SELECTMEN'S REPORT



With the accomplishments of 1966 behind us, we look forward to continued progress in 1967.

The tireless efforts of the Planning Board and the cooperation of all Boards have played a very significant part. Land usage, Zoning, Building Codes, Sub-divisions, and the work on the 701 Plan have occupied a great deal of their time.

The Board of Adjustment handled a difficult task interpreting our Zoning Ordinance. Its report is published this year for your information.

The Budget Committee devoted many hours to its work. We have not always agreed on the budgets. They had their job to do and did it to the best of their ability.

The 1966 Town Meeting authorized a Charter Committee. Its report is to be delivered at this year's meeting.

The long awaited Industrial Council was appointed, and worked very hard to provide industry for the Town in order to broaden your tax base. This is a long range proposition that requires time. Excellent progress has been made in obtaining a lease on County land adjacent to the #114 By-pass.

The Tax Mapping program was completed much to our satisfaction. The information is of tremendous value in furthering the growth of our Town. The Equalization program is progressing and will be complete for this year's tax billing. Hearings on both programs will be held in June.

We thank all Department Heads at this time for their fine cooperation. We realize wages are a continual problem, but have made an attempt at realistic rates, and hope to complete the job next year.

We have attempted, with the cooperation of everyone, to keep the tax rate in line this year. We prepared a realistic budget and think we succeeded.

At this time, the Board of Selectmen expresses a "Thank you" to the Town Manager, Warren Scribner, who has done a tremendous job of administering and of keeping us informed every step of the way. His job is not an easy one. Occasionally a few "big toes" had to be stepped on, but as far as we know, there hasn't been any serious casualty.

Many out of town meetings have been held this past year in order to acquaint us with other towns' solutions to common problems. One such meeting was at a Service Bureau studying the possibility of computer tax billing. This was a valuable session that pointed to a better and less expensive system of tax billing. It will provide vital information for the use of everyone.

Mr. Bernard and Mr. Weilbrenner attended the Assessors' School at Bowdoin College during the year. Your Chairman, Francis Gaudreault, was unable to attend the last session due to an operation. This School has proven to be very educational for the Selectmen and of great benefit to the Town. Your Board of Selectmen looks forward to serving you, the taxpayer, during the year 1967.

Moderator Raymond Cloutier called the meeting to order at 10:02 A. M. at the High School Auditorium for voting on Town Officers by ballot. In the 5th District, the polls were open from 10:30 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. and from 10:00 A. M. to 6:30 P. M. at the Central District.

The evening meeting was called to order at 7:42 P. M. by Moderator Raymond Cloutier.

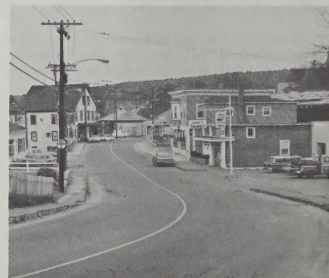

1967 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown in the said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs and to the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in School District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

The polls will open at 10:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P. M. at the Central Polling Place and will open at 10:30 A. M. and close at 6:30 P. M. in the Fifth District Pinarville Fire Station.

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot, shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

1. To choose all Town Officers, Trustees and Commissioners, and School District Officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of Five Hundred Seventy Four Thousand One Hundred Nine Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$574,109.18), and raise by taxes the sum of Four Hundred Thirty Seven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-five Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$437,375.18) (County Tax not included.)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow from time to time, such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, purchase, prescription or gift.

5. To see if the Town will vote to grant to the Planning Board the power to approve or disapprove sub-division plans showing plots, streets, or the widening thereof, or parks, as provided in RSA:36 provided that the Town Clerk shall file with the Register of Deeds for Hillsborough County a certified copy of this article and the vote

thereon, including the date of such vote, if action is in the affirmative.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase approximately twenty (20) acres of land adjacent to the Goffstown Back Road, being a portion of Lot Number twentyone (21) Tax Map Page Five (5), presently owned by John F. and Thelma R. Graham, said lot being of use to the Town as a gravel pit, and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500) for above purchase. RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Manager, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to appoint an Inspector of Buildings and to set his salary, and to approve all provisions of the comprehensive set of regulations for the construction and maintenance of all buildings that has been distributed to the assembly and in the hands of the Town Clerk, to be enforced by the inspector of buildings; all of the above being in accordance with RSA:156.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to advertise and sell to the highest bidder, the Town owned lot originally purchased from Mary A. Murphy in 1913, located near the corner of Shirley Hill Road, more adequately described as Lot number 31A, Tax Map Page Three (3), and consisting of one acre of land.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be matched with Federal and State funds to provide Capital improvements to the Pinarville and Barnard recreational areas equally and as recommended by the Recreation Advisory Council, the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be raised through the issuance of serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of Revised Statutes Annotated) and any amendments thereto; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and the time and place of payment and condition of sale thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Goffstown. (2/3 majority required). Submitted WITHOUT recommendation of Budget Committee.

10. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 111, Section F, of the Goffstown Zoning Ordinance, relating to signs, by deleting the entire Section F and inserting in its place the proposed Sign Ordinance that has been printed and distributed to the assembly and in the hands of the Town Clerk; the public hearing required was advertised on January 14, 1967 in the Goffstown News, was posted in three conspicuous places, and was held at the Town Hall at 7:30 P. M. on the eighth day of February 1967, all of the above being in accordance with RSA 31:64.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum of money not to exceed Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) from the Highway Machinery Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of completing payment on the lease purchase of the HD-11 bulldozer, authorized by the Budget Committee and State Tax Commission in March of 1966. RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase a parcel or parcels of land with or without buildings thereon, subject to the approval of the Recreation Advisory Council, to be used and administered as a Youth Center and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000) Dollars for said purchase. Submitted WITHOUT recommendation by the Budget Committee.

13. "To see if the Town will vote to revoke the authority granted to the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent and instead, to elect the Highway Agent by ballot at the Annual Meeting agreeable to RSA 245:6. This method will take effect at the 1968 Annual Meeting." Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters.

14. To hear the reports of Town Officers, Auditors, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In 1966 the Goffstown Planning Board held its organizational meeting on March 18. Lawrence Shirley was elected Chairman, and Charles S. Parker was elected Secretary-Treasurer. A set of rules of procedure for the Planning Board was adopted. Once organized, the Board proceeded with the preparation of a comprehensive Town Plan. Several phases of this proposed plan will be presented to the Town at the Town Meeting in March 1967.

The Board studied the Zoning Ordinance in some depth and is prepared to recommend changes in the ordinance for the voters' approval pertaining to sign regulations and land subdivisions. It was voted to recommend the acceptance of a building code and building inspector. In conjunction with the Town's planning consultant, such matters as future land use and the future capacity of the Town Buildings to serve the Town are being studied at this time. Dissatisfaction with the Wilbur Smith report on future highways for Goffstown was expressed to the Manchester Metropolitan Planning Board as well as the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

The Planning Board wishes to express its appreciation for the excellent cooperation extended to it by the Selectmen, Town Manager, School Officials, other Town Boards, and the people of Goffstown.

CHARTER COMMISSION

The March 1966 Town Meeting voted to authorize a Bi-Parisan Town Charter Commission. Members of this Commission are Raymond Ducharme and Lawrence Emerton Co-Chairmen; John Langley, Roland Barnard, Roger Paradis, and Lawrence Shirley.

The Commission has met several times, and also with other towns and with the N. H. Municipal Association.

This group will give a preliminary report at the 1967 Town Meeting.



INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL

After the town authorized the formation of an Industrial Council in the March 1966 meeting, the Selectmen named five men to do the groundwork in the implementing of the ordinance. They were Charles Parsons, Hedley Pingree, Albert Merrill, Bertrand Caron, and Roger Aubin.

The legal ordinance was drawn up, and the formation, patterned after the Manchester Industrial Council, was submitted to the Selectmen by September of this year. Mr. Hedley Pingree was elected Chairman, Mr. Charles Parsons, Vice-Chairman, and Mr. Roger Aubin, Secretary. Because of the pressure of business, Mr. Pingree had to relinquish the Chairmanship, and in September, Mr. Benjamin Cohen was asked to serve on the Committee and was duly elected Chairman.

Realizing that we needed the help of good men from all fields of endeavor the following new members were asked to serve - Burton Delaney, Nathaniel Bigelow, Jr., Charles Gage, William Zopfi, Henry Welch, Ralph Lavallee, Lawrence Shirley as Chairman of the Planning Board, and Warren Scribner as Town Manager.

This full Board met on September 12th to map a plan for the acquisition of land from the County if this were possible, and to receive a report from a representative of the Penobscott Poultry Company on their plans in the re-opening of the poultry plant. The Treatment plant needed to insure the Water Pollution Commission of proper waste disposal is the problem which is keeping

all outside interests from venturing in the re-opening of this plan.

