## TOWN WARRANT.

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Adams Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.
2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of brown tail and gypsy moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of Town officers, for the Board of Health, for the expenses of the Adams Memorial Building and Town Hall, for State and County Tax, and for other necessary charges arising in said Town.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45, G. A. R., to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.
4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 4, of Chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of trunk line roads, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Derry Public Library and pass any vote relating thereto.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Taylor Library and pass any vote relating thereto.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to sprinkle or oil the streets and pass any vote relating thereto.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct the Selectmen to release and quitclaim to Charles G. Parker its right, title and interest in the real estate of the late Edward T. Parker, and pass any vote relating thereto.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars in aid of the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, and pass any vote relating thereto.
12. To see if the Town will authorize the Trustees of Taylor Library to enlarge the library room, add new shelving, and make other necessary alterations and improvements and appropriate a sum of money to meet the expenses it may incur, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will instruct its select men to make certain necessary repairs to the Adams Memorial Building and to the Town Hall at East Derry, and raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the same.

14. To take the sense of the Town as to the advisability of enlarging the Derry Fire Precinct by increasing its area, or by uniting with the Derry Village District, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to purchase one or more automobile trucks for the use of the highway department and to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the same.

16. To see what action the Town will take relative to repairing Broadway from Maple Street to the railroad and from Boyd's corner at Park Avenue to the watering trough at Derry Village, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see what action the Town will take relative to completing that section of the Rockingham Road lying between Fairview Avenue and the Catholic Church, and pass any vote relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to issue its bonds for the purpose of carrying into effect any action it may take on either or both of the two previous articles; to fix the kind and denomination of such bonds; the time and place of payment; the rate of interest and the time when such interest shall be paid; the manner of payment; all to be done in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 129 of the Laws of 1917.

19. To see if the Town will authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the

negotiable notes of the Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more Liquor Agents in accordance with Sect. 6 of Chapter 147 of the Laws of 1917, and pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a sinking fund for the payment of Town bonds and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of assisting in defraying the expenses of the two hundredth anniversary of the Town of Derry and pass any vote relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for the purpose of having band concerts for the public of Derry during the ensuing year and pass any vote relating thereto.

## FIREWARD'S REPORT.

### Derry Fire District.

Your Board of Firewards submit herewith to the voters of the Derry fire district the following report for the year ending February 1, 1919. In the past year the department has answered 61 calls, most of these were telephone calls, and could be handled by the chemical. There were, however, 13 bell alarms, six of these were hard fires and were handled, we believe, in excellent shape.

The total amount of property involved being \$261,252.81, with a fire and water damage of \$72,-378.06. We believe the men of both companies are entitled to much credit for their prompt and efficient service and we take this opportunity to thank them. We think the department and equipment is in better shape than ever before, and we desire to thank the citizens for their co-operation and support.

## **REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH**

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The general condition of the town the past year has been very good.

There were 4 cases of Diphtheria, one of Scarlet Fever and several of Measles last spring, all light cases.

The first week in May was devoted to cleaning back yards and removing unsightly etc., rubbish, and the ready response the board received from the public encourages us to continue the good work this year.

Venerial diseases have been added to our list of contagious diseases, and all persons having a venereal disease unless being properly treated, will be quarantined and house placarded subject to the same laws as persons suffering from any other contagious disease and any physician or other person who makes a diagnosis in, or treats, a case of syphilis, gonorrhea, or chancroid, shall report such case immediately in writing to the local health officer, stating the name and address, or the office number, age, sex, color and occupation, of the diseased person, and the date of onset of the disease, and the probable source of the infection. The report shall be inclosed in a sealed envelope and sent to the local health officer, who shall report weekly on the prescribed form to the State Board of Health, all cases reported to him.

The health officer shall use every available means to ascertain the existence of, and to investigate, all

cases of syphilis, gonorrhea, and chancroid within their several territorial jurisdiction and to ascertain the source of such infection. Local health officers, or their authorized deputy, are empowered and directed to make such examinations of persons reasonably suspected of having syphilis, gonorrhea, or chancroid, as may be necessary for carrying out these regulations.

