TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall, in said Pembroke on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-six hundred dollars for trunk line maintenance of highways as required by the State Highway Department.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet band for a series of free band concerts.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to oil streets in Suncook village.

8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the running expenses of Pembroke library.

9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars to help in the care and upkeep of Pembroke Park for the ensuing year.

10. (By petition). To see if the town will adopt the Australian ballot to be used at annual elections in March.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars to renew the sewer on Pleasant street and for the extension of the sewer on Pembroke street.

12. To hear the report of the committee heretofore chosen, "to give amount, draw up plans for the purpose of erecting a new building for the town purposes, and report at the next town meeting," and to see if the town will vote to erect such building, and if so, what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate, or borrow, therefor.

13. To see if the town will recommend the selectmen to take such action as necessary to aid in establishing free mail delivery in the Suncook Post Office district.

14. To see if the town will vote to confirm the action of its Trustees of Trust Funds in accepting the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of designated burial lots:

(1) Gift of one hundred fifty dollars from the grandchildren of Edwin Dearborn for the Edwin Dearborn lot in Pembroke Street cemetery.

(2) Bequest of one hundred fifty dollars from the estate of George W. Sargent for his lot in Evergreen cemetery.

15. (By petition). To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars to purchase part of the equipment of a public playground, which is to be established at the Pembroke Grammar School grounds by the Lions clubs of Suncook.

16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home week.

17. To hear the reports of auditors, agents, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

As per your vote at the last school meeting, we have had the school house in the Borough district shingled and painted on the outside. This should preserve the building for a long time, unless it is required again for school purposes.

Also, according to the vote of the school meeting, the school house on Pembroke street has been greatly improved with the addition of new windows and flush toilets to meet the requirements of the State Board of Health. We believe we have a model one-room school building and invite your inspection.

For several years it has been the custom to have a school year of 36 weeks and to grant only a few of the principal holidays, in order that we might have a maximum number of school sessions.

This year we are to maintain 37 weeks and allow all holidays. We hope this will meet with your approval.

Owing to the small number of pupils in the North Pembroke district, and after conferring with the parents, it was decided to transport these pupils to the Suncook Grammar school. Mr. Ernest Hartford was engaged for this work and has carried the children in a large closed car.

We believe his services have been very satisfactory to all concerned.

This transporting of the children from a section of the district to the Village school is somewhat of an experiment and has its advantages and disadvantages, but your school board believes it will all prove to be for the best interest of the child under such circumstances.

We believe our Schools compare very favorably with other schools in like communities.

Our teachers are conscientious, hard working instructors, and like Superintendent Roberts and your school board. Their great ambition is for the good of the boys and girls who are to take up our burdens as we lay them down.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my seventeenth annual report of the schools of Pembroke for the year ending June 30, 1929.

There were maintained during the year ten schools, for a school-year of 36 weeks with one change in the teaching force. Miss Scott resigned owing to ill health and Mary Laurie was elected as teacher.

The school enrollment was 237, (115 boys and 122 girls), with a daily average attendance of 94.99 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average of 352.8 half-days.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Of the ten teachers employed, all are graduates of high school, six are graduates of a normal school, two are graduates of Dewey Training school and two have attended summer institutes for teachers.

The teacher arrives at the school in the morning in time to have the schoolhouse doors opened fifteen minutes before the scheduled time for opening the school.

The activities of the pupils during noon and recess periods are supervised by the teachers, who have learned that a well-supervised playground not only makes discipline pleasanter, but aids in the improvements of scholarship and in character-building.

The teachers have done their work faithfully and efficiently.

The school board is annually improving the sanitary condition of the school buildings and is providing ample scholar supplies and text books.

The health of the child, in a large measure, determines

his regularity of attendance, his behavior, his ability to perform successfully, his work, and his chance of becoming an efficient citizen. Supervision and instruction in matters of health should have an important place in the school organization.

The health work in our schools aims to develop the good health and happiness of the pupil and the well-being of the community.

Good work is being done by our school nurse, who is working faithfully and efficiently in checking epidemics and in correcting deformities and maladies.

The teachers are teaching the benefits of good health-habits and physical exercise for the well-being of the pupil and the home, with special emphasis upon the prevention of accidents and disease.

Drill in the fundamentals of arithmetic, and examinations by standardized tests, were given during the year and showed a marked improvement over previous years.

ATTENDANCE

The problem of school attendance is one of the most important problems in school management. Regularity of attendance is absolutely necessary in order that the school may perform its special work of training children for the duties of citizenship.

Non-attendance causes economic loss to the taxpayer; it causes a very large per cent of the failures of promotion; it retards the work of the entire class, and to a less extent, the work of the whole school.

