To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, 1931, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, auditors, town treasurer, road agent, collectors of taxes, trustees of public funds, surveyors of wood and lumber, fence viewers, and all other necessary officers.

Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and such other current expenses as may accrue.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

Art. 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to accepting state aid for highway construction, and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise such amount as recommended by the New Hampshire Highway Department.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to oil the streets of Walpole Village and North Walpole, the amount to be divided equally.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$30 for Memorial Day.

Art. 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to the White Pine Blister Rust, and raise and appropriate \$400 therefor.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote in favor of granting permits to druggists for the sale of liquor for medicinal, sacramental, scientific and mechanical purposes.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for applying gravel to the River Road.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for reconstruction of the highway known as Prospect Road, from the point where the improved road now stops opposite the land of Mrs. Harry Knight, continuing in a southeasterly direction toward Christian Hollow.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve the road from the old No. 6 school-house to E. J. Stevens'.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600 for the improvement of the road from Cold River bridge to Mountain Spring Trout Club, Inc.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to widen and gravel the road beginning at the so-called Four Corners and leading past the Earl Fuller place, toward Walpole.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to gravel Knapp Hill on Wentworth Road.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to gravel the road leading from Gilson's Corner to Hall's Crossing.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to purchase from Michael Meaney a right of way over his land for the purpose of extending Center Street, so-called, to River street.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 to be used with \$160 on hand, for purchase of curtains and other necessities for town hall stage, and appoint a committee to carry out the work.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to increase the street lights in the Drewsville section by 6, the location of 15 lamps to be as follows: 1 at Mann's and 1 at the four corners as at present; 1 between R. Whitman's and Brunell's, 1 front of parsonage, 1 front of Ball's, 1 between L. Chandler's and Gallo-way's, 1 between S. Whitman's and church, 1 between Mrs. Haselton's and schoolhouse; 1 in front of Baker's as at present, and 1 front of J. W. Prentiss, Sr's.; 1 on pole below present one at C. Chandler's, and the 3 at the bridge as at present. Also that above lamps be a 6.6 amp.—60 C. P.—600 Lumens street series circuit, same as lamps in Walpole village.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a new tractor, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.

Art. 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole :

I submit herewith my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

We were fortunate in having no change among the teachers at North Walpole.

Two changes have occurred in the teaching force at the Walpole High School. Miss Mary E. Flanders, of Hillsboro, replaces Miss Hope Griffith as teacher of Home Economics. Miss Flanders is a graduate of Keene Normal School in the class of 1930. Mr. Little, instructor of Agriculture, left us November first to take up the duties as State Supervisor of Agriculture. He is succeeded by Mr. George C. Dodge, of Troy, Maine, University of Maine, 1930.

Miss Brown, Supervisor of Music in the schools since 1920, resigned during the summer to accept a full time position as music supervisor in West Rutland, Vermont. She is succeeded by Miss Amalie W. Smith of Keene.

At the No. 14 school Miss Murray is replaced by Miss Hazel Wadleigh, of Brattleboro; at Christian Hollow Miss Gladys Miller succeeds Mrs. Buswell; and at Drewsville Miss Alma Farinoli succeeds Miss Edney.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Many desirable changes were made during the past summer. New lighting fixtures were installed in all the rooms of the Village school. Lighting conditions in the third-fourth grade room were greatly improved by blocking the windows on the east side of the room, and by cutting additional windows in the north and east walls. By facing the seats toward the east, the light is admitted from the pupils' left and the rear. The

walls in this room, in the primary room, and the halls were papered and the wood work painted.

In the junior high room a partition divides the space into two rooms, thus eliminating the troublesome cross lighting that formerly existed there. The interior of the high school was refinished.

At North Walpole a modern steam heating plant with automatic control has replaced the five furnaces which formerly were used to heat the building.

A new heater has been installed at the Drewsville school.

MOTION PICTURES

An Acme S. V. E. combination motion picture projector and stereopticon has been purchased for use in the schools. A schedule of two films per week has been arranged. Films are secured from such organizations as: United States Bureau of Mines, United States Department of Agriculture, General Electric Co., American Museum of Natural History. The films are shown at Walpole and North Walpole schools each week, and occasionally in the rural schools.