It is not the intention of the law to infringe upon the personal liberty of any one, but to institute measures for the protection of other persons from infection by such venereally diseased person, and any person violating any of the provisions shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each offence.

Despite the increased cost of all kinds of material used about the Water Works plant and in new construction and repairs, we are able again this year to make what we believe a gratifying financial report, as will be seen by the detailed accounts of the superintendent. Not so much new work, in extensions, etc. was done the past year, but all that was necessary was given attention and such repairs as were required were made. Now that the war is over, and the price of material is tending downward more new work may be done the ensuing year. Notwithstanding the high cost of labor, coal, wood, iron and steel, the price of water to the consumer remains the same as it was when the service was installed, and yet in spite of these facts the system is in a satisfactory condition, and the income is most gratifying. We hope it will be possible at an early date however to add to the water storage capacity of the plant a new and larger

standpipe which would be found valuable in case of an emergency. The appended report of the property holdings, and the financial condition will be found of interest to the citizens of this town.

To the Board of Water Commissioners:—

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent for the year ending December 31, 1918.

As every one knows, the year 1918 was ushered in with extreme cold weather which is expensive for Water Works plants. As a result it was absolutely necessary that the water should be left running in some localities to prevent the main freezing 15,734.002 gallons of water were pumped in 1918 more than in 1917. This increase over the previous year was noticeable only in the winter months. 250 feet of six inch pipe; 5 hydrant connections; and about 70 meters were frozen.

At the pumping station we have about one thousand dollars worth of fuel more than a year ago.

The hydrant at the end of West Broadway has been replaced by a new Corey hydrant; two services have been relaid; and ten leaks in mains and service pipes have been repaired.

We have done the customary work on the steam roller, tree sprayer and sewer.

In March we bought five Nashville, Tenn., 5 per cent bonds that mature March 1, 1922.

We have paid all running expenses; \$416.44 for extensions; \$4235.00 interest on bonds; bought \$5,000-00 worth of bonds and have a balance of \$3,654.50.

#### TRUSTEES REPORT

The librarians report gives so clear and comprehensive an account of the work of the library for the year 1918, that anything further hardly seems needed. We ask for a careful reading of the same and of that of the treasurer, that the citizens of the town may know how the money given for the maintenance of the library has been expended, and also be reminded that a much larger amount could be profitably used. We are doing a very large business on a very small capital, and it is hoped that a realization of this fact may lead to a larger appropriation for its support, that its usefulness may be proportionately increased. Had we not drawn from our reserve fund the number of books purchased would have been much less than in former years.

We feel that our library has been honored in the election of our librarian to the presidency of the New Hampshire Library Association, a fitting testimonial

of the state-wide knowledge in library circles of her proficiency in that work.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:—

The fourteenth annual report of the library for the year ending January 31, 1919 is here presented:—

The library has been open 274 days. During the epidemic it was closed five weeks and two days, not opening until one week after the ban had been lifted upon other places of public gathering. The hours have been the same as in former years.

##### Circulation

The closing of the library has decreased our circulation but the daily average of 117 books loaned, is I consider a good showing and but 4 1-2 below last years record. There is an increase in the per cent of non-fiction loaned and a corresponding decrease in fiction. Boxes of books have been sent three of the larger district schools and some of the pupils are acquiring a taste for reading which induces them to come to the library to further gratify their desire.

##### Accession

There have been 296 books purchased during the year. These have covered the usual wide range of subjects. We have added a good number of books on

the war both personal experiences of soldiers, nurses, and others, and the more thoughtful ones on prevailing conditions in the war zone and the problems resulting from the war. These have all been in constant demand. In response to the call for books for the Soldiers the Library collected and forwarded about 400 volumes. We have also enlarged our collection of practical subjects such as agriculture, home-making and the sciences, and many interesting works of travel and biographies have been purchased.

The number added however is not as large as could be used to advantage. Many a desirable book has not been purchased because of the expense. The books are wearing out constantly and a large number should be discarded and replaced by new copies if our funds warranted it.

A new stack has been added which will hold about 500 volumes and the books have been rearranged so that all departments have room for further additions for the present.

