## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### CHESHIRE, SS.:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House on Tuesday the eleventh day of March next, 1930, at Nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of wood and lumber, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary officers.

Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and such other current and incidental expenses as may accrue.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

Art. 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to accepting State aid for highway construction, and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise such amount as recommended by the New Hampshire Highway Department.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to oil the streets of Walpole Village and North Walpole, the amount to be divided equally. Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$30 for Memorial Day.

Art. 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to the White Pine Blister Rust; and raise and appropriate \$400 therefor.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote in favor of granting permits to druggists for the sale of liquor for medicinal, sacramental, scientific and mechanical purposes.

Art. 11 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to gravel and widen Pleasant Street in Walpole village.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to improve and widen the corner on Turnpike street, near Elm street.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for applying gravel to the River road.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for reconstruction of the highway known as Prospect road, from the point where the improved road now stops opposite the land of Fred Roy, continuing in a southeasterly direction toward Christian Hollow.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for improvement of the road between the Harold Pierce property and Cranberry Corner.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to improve the road leading from Monadnock Road below Black Jack Crossing, so-called, to Wentworth road.

Art. 17 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1500 to gravel the road beginning at the Four Corners, so-called, and continuing past the Charles Garrity place toward Walpole Valley. Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 to gravel and oil High street.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600 to gravel the road leading from Cold River bridge to the Mountain Spring Trout Club.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$6,000 to be used on Main Street in North Walpole.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for snow fence for use of the highway department.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates or bars, the Cheney hill road leading from the Daniel O'Brien place, so-called, over Cheney hill to Alstead line.

Art 23. To elect two delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Art. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# **REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD**

The school board of Walpole submits the following report from July 1, 1928 to July 1, 1929 and a temporary statement from July 1, 1929 to Jan. 31, 1930 and a budget for the school year from July 1, 1930 to July 1, 1931. This year the following repairs were made. At North Walpole the buildings were painted outside and some of the rooms refinished, new shades for all of the rooms and new chairs for the kindergarten were provided. At Drewsville school a steel ceiling, new floor in the back hall and new lights, also a new door with panic lock, and the room was refinished. At No. 14 school a steel ceiling, a new stove, new doors and panic lock, the interior was refinished and new shades provided, also new lights. At Walpole High school the foundation was repaired with cement. At the primary building a new room was constructed on the second floor. At the late annual school meeting a sum of \$1,750 was raised to meet the above items but in each case the cost was more than was expected. The cost of each was as follows: North Walpole, \$997.25; Walpole High school, \$264.71; New room, \$688.96; No. 14 school, \$424.12; Drewsville school, \$319.43, making a total of \$2,694.47.

#### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### TEACHERS

With one exception, the teaching force at North Walpole is the same as last year. In the sixth grade at that school, Miss Elizabeth McNamara was succeeded by Miss Catherine Gallegher.

The beginning of the year found two new teachers in the Walpole High School: Miss Esther Otis succeeded Miss Louise Dickenson, and Miss Helen Perkins succeeded Miss Dorothy Owen. In the Junior High School Miss Irene Lewis was replaced by Miss Edith Swett. Mrs. Isabelle Parker Buswell, cadet teacher at the Christian Hollow school during the spring term of 1929, continues as regular teacher there this year. At the end of the fall term Miss Elsie Gile resigned as teacher of Home Economics in the High School. She is succeeded by Miss Hope Griffith.

The September enrollment in Grades I-II of the Village school was large. Later additions brought the total of 44. In view of this large membership it was thought advisable to separate the two grades. As a result it was necessary to use the new room, finished as a sewing room for the Home Economics classes, for the second grade, and Miss Ruth Kelley was engaged as teacher. If next year finds a sufficient decrease in the enrollment of the two grades, they will again be combined as in previous years.

#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The improvements made on the various school buildings have been mentioned in the Report of the School Board.

I would recommend the following changes to further im prove the physical conditions under which the children work. In the village schools the lighting of the rooms on the dark days of winter and stormy weather would be greatly improved by the installation of new lighting fixtures, of the type which will result in a more uniform dispersion of the light. Such fixtures are especially needed in the main room of the high school, and in the junior high school room. It is entirely practicable to further improve lighting conditions in the latter room by dividing it into two rooms by a partition running through the center. This would necessitate changing the seats in one of these rooms to face in the opposite direction. The ceilings in the two above-mentioned rooms should be whitened.

Lighting conditions in the third-fourth grade room would be improved by blocking one window (that on the west side, nearest the front of the room), and cutting two or three more windows in the north and east sides of the room.

I believe that the district might well consider replacing the furnaces at the Kilburn school at North Walpole by a single furnace, of capacity sufficient to heat the entire building. There is no doubt that a saving of fuel, and a more uniform temperature in the different rooms would result from this change.

