


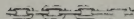

## TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chester, New Hampshire, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Stevens Hall, in said Chester, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To elect a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 4, Chapter 35. of the laws of 1905 and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will comply with the State in State Aid and Trunk-line maintenance.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,030.50 for State Aid Construction with the same amount given by the State.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase books and defray running expenses of the Public Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the decoration of the Soldier's Graves.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lights.

11. To see what the Town will do toward the suppression of pine blister rust.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Trustees of the Wilcomb-Townsend Home to sell the woodland and other lands of the Gov. Bell place not necessary for the proper conduct of the Home, the money received therefrom to be turned into the Trust Funds.

13. To see what the Town will do in relation to finishing the repairs and furnishing the Wilcomb-Townsend Home. And appropriate from the trust funds such sums of money as may be necessary therefore. Trustees, Martin Mills, Eleanor J. Locke Arthur H. Wilcomb, Farish G. Lewis, One vacancy caused by the death of Sarah P. Webster.

14. To see if the Town will vote to fix the hill beyond the Noah Week's place (so called) and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

15. To see what the Town will do in regard to purchasing a Tractor, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

16. To see if the Town will vote to close the following roads. The road leading from Haverhill road (so-called) to Albert Warrens. The road leading from the big hill to Charles H. Smiths. The road leading from Elijah Sanborn corner to the Daniel Sanborn corner.

## THE WILCOMB-TOWNSEND HOME.

To the Citizens of Chester;

Pursuant to the vote of the town, the Governor Bell place was purchased of Mrs. Luzetta S. Emerson. The purchase price being nine thousand dollars; which included considerable personal property donated by Mr. and Mrs. Emerson for which we express our sincere thanks and appreciation.

We have begun the necessary repairs and improvements, such as new heating and lighting apparatus, a bath room on the first floor and the remodeling the rooms necessary for the proper care and comfort of the aged and helpless. When completed these improvements will cost approximately four thousand dollars, three thousand of which was voted by the town from the fund of Mrs. Mary J. Wilcomb and Mrs. Lydia A. Newell, bequeathed to the town for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a home.

We have received a generous unrestricted gift of one thousand dollars from Hon. Amos Tuck French, part of this money will be used for repairs, the balance will be used to furnish a room which we propose to name in honor of the donor, others have expressed a desire to assist in furnishing the home by gifts of furniture and money. the trustees will appreciate and gladly accept such gifts.

Applications have already been received from those who desire to enter the home and it is the intention of your trustees to finish the repairs and furnish the home so it can be opened on a small scale this fall. It is the intention of the trustees to conduct the affairs of the home so it will be, as nearly as possible. self supporting.

We recommend the disposal of the outlying lands of the Emerson place, not necessary for the proper

conduct of the home, also the Townsend estate (provided the consent of the donor can be obtained) the proceeds therefrom to be added to the trust funds for the maintainance or future developments of the home.

We have suffered a severe loss by death of Miss Sarah P. Webster. A talented woman of sound common sense and a loyal friend to the best interests of the home and her native town. She was emphatic in the idea that the home should be started before the generation who knew the donors, passed on. Much that has thus far been accomplished has in a great measure been due to her wise counsel.

Since my services in Chester began with the present school year the report for the year completed in June, 1929, is of necessity statistical. However, I wish to deal briefly with the present organization and instruction, buildings and equipment, and health activities.

The cost per pupil in the elementary schools of Chester for the year 1928-1929 was \$65.74 compared with \$83.35 the median cost per pupil in the state. Of the 244 New Hampshire school districts arranged in the ascending order of cost, per thousand of equalized valuation for all school purposes, Chester stood 47th.

## ORGANIZATION AND INSTRUCTION

You are fortunate in the retention of the present corps of teachers, all of whom are normal school graduates and have had one or more years of successful experience in teaching. The frequent change of teachers in the smaller school systems is of advantage chiefly to the larger villages and cities. Many of the larger systems employ only experienced teachers and thus profit by the year or two years of additional training gained with our country boys and girls. It is evident, if the city pupils need teachers of exper-

ence as well as training, that experienced teachers are in some measure an asset in the educational progress of our country's children.

It is worthy of note that in the skill and achievement tests in arithmetic and language, given by the superintendent this year to 225 pupils in the four upper grades in the five towns of this Union, the schools in Chester attained the highest averages.

### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Like many other towns in our state, Chester faces the problem of several school houses now unused and yet in need of considerable outlay to keep the roofs shingled and outside walls painted. The ladies of North Chester have solved the problem in their neighborhood by obtaining permission to use the schoolhouse for a community club room. In return the club keeps the building in good repair. It would seem a matter of good business to make some disposal of the other unused school buildings in town.

Before another year the stove at the Towle school should be equipped with a sheet-iron jacket, and a system of indirect ventilation installed in the room. The latter may be provided by a fresh-air inlet flue to the stove jacket and a foul-air exit flue located at the base of the chimney. A new teacher's desk with ample space for keeping records and materials and for filing the completed work of the pupils should be purchased for the same school.

### HEALTH ACTIVITIES

Chester and the other four towns of this Union are fortunate to retain the services of Margaret E. Cronin, R. N., for the entire period of the present school year. Her report for the six months ending June 30, 1929, follows.

In addition to the visits to schools, recorded in the Table of Statistics for 1928-1929, there should be added twenty-three visits to pupils' homes, which constitute a particularly effective feature of the nurses' work in securing corrective treatments.

More and more throughout our state and nation is health supervision by skilled doctors and trained nurses being recognized as one of the most important factors in development for citizenship. Correct

dental and throat conditions are of major importance in the child's prospect of physical health and mental efficiency.

IN CONCLUSION.

I wish to commend the efficient service being rendered by your teachers and nurse, and to bespeak for them the hearty cooperation of your Board and community.

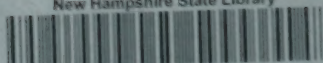