#### Picture Collection

Our collection of pictures is growing in favor and its use increasing. Nearly twice as many pictures were loaned as last year. The Mentor Magazine subscribed to for the past year is a help in this department. With each magazine comes six fine pictures of the subject treated and as many useful and interesting subjects are included we are able to loan these to advantage after they have been removed from the reading room:

#### Bulletin Boards

The bulletin boards have had a special prominence the past year. One board has been used exclusively

for the food problem. The library has received monthly, information on this subject from the government authorities with suggestions for display and many posters, war recipes and government leaflets have been thus shown. At one time another board contained a collection of Camp Devens post cards in which many were interested. We have had photos of Derry boys in the United States service on exhibition since last summer and many have been glad to see the faces of those who have represented Derry in the world conflict. Souvenirs of the war and views of the battle ground have also been loaned for exhibition. These subjects in addition to the usual book notices and Pinkerton Academy reading list have made these boards of more than ordinary interest.

#### Library Meetings

Your librarian has attended two library meetings during the year, one the annual state meeting held at Claremont, the other a neighborhood meeting held at Laconia. At the latter she represented the state association as its president and demonstrated book repairing. She also spent a day visiting libraries in the vicinity with Mr. A. T. Dudley, of Exeter, one of the New Hampshire Library Commission.

#### In Conclusion

Assistance is rendered whenever possible to those seeking information and the request for educational and practical books are welcomed. Our library has a good collection along this line and we wish it might be used to even greater extent. The government bulletins issued on agriculture and allied subjects can be had at the library and might be helpful

to many in the rural districts. We wish more would get the habit of coming to the library when there is information wanted as well as for books of entertainment.

## **REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.**

---

The annual report of the School Board for the Town School District is herewith respectfully submitted.

On account of the prevailing epidemic the schools during the fall term, have lost four weeks which is a serious loss to the pupils.

During this time the teachers were paid in full and we are very sure that they will co-operate with the Superintendent in doing their best to make up for lost time.

On account of the conditions and the high cost of living the Board felt that the teachers were not receiving adequate pay, consequently the pay of each teacher was raised one dollar per week,

The past year has been a disastrous one on account of fires, but only one was a serious financial loss; the School House in District No. 4, for some unknown cause burned to the ground and as the insurance was only \$600.00 the loss was quite material.

As the law imposes a duty upon the School Board to furnish School facilities to all pupils and as transportation did not seem feasible the Board took it upon themselves to make immediate arrangements to rebuild the School House. This was done and the School House completed in the early fall. On account of the high price of materials and labor the School House cost in the neighborhood of \$3000.00.

but we think we have one of the model district Schools in the State and we would ask the District to ratify all we have done in the premises.

The following is an estimate of the amount required to meet the statuary obligations, and this report is a notice to the selectmen as required by law. High School Tuition \$2400.00; Books and Supplies \$800.00; Flags and appurtenances \$25.00

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Board of Education of Derry Town School District:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools.

The past year has been in several ways a rather trying one in school work. The extremely severe weather of last winter caused considerable interruption, and the epidemic of Influenza has made a most serious break in the work of the present year. However, there are many things about the situation that are encouraging, and in spite of these drawbacks, we can find much in the year's work that is gratifying.

In June sixty-one were graduated from the Eighth grade, as follows: From the Oak St. school, 22, from the Floyd school, 27, and 12 from the various district schools. The majority of these entered the Academy in the fall.

Throughout the year there has been no change in the teaching force, but at the end of the year in June, and during the summer, the following resigned to go elsewhere, or into other work: Mr. Collins, Miss Rand, Miss White of the Oak St., school, Miss McCarthy of the West Side, Miss Coulter at Dist. No. 4, and Miss Reardon at Dist. No. 7. Miss Augusta E.