A meeting was set up with the County Commissioners and a proposition to acquire some of the County land by lease, with various stipulations for the protection of both Town and County, was submitted to the Commissioners. Though the meetings were friendly and interesting, the final answer is still forthcoming from the Commissioners in this proposition.

Meanwhile members of the Committee are busy investigating road and utility costs in the development of available land and others are trying to find land suitable for industrial purposes. In this role, any private citizen having land which he believes suitable and available for industry is asked to contact members of the Committee or the Town Manager. Because industrial prospects often have to make reports to Boards, it is very desirable that an estimated purchase or lease price be established when submitting available land. Since your Industrial Committee has to act as liaison between parties, an Industrial Corporation is being formed to act as legal agent for this purpose. This Committee's sole purpose is to help preserve existing industry and help attract new industry, and it is hoped that anyone needing help in either of these areas will get in touch with the Chairmen, Town Manager, or any member so we can properly fulfill our function and not miss any opportunities.

The Fire Department has enjoyed a very good year, thanks to the cooperation of the people.

As anticipated in the 1965 Town Report, the new dumping arrangement would mean no more dump fires. This proved so in 1966.

Also due to the new dumping arrangement, and the "No burning between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M., regulation", we have had a marked decline of grass and brush fires this past year - 56 during 1965 as compared to 31 during 1966, and just one fire was directly caused by an incinerator.

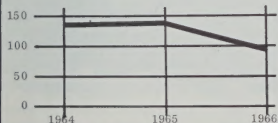

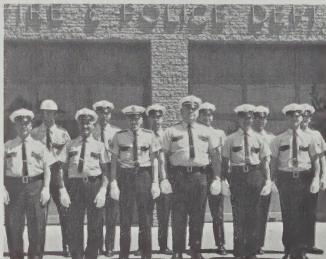
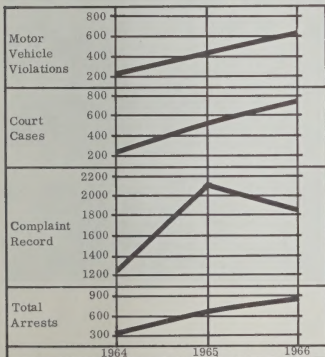
POLICE DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN - 1966

One of the most important services that a Library can perform to its community is being an "Information Center" This past year, your Librarian has noted an upward trend in the use of this service, not only patrons visiting in person, but also the number of questions through "phone" calls. Many hours have been spent helping students and adults locate the answers to their questions.

During National Library Week in April an evening Film Program was presented by the Trustees. A story and game hour was held for pre-school children and special book marks were given to all school children.

There have been more class visits and more loans of books to teachers for school use this year. The Kindergarten and Head Start groups visited us and were introduced to the use of books and enjoyed Story Hours.

Our Summer Reading Program was more popular than ever before. During July and August 98 children read ten or more books and half of this number read more than twenty. The party held in September for the readers was actually a huge success.

We have been able to add a few more of the necessary Reference Books to our collection, which makes our lack of adequate and proper shelving even more acute.

