itself has responded well in the past to the needs of its young people. Successful efforts have been made to meet real educational needs that go beyond the traditional classroom. The first evidences of such effort are found in the physical education program, and the reading and guidance programs. The former serves all students, the latter two serve that percentage of the student population that require special services or instruction if they are to enjoy the full benefits of the entire educational program.

The School Board fully endorses the concept of Auburn based educational programs for Auburn students. The Board, in fact, this year accepted the suggestion of the Superintendent of Schools and approved a limited Learning Disabilities program. The program, fully funded by the Federal Government, provides services of a certified learning disabilities specialist at the Auburn Village School two days each week. Her job is to prescribe the tasks that must be accomplished by students experiencing serious learning difficulties. The task programs for each child are carried out by competent Auburn residents working as aids in the Learning Disabilities program.

Meeting the needs of Auburn students is also the thrust of the recently implemented teacher recertification program mandated by the State of New Hampshire. Under this plan local districts, individually or jointly with neighboring districts, define the educational needs of local communities and students. Teachers are then required within specified time limits to improve upon their own teaching skills, through course work and other activities, within the framework of community needs. The Board voted in June to accept the Staff Development plan as drafted by a committee of parents, teachers, and school administrators from Candia, Auburn, and Hooksett.

The least visible activity of the School Board, and yet one of the Board's most important functions, is the reviewing, drafting,

and implementing of policies for the operation of the school and the regulation of other school district activities. During the year the Board implemented review of all existing policies and coordinated with the Superintendent's office a procedure whereby School Board policies would be reviewed on a continuing basis. Recent federal and state legislation in areas of nondiscrimination, family privacy, right to know, and negotiating rights of public employees, require careful scrutiny of all local policies to assure conformance and to avoid conflict with such statutes.

Perhaps the most important policy revision as far as the community itself is concerned, and one unrelated to outside influence, was the major changes in the policy governing Community Use of School Facilities. Under the direction of Joseph Phelan, Vice Chairman of the Board, several months of study, drafting, and re-drafting were required before the Board adopted a policy which has met with apparent favor of all community agencies and organizations which from time to time require the use of school facilities.

In consideration of the scope of educational programs and Board activities, the Board wishes to underscore its commitment to "proper budgetary limitations." We experience personal satisfaction, that we hope is shared by the townspeople, in reporting that in a time of unprecedented inflation, we were able to return \$38,501 to the town at the end of the fiscal year.

The School Board wishes to acknowledge with thanks the participation of Albert H. Burtt, Jr. in the 1974-75 Board deliberations and actions. We also wish to recognize and commend David Cawley, Superintendent of Schools, his assistant, Richard Thompson, and the entire Supervisory Union 15 staff, for valuable cooperation and advice. We recognize, too, the efforts of Bernard Cote and the entire Auburn Village School staff, in the implementing of and adherence to School Board Policy. And, finally, we welcome Dale Phillips as the newest member of the Board. We are confident that the School Board will enjoy continuing progress throughout 1975 and on into 1976.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I hereby submit my annual report for the school year 1974-1975 to the citizens of Auburn, the School Board, and the Superintendent of Schools.

The school population on September 3, 1974 was 379 and when school closed on June 16, 1975 it had risen to 395. Forty students registered for first grade at the pre-school registration held in April. However, past history tells us that late registrations and new arrivals in town will give us approximately the same number of first graders when September arrives.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were scheduled at the first and third marking periods for reporting student progress. The full staff was at school for two days from 3 until 5 P.M. and one day from 3 until 9 P.M. This format was quite successful and a majority of the parents visited school.

The athletic teams returned to the regular schedule after a year of intramurals. The boys' and the girls' basketball teams worked very hard and put up some mighty struggles in compiling a record that was below the 500 mark. The girls' softball team was the most successful as they lost only two games and finished in second place in their league. The boys' baseball team was very competitive but did not attain as many victories. Spirit trophies were awarded to Robin Dross and Steven Frisella for basketball and to Susan Joubert and Gregory Rolfe for softball and baseball. All of the students who participated in the school teams received Certificates of Participation. These certificates, as well as the trophies, were donated by Mr. & Mrs. Russell Phillips. The second annual Student-Faculty games were played with the students emerging victorious in the girls' game and being nosed out in the boys' game.

