TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will open at 10:30 a.m. and not close before 4:30 p.m. to elect Town Officers. The following articles will be acted

upon:

Article 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one Trustee of the Library for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one member of the Planning Board for three years, one member of the Planning Board for two years, two members of the Planning Board for one year each, and any other Town Officers.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$708.08 and accept State Aid of \$4,720.55 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a setoff against the principal payment of one Faxon Hill Road Long Term Note in the amount of \$5,400.00.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year and to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Highway Projects in the ensuing year and

to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase and installation of a 4,000 gallon gas tank and pump at the Town Garage and to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to expend any money that may be forthcoming from the Public Works Employment Act, Anti-recession Title II, on the following projects:

1. Millen Pond Dam (Faxon Hill Road)

Guard rails on pond and road embankments

2. Washington Lake Estates Road

Corner 1500 feet beyond Island Pond Dam

3. East Washington Road

Corner at "Kingsbury Hill" camp or to take any other actions in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a workshop addition to the Town Garage, subject to the availability of land, and/or to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary funds by Long Term Note.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Highway Department to plow Valley Road, so-called, (a distance of approximately 2.5 miles), and to accept from the Highland Lake Association, Inc. payment to be agreed upon by the Road Agent, Board of Selectmen and the Highland Lake Association, Inc. or to take any other

action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for heating and insulating the second floor of the Town Hall and to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see what action the Town will take regarding the order from the State Board of Taxation to reassess all taxable property in Town:

1. To vote to see who will do the reassessing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to partially defray the cost of the reassessing and to see what additional sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Fire Department for the ensuing

year and take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of one thousand four hundred dollars (\$1,400.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the paving of the Washington Fire Station driveway or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the installation of the three (3) dry hydrants: one at Millen Lake, one at Washington Lake Estates, and one on the Marlow side of Ashuelot Pond, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take relative to acquiring financial assistance for the care of the dumps from users who

are not residents or taxpayers of Washington.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for the Library Building Fund and take

any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to transfer custody of all materials purchased for resale by the Bicentennial Committee to the Library Committee, and to authorize the Library Committee to sell said materials and place the proceeds in the Library Building Fund or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see what action the Town will take regarding the

Bicentennial Committee's checking account balance.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue the preparation of a Town Tax Map

required by Chapter 426, Laws of 1971 or to see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to be appropriated towards the cost to acquire professional assistance for the Town Tax Map Cordinator to complete the Tax Maps more rapidly.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the printing of the New Town History, the same to be returned as the books are sold, and take any other action

relating thereto.

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred forty-eight dollars (\$248.00) as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the Council.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$257.00) as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the

Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to investigate the acquisition of all or part of the Camp Morgan property and the availability of matching Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR) Funds and to see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for an appraisal of the property or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate for Band Concerts in the ensuing year.

Article 29. To see what action the Town will take relative to acquiring land for an addition to the East Washington Cemetery and to see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Trust Fund for this purpose or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 30. To transact any other business that may legally come

before this meeting.

ABSTRACT 1976 TOWN MEETING RECORDS

Article 1. Officers Elected: Town Clerk, Wenonah Babb; Town Treasurer, Wenonah Babb; Selectman for 3 years, Robert Wright; Selectman for 2 years, Hilbert S. Cofield; Road Agent, Robert W. Crane; Tax Collector, Charles Dalphond; Auditor, Karin Jurson; Police Chief, Charles Wood Jr.; Fire Chief, Charles Dalphond; Library Trustee, Mary Yusko; Trust Fund Trustee, Lynda Roy. Question: Shall Town accept absentee ballots for Town Officers? Yes 107 — No 29.

Article 2. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$711.69 and accept State Aid of \$4,747.71 for Town Road Aid, the total to be used as a set off against the payment of one Faxon Hill

Road Note." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 3. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,000 for operation of the Highway Dept. for the ensuing year." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 4. Moved "that the Town vote to raise the sum of \$4,000 and appropriate the sum of \$12,401.80, (\$8,401.80 to come from State Highway Subsidy Funds) for special Highway projects." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 5. Moved to dismiss — carried, voice vote. (Capital Reserve

for Permanent Bridges.)

Article 6. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$53,604.76 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 7. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 8. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year. Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 9. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000 from Revenue Sharing Funds for a workshop addition to the Town Garage." Motion made to dismiss article. Paper ballot — article dismissed.

Article 10. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$1,500 from Revenue Sharing Funds for 3 dry hydrants: one at Millen Pond; one at Washington Lake Estates; one on the Marlow Side of Ashuelot Pond." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 11. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700 for support of the Shedd Free Library." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 12. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve the sum of \$500 for the Library Building Fund, and it was suggested that estimates of general cost be obtained and brought in at next Town Meeting." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 13. Moved "that the Town vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$251 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 14. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad." Motion

carried — voice vote.

