TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defrav town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Namely: town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration expenses, expenses of town hall and other buildings, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, auto and dog fees, town maintenance of highways and bridges, street lighting, general expenses of highway department, town road aid, libraries, town poor, old age assistance, Memorial Day and other celebrations, aid to soldiers and their families, parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, Monadnock Region, interest on temporary loans, on long term notes, on principal of trust funds used by town, payment on notes in anticipation of taxes, serial and long term notes, county taxes.

3. To hear the reports of town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept State T. R. A. for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$807.82 and the State will contribute \$5,385.46.

5. To see if the town will vote to close permanently,

the section of road leading from Mrs. W. A. Griffen's to the Bill's place or take any vote relative thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to close the cross road, (subject to gates and bars) leading from Draper's to the Forrest Road so called, and expend the T. R. A. money from Town and State on the road leading from South Lyndeborough by Hatt's to Foote's, or take any vote relating thereto. (By petition)

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to repair the Hadley Mill Road Bridge or take any vote relative thereto.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to re-tar black top roads or take any vote relative thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purchase of a used grader or take any vote relative thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for continuing the work on the new section of the South Cemetery or take any vote relative thereto.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to pay off the Israel Cram Cemetery Fund Note or take any vote relative thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purchase of a new portable fire pump for the fire department or take any vote relative thereto.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 65.00 (1/100 of 1% of the valuation) to the Monadnock Region of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town,

in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region or take any vote relative thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust or take any vote relative thereto.

15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow not more than \$12,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time of taking inventory April Ist.

17. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee, or make any alterations thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in re-appraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call "I don't care"; he is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called "I don't know any better," and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountain streams clear, your cooperation is needed by:

1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.

2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.

3. Never burn in dry, windy weather.

4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.

5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe ashes are out before discarding.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

SCHOOL WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Lyndeboro, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1952, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of providing a music supervisor for our public school, or take any action thereto.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of providing annual physical examinations for our pupils by a competent physician or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for the purpose of installing a telephone in the public school or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6.00 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.

12. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

13. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeborough:

I respectfully submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Instruction:

Your teachers, Mrs. Adelaide Herrick and Mrs. Alice Smith are continuing to maintain high standards of instruction in your school. Methods of instruction are being kept up to date with emphasis being placed upon the individual learning abilities of each child.

The Guidance Program initiated last year, provides each child with a folder in which a record of his achievement test results, difficulties, etc., are kept. These records reveal the mental and physical growth of each child and direct the teaching activities in the path which will be most profitable to the child.

A complete testing program is given to all pupils in grades one through six. In grade one each child receives a Metropolitan Reading Readiness Test which measures the maturity of the individual and reveals to the teacher the probable groupings necessary to carry on efficient instruction. They also are given the S. R. A. Primary Mental Abilities Test which indicates the innate ability of the child to succeed in school work. These tests are given also to grades three and six. All grades are given a Metropolitan Achievement Test in May. An analysis of the results of these tests reveals to the teachers the strengths and weaknesses of individuals and also of the educational program. Throughout the year standardized tests in reading are given as the pupils complete various phases of the reading program. Of particular importance are the Weekly Reader Tests given in October, Januarv, and May. These measure the growth in reading ability in these periods. All results are recorded on a Cumulative Record Card which accompanies the pupil as he moves from grade to grade.

We are continuing the use of audio-visual aids to stimulate learning. In addition to the sound-film projector that was obtained through the cooperative efforts of local organizations, parents, teachers and children, we have procured a film-strip projector and one film-strip library. Children are shown graphically how various principles and processes grow out of the needs of daily life. Their attention is captivated and their understanding ensured by experiences drawn from familiar situations.

All teachers in Supervisory Union No. 63 attended a two-day Workship in Wilton, New Hampshire. The theme of the Workshop was "Improving the Techniques of Teaching with Audio-Visual Aids." These aids train the child to learn by seeing, listening, speaking and doing. Experience has shown that they are an invaluable aid to the child who has a reading difficulty.