It was gratifying this year to see several residents volunteering their time and talents to help with the Junior High Mini-Courses. They are: Mrs. Dottie Emery, cake decorating; Mr. John Hasbrouck, small engine repair; Mr. Martin Laliberte and Mr. Dennis Laliberte, carpentry; Mrs. Muriel Vaillancourt, hairdressing and makeup; Mrs. Nancy Robar, arts and crafts; Mrs. Bobbie Frisella, cooking. Mrs. Jennifer Shone, Junior High Mathematics teacher, was instrumental in the planning stages as well as the weekly programming of activities. These courses provide a diversity of activities which are important for students in this age group. It is hoped that we may once again draw upon the resources of those in the community who can offer their skills for the enrichment of Auburn youngsters.

A Workshop of significance to first grade teachers and other personnel who deal with students in this age group was sponsored by the Supervisory Union during the Spring quarter. The primary purpose of these meetings was to acquaint teachers and administrators with some techniques for identifying those children who come to school needing some special activities and/or exercises in the areas of physical development. Studies have shown that psychomotor development and success in school are related and it is our goal to provide students with those activities which will enhance the possibility of their doing well in school.

Graduation exercises were held on Friday, June 13, 1975 when fifty-one students received diplomas. The Honor Speakers were Shawn Daggett, Timothy Dollard, and Pamela Shatford. Janice Griffin and Steven Frisella were presented with the Good Citizen Awards. Departmental Awards were presented to: Frederic Burt, English; Kathleen Martin, Mathematics; Jane Towne, Social Studies; and Daniel Miville, Science. Mr. Donn Parker, host of the WKBR Open Line Show, was the guest speaker. A "Well Done" to the parents who served on the Graduation Committee: Mrs. Alice Burt, Mrs. Lucy Daggett, Mrs. Bobbie Frisella, Mrs. Mary Griffin, Mrs. Gerry Joubert, Mrs. Dale Phillips, Mrs. Judy Riik, Mrs. Mary Ann Rolfe, and Mrs. Judy Rouleau. The help given by several others who helped in the food preparation was also much appreciated. Their hard work was evident in all aspects of the Graduation, most especially at the Buffet and Dance which they sponsored the night before the exercises. I hope that we may have revived a tradition.

Little is usually said in town reports about the value of teacher aides. I feel that we have some exceptional aides who deserve special recognition: Mrs. Cecile Doyon, Mrs. Jeanne Mason, Mrs. Bobbie Frisella, Mrs. Yvonne Gosselin, and Mrs. Peggy Hasbrouck. Peggy is funded through the Federal Manpower Program; Bobbie and Yvonne by a Title I Grant; Jeanne and Cecile are regular members of the staff. These five persons render services which are often above and beyond the remuneration which they receive. Their contributions to the children of Auburn are many and varied, ranging from playground supervision to assisting and/or directing cooking sessions. They are splendid examples of townspeople helping to educate the children of our community.

My singular thanks to Mrs. Millie Preston, School Secretary, for her dedication to the students, the school, and the office.

I would like to express my appreciation to the parents and other citizens of Auburn, the School Board, the Superintendent

and his staff, and the complete faculty and staff of the Auburn Village School. They are all important members of a team which works together towards a common goal – A quality education for Auburn students.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE-TEACHER

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board, School Principal and the citizens of Auburn.

Pre-school registration was held April 23 with 40 children registering.

Athletic physical examinations were given to 70 boys and girls in the 6, 7, and 8th grades, by Dr. Rebecca Cohen.

Pre-school physicals were given by Dr. Cohen to 18 children.

Three immunization clinics were held at the school by Dr. Cohen and 152 children from Auburn and surrounding towns attended.

Breakdown of immunizations follows: Polio 113, Measles and Rubella 8, DPT 18, Rubella 9, TB 23, Mumps 16, DT Booster 34.

Vision Tests were given to 406 children and 26 were found to have defective vision. Six received treatment.

Hearing tests were given to 418 students and 6 were found to have defective hearing. Two received treatment.

Heights and weights were checked and recorded on all students.

Room inspections were held in all classrooms after each vacation.

First Aid was administered to 436 students.

Home visits were made to 63 families.