Article 15. Moved "that the Town vote to participate in the

National Flood Insurance Program and direct the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.' Motion made "that Article 15 be indefinitely postponed until such challenges of the Federal Insurance Law now before or to be before the Federal Courts shall be brought to a final judgment." Paper Ballot — Article indefinitely postponed.

Article 16. Dismissed (pertaining further to Flood Insurance).

Article 17. Dismissed (pertaining further to Flood Insurance). Article 18. Moved "that the Town vote to elect the members of the

Planning Board instead of their being appointed as at present, beginning with the 1977 election." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 19. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to add to the Old Home Day Fund for the observance of the 1976 Bicentennial, August 6, 7 and 8." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 20. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to match the grant of \$1,000 received from the New Hampshire American Revolution Bicentennial Committee towards the reprint of the Old Town History, as a project of the Washington Bicentennial Committee; provided the entire amount is returned to the town when the Histories are sold." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 21. Dismissed (pertaining to additional funds for "New"

cemetery.)

Article 22. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to continue the preparation of the Town Tax Map." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 23. Moderator ruled question could be taken up in two parts: Voted to uphold moderator's ruling.

- 1) Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,250 and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$2,250 from the Revenue Sharing funds to buy an air compressor and component parts." Motion carried voice vote.
- 2) Moved to dismiss (pertaining to purchase of a ride-on Lawn Mower). Paper ballot dismissed.

Article 24. Report of the committee on heating the second floor of the Town Hall was heard and vote was to accept report.

Article 25. Moved to dismiss. (Relative to outside auditors for Town Books, candidate had filed for this office.)

Article 26. Other Business:

- 1) Moved "that the Town Meeting direct the Board of Selectmen to change Town Council within 30 days from date." Motion carried—voice vote.
- 2) Moved 'that the Selectmen adopt a policy of publishing in the annual Town Reports a record of the action taken at the Town Meeting of the previous year.' Motion carried voice vote.
- 3) Moved "that the Selectmen be requested to insert an article in Warrant for 1977 to appropriate a sum of money to heat the second floor of the Town Hall; this to include insulation and storm windows. Motion carried voice vote.
- 4) Voted that the Selectmen publish a summarized report of action taken and items under discussion at each Board meeting in local newspapers. Motion carried.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Willard Brown for his three years of hard work. A rising vote of appreciation was given to Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Jager for their hard work and devotion to the Town History.

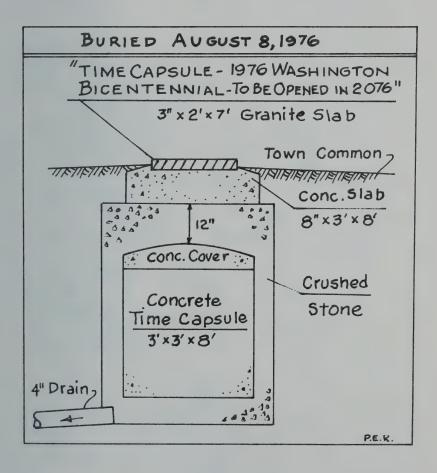

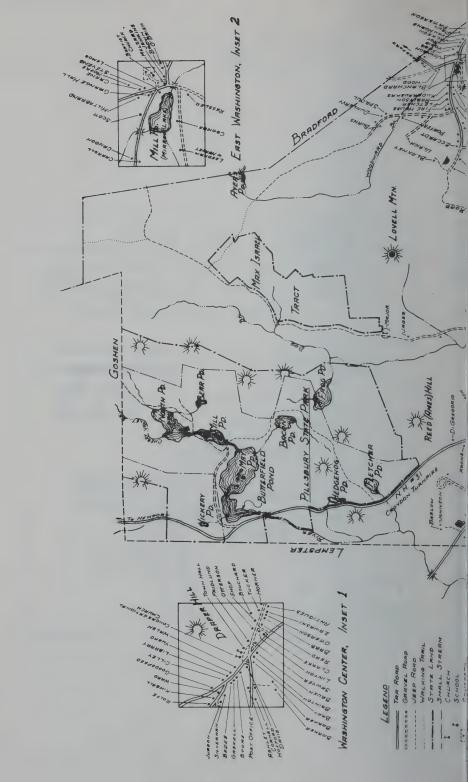

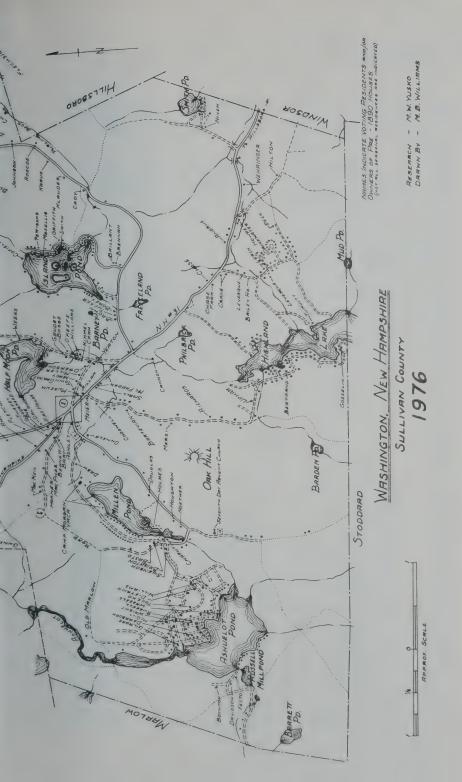

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY REPORT OF TRUSTEES AND LIBRARIAN 1976

