

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highway improvement, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to install a telephone in the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to buy linoleum for the Town Hall kitchen, raise and appropriate money for same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid and build a new bridge on Winnicutt Road, raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to build an exit on the North West side of the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. On petition of Dennis O'Connell and 17 others to see if the town will vote to oil Bunker Hill Ave. so called, and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money to repair and repaint the pavillon and waiting station at Stratham Hill Park or pass any other vote relating to the Park.
- 10. To see what vote the town will take for the purchase of snow removal equipment, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



### To the Board of Stratham, N. H.:

It gives me pleasure to submit my annual report as superintendent of the Stratham schools, the eleventh in the series.

The statistical tables appended to this report are constructed for the purpose of giving concise information in an understandable form on a variety of subjects of interest to parents of school children and to taxpayers.

Table II deals with the enrollment statistics of individual schools and Table I gives a survey of the statistics not only for last year but for the last ten years. It is of interest to note that the percenage of attendance, and the average membership of the schools remained at a creditable level and that the number of cases of tardiness was small last year. Our total enrollment has remained at about the same figure for a number of years, though undoubtedly it will drop this year. We have an enrollment now of only 51. Last year at this time the figure was 62. Our present enrollment is distributed as follows:

Winnicutt School	17
Stratham Hill School	14
Ridge School	14
Plains School	6

From all available information it seems that those who will leave at the end of this year are more than those who will enter.

Parents look to school officers for effective results in school work and expect the maximum return on money paid for ma ntenance of schools. While our schools continue to be as small as they are now and are housed and graded as at present we cannot secure this maximum effectiveness or just return of money for taxpayers. Our schools would be much more effective if they were larger and made up of fewer grades. Certainly the cost of the present plan cannot be justified.

Table VI shows that in the matter of attendance Stratham has a commanding position among the districts of this Union. The record of the Ridge School in this matter last year was remarkable; the parents, pupils and teacher who made it possible deserve high commendation. Table III tells us that almost three-fifths of all the pupils in town had their names on the honor roll for one or more terms. Stratham boys to the number of 19 are enrolled this year at the Exeter High School and Stratham girls to the number of 13 are enrolled in Robinson Seminary. It is expected that 7 pupils will enter the Exeter schools next fall and that 3 will be graduated at the end of this year.

We are fortunate in having the services of teachers thoroughly devoted to their work and who approach it with a commendable professional spirit. It is their aim to deal with the individual needs of their pupils and to this end they do much individual work. Their plans are well made, their teaching is skillful, they have pride in their work and they are good citizens of the community.

At the end of last year achievement tests similar to those given in other years and to those given extensively throughout this and many other states showed that our children were progressing satisfactorily. During the past year we have made considerable use of new kinds of standardized drill material in arithmetic, English and reading. Research workers in education are gradually determining with accuracy those parts of the subjects of our course of study which are most difficult for all pupils. On the basis of this information we can adjust drill in a much more satisfactory way than was possible some years ago.

For the first time the health inspection was made this year, by a registered nurse instead of a physician. Mrs. Dolbec was thorough in her inspection and painstaking in her followup work in the homes. Of course, we fail to get the full benefit of health supervision if defects are not corrected. It is our hope that this service in our schools will carry over into every home where children need medical attention.

Your provision of new desks for two of the school houses

this year has been of great worth. I wish every parent could visit the schools where they are installed and see them in use. I recommended last year that ventilating stoves be installed as fast as money could be provided. The need for this type of heating apparatus at least in the Stratham Hill School, is more urgent than ever. It is impossible in cold weather to heat this school room adequately with a box stove. We continually run great risk of sickness and the pupils are subjected to continuous discomfort.

You were unexpectedly faced in the summer with the problem of providing new shingles for the Ridge and Winnicutt Schools. All persons interested in the schools should know of the urgent need of this work and of your success in meeting it.

I acknowledge with thanks the generous cooperation of teachers, School Board and parents in the common task of securing the best possible education for our children.