Communicable Diseases Reported: Chicken Pox 8, Pediculosis 6, Impetigo 4, Mumps 2.

A Dental Clinic was sponsored by the PTA and Dental hygienist Cynthia Killian had 181 children receive cleaning and fluoride treatment.

The school nurse attended the following workshops: Diabetes Symposia in Concord; Cystic Fibrosis Clinic at the Manchester Health Center; Quality of Life to identify trends that deal with Health Maintenance at the Pembroke Center; Birth Defects—sponsored by the March of Dimes at Pembroke Center; Drug Plan as it relates to Education—2 workshops at Raymond and Pembroke. The School Nurse completed the Standard and Advanced Red Cross Courses.

In June of 1975 I received my BA Degree from New England College.

I want to thank the Principal and Teachers and Staff for their cooperation throughout the year. I thank the PTA for sponsoring the Dental Clinic—it was very beneficial to the children.

The Lions Club continues to be very helpful in paying for glasses and eye vision tests for those unable to do so. We all appreciate their help to the community.

I also thank the many volunteer workers who helped at the several clinics during the school year.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, Principal, School Board, and Citizens of Auburn

The following are some of the programs and procedures I was responsible for this past year:

Establishing a referral system where information would be received regarding students with learning difficulties who were generally unsuccessful within the classroom. This involved testing and observing the child so as to refer him/her to the appropriate Specialist and create a program that would be most beneficial. The results of testing and observation would be explained/interpreted to parents, teachers and student.

Coordinating all testing services: the Stanford Achievement Test, Otis Lennon Ability Test and Individualized Test and explaining results to parents.

Consulting with teachers and Principal.

Holding parent conferences

Making home visitations

Consulting and working with Learning Disability Specialist and Speech Teachers.

Consulting and working with local agencies and specialists who could provide services for those children with special needs.

Obtaining information for parents who could benefit from the services of local agencies and programs.

Attending staffings on those children who have been placed in special classes outside the Auburn Village School. A staffing entails my visiting the child's placement and talking with teachers and appropriate personnel so as to review the program that has been developed for this child.

Preparing parents and students in the transition from Auburn Village to a new placement outside the district for special services.

Meeting with students on an individual and group basis, allowing them the opportunity to work together and discuss in an open and informal way.

Visitation to Manchester Central High School with the Eighth Grade Class. Over a four day period a small number of students would spend a morning at Central, attending classes and being allowed to see and experience a high school's daily program. This provided me with the time to meet and discuss with administrators and faculty members the kinds of programs being offered to the students and in turn discuss with the Eighth Graders the most appropriate course selection needed for their freshman year.

Involvement in the South East Regional Education Service Center as a member of the diagnostic team. At the moment tentative proposals and criteria have been established that would provide supplemental services to local school districts, including Auburn.

Some of the following workshops were attended:

New Hampshire Early Recognition Conference (Ideas and methods for the early detection and response to young children -birth to eight- with special needs).

Sex equality in Guidance opportunity.

Strategies in Early Childhood Education.

Counseling Conference: "Integrating Techniques, Issues and Settings". University of N. H.

REPORT OF THE READING SPECIALIST

To the Citizens of Auburn:

The Auburn Village School reading program is designed to motivate students to want to read for pleasure as well as for knowledge.

Each class has a daily ninety minute time period set aside for reading and language arts. This more than meets the time requirement for reading instruction recommended by the International Reading Association. In addition to this ninety minutes there is time each day available in the primary and intermediate grades for "free-reading" and time for teachers to read aloud to the students. Pupils who need further help with their reading skills have additional time to work on individualized programs designed to meet their specific needs.

Our reading program uses two basals, Harper and Row, and Scott Foresman. To supplement these basals, the Alpha series and the Lyons and Carnahan phonics program are also integrated into the reading program. Learning Activity Packages are prepared and utilized by many teachers to help individualize reading instruction. The use of a basal series, plus a supplementary phonics program and individualized instruction provides the student with a well-rounded reading program.

The reading specialist has worked this past year with forty-five students for a period of ninety minutes each day. This program proved successful with nearly all students achieving a years growth or more in reading skills. Not only was there significant progress in reading, but many of these students developed a love for reading.