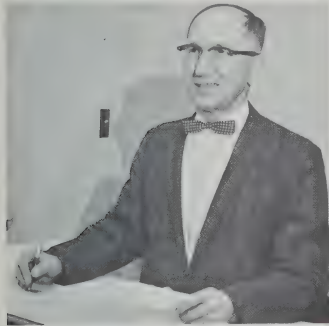

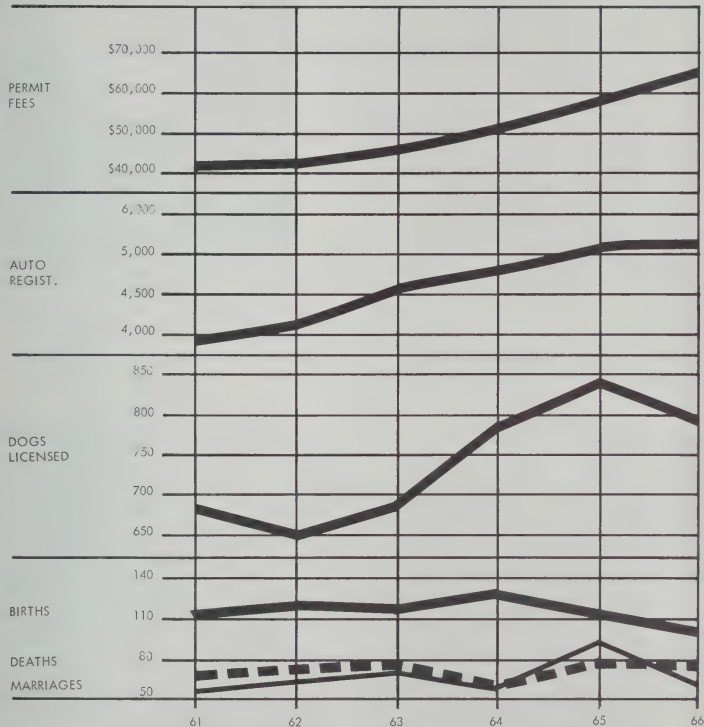

RECORD OF ANNUAL PRECINCT MEETING March 15, 1966

Annual Meeting of the Goffstown Village Precinct was held at the Town Hall.

Meeting called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator Judge Hedley G. Pingree. Call for the meeting was read. Voted to dispense with the reading of the warrant and to take up each article in their order.

Judge Pingree was elected Moderator, Pro. Tem. and was administered the oath of office.

ARTICLE 1 Gardner Lamson was nominated for the Office of Moderator, was elected and so declared by Moderator Pro. Tem. Elizabeth Bixby was nominated for the Office as Clerk, was elected and took oath of office. Auditors elected were Howard Johnson, Charles B. Thorp and Richard Duclos.

ARTICLE 2 Water Commissioner for Five Years
Albert H. Gilbert elected
and took oath of office

Water Commissioner for two years
Albert F. Merrill elected
and took oath of office

ARTICLE 3 Voted to act favorably on this article giving the Commissioners the right to hire money in excess of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars due to emergency.

ARTICLE 4 Voted to accept the report of the Budget Committee, and appropriated Thirty Three Hundred Eighty-five (\$30,385) Dollars for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5 Voted to accept the report of the Officers as printed in the Town Report.

Moved and seconded to authorize the district to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000. to purchase and install fluorescent lights in nine classrooms, the library and teachers' room at the Maple Avenue School. After a discussion and outline by Board Member Merrill the article carried.

ARTICLE 7. It was moved and seconded that the district raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,000. to grade, gravel, oil and sand the school yard at the Bartlett School. Discussion by Dr. Snay then article carried in affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. Moved and seconded that the district vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, that the district authorize the school board to make application for such funds, and to expedite the same for such projects as it may designate. After extended discussion the question was moved, it carried. The Article was voted on by a standing

vote and it carried 76 to 74. Richard Hesslein requested the vote be by checklist and the moderator declared vote must be by checklist. Vote by checklist saw motion defeated by a vote of 77 to 76.

ARTICLE 1 from Special School Meeting 2: Moved by Hedley Pingree and Seconded to dismiss this article referring to accepting the provisions of Public Law 89-10, the law to improve educationally handicapped from low income families. Motion to dismiss carried.

ARTICLE 9. Moved by Alan McKernan and seconded to act favorably on article to accept provisions of Title III, Public Law 89-10. After discussion motion was declared lost by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10. Carl Hecker moved and it was seconded that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$862,399.50 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Much discussion ensued and Elmer Nickerson moved and was seconded to amend the article to increase the budget by \$12,000. to \$874,399.50. Ten voters discussed in length and amendment was further amended by Gordon Burns and seconded to restrict the additional \$12,000. to be spent under Item 210 of the School District Budget. Votes on both amendments carried by voice votes.

Attorney Richard Kohls, Chairman of the Goffstown School Board was recog-

nized and he moved and was seconded that a rising vote of thanks be given to Past Chairman of the School Board Emile Bourque be given in recognition for long and meritorious service to the residents of Goffstown. Carried out unanimously.

Former Moderator Gordon Burns offered the following resolution and moved its adoption and was seconded:

Whereas: One of Goffstown's most active and leading Citizens has deceased since the last meeting of the Goffstown School District and

Whereas: Albert J. Lamothe was a past member of the Goffstown School Board, Town Budget Committee, Assistant Town Moderator and was active for many years in Public Affairs therefore be it resolved that:

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination and audit of the accounts of the Goffstown School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)
Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1965 and June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$76,816.13 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures-Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$13,458.51, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$7,736.11, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$21,194.62

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit F.

School Lunch Account: (Exhibit G)
A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the School Lunch Account is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

Exhibit H presents a statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Goffstown. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1966, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1965-66 School Tax in the amount of \$594,849.24.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit I)
A statement showing the activity in

Building Fund Account is presented in Exhibit I.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit J)
A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Goffstown:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report relative to the schools of Goffstown.