Parents who desire their children to be promoted should see that their attendance at school is regular.

I am glad to report that the cases of truancy in our schools are growing less.

The changing social and economic conditions of modern life are seriously affecting rural life. What to do with small rural schools, in order that they may meet the new

conditions in American life, is more perplexing than what to do with urban schools. Whether to merge the one-room rural school with other schools in the community and thus establish a consolidated school, or whether to retain the one-room school and improve the sanitary and hygienic condition of the buildings, build up the teaching force by paying a sufficiently large salary to retain the teachers, are problems that should receive serious consideration.

Investigations made of the rural schools throughout the country lead to the belief that the interests of the children are best served in the larger schools.

Parents and citizens are invited to visit the schools frequently.

In conclusion, I express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance given to me by the teachers, the school board, and the citizens.

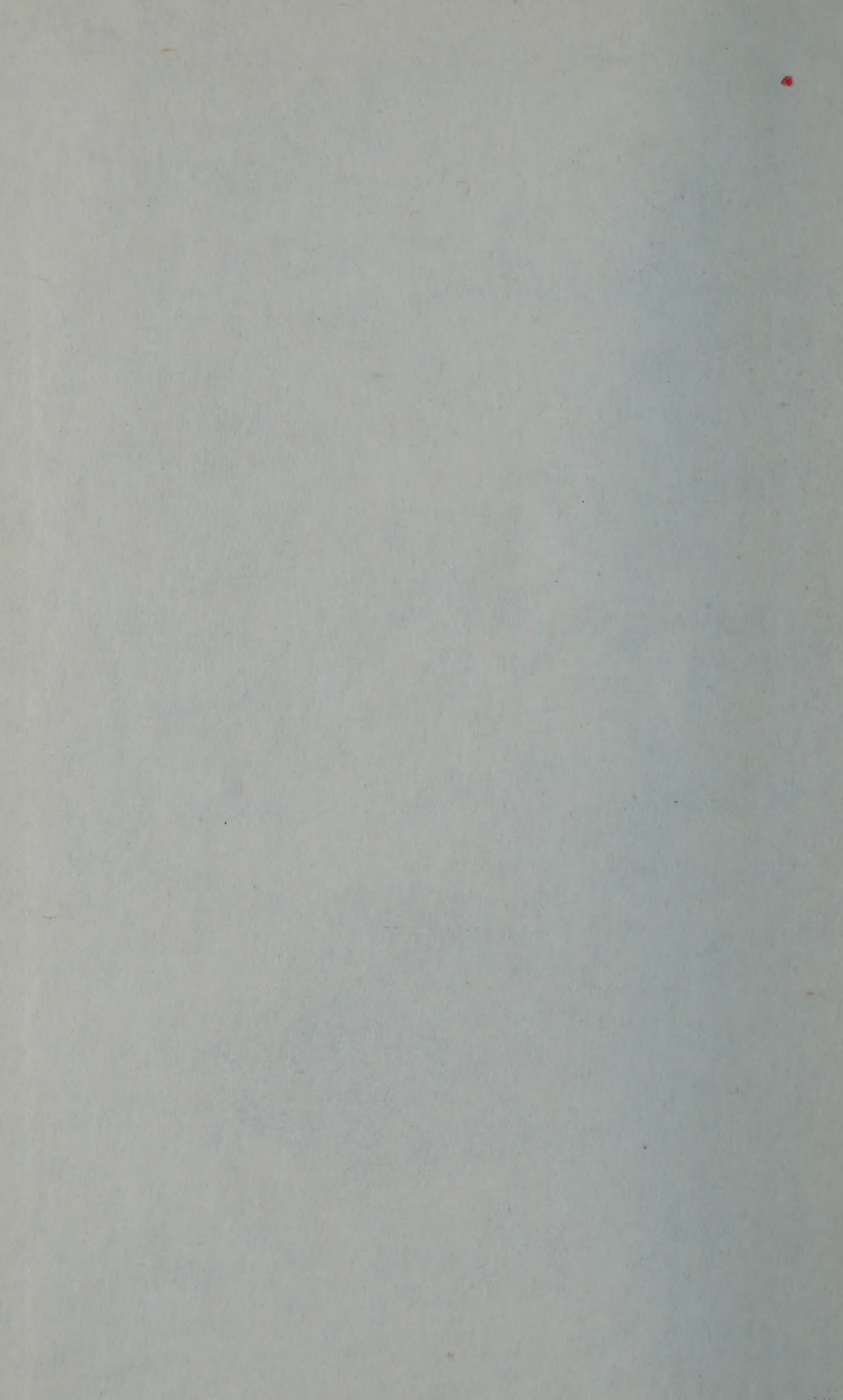