Circulation from the 3,837 books and 138 recordings in the library and the 1,869 books from the Bookmobile totaled 6,209. This averages about 17 books per capita or about three times the average for the 217 public libraries in New Hampshire. We think this indicates that we really use our library.

For the Bicentennial, Mrs. Babb donated a beautiful handmade afghan of the town buildings which brought more than \$600 in a raffle drawn Aug. 8 to the library building fund. Proceeds of the Saturday, Aug. 7, noon dinner at the Town Hall by the Lake Ashuelot Estates Assn. and the Sunday, Aug. 8, noon lunch at the Town Hall by the Washington Lake Assn. were donated to the library building fund. On Nov. 20 Dr. James L. Hofford presented audio tape recordings of Bicentennial events to the Town, to be kept in the library as an historic record of the 200th birthday of the first town in the United States to be incorporated under the name of George Washington on December 13, 1776.

On Feb. 5, Preston Rolfe accepted the certificate of merit awarded to the Shedd Free Library for meeting the qualification standards of the Statewide Library Development Program, one of 132 New Hampshire public libraries so honored at Concord.

Book meetings at Claremont and Keene, the seventh annual Spring Conference of the N.H. Library Council at Bedford on May 18 and the N.H. Library Trustees Assn. fall conference at Concord on Oct. 20 were among the meetings attended by the trustees and librarian. Preston Rolfe is the delegate to attend the quarterly meetings of the Southwest District Advisory Council of the Statewide Library Development Program with which the library is affiliated.

During the year 66 books were borrowed through interlibrary loan from the state, University of New Hampshire, St. Anslem's College,

Keene Public, New England College and Newport libraries.

The Building Fund, including \$1,500 in a Capital Reserve Fund and more than \$400 in interest during the year, totals more than \$10,800.

Although inflation increased the cost of heating to over \$1,000 and electricity costs went up 17 percent, we think we can provide good library services next year by only increasing the town library appropriation from \$2,700 to \$3,000.

The library is open on Monday and Wednesday from 1:30 to 3:30 in the afternoon and from 7 to 9 in the evening and everyone is invited and welcome to visit and use its facilities.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For the second consecutive year I am able to report that the town of Washington had no forest fires.

I attribute this to the following fact: People are being increasingly

careful of their's and other peoples' land.

Our fire fighting forces did respond to two out-of-town fires however, the first early in the spring in Hillsboro, and the second early in the summer at Highland Lake in Stoddard.

The warden and some of the deputy wardens have been attending training provided by the state. And two young men from town have passed a Junior Forest Fire Fighters course.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the state forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three-year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in

such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The state also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of state and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the 1076 Forest Fire Statistics

past 20 years.

TOWN TAX MAP 1976

Not as much time was spent this year on the tax map started in 1973 and required by law to be completed by Jan. 1, 1980, due to Bicentennial activities. However plans and descriptions of about 51 parcels containing about 678 acres were obtained. This brings the coverage to date to about 20,200 acres of the 29,440 total acres in the town, or about 68.6 percent of the land area. It appears the remaining 31 percent can be finished in the three years remaining to the deadline. These plans have to be converted to a uniform scale of 400 feet to the inch and plotted on the Mylar sheets and indexed, to complete the tax map. We learned in November that the ASCS (Agri. Stabilization and Conserv. Service) had available aerial photos flown in 1975. Since our aerial photo base map was flown in 1953, we ordered a set of 18 enlargements costing \$13 each for a total of \$234 to update our base map. These were received in December from the Aerial Photography Field Office of the ASCS in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Expenses for the year were: Aerial photos \$234; P. Rolfe 88 hours at \$3.50, \$289.98; Soc. Sec. \$18.02; P. Rolfe 258 miles at 15 cents, \$38.70; total \$580.76.

Expenses to date: Base maps, aerial \$462, topo. \$750; plans \$153.50; supplies \$38.40; salary \$1,381.85; Soc. Sec. \$79.65; travel \$250.84; total since 1973, \$3,122.34.

TOWN PLANNING BOARD 1976 Report

The Planning Board held 13 regular and five special meetings during the year. They also served jointly with the Bicentennial Committee in planning the Aug. 6, 7 and 8 Bicentennial celebration and attended 21 meetings with them. This total of 39 meetings meant we had a real busy year. We found that so much time was devoted to administering subdivision regulations that in October we changed to meeting twice a month. Notice of meetings is posted at the Town Hall and Gaskell's Store and at present are held the second and fourth Tuesday.