Superintendent of Schools Office Staff



The Superintendent's office staff administers and supervises the schools and manages the school district business of Goffstown, Bow, Dunbarton, New Boston and Weare. This current school year the Supervisory Union added the services of Arthur Wagman, Business Manager in charge of the non-instructional and specialized business and accounting services. The school district warrant has an article that will designate his title as "Business Administrator". An affirmative vote by a majority of the school districts representing 85% of these students in the five towns will entitle the Supervisory Union to a state subsidy of \$2,700 toward his salary. There are currently more than 180 employees on the payrolls of the five towns with over 100 in Goffstown. The total budgets are fast approaching two million dollars annually exclusive of building programs.

The Schools



Bartlett Elementary School currently has an enrollment of 235 pupils in grades 1 through 5 with the staff cooperatively presenting a realistic and modern curriculum under the direct supervision of Leon Cote, full time supervising principal. Under Mr. Cote's direction a remedial reading program and a school library has been introduced. It is hoped to expand the services of each to meet the needs of all pupils. The Bartlett School Mother's Club has provided a duplicator center under Mr. Cote's direction. The center is in constant use providing enrichment materials for the Bartlett School pupils. The playground area is being constantly improved with a hot-topping program, chain link fence, the closing of a portion of Higgins Street, the filling in of the gully and the acquisition of land from an abutter. The usable playground area has tripled.

Goffstown High School

Robert Moulton assumed the principalship of Goffstown High School in July 1966 and made detailed plans for the opening of school in September with an enrollment of 480 pupils. It is anticipated that the September 1967

enrollment will approximate 550 pupils and that in 1968 there will be in excess of 600 pupils enrolled.



Goffstown High School enjoys membership in the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Currently Mr. Moulton is directing his staff in a complete high school evaluation that is required each ten years for continued membership in the organization. The work, initiated with a self-evaluation requiring nearly a year to complete, is culminated with an evaluation by a group of educators who will assess our strengths and weaknesses, make recommendations and provide for continued membership of Goffstown High School in the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Guidance



Among the many services offered at Goffstown High School is full time guidance. Through the guidance department specific services such as the following are provided:

1. Assistance with course and subject selection.

- Administration and interpretation of various tests.
- Aid in the selection and completion of post-secondary school applications.
- Arranging for representatives from various schools and the armed forces to speak with the students.
- Providing information on various occupations.
- Communication with teachers, parents and agencies as to the special needs of student.

The major concern of the guidance program is to assist in clarifying, through counselling, the normal developmental needs and problems of all pupils for whom it is responsible. This is accomplished by giving each pupil the opportunity to experience an accepted relationship in which he is helped to better understand himself and his environment and the relationship between them.

Art and Music



Art courses are offered on an elective basis to all interested students. Art aims to give the student a better insight into aesthetic values through applied visual perception in two and three dimensional form. Units such as perspective, color, drawing, painting, art appreciation, as well as modeling and sculpturing are studied. In music the present program of band and chorus will be expanded in the 1967-68 school year.

Physical Education

All physically able students (both boys and girls) are required to participate in a program that consists of games,



gymnastics, rhythms, and conditioning exercises. Aimed at physical development, health, recreation, social development and emotional adjustment, the physical education program seeks to help each individual establish a satisfactory pattern of living.

Driver Education



Driver Education is offered on an elective basis to all students prior to graduation. Held at the close of the regular school session, classes provide each student with 36 hours of training, 30 hours in the classroom and 6 hours behind the wheel of an automobile. It is estimated that 68 students will have completed the course by June of this year and that an additional 16 will complete the course during the summer session for a total of 84 students during the 1966-67 school year.

Goffstown Junior High School

There are 342 students enrolled in grades 7 and 8 of the Goffstown Junior High School.

The Remedial Reading Program voted at the



last school district meeting has been implemented.

It is anticipated that a complete evaluation of the Junior High School similar to the current Goffstown High School evaluation, will be undertaken in the very near future.

The evaluation includes assessment of the physical plant, curriculum and the staff in terms of the role the Junior High School should play in the preparation of boys and girls for high school.

These schools house Grades 1 through 6. The present enrollment in the grades is 597 students, as compared to 576 students in 1965-66.

The Maple Avenue School has 17 classrooms which presently are being used to their capacities. There are 481 students in grades 1 through 5.



In the year of 1967-68 all six classrooms in the White School will be used as the enrollment in grade 6 will increase from 116 students currently to 156 next year.