Newbegin, a graduate of Farmington, Maine, Normal school, and a teacher of considerable experience, was secured to succeed Mr. Collins as Prin. of the Oak St., school. Miss Emily F. Lord, a graduate of Keene Normal school, was engaged for the sixth grade, while Miss McGrail was transferred from the Floyd school to take Miss White's place in the 1st. grade of the Oak St. Miss Smith was transferred from the Floyd school to the 2nd. grade of the West Side school, and Miss Armstrong was transferred from Dist. No. 5 to take the 3rd. grade at the Floyd school. Miss Hazel B. Butler, a graduate of Keene, was secured for Dist. No. 4, and Miss Marion S. Gilson, a graduate of the State College, for Dist. No. 5, and Miss Helen M. Devaney, a graduate of Lowell Normal school, for Dist. No. 7. At the beginning of school in September, Miss Ranney was unable to return, and later at her request, she was given leave of absence for the balance of the year.

But one 1st grade was needed at the Floyd school, and later what had been Miss Ranney's room was distributed, so but four rooms at the Floyd school are now in use. The enrollment has dropped off quite a little since last year, due to the fact that a number of families have moved from town on account of industrial conditions caused by the war. With the return of peace and normal conditions, the enrollment is likely to increase.

At the beginning of school in September, it was thought to be necessary, on account of the increased cost of living, to increase the pay of the teachers. Still their pay compares very unfavorably with what they could earn in almost any other kind of employ-

ment. Their training and aptitude for their work, and not their pay, keeps them in the service.

We have had a rather curious epidemic of fires during the past year. In April, the building at No. 7 caught fire one morning, and was saved only by the efforts of the boys of the school, aided after a time by the neighbors. This fire originated about a defective chimney. To prevent further difficulty from this cause, a new chimney was built on the outside from the ground up. While the repairs were being made, the school continued in session, through the courtesy of the officers, in the nearby Community building. Three other buildings were found to have faulty chimneys, and during the summer these were rebuilt similarly. In May, the building at No. 4 was completely destroyed during the night. The origin of this fire is unknown. There had been no fire in the building for heating for a week, and the fire apparently did not originate about any part of the heating plant. The loss of this building was all the more severe, as it had been more thoroughly equipped than any other of our rural buildings. For the balance of the year, the teachers and pupils were transported to a vacant room in the Floyd building. This arrangement was quite satisfactory, but expensive.

In October, while the buildings were closed on account of the Influenza, a fire, caused by spontaneous combustion in soft coal, did considerable damage to the Oak St., building. One week later, a similar fire occurred in the West Side building. But for the timely discovery of these fires, we should have lost both of these buildings.

It was unfortunate to have to build this year at

District No. 4, when labor and materials were so high, but having to do so, it was wise to build a good building—one that would adequately meet the needs of the school, and conform to the requirements of good school architecture. We may well be proud of the building, and it is sure to react favorably on the work of the school.

It may be well to suggest at this time that several of the buildings need important repairs. All of the older buildings in the district are faulty in the matter of lighting. The buildings at No. 3, No. 6, and No. 7 have windows in front as well as on all other sides, so that children face the light. This is partially remedied by keeping the curtains at these windows drawn. The interior of the building at No. 8 was improved last year but the four other older rural buildings need much done to put them in good condition. The ceilings need to be whitened, the walls tinted or papered, and the wood work painted. Jacketed stoves in all of these buildings would improve the heating and ventilating conditions. The Oak St., building should be painted this year. Its present appearance is not very creditable to the town.

The School Savings Bank continues to do good work, especially among the younger children. Many of the children, however, are buying thrift stamps instead of depositing in the bank, and they are encouraged to do so. The bank has been in operation almost exactly two years, and in that time, the children have deposited \$2228.38, of which amount \$2052.00 have been deposited to the credit of individual accounts in the Derry Savings bank. The thrift stamps are affording an excellent opportunity to teach thrift in

the outlying schools, where it is impracticable to make use of the School Savings Bank.