Wendy Otterson did not wish to continue her term that expired in March, so Thomas Heavey was appointed in April. James Pratt resigned in May and William Rhoades was appointed to succeed him. When Tom Heavey moved to Henniker, Willard Brown was appointed in November.

Most of our meetings were concerned with the administration of the Subdivision Regulations adopted by the Town Oct. 6, 1975. A summary of this work including the 11 file numbered cases follow.

On Jan. 13, J. McLaughlin appeared for a preliminary discussion of a proposed development of 26 lots in 80 acres bordering Island Pond, and wanted to know if compliance with town road standards could be waived. Since they are part of the regulations, we had to say no.

In 76-1, Florence Robinson wanted to subdivide seven lots containing 38.3 acres from her 49.3 acres on Oak Hill among her children and annex 0.6 acres to Geo. Parker. The hearing was held Sept. 17 and approved Oct. 12. Fee \$80. Costs \$17.48.

In 76-2, on May 10, Ken Rockwell of Claremont, in a preliminary discussion of the development of 200 acres off Barden Pond Road to the Stoddard line asked if the town could share part of the cost of improving this road and if the paving of steep roads in the development could be waived. The Board gave him a negative answer.

In 76-3, Lawrence Duggan wanted a minor subdivision of 23.8 acres from his 30.5 acres on Island Pond. It was approved after a public hearing June 14. Fee \$30. Costs \$15.42.

In 76-4, Harold Proctor wanted to annex 1.4 acres to Linda Gosselin at Highland Lake Shores. This was approved July 12. Fee \$20.

In 76.5, Ken Parker appeared Aug. 11 to find out what he and his brother Geo. Parker would have to do to divide their jointly owned land on Millen Pond to comply with our regulations. He suffered a heart attack on the way from our meeting and no further action has been taken by him.

In 76-6, Alice E. Reade wanted to subdivide one lot of 5.5 acres from her 8.5-acre homestead and annex two very small parcels to W. Horner and E. Bruen. This was approved after a public hearing Oct. 12. Fee \$40. Costs \$23.60.

In 76-7, John Cummings and his brothers wanted to subdivide two lots of 104 and nine acres from their 125-acre family homestead in East Washington. Their application was approved after a public hearing Oct. 26. Fee \$30. Costs \$26.60.

In 76-8, the Atkinson-Davis Corp. wanted to annex six acres of their 44 acres to the land around the garage business on Route 31 at

the East Washington Road. This was approved Dec. 14. Fee \$20.

In 76-9, Paul Bryant Johnson wanted to subdivide a five-acre lot to Gerald Blanchard from his 96-acre Cornell place in East Washington. This was approved after a public hearing Dec. 14. Fee \$20. Costs \$16.50.

In 76-10, Gottfried Noether, through Henry Amsden, surveyor, wanted to subdivide five acres with buildings from his Oakes place at the outlet of Millen Pond. This was approved after a public hearing Jan. 11, 1977. Fee \$20. Costs \$15.52.

In 76-11, Stephen Agel of Claremont appeared to ask what he had to do to subdivide 192 acres west of Smith Pond Road from 14 acres east of the road. Since our regulations say parcels separated by a public road when transferred by sale are not a subdivision, he did not need our approval to subdivide. However he wanted us to sign the plats for registration purposes, which we did Jan. 11, 1977, and he left us prints for our use.

Other actions of the board included: On Oct. 26 we recommended that the selectmen hold a public information meeting on the reassessment order of the N.H. Board of Taxation; on Nov. 4 Robert Ward, Regional Planner, met at our request to discuss the preparation of a Master Plan, he told us we need a soils survey and we are looking into it; Chairman Barker turned over to the selectmen the information he had, to help them prepare the required state report on the open dump burning question; discussion of town roads; storage of records; heat for the town hall upstairs; warrant articles, and election of planning board members.

The accounting of all income from fees and of all payments including postal and newspaper notices will be found in the town report, as the Planning Board has no funds itself.

Chairman Barker and Sec. Rolfe attended a series of five weekly

Planning Law Lectures at Bow with expenses paid by the town.

We believe that our Subdivision Regulations are operating to the advantage of the town even though they require a lot of administrative time. We hope in the future we can devote more time to real planning work to help the town and the selectmen. We also hope you realize that in the complex world we live in today that Planning Board duties require a lot of time and work to find the answers to the many questions that now come up in the operation of a town.

1976 REPORT ON REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The Town continued membership in the regional planning commission now called the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. There are 20 member towns plus three from Vermont with 47 board members. Each town has two directors and Preston Rolfe and Thomas Heavey were appointed by the selectmen to represent Washington. They are allowed mileage but receive no other compensation. They attended meetings in Newport, Lebanon and Grantham. Preston Rolfe served on the Land Use Advisory Committee chosen to help in the preparation of a Regional Land Use Plan required by the government. He attended meetings in Newport and Lebanon of this committee.

