TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salem, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at six-thirty (6:30) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.

Art. 4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, such sums of money as may be needed for general purposes in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 6. To see what action the town will take relative to lighting the streets, and raise money for the same.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000), for the purpose of providing police officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed three thousand dollars, (\$3,000), for the maintenance of the fire department for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), or any part thereof, for the removal of snow from the highways and general highway expenses.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred and forty-three dollars and ninety-two cents (\$643.92), and apply for aid from the state for Class 5 roads.

Art 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six dollars and seventy-five cents (\$1,836.75), or any part thereof, and apply for State Aid on the road from Cowbell Corner to the Atkinson town line.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to omit the printing of vital statistics from the annual reports.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.

Art. 14. By request of library trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800), or any part thereof, above the sum required by law, for the support of the Salem Free Public Library for the year 1940.

Art. 15. By request of Chester T. Woodbury. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), or any part thereof, to maintain and improve the Town Common and the Public Square near Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 16. By request of Ernest W. Young Post. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300), or any part thereof, for the use of Ernest W. Young Post, No. 63, American Legion, to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1940.

Art. 17. By request of the North Salem Fire Department and others. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), or any part thereof, for a piece of approved motor fire apparatus to be housed at the North Salem Fire Station.

Art. 18. By request of Gordon Woodbury and others. To see if the town will vote to continue the road now under construction, from the residence of Charles Smith to "King's Corner" so called, or any part of this distance and raise money for same.

Art. 19. By request of Paul Garabedian and others. To see if the town will vote to repair Salem street with gravel and tar, beginning where the tar road stops to the Methuen Line, and raise money for the same.

Art. 20. By request of Hagop Kachadoorian. To see if the town will vote to continue the gravel and tar road leading from Kelley's Crossing to No. 8 schoolhouse and raise money for the same.

Art. 21. By request of Henry J. Pendergast and others. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or any part thereof, for repair on Cluff Road from end of tar road to Foster's corner.

Art. 22. By request of Leslie H. Kohler and others. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), or any part thereof, to continue the gravel and tar road from Merrill's Corner to North Salem Road.

Art. 23. By request of Arthur L. Cullen. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar the road commencing at the fork of the road leading to North Salem and continue in a northeast direction to the Atkinson line near the Hannah Brickett Corner, so called, or any part of this distance and raise money for the same.

Art. 24. By request of Frank S. Haigh and others. To see if the town will vote to resurface and tar Church Avenue from Main Street to the residence of Frank Barker and raise money for the same.

Art. 25. By request of S. Milton Kelley. To see if the town will vote to build a permanent railing on the bridge known as the Town Farm Bridge over the Spicket River and raise money for the same.

Art. 26. By request of Walter S. Woodbury. To see what action the town will take relative to the

collection of back taxes and instruct the selectmen to issue a contract mutually satisfactory as to compensation for the same.

Art. 27. By request of Walter S. Woodbury. To see if the Town will vote to allow 1% for the collection of future Tax Warrants as per what other Towns in the state pay for this service.

Art. 28. By request of Brown Brothers. To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide a public dumping ground, and maintain same.

Art. 29. By request of Grossman's of N. H. Inc. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Willow Street and raise money for the same.

Art. 30. By request of Edgar W. Smith and others. To see if the town will vote to replace the two (2) inch water main from the residence of David Webb to the residence of Philip A. Thorpe with a six (6) inch main and then extend the main to the Frank M. Robert's place so-called and raise money for the same.

Art. 31. By request of Daniel J. Buckley and others. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main down Pleasant St. to Hall's Crossing and to authorize the Selectmen to get State or Federal aid or any other money available for same.

Art. 32. By request of Percy Powell and others. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the junction of Policy Street and Brookdale Road up Brookdale Road to the house of Percy Powell; or any part of this distance and raise money for the same.

Art. 33. By request of Arthur L. Cullen. To see if the town will vote not to exceed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for policing the town.