TEXT BOOKS

As replacements are made in the text books, an attempt is being made, particularly in the elementary grades, to follow a definite plan. The advantage of making an adoption of various basal texts is both economic and educational. Children who change from one school to another within the union find the same books in use. Where the same books are in use in the different schools, a shortage in one school may be relieved by transferring books from one school to another.

THE MUSIC COURSES

As stated in the report of the Music Supervisor an orchestra has been organized in the Walpole school. Favorable progress has been made, although the amount of time available to the Supervisor for this purpose is inadequate, I believe that

a full time music supervisor might well be employed in Walpole. This would allow an additional day each week both in Walpole and North Walpole schools, with one day available for work in the rural schools.

In conclusion I express my appreciation of the cooperation of the school board, citizens and teachers.

TEACHERS

Our regular teaching corps remains the same as in the past three years. For music supervisor we have Miss Amalie W. Smith of Keene, who succeeded Miss Hazel Brown, resigned. Our drawing teacher is supplied from the Art students of Keene Normal school. The length of service of this teacher varies according to the supply of Art students and the requirements of their own school course. These special teachers are with us one day a week.

The desire to give each pupil in their charge the best of their ability is evident in the work of the teachers. Naturally they labor to direct and improve their pupils. The latter's advancement is a recompense to them and they work to obtain this aim. Cooperation in all plans for school progress is readily given.

COURSE OF STUDY

The Course of Study for the Grammar grades underwent some changes this year upon the publication of the revised course. The revision resulted not in elimination of subjects but in some readjustments of work between the grades.

In Grades 9 and 10 Algebra and Geometry were made optional subjects. Eleven pupils out of 22 elected Algebra in Grade 9; six out of 23 chose Geometry in Grade 10. All pupils are taught some Algebra in Grade 8. There are 22 pupils in Grade 9 and 18 in Grade 10 taking the French course. Science has 16 pupils in Grade 9. Commercial pupils in Grade 10 number 18. Latin is taken by 4 pupils in Grade 8, 5 in Grade 9, 4 in Grade 10.

DISCIPLINE

Proper teaching conditions depend upon good discipline. A survey of classroom activities would show a satisfactory atmosphere in this requirement. Minor infractions of rules occur naturally. However, all cases are handled with due consideration and settled with discretion and firmness.

STUDY HABITS

In regard to the study habits of most of our pupils there can be no criticism. These children do good work and need no urging to apply themselves to their lessons. However there are some pupils continually receiving low and failing marks as a result of poor work. In many cases I believe improvement would be shown if the parents of these pupils would check up on the actual school work their children are doing.

When reports are sent home showing poor marks, the cause of them should be investigated. A personal talk with the teacher will reveal the reason and much good will result. In Grades 8, 9 and 10 we find cases of poor work by pupils, which is due to laziness, lack of interest and insufficient study. Our investigation frequently reveals that these poor pupils do little home studying. While they have study periods at school, for the low mark pupils these periods are not sufficient. To a certain point the teachers can try to overcome these defects in these pupils but beyond that point the parents must step in and cooperate. Our experience shows that when this cooperation begins to work, a beneficial change is seen in the attitude and work of the pupil.

HEALTH

In order to avoid some unwelcome situations in this branch of school work, our teachers should have some definite rules of instruction about the time required for absence from school of pupils afflicted with infectious diseases. With these rules definitely stated by medical authority, we can act in these cases without criticism. I believe the parents would accept these rulings and follow out instruction by keeping their children at home the required length of time.

Another phase of this work might well be explained. Sometimes pupils who show suspicious symptoms of disease are sent home. Occasionally these pupils are sent back to school by the parent. In most cases, the judgment of the teacher has been found later to be correct. The teacher acts solely on her experience and observation of many children. She must have the interests and protection of the whole class in mind. This situation is explained in order to create a better understanding in regard to our work in these cases.

BUILDINGS

Results from the new steam heating system in the Kilburn building have been satisfactory. I suggest that consideration be

given to building some device on the eaves or a roof over the fire escape on the Kilburn building. During the winter months it is frequently coated with thick ice caused by the freezing of the water dripping from the eaves.

ATHLETICS

Baseball and basketball are our main school sports. We use Russell hall three time a week for basketball sessions. Two teachers aways supervise this work. Games are played with outside teams by both the girls' and boys' teams. It is a pleasure to realize that our boys and girls can meet in their own hall to watch and play basketball games.