Our town's share of the funds to operate the regional commission based on our population of 360 is \$248 for 1977. We urge the town to continue membership so we can avail ourselves of their many services. Robert Ward, regional planner, has met with our Planning Board to help them work out a Master Plan for the Town which is one of their duties. We have received information on the developments on the question of extending the deadline for ending open burning of our dump and what is going on toward a regional landfill that we might utilize.

It seems to us that the \$248 would be a good investment in planning for the town.

REPORT ON REGION ASSOCIATION 1976

New Hampshire is divided into six regions to provide information of events and accommodations for people who wish to vacation here. From north to south they are White Mountain Region, Lakes Region, Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, Monadnock Region, Merrimack Valley Region and Seacoast Region. Each has an association to handle the activities and receive some income from a state appropriation. We are in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, Monadnock Region, Merrimack Valley Region and Seacoast Region. Each has an association to handle the activities and receive some income from a state appropriation. We are in the Dartmoutn-Lake Sunapee Region Assn. and Preston Rolfe was appointed by the selectmen to represent Washington as a councilor along with councilors from 35 other towns. By encouraging vacation travel to our region, the association indirectly helped to increase our share of the State Rooms and Meals Tax to \$2,397.51 in 1976. To help meet the cost of informing the vacationing public, along with contributions from other towns and the state funds, it seems fair that they have asked us to contribute \$257 for 1977. This seems like a good investment for the town with a 9.3 to 1 return. The advertising of local services in the towns that have them, in the advertising brochures they put out nearly pays for the printing of such items, but such items as postage, telephone, salaries, other printing, rent, etc. require our contribution.

When I attended the annual meeting in New London and talked with the councilor from Andover, her husband, E. F. Magenau, retired architect, presented to the town archives four measured drawings of the town hall, made 42 years ago in 1934 by Mr. Magenau when he was in the N.H. ERA Engineering Office. I also attended meetings in Andover, with transportation paid.

The \$257 contribution seems like a good investment for the town

and I hope we can make it.

TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT 1976

The committee met at least once every month for a total of 18 meetings with Ronald and Grace Jager, to publish the reprint of the 1886 History of Washington for the Bicentennial, and the new history written by the Jagers and called "The Portrait Of A Hill Town, A History of Washington, New Hampshire, 1876-1976." Some 1,700 flyers announcing the reprint were mailed May 5 and 604 books were received May 17. One copy was sent to Profiles magazine for review: one copy was given to the town clerk, one copy was presented to the selectmen, both for town use, and two copies were sent to the Register of Copyrights, Library of Congress, Washington, D.C., leaving 599 to sell. As of Dec. 31, 359 copies have been sold for \$5,576, which was deposited in the bank as received and has earned \$130.18 in interest. The total of \$5,706.18 will remain in the bank, increasing as books are sold and earning interest, until, according to Article 20 adopted at the March 2, 1976, town meeting, when all books are sold, the money borrowed to pay the printer will be returned to the town. The committee had thought we would have less than the 240 copies left at this time, but has since learned that it takes about 10 years to sell an edition of a town history completely.

In working on the new history, some 1,700 flyers announcing it were mailed July 14 and the committee was reviewing the manuscript submitted by the Jagers as they completed a chapter. Although the Jagers have gone back to New Haven, they have kept up with the printers, Village Press, in Concord, who have not been able to meet the original publishing date of Dec. 13, 1976, our actual 200th birthday. This is entirely beyond our control, but we have learned it very often happens, and while we are sorry for the delay, we hope it will finally be available in February as now promised. To Jan. 17, 1977 we have received orders for 358 new histories and have \$6,216.87 in the bank of which \$115.81 is interest. According to the agreement signed Aug. 22, 1975, with Village Press they will expect payment of the estimated \$10,350 printing cost on March 13, 1977. This means we will ask the March 8, 1977, town meeting to appropriate the estimated difference of \$4,100 to pay the bill with the understanding we will pay that back to the town when we have sold all the new histories. In this way we hope to have two good town histories with a minimum cost to the town. although it may take a few more years to get the matter settled than we had first thought.

The committee believes that, although these books have taken a lot more work, time and judgement than we anticipated, and with the guidance, ability and work of the Jagers, without which we never would have had any books, to say nothing of excellent ones, we have done a good job for the town and hope you agree. While all town funds for the histories are recorded in the town accounts we report below our summary of the funds.

On February 21, 1976 to start our year-long celebration, a hayride, wiener-roast and bonfire was held. This was well attended and much fun was had by all.

On May 20 and 21, 1976, the Valley Forge Wagon Train was in Henniker. Our scroll bearing the signatures of many local residents as well as our grammar school children was presented to this Pilgrimage at this time.