Art. 34. By request of Jennie E. Albert. To see if the town will vote to accept from Jennie E. Albert the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Jacob Albert lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 35. By request of Mary A. Fisk. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mary A. Fisk, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Noble Fisk lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 36. By request of Gertrude C. Quimby. To see if the town will vote to accept from Gertrude C. Quimby, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Charles A. Quimby lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 37. By request of Emma Shippe Estate. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Emma Shippee Estate, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Shippee-Whitford lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 38. By request of Flora M. Wallace Estate. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Flora M. Wallace Estate, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Lascelles C. Wallace lot No. 366 in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 39. By request of Charles H. Smith. To see if the town will vote to accept from Charles H. Smith, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Charles H. Smith lot No. 376 in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 40. By request of Edwin M. Bailey, Admr. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Viola A. Hunt Estate, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Viola A. Hunt lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

The forty-seventh annual report of the Trustees of the Salem Public Library is herewith submitted:

There have been added to the library approximately 240 new books this year.

The Trustees have sought to select books of permanent value rather than books of temporary interest only. The Trustees are also buying books of "Practical Science for Young Men" from the proceeds of the Bailey Fund.

The State Library is seeking to raise the standard of library service by conducting a summer school at Durham for librarians of the state. Our librarian, Miss Alice Hall, attended the 1939 summer school, one-half of the expense was defrayed by the state, the other half from our general fund.

From the librarian's report, it appears that the circulation is increasing yearly; the trustees feel, however, that the public could make a greater use of the library if it took advantage of the books of entertainment and instruction which are to be had for the asking:

REPORT OF THE SALEM FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department during the past year answered 105 calls, which was an increase of 28 calls over last year. The fire loss for the year was \$7,377.35 against \$8,825.13 for the year 1938. The value of the property on fire amounted to \$87,650.00. The amount of insurance carried on this same property was \$65,700.00. While the actual fire loss was \$7,377.35 the insured were paid \$6,227.35 by the Insurance companies. The trucks and equipment are kept up in fine shape. The older piece was put into first class condition by your vote of last year and should be able to give good service for the next ten or fifteen years. One of the most needed addition to the equipment to the Fire house is a washer and a drier for the hose after a fire. No hose can be kept year after year without being properly washed and dried. Five hundred feet of hose should be added this year. Thanking you, the voters of Salem for your splendid cooperation, I am,

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The school board of the town of Salem, N. H., herewith submits its annual report to the citizens of the town of Salem. The annual school district meeting was held in Salem this year at the Woodbury High School. This meeting is held by all the members of the school boards comprising this supervisory union of which Salem is a member. On this occasion, a very fine dinner was served them by a group of girls from the Home Economics department of our high school under the direction of Miss Ann Minichiello. The board was much pleased to have the opportunity to act as hosts for this annual meeting and everyone present was greatly pleased by the manner in which the affair was conducted.

During this year, effective as of July 1, 1939, our school insurances have been readjusted, so that we pay the same amount of money for this purpose each year, rather than the greatly varying amounts as previously arranged. We found it necessary to again transport children from both No. 1 and No. 5 districts where there are too many children to be adequately handled by the schools in that area, to the No. 9 school. There are considerably too few children in this district for this school so that this method provides advantages to children of both sections.

The major repairs and improvements are listed as follows: Woodbury High School: The auditorium was redecorated and the gray borders in the classrooms were repainted. A bad roof leak, causing considerable damage to the walls and floor of the girls' dressing room was repaired as were the walls and floor. The old unsanitary urinal in the boys' toilet has been removed and modern sanitary type individual urinals have replaced it. A new electric

entrance service has been installed to more evenly distribute the incoming load as well as to take care of the electric range used by the students in the home economics department. This stove and an electric refrigerator have been loaned to the school by the Granite State Electric Company for use by the students at no charge to the school other than cost of operation. We are very grateful to the officials of this company for this service for the benefit of our school children. The unsightly counter in the main corridor has been removed and this corridor redecorated. This provides additional space for the proper placing of auditorium settees and improves the appearance of the main entrance to a great degree. A fireproof safe has been provided wherein important papers may be filed, furnishing a greater element of safety for such documents and records as well as saving the cost of a safety deposit box available only during banking hours. The school board has rendered to the selectmen of the town whatever assistance it could in the starting and development of what will be a fine field in the rear of the school for outdoor recreational projects and athletics, not only for the benefit of the children of the High School, but the entire community. We sincerely hope that this objective may soon be accomplished.