I am pleased to report that the school is on the honor roll of the State Department of Education because of the excellent record of attendance maintained during the past year. This is the fourth consecutive time that the school has been on the state honor roll for maintaining a low percentage of tardiness. I wish to thank parents and pupils for this evidence of their co-operation.

A summary of data from the records of the five year period 1927-1931 will serve to indicate the trend in high school attendance. The figures for each year are compiled from a summary of the school register for the first twenty weeks of school.

SCHOLARSHIP

The school is approved for the current year by the State Board of Education. The privilege of certifying graduates for entrance to colleges associated with the New England College Entrance Certificate Board has been renewed. Certification for entrance to Dartmouth College is a special advantage offered to pupils who do superior work and who maintain, in the junior and senior years, a scholastic standing in the upper one-fourth of their class.

The University of New Hampshire and the State normal schools will accept graduates who present evidence of a high standard of work during the four years of high school. The rating of the school in college preparation is determined largely by the success or failure of graduates who have entered these institutions. To safeguard the interest of worthy pupils, it has been the policy to recommend only those whose high school record gives sufficient assurance of success in continued study on a post secondary level.

The school entered two teams in the scholarship contest sponsored by the State Department of Education with the following results:

Algebra — 1st. Place

Spelling — 5th place

The Gilbert Character Cup was awarded last year to Doris Hitchcock.

I wish to acknowledge the following gifts: A set of books on American History and Biography—a most valuable contribution to our library—from Mrs. Alice Gilbert. A large framed portrait of Daniel Webster—from Miss Mary Bates.

The Abigail Stearns Chapter, D. A. R., has again voted the amount of ten dollars (\$10.00) for use in the promotion of interest in the study of history and civics.

ORGANIZATION

The following phases of our work have been selected to receive special emphasis during the current year:

1. Organization of class assignments to provide for individual differences in capacity for work.
2. More effective supervision of the work of pupils during the study periods.
3. Recognition of school activities as a phase of school life.
4. Conduct of class and organization meeting in accordance with correct parliamentary procedure.

A change in the order of the daily time table has been made this year to aid in the realization of these objectives. Classes in the Academic subjects are scheduled during the first seven periods. The last period is thus left for development in the following activities: Organization and Class meetings, assembly programs, play rehearsals, motion pictures, banking, music, etc. When not otherwise occupied, the period is utilized for general study purposes.

"The Warbler" will be issued as usual this year. The work is organized as a regular part of the course in English. The pupils are at present preparing stencils for the mimeographed issue which is about ready for circulation. Miss Otis has devoted much time to the supervision of this very desirable school project.

We are again indebted to Mrs. A. P. Davis for her excellent work in directing the school plays. Miss Perkins is assisting Mrs. Davis with the work.

Basketball continues to retain its place as the major athletic activity; the school is represented by a boys' and girls' team. A schedule of ten games for each team has been completed with fair success. Mr. Dodge is coaching the boys' team with the assistance of Mr. Ladieu.

We are especially indebted to Miss Margaret Porter and Miss Perkins for the many evenings which they have given to the interest of the girls' team.

In behalf of the school, I wish to express appreciation to the townspeople who have so kindly contributed, individually and collectively, to the support of school activities during the year.

AGRICULTURE

There are twenty-four boys enrolled in the Agricultural classes as follows: Freshman 9, Sophomore 6, Junior 4, and Senior 5. The work in this department follows the four year program which was outlined in my report of last year. All classes are being held regularly at the Hooper building.

The following activities of this department are worthy of special mention:

During the spring of 1930 the boys visited the Boston markets. The trip was sponsored by the State Department of Education and was made possible through the cooperation of the railroad officials.

Five thousand four year old white pine transplants were set out on the Hooper land.

Rebuilding the swing supports for the elementary school playground furnished the class in concrete construction with a very practical project.

Much value was derived from attendance at the Eastern States Exposition. The expense of the trip is justified by the increased interest in Agriculture.

The annual fair was held as usual in the fall.

The school was represented at the State Interscholastic Judging contest. Fifteen boys comprising teams of three each were entered in the following contests: Fruit judging, dairy cattle, livestock, and forestry.