A copy of "Perspective 76" which contains many ideas for Bicentennials was purchased and presented to the Shedd Free Library.

A brief Memorial Day program was held and our flags were flown for the first time.

On June 18, 1976, our town of Washington was presented on the "Today" program on television when they saluted New Hampshire on their parade of Bicentennial states.

A Fourth of July program was held at the town hall. A brass rubbing of George Washington which was a gift to us from Priscilla Hill of Storrs, Conn., was presented to the town. Also a painting of the town common and buildings done by Kenneth Andler of Newport, N.H., which the committee purchased was presented to the town. On this day, we joined the nation in the National Bell Ringing Ceremonies at 2 p.m. with both Washington and East Washington ringing their bells.

Through our efforts, the Bicentennial Commission presented us with a \$1,000 grant which was used by the history committee to help them reprint the old town history.

Through the efforts of two of our local women, maps were made of the year-round residents in town in 1976. Our committee purchased and sold some of these maps.

Prior to our celebration, many flowers were planted in prominent places in Washington and East Washington to help beautify our town and also many tubs of flowers added to the beauty. The town buildings in both ends of town were nicely decorated with red, white and blue bunting and our flags were proudly flown in both sections of town.

Special arrangements were made to seat Senior Citizens where they could view the parade easily and shuttle-buses were available to get the people from the various parking lots to town. The problem of parking did not prove to be the problem we anticipated due to the poor weather.

On Friday, August 6, 1976, our celebration was started off properly with a New Hampshire Sweepstakes drawing. We had a man in the audience from Florida who was vacationing in Manchester, N.H., who had the \$5,000 ticket and was present so he would get \$10,000.

Other events on Friday included a children's program with the main event being a balloon ascension. A "fun day" with different events with horses was held at the Y-field. A Computer flashback of historical events was going on in the town hall all day. A carnival was present in Ward's field and various booths were open on the lawn beside the church. Various Bicentennial items were being sold in the town hall also.

In the evening, a very successful street dance was held at the fire station with the "Maegera West" group providing the music.

Saturday, August 7, 1976, a breakfast was put on at the town hall by the 4-H club. An all-day flea market was held in Cilley's field but was forced to close due to rain. The computer flashback was going on all day again as were the booths. The Bicentennial items were still being sold in the town hall. The carnival was still open but was also closed down due to the rain.

A very successful parade was held in spite of the rain with some 50-odd entries.

The Shedd Free Library was open to the public in the morning.

At noon a lunch was held in the town hall sponsored by the Lake Ashuelot Association.

In the afternoon, a demonstration was put on by the Woburn Minutemen of Woburn, Mass. A coin auction was held when Mr. Frederick MacPhail of Keene, N.H., auctioned our coins numbers 1 through 10, 76, and 100. These coins netted us \$512.50. A dedication ceremony was held at which a plaque was dedicated in honor of Sylvanus Thayer, who lived in Washington and who became the so-called Father of West Point Military Academy.

The Washington Congregational Church was open to visitors in the

afternoon.

In the late afternoon, a dedication ceremony was held dedicating the "Washington Wood-mill site;" a piece of property on the Half Moon Pond road which the committee acquired, free, from the North American Rockwell Corporation for an historic site.

Suppers were held at the town hall sponsored by the Ladies' Auxiliary and at the East Washington Grange Hall sponsored by the

Grange.

In the evening, a square dance was held at the Y-hall with Dudley Laufman providing the music. This was well attended and a good time was had by all. This dance was the only event in the entire celebration which had an admission fee.

The fireworks scheduled for this evening were postponed due to the rain.

Sunday, August 8, 1976, the computer flashback was still going on as were the booths and the Bicentennial items were still being sold in the town hall.

The Shedd Free Library was open to the public in the morning.

A church service was held in the Washington Congregational Church with several of the past ministers taking part in the service. A baptismal service was also held.

At noon a chicken barbecue was held at the fire station sponsored by the firemen. Also, a lunch was held at the town hall sponsored by the Washington Lake Estates.

In the afternoon a dedication ceremony was held for the time capsule which could not be buried at this time due to rain.

The Hillsboro Historical Society put on a historical promenade of the town of Washington.

Raffle drawings were held for three afghans, two rugs, and a toy fire truck set.

A band concert was held with the Nevers' band of Concord providing the music.

In the evening a lamplight service was held in the East Washington Baptist Church and was followed by a light lunch in the Grange hall sponsored by the Grange. This made a very nice ending to our three-day celebration.

On August 21, 1976, the time capsule was buried.

On September 4, 1976, the fireworks that had been postponed were held at the Y-beach. These fireworks were put on by the Atlas Fireworks Company of Jaffrey, N.H.

The float of the town buildings was built in such a way that it has

been disassembled and stored for use in future parades.

The guest books used at the Bicentennial have been given to the library. Also a complete set of the minutes of all our meetings and our financial report will be turned over to the library along with a list of the

people who have the silver medals.