Some consideration should be given to provide our children with a more adequate music program. This would necessitate employing a Music supervisor. The estimated cost for this service is approximately \$250. Our school children are the only ones in the Supervisory Union who do not have the benefit of such instruction. This shows up especially when our children move on to other schools and compete with those who have had the benefit of such instruction.

Health Supervision:

Details of the health program are revealed in the Report of the School Nurse. Each child receives each year, a vision test and an auditory test. No physical examinations are given. Lyndeborough is the only school in Supervisory Union No. 63 which does not provide this service. Article 9 calls your attention to this service.

Certain communicable diseases are difficult to control once they get started. Every effort is made to obtain professional advice to guide the actions of the school officials.

School Lunch Program:

Mrs. Harry Holt, assisted by Mrs. William Shinn, continues to operate an excellent school lunch program. It has been especially difficult this year to finance our program on a "pay-as-you-go" basis since the Federal Reimbursement has been reduced from 9c to 6c and surplus government foods have been decidedly curtailed. However, due to efficient management and splendid material help from the many friends of the school, we have been able to finance a Class "A" Lunch Program.

Transportation:

The school transportation routes are operated by Mr. Guy Draper and Mr. Arthur Lord. Mr. Draper operates the town and Wilton routes and Mr. Lord transports the North Lyndeborough pupils to Francestown.

A problem is developing relative to the town route. As our tuition pupils increase in Grades 7 and 8, it is becoming apparent that there may come a day when there will not be room enough on the school bus to permit those in grades 9 through 12 to ride. Thus, it will be necessary for them to obtain their own transportation to high school. However, this action will not be taken until every facet of the problem is studied.

No School Policy:

The "No School" policy as set forth by the Lyndeborough School Board is as follows. If the weather and road conditions are such that it is dangerous or impossible for the school bus to operate, the school will be closed. Every effort will be made by the School Board to contact the parents in the outlying areas and along the bus route by telephone. Also arrangements have been made with the radio station WOTW in Nashua to broadcast the "No School" message. This information is usually available to the School Board between 7:00 and 7:15 a. m. On stormy days, parents are encouraged to use their own judgment and keep their children home if they feel that it is in the best interests of health and safety to do so.

Improvements to Building and Grounds:

Additional blackboard and bulletin board space has been added to the primary room. Similar additions are contemplated for the upper grades room this summer.

A hard top walk, cement or asphalt, is planned for the front of the building, with additional grading and seeding in this area. A sum has been reserved from the original fund for this purpose.

Finance:

The School Board's Budget for 1952-53 calls for an appropriation of \$23,064.46, an increase of \$1616.62 more than last year. This increase is due largely to a greater number of tuition pupils involving \$1265. The remainder is spread out over teachers' salaries, transportation and other expenses of operation.

Tuition costs for the year 1952-53, will be as follows: Milford High School \$225., Junior High \$200.; Wilton High School \$225., Junior High \$125. This latter figure is subject to change since it has not yet been set by the Wilton School Board.

Conclusion:

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to the Lyndeborough School Board, parents and friends of the school who have given me and the teachers so much assistance in our endeavors to provide our children with a progressive educational program.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

I made ten visits to the Lyndeborough Public School during 1951. I examined the children for evidence of communicable disease and found measles, chicken pox, sore throats, colds and pediculosis. Poison ivy was also evident on three children.

The teeth of ten pupils have need of dental attention, four children have need of treatment of diseased tonsils and two children have speech defects.

Cleanliness of body as a disease preventative was stressed throughout the year. There is a gratifying improvement in the general appearance of the group.

I weighed and measured the pupils twice during the year and most showed a satisfactory gain in both height and weight.

The Well Baby Pre-school Clinic in April gave an opportunity for the school children to receive Booster Shots.

Due to personal illness in March it was not possible to accomplish all that I hoped in testing the hearing and vision of the group. I am striving to accomplish this as soon as possible.

Arrangements were made for one boy to obtain glasses through the Sight Conservation Program, and plans are under way to obtain aid for a deafened older child.