No. 1 school: The field adjacent to this building has been further improved for the purposes of athletics, and while the result leaves much to be desired, yet it is serving its purpose temporarily. An oil burner has been installed here and while as yet the results are not as favorable as the installation at No. 9 school, we feel that our heating situation here is, and will be further improved by this step. The toilets here have been repaired, correcting a bad situation.

No. 4 school: Ordinary repairs were effected here because the school is in good condition. However, the position of the septic tank must be changed. It will be done as soon as the ground is workable in the spring.

No. 5 school: The walls and ceiling here were cleaned and repainted. A new closet was built in one entrance corridor for the storage of books and paper, a new shelf was built, and electric lights were installed where there were previously none at all.

No. 6 school: This school was thoroughly cleaned, two of the rooms painted, ceiling whitewashed, the woodwork and sashes varnished, several bad plaster holes and cracks repaired, and in general the school is in good condition.

No. 7 school: Some minor repairs were made here, a new pump for water was installed, and the building put in good repair.

No. 8 school: New shades were purchased for these school windows. The lattice work and woodwork at the bottom of the building in the rear was renewed and the damage caused by the breaking into the school during the summer was repaired. The old toilets now obsolete were eliminated, making room for the storage of supplies. This work together with the ordinary repairs made to desks, closet drawers, and book closets makes this building very presentable.

No. 9 school: This building was found to be in fine condition and needed nothing but a few minor repairs such as pointing up the cellar wall on a corner and patching a few plaster cracks in the inside walls.

While we feel that much has been accomplished in maintaining our school property and many im-

provements have been made, yet there are a considerable number of other changes that we hope to be able to make as soon as possible. We cannot conclude this report without some mention of our regret at the passing of Harry Haigh who had served us so faithfully for many years as janitor of No. 1 school. He was loyal to his duties until his poor health made it utterly impossible for him to carry on. We can only say "God bless you, Harry Haigh, may your reward be consistent with your faithful service."

Again, we wish to thank all for their generous support of our efforts to improve our school system and above all, for the evidences of a growing tendency on the part of most of our citizens toward greater interest in the welfare of our school children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Salem:

It is with pleasure that I present my annual report as Superintendent of your schools:

The Statistical Report is for the school year ending June 30, 1939. This report is followed by the reports of the Headmaster of the High School, the Music Supervisor, and the School Nurse.

The following changes in the teaching staff went into effect at the beginning of the present year: Miss Sarah Courser resigned her position in grade seven at the Woodbury High School. Miss Kathryn Walsh was elected to take her place. Miss Ruth Widener gave up her work at No. 4 school, and Miss Helen Rowell was selected to fill the vacancy. Miss Anna Tighe was transferred from the No. 5 school to the No. 8 school primary room to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Edna Grierson. Miss Faith Bullock was chosen to take Miss Tighe's place. Twelve of our elementary teachers completed Dr. Durrell's course in Remedial Reading last spring. Three of our teachers have taken extension courses since that time, and eight attended regular summer school sessions last summer. I feel that the efforts the teachers have made for improvement are very commendable. Our teaching force is composed of persons well trained professionally and competent in the execution of their work. The Metropolitan Achievement Tests which are given each year in grades one to eight reveal commendable work and a spirit present in the schools which brings satisfactory results. The interest of the pupils, which is strong evidence of success in school work, is mani-

fest to a remarkable degree. The schools are well equipped for their work.