#### HEALTH

As during the last year, the health of the children has been carefully supervised by our efficient school nurse. Clinics for children needing dental treatment, for children showing evidence of defective vision, and for children who are underweight, have been held, or are planned for the future. I believe that the importance of this work cannot be overestimated. A detailed account of the work will be found in the report of the school nurse.

During the cold weather a hot dish is served at noon to those children who eat lunch at the school. This is prepared and served by the girls of the Home Economics classes. A small amount, just sufficient to cover the cost, is charged.

### THE WORK IN THE SCHOOLS

I do not think it proper to conclude this report without a word about the success of the schools in achieving that objective which is the primary cause of their existence, namely, the training of children. The various tests which have been given from time to time show that the average child of the Walpole schools possesses normal intelligence. In other words, the material furnished our teachers differs in no respect from that furnished to other schools. The success or failure in the process of developing these children, of so equipping them that they are enabled to do work which compares favorably with work done by the average American child of the same age, is a measure of the success or failure of the schools.

The above mentioned objectives are being met in the Walpole schools. The children promoted from the eighth grade, in rural and village schools, are in general successful in high school work. The pupils at North Walpole who continue in the eleventh and twelfth grades in another school show equal progress with others of the same school. Our high school graduates rank with the graduates of other high schools in the success attained in college, normal school, or other post-secondary work.

In general, the results would indicate that our teachers, as a group, are doing efficient work, and are performing faithfully the duties required of them.

I wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation I have received from the citizens, members of the School Board, and the teachers.

#### TEACHERS

There was one change in our teaching force this year. Miss Katherine Gallagher, a graduate of Keene Normal school, succeeded Miss Elizabeth McNamara as teacher of Grade six.

We are fortunate in not having many changes from year to year in our teachers. In general this works out well as it gives experience, order and economy of effort to the administration and teaching branches.

Our teachers are interested in their work and naturally anxious to see the results of their efforts reflected in the work

of their pupils. This natural interest and pride in their work make a good working basis upon which they labor not only to teach the bare essentials but also to give their pupils a fuller development.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

The results obtained in teaching, on the whole, are good. After a survey of the work, I would say that our general aims in scholarship should be accuracy and the elimination of mediocre work. This aim I take in the sense of local and correctional. For many of our pupils our constant effort is improvement in written and spoken English.

Interest, and co-operation by parents help greatly in school work. Personal interviews with teachers by parents are welcomed. Supervision of home study and inspection of report cards are advised.

Scholastic work usually improves when the home and school work together.

#### DISCIPLINE

The discipline throughout the school is satisfactory. Under such conditions it is possible to teach without a handicap.

The upper grades, eight, nine, and ten, demand the greater supervision in this regard. Except for occasional infractions of rules it may be said that the general discipline in this section is good. When corrective measures are necessary, the response on the part of the pupils is in most cases immediate.

#### COURSE OF STUDIES

Changes in the High school studies were suggested for this year by the officials of the state department. Some of these changes were put into effect at the beginning of school in September. Others will be installed next year.

The Eighth grade course was relieved of pressure by taking out Commercial Accounts and Science. The eighth grade **pupils will have an opportunity to take Science next year.** It was felt that sufficient commercial instruction was given in the Arithmetic course of Grade eight to allow the withdrawal of Commercial Accounts.

The regular High school Commercial course also will furnish sufficient training in this branch. It was suggested that Science and another foreign language be substituted for Algebra and Geometry in the 9th and 10th grades respectively. I welcome the opportunity to make adjustments in our course that will relieve some of our pupils from the burden of Geometry. I do not approve eliminating Algebra.

Elementary Bookkeeping principles are being taught in the last year of the Second year Commercial course.

#### ATHLETICS

Our pupils engage in athletic pursuits sufficiently to obtain the benefits of participation in healthy sport. A generous yard space about our school provides area for playing many varieties of athletic games.

Our High school baseball team played some outside teams last year. Basketball teams for boys and girls have been formed this winter. Many games have been played in Russell hall. We practice in this hall three times a week. Teachers supervise these sessions.

We hope to arrange a system whereby more of our boys and girls can play basketball. At present our arrangements allow use of the playing surface only by those on the girls and boys basketball squads.

The High school has a total enrollment of 108 pupils; 62.96 percent of this number are boys. The number of pupils that have left school is unusually small. Special mention should be made of the fact that there have been no instances of tardiness in the Junior High school during the twenty week period covered by this summary. Both groups have maintained an excellent record of attendance. In general, our record this year compares very favorably with that of previous years and also with State Standards.