Walpole was awarded silver loving cups for first place in two of these contests; viz., livestock and forestry. It is worthy of mention that we were within two points of the highest general score. Mr. Dodge deserves much credit for the extra work which he did in preparing the boys for these contests. We are also indebted to the farmers of this town and Westminster for their assistance in the work.

HOME ECONOMICS

The courses in Home Economics this year are, "The Family and Its Members" and "Foods and Nutrition."

The aim of the course in "The Family and Its Members" is to develop an appreciation of home and family life in order that the girl may become a better member of her family group and community.

When the girls have completed this course they should have an understanding and appreciation of the home makers responsibility for health, education and moral development. The units studied in this course are: Family Relationships, Use of leisure time, Home Nursing and Emergencies, Feeding the sick, Community Responsibilities and Infant and Child Care Training.

A very helpful and interesting class project was carried on by the girls which gave a new touch of life to the cooking laboratory. The room was painted white and green and white checked curtains were made for the windows. In addition to the class projects the girls are required to carry on home projects which are closely related to the unit studied in school.

There are eleven girls enrolled in this course, which have completed the first four units and will soon begin the unit on Infant and Child Care Training, stressing the value of good habits, correct feeding, proper clothing and adequate exercise for the child.

The course in Foods and Nutrition should teach the girls by actual experience the value of food selection and preparation, through meal serving, and the value of food preservation through preserving and jelly making.

The work is divided so there is a series of lessons on breakfast, luncheons, and dinners. During the year ten three-course meals are served and a record of the food value and cost is kept.

This class put on an exhibition of canned goods, jellies and project work at the fair. Home projects closely related to the course are carried on by the girls during the year.

School lunches are being served by three girls who have chosen this for one of their projects. They obtain practice in marketing by buying for the lunches, also experience in cooking in large quantity, for they serve from thirty to forty-five people each day.

There are eighteen girls enrolled in the course. They have completed the work on breakfast. The work for the remainder of the year will include the preparation and serving of luncheons and dinners.

The girls in the Junior High School are given work in Cooking and Sewing during the year.

The course in cooking should teach the girls the correct way of preserving foods, proper methods of preparing and serving simple meals and the general relation of food to health.

In sewing class they learn to use the sewing machine, to make simple garments and to give proper care to their own clothing.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In undertaking the supervision of the music in Walpole and North Walpole, I have attempted to continue the fine training that has been started there. In the primary grades the chief aim has been to establish a feeling for rhythm, mood and beauty, first through the singing of beautiful songs suitable for the children, secondly through the rhythm orchestra and thirdly through listening lessons. This is to give the child experience in music rather than simply information about music.

In the intermediate grades the aim has been to teach a large repertoire of enjoyable songs and a sufficient amount of theory to fully understand and appreciate them.

In directing the music in the High School, I have tried to consider the educational value of the music chosen as well as its musical appeal.

A school orchestra has been started in Walpole. This has been a difficult undertaking due to the lack of instrumental training available but with the splendid help of Mr. Dalzell, a group of players are being trained. The enthusiasm of these pupils has more than repaid for the effort and it is hoped that the beginnings of an orchestra will be formed that will be an inspiration to the school.

The Supervisor wishes to thank Mr. Thompson, Mr. Russell, Mr. Dalzell and the teachers of the schools for their encouragement and help.

39 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.

11 pupils had enlarged glands.

11 pupils were unvaccinated, without proper excuse.

14 pupils were vaccinated once, unsuccessfully.

3 pupils were vaccinated twice, unsuccessfully.

265 visits were made in homes.

254 visits were made in schools.

Dental clinics were held as follows:

The total bill for this work was seventy-one dollars (\$71.00) paid for by the parents of the pupils having work done.

20 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

In Walpole a dental clinic was held April 8th and 9th, 1930, with work done as follows:

One tonsil case was treated privately.

Fourteen pupils had special eye examinations and defects corrected.

Three pupils were vaccinated during the year.

An eye clinic was held at Dr. B. D. Mousley's office, Bel-
lows Falls, March 5th, 1930, for the North Walpole pupils, at
which twenty-three pupils were given special eye examination
by Dr. Mousley.

Two underweight clinics were held May 1st, 1930, thirty-
seven pupils were given chest examinations at Walpole and
forty at No. Walpole, Dr. Luther March of Nashua was the
examining physician.

Thirty pupils, members of the basketball squads were
given chest examination by Dr. Prevost.