The enrollment for the year covered by this report was 755, which was thirteen more than during the previous year. The school attendance averaged 94.36% of the membership, as compared with the state average of 94.74%.

There were sixty-one boys and girls graduated from the eighth grade last June. All but four of these have entered a high school this year. Olga Fedorchuk was the recipient of the medal awarded by the Sons of the American Revolution to the pupil in the graduating class of the elementary schools who has best exemplified the principles of good citizenship. The Scholarship Medals given by the Salem Board of Trade to eighth grade students, were awarded to the following:

Gold Medal—Shirley Dyson

Silver Medal—Bessie Gordon

Bronze Medal—Warren Stickney

The report presented by Mr. Atherton contains detailed information about the Woodbury High School. The fine spirit of the student body, and the efficiency of the teaching staff at the High School has resulted in constant achievement and progress.

Training in safety has become almost as much of a necessity as other fundamentals in any plan of education in this country. Considerable attention has been given to safe procedure at home, at school, on the playground, on the road, with fire and poisons, in water sports, and other varied aspects of safe living.

Our cities have trade schools and mechanic art classes, and are able to furnish this type of education

to those pupils, of high school age, that get a greater development from such experience than from the regular high school work. There is a real need for a mechanic arts shop at Woodbury High School.

Children between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one years old may be employed in industry. The working certificate, if the work is in New Hampshire, is issued by the Superintendent of Schools for the town where the work takes place. Applicant should bring a birth certificate and a statement from employer certifying that employment is being given. If work is in Massachusetts, applicant should present to the school department where work is located, a copy of birth certificate, and a statement of employment, and working papers will be given in exchange for these. In New Hampshire the certificate is required between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years. Those over eighteen years are required to file a birth certificate with the employer, and no work certificate is necessary. In Massachusetts, working certificates are required from persons sixteen to twenty-one years. Vacation and out-of-school-hours employment certificates may be obtained as formerly.

The per pupil cost in our schools still continues low. The State Board reports that in Salem the cost per elementary pupil for last year was \$56.43 as compared with the median cost of \$81.07 for the State. The per pupil cost at Woodbury High School is \$10.00 below the average pupil cost for high schools in the State.

The programs offered by the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, and Four H Clubs, have splendid possibilities for character building and development of youth. Greater community cooperation is needed to carry out these programs. These

organizations assist, in an effective way, in the educational program of our public schools.

A number of motion pictures and weekly radio programs have done much to bring interesting events and people more realistically into the schoolroom. Various clubs and activities have made the work more interesting and helpful. They tend to develop such training as social responsibility, good manners, worthy use of leisure time, habits of cleanliness, good health, and good citizenship.

I am very appreciative of the interest and activity of the School Board in their unselfish efforts to make your schools the best that available funds allow. We have worked together for another year for the best interests of the children.

I would like to express my gratitude for the cooperation of the parents and citizens, as well as to those organizations that have given special assistance.

I would not forget the loyal service and active efforts of the teachers. I give them many thanks for their support and diligence. They deserve the bulk of the credit.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To W. J. Nelson, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of Woodbury High School.

Since school opened September 6, 1939, for the fifteenth year, 298 pupils have been registered, 16 more than last year. This is the largest registration in the school's history. A table of enrollment by classes follows:

There are in school 9 tuition pupils from the following towns: 2 from Atkinson, 1 from Derry, and 6 from Windham.

Of the 37 graduates last June, twelve are engaged in housework at home. The others are gainfully employed or enrolled in post secondary institutions as follows:

- 1 post graduate in Woodbury High School.
- 2 are attending the University of New Hampshire.
- 1 is in training at the Elliot Hospital, Manchester.
- 2 are attending The Bentley School of Accounting.
- 3 are attending Burdette Business College.
- 1 is attending McIntosh Business School.
- 1 is attending Northfield Seminary.

2 are working in shoe factories.

1 is a telephone operator.

5 are working in textile mills.

2 are waitresses.

1 is working for a coal company.

1 is working for the Bolta Company.