### SCHOLARSHIP

An examination of the pupil records this year reveals a general improvement in the quality of work done by the various classes. There has also been a marked decrease in the number of pupil failures. This improvement has been realized without a lowering of the standards. In general, the excellent, cooperation of the teaching staff is responsible for this accomplishment. The teachers have insisted upon a high quality of work from the pupils and have conscientiously devoted much time to the supervision of the work in the process of preparation. The individual supervision of the pupil's work during the study periods has been a most certain influence to a better understanding of the work assigned. In the work of some classes, provision for individual differences has been made by a variation in the length of assignments. The progress of class work has not been seriously hampered by a large number of absences.

The Walpole High School has been approved for the current year by the State Board of Education. Approval by the College Entrance Certificate Board has been renewed. Graduates of the school may be certified to enter many of the New England Colleges, including Dartmouth and University of New Hampshire, without examination.

I wish at this time to acknowledge a gift of \$10.00 from Prof. Charles T. Copeland for use in purchasing books for the High school library. The Abegail Stearns Chapter, D. A. R. has again offered prizes amounting to \$10.00 for the best essays on some historic or civic subject.

The Gilbert Character Cup was presented last year to Mildred E. Bellows.

#### SOCIAL AND ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES

During the past year the school activities have been more fully connected with the school work and have been more definitely under the guidance and direction of the teaching staff. Athletics, dramatics, the social life, and the school publications are now considered a vital part of the school program. Our teachers cheerfully accept this extra responsibility and consider it an opportunity to teach, in a very practical manner, lessons of good sportsmanship, honesty, fair play, and cooperation. All of these, added to the regular High school work, have a large part in making the good citizen for the better tomorrow.

The school plays, are as usual, under the able direction of Mrs. A. P. Davis to whom we owe a debt of gratitude for this work.

I particularly wish to call your attention at this time to the seriousness of the situation with respect to the financial support of basketball. This year a schedule of ten games was arranged with the school teams of neighboring towns. This was done with the expectation that the sport would continue to be self-supporting as in previous years. This was not the case, however, and I am sorry to report a financial loss for the season. It is evident that we cannot continue interschool basketball unless some means is found to solve the financial problem. The rent of the hall for basketball practice is our biggest item of expense. A decision to discontinue basketball would, I believe, be a disappointment. The pupils derive a certain amount of value through contact with the pupils of other schools, and interschool contests promote school spirit. At the present time there are more boys and girls participating in basketball than in previous years. The boys' and girls' squads are both larger than formally and this year a freshman and a Junior High team have been organized with a view to developing material for the future High school teams.

### ASSEMBLIES AND SCHOOL PUBLICATION

Chapel periods are being held as usual Monday and Friday mornings. On these days the Senior High and Junior High schools meet in the assembly room. During the present year we have enjoyed many interesting programs. These programs have been provided for us through the co-operation of the various classes or organizations of the school and by townspeople with special talent who have willingly come in to entertain or instruct us. Provision is also made each week for an organization period when time is allowed for the various student activities.

The publication of the "Warbler" is being continued under the supervision of the English department. It has, for its objective the development of literary ability.

#### HOME ECONOMICS DEPT.

The Junior course, "Home, Its Care and Management," gives the girls an opportunity to study all types of house construction with the advantages and disadvantages of each type. They learn about the best heating and plumbing systems and about modern conveniences. Then they plan and furnish a home in accordance with a stated allowance. In their outside projects they care for the home and learn the responsibilities of the housekeeper.

The combined Freshman and Sophomore classes this year are studying "Clothing and Textiles." Besides learning to make and care for their clothing, they learn about the suitibility of clothing to the purpose and occasion. They also learn to distinguish between the textiles; how and where to use each. They study the origin and manufacture of the fabrics.

The Junior High and fifth and sixth grades have Cooking and Sewing. In cooking they learn to serve as well as cook **simple wholesome dishes.** Table etiquette and entertaining are studied also. In sewing they learn, by making simple garments and household articles, to stitch by hand and on the machine.

#### AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

A summary of the number of boys registered in the Agricultural course for the four years 1927 to 1930 inclusive shows the following increase, indicating that this course seems to be increasing in popularity with the boys.

The number of periods devoted to each enterprise indicates its relative importance in this community as determined by an agricultural survey.

All classes in this course have been held in the new building located on the Hooper estate. I am pleased to state that the transportation facilities as provided have been excellent and very little time has been lost on account of the distance. According to the plan adopted two years ago the combined agricultural classes set, during the spring of 1929—5,000 4-year old White Pine transplants on the Hooper estate. The orehard started three years ago was continued by setting 75 additional 2-year old McIntosh and Delicious trees, this completes the planting on the field originally started.

During the early part of the fall it was made possible for the members of this department to visit the Eastern States Exposition held at Springfield, Mass. This trip was very interesting to the boys and provided an excellent opportunity in motivating the work of this course.