On December 13, 1976, our actual birthdate, a Bicentennial Ball was held in the town hall with Bobby Carle of Concord, N H., providing the music. The hall was nicely decorated with bunting and poinsettia plants. These plants were later given to local shut-ins, townspeople at the county farm, and to two women who just recently lost their husbands.

At this ball, the committee presented to the town framed pictures of the parade, and the number 200 coin imbedded in lucite along with a bronze and pewter coin showing the obverse and reverse sides.

\$584.50 worth of saleable items have been turned over to the

Shedd Free Library to sell.

The committee feels that in spite of the rainy weather, our Bicentennial celebration was very successful. We wish to thank everyone for your cooperation. It was through the effort and cooperation of everyone that our celebration was such a success.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Although the national economy has been in constant flux with increasing prices and heavy unemployment, the public services have continued uninterrupted. The public schools reflect, to an extent, our economy with emphasis on tight budget control, stringent salary negotiations and keeping at a minimum educational program changes and capital expenditures for new equipment.

Our schools are operating very well with an excellent professional and paraprofessional staff, good instructional programs and objective evaluation of student progress. We again have an overall increase in

enrollment with facilities severely strained in some instances.

As has been the case for years, legislation, court decisions and funding have created changes in educational operation. Title IX has at last guaranteed equal rights with equal opportunity for girls in school and women in teaching and administration including equality of pay. Court decisions have placed responsibility for special services for teaching handicapped children upon the local school district with very limited availability of state funding to assist multiple handicapped cases. The question of Federal funding for Title programs and School Lunch programs persists year after year pending the whims of Congress. However, in spite of inconsistent funding, many extremely important changes have come about greatly benefiting our children by providing programs and assistance for special needs.

At the conclusion of this school year I will be terminating my duties and responsibilities as Superintendent of Supervisory Union #24. The five-year tour has gone by rapidly and I look back with mixed emotions on these years. Many good changes have come about and so many things need to be done but I have had the good fortune to have dedicated school administrators and staff in the several schools working hard to improve instructional programs and educational opportunities. I thank you, the overall citizenry, for your interest, concern and willing-

ness in funding and assisting educational improvement.

On October 27, 1975, Mrs. Anna Baily R.N., School Nurse for the Hillsboro-Deering School, visited the school and conducted hearing tests on all pupils. One child was found to have a hearing problem, which was corrected with surgery.

In January, teachers were given TB tests and found to be negative. The film, "Girl To Woman," was shown to girls in Grades 5, 6, 7 and 8. The film, "Boy To Man," was shown to boys in Grades 5, 6, 7 and 8, with one parent attending.

Two sessions on nutrition were held in Grades 1 through 6. Booklets and other nutrition material were distributed to the children, and children filled out their daily menus for one week.

With the help of two volunteers from the Hillsboro Rescue Squad, two sessions in First Aid were presented to the seventh and eighth grades. These young people had a chance to try splinting "injured" limbs on their classmates. First Aid booklets, obtained from the Red Cross, were given to the pupils.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The past year has been an exciting and challenging one which has seen several new approaches to education in the Washington School. The first challenge we faced was an \$8,000 budget cut put through at last year's School Meeting. We have tried to keep the community informed on our actions in this and other areas throughout the year. In this area, thanks to a genuine effort on the part of many townspeople, we were able to come out with a very desirable alternative. The decision was made to reduce the teaching staff from three to two and hire two part-time assistant teachers. Richard Estren was hired to teach Grades 1 through 4 assisted by Nancy Powell. Jean Murdough was hired to teach Grades 5 through 8 assisted by Karin Jurson. We have had very positive results in terms of individual help and attention given the 39 students of the Washington Central School. We are recommending that this setup be used in 1977-1978 also.

An effort to help deal specifically with the individual needs of students has been the contracting with Sullivan County Counseling Center. We now have regular visits to the school to observe student behavior and discuss problems with teachers. Teachers are then able to sit down with a professional psychologist, leading to a more creative approach to student problems and much growth on the part of the teachers. We are using S.C.C.C. to do the necessary student testing. Since this is also the county agency responsible for family counseling, the benefit is in having one agency handling the school program, testing and family counseling for a student instead of three different agencies.

A new program was begun this year to meet the needs of students of legal school age who would not respond well to full-time first grade. A cooperative program between Pooh Corner School and Washington School enables these children to master skills as they are ready. Richard Estren and Ellen Hofford have worked to coordinate the program gradually working the children towards a full-time program. Reports from teachers and parents indicate that the program has met a

genuine need and been very helpful.