2 are working part time in miscellaneous jobs.

Woodbury High School is fully approved by the State Board of Education as meeting state standards for secondary education. It is also accepted by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board and is thus entitled to certify its graduates to the colleges belonging to the Board, and to other colleges by individual arrangement. Since college work is much more difficult than that of high school, only those graduates who have natural academic ability, high school grades of 85 or better, and a record of steady reliability, can be recommended. Our graduates attending colleges at the present time are doing satisfactory work. Some are winning honors. This is evidence that our academic curriculum is serving its purpose.

Since the great majority of our pupils do not go to college it is right that we examine critically the type of training we offer them in our school. For the girls we have the Commercial, Home Economics, and Social Science curricula; for the boys we have only the Social Science. Our boys are in great need of a school course in Mechanic Arts. If facilities can ever be found for this, crowded conditions in the building in general and in some of our classes will be greatly relieved.

In activities outside the regular classroom procedure the school has been contributing a great deal to the general development of its pupils. In music we have choral singing, glee club, and orchestra practice weekly under the direction of Mrs. Thomp-

son. A majority of the upper classes took part in the annual school operetta "Hollywood Extra." There was a great amount of enthusiasm in the undertaking.

Physical education has been carried on with football for boys, basketball and softball for both boys and girls. Physical exercises are held at morning recess.

Good dramatic training is provided for many pupils in the operetta, senior play, assemblies, and dramatic contest. These activities include quite a large number of different pupils which is in keeping with the school's aim to provide useful experience to as many pupils as possible rather than to just a talented few.

Cooperation and responsibility are developed in the duties allotted class officers, athletic managers, secretaries in the school office, student council, pupils assisting in preparing hot lunches, selling candy and ice cream, and all other possible miscellaneous activities.

Some experience in journalism is provided the editorial board of the Ray. Training in safety is secured to some degree in the Automobile Course. Recreation in good surroundings is offered by school and class parties or dances.

All parents and interested citizens are cordially invited to visit school at any time. Any such visits which will help the training and welfare of any school pupil will be particularly appreciated.

I wish to extend thanks for the many kindnesses of teachers, superintendent, school board members, and citizens who have contributed so generously to the school's activities.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure I present my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Salem schools. Music education in our schools has developed a genuine enthusiasm and love for good music through vocal appreciative courses.

Below is a brief outline of the work done in each grade:

Grade I. Rote singing. The melodies are simple but tuneful, with easy progressions, and thus rote singing becomes a pleasureable and valuable activity. The scale is taught by rote and then from the blackboard.

Grade II. Rote singing is continued with the material placed in the pupils' hands. Notation and simple rhythms are presented here.

Grade III. To develop a music vocabulary and broaden the pupils' experience rote singing is still carried on. In this grade reading provides an opportunity for the child to gain facility in using simple elements of music.

Grade IV. Here we have a review of the music elements, which have been familiar to the child, introduce chromatics, the dotted quarto and eighth notes and easy two-part singing.

Grade V. In this grade 6/8 measure is introduced, also dotted eighth and sixteenth notes. Two-part singing is continued and simple three-part singing begun.

Grade VI. More difficult chromatics, scale intervals and triplet time are developed. Three-part singing is continued and broadened.

Grades VII and VIII. The bass clef is presented, and in these grades the pupils experience true harmony in four-part singing.

"America the Beautiful," a musical play, was presented by the pupils of Number Six School in May. Excellent work was done by the boys and girls under the capable direction of their teachers. The proceeds were used to purchase a piano for the school.

Nine pupils from Woodbury High School took part in the annual music festival held in Concord on May 12th. The boys and girls enjoyed the work and were given certificates at the end of the school year.

"Hollywood Extra," an operetta by Brown and Codman, was given by the High School pupils on December 14th and 15th.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to you and the teachers for the hearty cooperation extended me throughout the year.

Children were weighed several times during the year, and records sent home. Weight charts were placed in each school room.

Notices of all defects found were sent home to parents.