Early in December an evening school was opened for the benefit of our foreign-language people who might desire to avail themselves of an opportunity to acquire some mastery of the English language. Two classes were formed, one for those who could use little or no English, and one class for those who were somewhat more advanced. Forty-five have been enrolled, about half of whom have attended regularly. These have made good progress. No special effort was made to secure the attendance of large numbers. It was thought better to try to do successfully what we might undertake with a few rather than to secure large attendance and obtain doubtful results, particularly as we had facilities for not more than two or three classes. I have several times suggested the advisability of such a school in Derry. This year, the activities of the State Americanization Committee made it seem necessary to try the experiment. That committee had demonstrated the fact that there was great need of doing something. An industrial census secured during the summer showed the following facts at that time in the two largest shops, the Derry Shoe Co., and the Woodbury Shoe Co.:

Number of foreign-born employees.....	190
Number of those not able to speak English.....	32
Number not able to read English.....	81
Number of nationalities represented.....	13

These figures, of course, represent but a part of our foreign-born population, but are sufficient to indicate a very real need. If you can help any considerable number of these people to acquire some use of the common language, we shall be doing them a

great good, and make it possible for them to become better citizens. It may be of interest to note the nationality of those enrolled in the evening school. There were 33 of French Canadian stock, 1 Greek, 1 Russian, 2 Italians, 2 Poles, 2 Lithuanians, and 4 Armenians.

No provision had previously been made to finance the school, so all bills not otherwise provided for will have to be paid out of the regular school funds. The Derry Woman's Club has generously given \$25.00 towards the support of the school, also Molly Reid Chapter, D. A. R., has given \$5.00 for the same purpose. In the future, the district should vote sufficient money to maintain an evening school to meet the evident need of the community.

The financial statement this year covers the period from Feb. 15, 1917, to Aug. 31, 1918, or nearly a year and a half, and the total amount expended is proportionately larger than usual. At the last annual meeting there was appropriated an amount of money estimated to cover the expenses for one year, and therefore it will be necessary to vote again this year an amount to cover the period from this time to Aug. 31, 1919. It would be very desirable, if possible to raise an amount sufficient to provide for the year from Aug. 31, 1919, to Aug. 31, 1920, the next school year.

The following table of statistics for four years is given for comparison and should be of interest.

It will be noted that the average cost per pupil for teaching is greatly increased for 1918, but the figures given are for a period of nearly a year and a half and really do not represent any increase. The cost of books and supplies has been kept very low through the co-operation of the teachers and children in the effort to eliminate all possible waste.

We are required annually to vote on the matter of medical inspection, or until the act shall be accepted. For two years the District has voted to instruct the School Board and Superintendent to call in the doctor of the Board of Health or the district nurse whenever deemed necessary. The doctor has been called upon occasionally, and I have made arrangements with the District Nurse Association for the services of the district nurse, if any special need should arise, whenever she might be at liberty. I would suggest that it would be well to arrange for her to act as school nurse for inspection purposes all of the time she may have available.

Miss Marguerite E. Clark, for quite a number of years supervisor of music, recently resigned to accept a more lucrative position in New Jersey. Miss Clark had done excellent work in the schools, and her going is a distinct loss. The subject of music is important, and should be given more rather than less attention. Arrangements are being made to continue the work along lines already outlined for the balance of the year.

While the schools have been interrupted a good deal by sickness up to this time, just now the attendance is getting to be more nearly normal, and the work is going along well. It is the purpose, entered into heartily by teachers and pupils, to accomplish the year's work in spite of the unusual difficulties. I am confident, if no further interruption occurs, that at the end of the year in June, a good year's work will have been done. The teachers are enthusiastic and working hard, and the pupils generally are responding well.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Board for generous co-operation.

To the Board of Education Derry Special District No. 2:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The year since the last annual report has been of unusual difficulty in school work. Last winter the unusual severity of the weather interrupted to quite a degree the work of the schools, and the epidemic of Influenza this year has been the most serious interference that we have ever known. Yet in spite of these drawbacks we can find much that is gratifying in the year's work.

An unusually large class was graduated from the Eighth grade in June, and as the class entering the Grammar room in September was small, the attendance in that room since September has been unusually small. There has also been some decrease in the number in the Primary room. This is in accordance with the tendency in Derry due to industrial conditions arising from the war. Normal conditions may be expected to be restored soon.

We have been fortunate in retaining the same teachers—Miss Lewis and Miss How. Both are doing excellent work.

The garden work of the children last year was very successful. The estimated value of the crops raised was \$373 and this amount was reported to the state supervisor in Concord. The food situation is still serious, and it is hoped to accomplish even more this year in the school-home gardens. We hope parents will co-operate to this end.