As school opened in September we did not have one program that we had planned on. At last year's School Meeting the School Board told those attending that we would have to participate in the School Lunch Program. The State Dept. of Education had told us repeatedly that they would not grant any waivers, all schools would have to provide lunches. Accordingly, we ran a trial program in May with borrowed cooking equipment to determine the feasibility of a preplated lunch program. The program turned out to be even more expensive than any of us had expected. When the State Dept. of Education reversed itself last July and decided that they did have the power to grant waivers "in unusual circumstances," Washington immediately submitted a request for a waiver. With the results of a trial period showing that we cannot serve an economical lunch program the State Dept. of Education granted us a waiver for this school year. We will again submit an application for a waiver for the 1977-78 school year. But until we have an answer, we must budget the money to run the lunch program.

The School Board put considerable time into the adoption of consistent policies for running the Washington School. During the past

year the School Board had adopted policies on teacher complaints, bus conduct, school closing, teacher advancement and pay schedule, paraprofessionals and field trips.

In addition we have made a comprehensive, although preliminary, statement of goals and objectives for the educational program of the

Washington School.

One disappointment of this school year was an inability to hire a qualified candidate in the area of music and art. For the past several years we have carried a \$500 appropriation for the areas of music, art and physical education. It was never thought that this would cover the total expense if a qualified teacher became available, but we felt that we would somehow "borrow" funds from another account to make up the difference. In other years we could find no qualified candidate. This year we found a qualified, experienced candidate. After considerable review of our budget we could find no money except the \$500. Unfortunately, we could not hire the man at this salary level. Accordingly, the 210.4 budget category will be proposed at \$1,000 for the 1977-78 school year.

Physical improvements at the school have been carried out during

the past year with more proposed for next year.

Following last Annual Meeting a group of parents volunteered to undertake the painting of the school in order to save some money cut from the 1976-77 budget. Before the volunteers were finished the exterior of the school had a bright new coat of white and green trim, the first floor classroom had a freshly painted floor and ceiling and the front hall had freshly painted walls and ceiling. The money saved through this voluntary effort was used to start the aide program. The School Board wishes to express its sincere thanks to all those who helped out.

The other improvement undertaken has been the installation of aluminum combination windows on the upstairs classroom. For the coming year we have propsed money in the budget for two major improvements. First, additional insulation in the attic would be a wise move. The second item is to install commercial carpet in both classrooms. We do not view either of these items as a luxury but as a wise move that will save the taxpayers money in the long run. Consider the fact that we are budgeting \$1,890 to heat a school building smaller than many of the homes in Washington! The school has a cold crawlspace under it, not enough insulation over it and no insulation in the side walls. It is our opinion that the money for the insulation and carpeting will be repaid in savings of heat and plant maintenance in three to four years.

The coming year will offer new challenges for the School Board. Faced with the resignation of Supt. Neil Cross, Washington with the rest of Union 24, has begun the search for a new superintendent. The Hillsboro School Board has applied for a grant to allow them to explore the possibility of withdrawing from Union #24 to form a smaller union. The Washington School Board will carefully weigh any possilities and attempt both to inform the community and get feedback from the community.

TEACHERS' REPORT

There is a relaxed and cooperative atmosphere among the staff this year. There is good interaction and communication between the teachers. The total functioning of the school in Grades 1 through 8 is smoother, with the emphasis being placed on the education of all students.

The teachers are working on a curriculum continuum of skills for Grades 1 through 8. This coordinated effort is an attempt to pull the school together as one working unit, and we are hopeful for the future. About the Aide Program:

The best thing that is incorporated in the school this year is the aide program. The benefits of this program are many, as described below.

There is more time to help students understand mistakes made on daily work. There is more occasion for immediate reinforcement.

We are able to make subject presentations for longer periods of time. Students do not have to wait for the teacher to finish the presentation for clarification on difficult problems. It is more beneficial to students to be able to have at least two ongoing oral presentations at a time. In the past we've only been able to give one oral per day, and now we can do two. Concurrent lessons provide extra stimulation and motivation for learning to all children, especially the more capable and advanced students.

There is more interaction and helping of students with each other. There is constant supervision for the entire morning.

It is now possible to:

a) retain continuity in learning procedures for those students who need day-to-day supervision,

b) be available for students who have minor difficulties with studies, and most importantly,

c) the highly accelerated students are able to continue striving for the education that meets with their potential.

It is very important to remember that the students who are often allowed to rely upon their own resources are the accelerated students. These students need constant supervision, as do those at the other end of the spectrum, to insure proper facilitation of their potential. Separate programs are essential to keep their minds alert and so that there is little time if any for boredom.

In the primary grades the aide has been very helpful in conferences with parents and the Sullivan County counselor, with regard to giving additional information and insight on the students and their development.

The aides also serve as substitutes, which allows for the continu-

ation of the ongoing programs.

These areas, mentioned above, are extremely essential if all students are to receive a proper education related to their best potential. The aides have helped the teachers in ways that we can do our very best for each and every student.

On Sullivan County Counseling Center Services:

We are no longer on a waiting list for special counseling. We are able to get results sooner with this service, and this enables us to set up individual remedial programs earlier in the year. The service also

provides needed professional consultation with the teachers as an ongoing process.