Our school was again represented at the annual Interscholastic Judging Contest held at the University of New Hampshire. Teams were entered in the usual contests with placings as follows, in competition with eleven other schools: dairy cattle, fifth; fruit, fourth; livestock, second; wood identification, third; wood chopping, first. The silver loving cup offered by the Forest Department was awarded to our school for having the greatest number of points.

This year our school was chosen to train two teachers in Vocational Agriculture.

The annual Domestic Arts and Agricultural fair at the Town Hall, October 11, was held. We appreciate the interest and co-operation of the townspeople who assisted us in many ways to make this fair a success.

May I take this opportunity in concluding my report, to express, in behalf of the school, appreciation to the many townspeople who have contributed to the success of the school activities.

#### **REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC**

Mrs. L. O. Thompson,

Superintendent of Schools, Walpole, N. H. Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report as supervisor and teacher of music in the Walpole schools.

The work in music is being carried along on the same lines as in previous years. The subject which proves most effective in developing an equal balance of the intellect and the emotions is music, because it provides a wonderful outlet for those finer emotions which make us human. This is the reason why music in the schools is equal in value to other studies, and perhaps even more effective in cultivating the qualities of a good citizen.

Lessons in music appreciation and folk dancing have been given in the grades. A new set of books has been purchased for the third and fourth grades in Walpole. New books are needed in the high school at North Walpole, and in nearly every grade.

A concert and two operettas will be given this Spring by the high school girls glee club, and the children of the grades.

The work with the Toy Symphony Orchestra in the lower grades has been somewhat handicapped because of the lack of instruments, scores and records. I believe that in the Toy Symphony the child has a splendid avenue for self expression, and that it is one of the best forms of rhythmic drill. It develops concentration and encourages whole hearted team work. It does not teach a child to play the piano, violin, wood-wind or other instruments, but it is good preliminary training, because the children learn the beginning of orchestral behavior. They learn to handle scores and instruments, and to follow a leader. In the scores the child will meet with many of the rhythmic problems that he will find in orchestral work.

I herewith submit my second annual report as school nurse, Inspection in Walpole showed the following defects:

228 pupils were examined.

- 7 pupils showed a slight degree of anaemia.
- 15 pupils were underweight.
- 136 pupils were in need of dental care.
- 26 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.
  - 4 pupils had enlarged glands.
- 28 pupils were unvaccinated, without proper excuse.
- 3 pupils were vaccinated once, unsuccessfully.
- 1 pupil was vaccinated twice, unsuccessfully.

Inspection in North Walpole showed the following defects: 263 pupils were examined.

- 18 pupils showed defective vision, uncorrected.
- 2 pupils showed defective hearing.
- 9 pupils showed some orthopedic defect.
- 4 pupils showed a slight degree of anaemia.
- 32 pupils were underweight.
- 186 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 44 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.
  - 16 pupils had enlarged glands.
  - 10 pupils were unvaccinated, without proper excuse.
  - 13 pupils were vaccinated once, unsuccessfully.
    - 3 pupils were vaccinated twice, unsuccessfully.

281 visits were made and health conditions talked over with parents.

Dental clinics were held as follows:

In No. Walpole two dental clinics were held, one, February 6th, 26th, 27th, March 6th, 1929, and the second one on November 13th, and 14th, 1929, with work done as follows:

The clinic rates as follows: Cleaning, 75c; extraction, 50c; silver and cement fillings, \$1.00; porcelain fillings, \$1.25.

The total bill for this work was two hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$205.25), paid for by parents of the children having work done.

10 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

In Walpole a dental clinic was held November 20th, and 21st, 1929, with work done as follows:

The clinic rates were the same as charged in No. Walpole. The total bill for this work was fifty-fve dollars and seventyfive cents (\$55.75).

33 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

Two tonsil clinics were held at the Mousley Hospital on June 18th, and 21st, 1929, and thirty-two children were treated.

9 tonsil cases were treated privately.

15 pupils had special eye examinations and defects corrected.

6 pupils were vaccinated during the year.

Two underweight clinics were held April 30th, 1929, at which 62 pupils were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

An eye clinic was held at the Walpole School January 22nd, 1930, at which 37 cases were examined by Dr. Mousley.

In the past year the number of underweight children in our schools has greatly decreased. While the number of children needing dental care has not been reduced, the amount of dental care needed by the children attending the clinics has been greatly reduced.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the Local Red Cross Chapter, the alliance of the Unitarian Church, the N. P. Club. Mrs. Alice C. Gilbert, Metcalf & Cahalane, Mr. Holt, Dr. B. D. Mousley and Dr. Ralph Knight for assistance given.

I also wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the past year.