Scores on the Stanford Achievement Tests were significantly better for the school as a whole than the national norms for schools in our same classification. (geographical and socio-economic similarities.)

This summer the majority of our teaching staff are taking graduate course work in the area of reading instruction. During the school year many teachers attended workshops in this area as well. The first grade teachers along with the specialists attended a two day workshop in early childhood education which helped the staff focus on the diagnosis of early reading problems and remedial instruction.

Reading problems are usually pluralistic in nature, and our success in correcting reading failure has been the result of the close working together of the classroom teacher with the Guidance person, Learning Disability Specialist, Speech Specialist, the Nurse, the Principal, and the Reading Specialist.

At this time I would like to thank the Principal, Bernard T. Cote, for the support and assistance he has provided to the reading program.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Auburn School District for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and the School Lunch Program.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits 1 and 15)

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the financial condition of the general fund as of June 30, 1972 and June 30, 1973, are presented in Exhibit 1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the District increased by \$61, from \$43,133 to \$43,194, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973.

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the financial condition of the general fund as of June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974, are presented in Exhibit 15. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the District decreased by \$23,289, from \$43,194 to \$19,905, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibits 2 and 16)

An analysis of change in current financial condition of the School District for the years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 is made in Exhibits 2 and 16, with the factors which caused the changes indicated therein.

The factors which caused the net increase in surplus in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 were as follows:

The factors which caused the net decrease in surplus in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974 were as follows:

Increase in Current Surplus:

Net Budget Surplus 19,538

Net Decrease in Current Surplus \$23,289

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures –

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits 3, 4, 17 and 18)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 are presented in Exhibits 3 and 4; similar statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 17 and 18.

As indicated by the Budget Summaries (Exhibits 4 and 18) a net revenue surplus of \$2,962, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,739, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$223 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973; a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$19,669, less a revenue deficit of \$131, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$19,538 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974.

Capital Projects Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits 5 and 19)

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the financial condition of the Capital Projects Fund as of June 30, 1972 and June 30, 1973, are contained in Exhibit 5. Similar information as of June 30, 1974 is contained in Exhibit 19.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits 6 and 20)

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the District as of June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are contained in Exhibits 6 and 20. The bonded debt of the District decreased by \$30,000 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973, from \$350,000 to \$340,000. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974 the bonded debt again decreased by \$30,000, from \$340,000 to \$310,000.

Statements of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibits 7 and 21)

Statements showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest on bonded indebtedness as of June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 7 and 21.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statements of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibits 8 and 22)

Summary statements of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, are presented in Exhibits 8 and 22.

Capital Projects Fund:

Statements of Treasurer's Accounts: (Exhibits 10, 11, 24 and 25)

Statements showing the activity in the Building Fund Accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 are presented in Exhibits 10 and 11. Similar statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 24 and 25.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Statements of Account: (Exhibits 13 and 27)

Statements of the activity in the School Lunch Program accounts for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 13 and 27.

SCHOOL TAX ACCOUNT

Statements of School Tax Account: (Exhibits 14 and 28)

Exhibit 14 presents a statement of the 1972-73 School Tax Account with the Town of Auburn. As indicated therein, the total amount (\$426,149) due the School District for the 1972-73 school year, plus a balance of \$12,000 due from the previous school year was paid by the Town of Auburn as of June 30, 1973.

As indicated in Exhibit 28, the total amount (\$442,406) due the School District for the 1973-74 school year was paid by the Town of Auburn as of June 30, 1974.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of the Municipal Budget Law:

As indicated in Exhibit 3, there was a net overdraft of appropriations in the amount of \$2,739 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973; i.e., total expenditures exceeded total budgeted appropriations by this amount, as shown in the following tabulation:

Overdrafts of Appropriations	\$17,067

In cases of this sort the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R.S.A. 32:10-a) require that the School Board, with the written approval of a majority of the Budget Committee, shall petition the State Board of Education for a certificate of emergency which would authorize the expenditures made in excess of budgetary appropriations.

There is no record of any such petition having been filed with the Board of Education.

Consequently, it must be stated that the aforementioned overdraft of appropriations of \$2,739 resulted in a violation of the Municipal Budget Law under which statute the Auburn School District operates.