In grades 5 and 6 of the Maple Avenue School and White School the children are grouped by their achievement into seven different groups. At the fifth grade level there are three groups and at the sixth grade level there are four groups. Prior to the closing of school each year the students are given a homeroom assignment which is their reading group. The children are further grouped in their other subject areas. In grouping of the children four criteria are used, (1) achievement for the previous years in school, (2) standardized achievement test scores, (3) intelligence test results and (4) teacher recommendations. We attempt to group each child in each child in each subject area by his previous achievement.



The Maple Avenue School has a library containing 1937 books at the present time which, with the purchases made this year will bring the count to over 2000 books. Over a six year period we are attempting to bring our library to 6000 volumes to meet the American Li-

brary Association standards. The library is staffed by members of the Goffstown Mothers; Club daily from 1:00 P.M. to 2:45 P.M. The various grades are scheduled throughout the week. Grades 4 and 5 use the library in the morning under the direction of their respective teachers for the purpose of research work in the various subject areas. Our library has a good balance in type of texts, but is lacking in sufficient volumes for the number of students we attempt to service. This will be remedied by our purchasing plans over the next six years.

The grades 4 and 5 Special Class is taught by Mrs. Barbara Metivier who has her Masters Degree in special education. In this class we have students who have had difficulty in school. We are attempting through small group instruction and the use of special materials to give these students the help they need.

Curriculum studies in the areas of Science and Reading are planned for the current school year.



Remedial Reading

The Remedial Reading Program was started in September 1964 and is now in its third year. The program seeks to identify those children in grades 2 through 6 who have encountered reading difficulties severe enough to handicap them in their mastery of school subjects, diagnose these difficulties, and provide remedial help for them. The children are identified and recommended for the program by their classroom teachers.

Diagnosis is most important because it reveals and pinpoints the difficulty and

gives the teacher a specific and orderly plan of remedial instruction.

Phase of the reading program specifically dealt with are oral and silent reading, comprehension, listening, word recognition and work analysis, names of letters and their sounds, hearing sounds in words learning rate, phonic spelling, regular spelling and handwriting. Usually materials used are other than the child's basic reader. Included among the materials used are reading laboratories, a varied assortment of textbooks, workbooks, and practice exercises and library books.

The Remedial Reading teacher works with the children in small groups with the ultimate goal of attaining grade level. She works closely with the child's own teacher to assure continuation of practice to overcome the difficulty.

The length of time a child spends in the program varies with the child. Some are helped for a few weeks (usually the length of a marking period), while others stay for an entire year or longer.

It is hoped that in the near future, the work can be extended to serve greater numbers of students and to include the children of the first grades as well.



Conclusion

Refinements in the educational effort of Goffstown have improved the facilities, increased services such as full time supervision, remedial reading, student libraries and special classes. Current and proposed curriculum development will contribute to the excellence

of Goffstown education. The enthusiastic support of education generally is an encouraging sign for the future.

The continual increase in the number of boys and girls enrolled in the Goffstown schools makes it imperative that a building study committee is named to study and make recommendations relative to the immediate and future school building needs of Goffstown.

The Goffstown School Board under the Chairmanship of Attorney Richard C. Kohls has established sound educational policies and assumed its responsibility with dedicated public service and a goal of quality education for all the boys and girls of Goffstown.

I wish to acknowledge the support and cooperation extended to the administration by the school board, principals, teachers, pupils and citizens of Goffstown as well as the loyal support of the Supervisory Union office staff.

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association are available for all of the residents of Manchester, Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Goffstown, and Hooksett, regardless of race, creed, or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care and treatment according to the directions of the patient's physician. She gives the supervision and therapy that are needed for the rehabilitation of the patient. Instruction in maternal and infant care during pregnancy and after the baby comes is another important service.

The Visiting Nurse is also a health teacher who gives family health guidance.

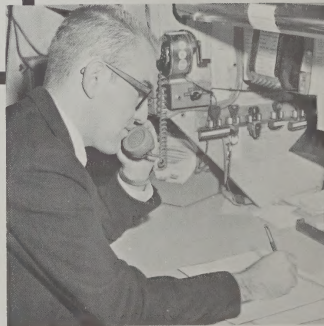
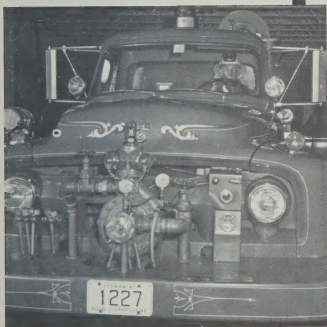
