Nothing of unusual importance has occurred during the year.

The School work has gone forward steadily and faithfully under the immediate supervision of Mr. Roberts, and with the hearty co-operation of all the teachers.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

For the Year Ending June 30, 1922.

---

## *To the School Board and Citizens:*

I herewith submit my tenth annual report of the schools of Pembroke.

There were maintained during the year nine schools for a school-year of 36 weeks. The State Program of Study was well carried out.

It is the earnest desire of every patriotic citizen, and the duty of the school board and superintendent to see, that every school in Pembroke shall be a good school, furnishing an opportunity to each boy and girl of obtaining good and wholesome education.

That this result may be accomplished, the following requirements must be maintained:

(a) Each school must be taught (not kept) by a thoroughly trained, efficient, happy and well-paid teacher.

(b) The school plant must be sanitary, healthful and pleasant; with adequate toilet facilities; with comfortable heating and ventilating arrangements; with desks and seats adjusted to the children for comfort and health, and with ample text books and supplies.

(c) Parents and citizens must be actively interested and willing to co-operate with the teacher in her work. Unfriendly criticism of a teacher in the presence of a pupil is an obstacle in the advancement of the pupil.

## HEALTH.

A careful examination of the pupils was made during the year by Health Inspector, Dr. Edmund Hill.

The work of Doctor Hill was carefully followed up by the school nurse, Miss Clara Benoit.

Miss Benoit worked earnestly and faithfully, and under her direction many of the children received benefits that they would not otherwise have had.

The results of her skilfull service justify the employment of a school nurse.

In conclusion, I express my appreciation for your hearty co-operation and assistance.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

*"Music begins where words end."*

It has been my duty during the past four years, to lead the pupils of the public schools along some of the pleasant paths that music points out, and they have been willing followers.

Music appeals to all classes of people, and in every phase of daily life, plays a larger part than all other arts and forms of recreation combined. If this statement be true, the efforts made and time spent have not been wasted.

As usual our regular course has been followed, supplemented by ear and eye training, sight reading, a music memory contest and a course in appreciation. We have added some fine records to our collection.

I take great pride in the rural schools and consider them a very important and interesting part of my work. I should like to see a keyboard instrument of some kind in each rural school room, and as the children have so little opportunity to acquire musical experience from outside, a talking machine seems indispensable.

Both rural and graded schools have prepared interesting programs for special occasions. The Suncook grammar school gave a recital; the first and second grades presented the cantata "A Box of Dolls."

Great credit is due the graduating class for the manner in which they presented the pageant "The Shut-up Posey" at their graduation, held in Legion Hall. This form of program was an innovation and was of particular interest because of the evidences of latent talent it brought forth.

We thank the friends of the school who have attended our entertainments, the superintendent for his hearty cooperation and the teachers who have made the music lessons so vital a part of the daily program.