The purpose of the Municipal Budget Law is to control the appropriation and expenditure of money in municipalities which adopt its provisions. When these are disregarded, the law becomes ineffectual.

Unexpended Bond Proceeds and Application of the Municipal Finance Act:

As indicated in Exhibits 5 and 19, there are unexpended balances in the school building fund accounts. The balances in these accounts as of June 30, 1974 are as follows:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33, Section 3-a, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, if a balance remains after completion of the project or projects for which the debt was authorized, a school district may authorize the expenditure of such funds, including any premiums received, for any purpose for which bonds or long-term notes may be issued for an equal or longer period of time. If the remaining sum is not so appropriated, then the same must be used to pay the principal as it matures.

It is recommended that the sums remaining in the school building funds be disposed of according to the foregoing provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, require that the auditor's summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

As you requested, I will try to answer the question concerning the figure deficit of \$2,200.00 in the Auburn School Budget for the 1972-1973 year.

After repeated efforts by the superintendent and the school board, the Auburn selectmen finally paid to the school district the sum of \$12,000 which was due to the district for the 1969-1970 school budget. As a result, the district treasurer's balance was unusually large and obscured the fact that the actual appropriations for the school year had been overspent. This was not discovered until after the reports had been finalized.

As it stands, all expenditures for the 1972-1973 school year were paid and funds were returned to the school district to be applied to the 1973-1974 school budget.

The deficit of \$2,200.00 is actually a figure of record, and as I understand the procedure it will not cause a tax burden to the Town of Auburn.

CHAPTER 21.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE SALE OF SUBDIVIDED LAND.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

21:1 Subdivision of Land. Amend RSA 36:27 (supp) as amended by 1963, 163:3 and 1969, 185:1 by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following: **36:27 Penalties for Transferring Lots in Unapproved Subdivisions.** Any owner, or agent of the owner, of any land located within a subdivision in a municipality that has adopted subdivision regulations, who transfers or sells any land before a plat of the said subdivision has been approved by the planning board and recorded or filed in the office of the appropriate register of deeds shall forfeit and pay a penalty of five hundred dollars for each lot or parcel so transferred or sold; and the description by metes and bounds in the instrument of transfer or other document used in the process of selling or transferring shall not exempt the transaction from such penalties. Said municipality may enjoin such transfer or sale and may recover said penalty by civil action. In any such action the prevailing party may recover reasonable court costs and attorneys fees as same may be ordered by the court.

21:2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect sixty days after its passage.

[Effective date July 3, 1970.]

The New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission hereby gives notice that Governor Peterson has signed Senate Bill 233 which broadens the jurisdiction of the Commission under Chapter 149-E, Revised Statutes Annotated relating to sewage disposal systems and subdivision of land.

Effective July 1, 1971 all land being subdivided for the purpose of sale, rent, lease, building construction or any other purpose must have prior approval of the Commission.

No building from which waste will be discharged and no waste disposal system can be constructed in the state without prior approval of the plans of the waste disposal system by the Commission.

Previously the law applied only to land located within 1000 feet of any surface water. The amended law now covers the entire state.

Lots in previously laid out subdivisions which are still owned by the developer must be approved by the Commission before they can be sold.

No plans of subdivisions or individual lots need be submitted when municipal sewerage is available, however, plans for extensions of sewerage systems must be submitted by the municipality and approved by the Commission.

To Whom It May Concern:

Misunderstandings have developed regarding the requirements of the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in case (a) where the sale or other conveyance of property involves merely an exchange of land among two or more owners which does not increase the number of owners and on which no sewage disposal system is to be constructed; and case (b) where an individual intends to divide his land and there is no intent to undertake any building construction involving sewage disposal.

Please be advised (despite any contrary advice you may have received) that the only requirements are as follows:

Case (a) - No requirement to submit any information to the Commission.

Case (b) - Where no construction is contemplated within two (2) years and the lot size of the subdivided portion is in excess of five (5) acres, only a plan showing how the property is being divided, drawn to scale (lot lines and property boundaries), and information regarding the nature of the soil in the area is required. The required soil data are available from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service which maintains an office in each county.

Where the subdivided portion is less than five (5) acres in size, additional information may be required, and persons should contact the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission at 105 Loudon Road, Concord, regarding that information.
