

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

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

Another school year has come to a close and according to the usual custom, the people of Londonderry look for a report from those who have had oversight of their schools. By consulting our statistical table one may see at a glance the amount of schooling we have had, the number of pupils attending school, and the average attendance, and also who have been our teachers with the wages they have received. And by consulting our "roll of honor" one may also learn who among the pupils have been regarded as specially praisworthy.

In justice, however, to some whose names do not here appear, it ought perhaps to be stated that had it not been for the prevailing epidemic, this roll would probably have contained a greater number of names. And if the average attendance of pupils for the year has been less than usual, it may be accounted for in the same manner. While we have had much sickness and many deaths in town during the fall and winter, only one of our school children has died. This was Ernest H., the son of Mr. George Annis, whose mysterious and accidental death must have been a great shock to his parents, and calls for our hearty sympathy Nothwithstanding the prevailing sickness, and the fact that, in one or two of our schools, there was for a few weeks, more or less friction, yet we think all our schools have made a good degree of progress for the year. Your committee has been obliged to employ several new teachers, during the year, and a change of teachers is always attended with more or less risk.

A teacher may come to us with the very best of recommendations, and may pass an excellent examination, and yet her real worth is not known until she is tested in the school room. To be successful a teacher needs to possess tact, a knowledge of human nature, and the power to control herself as well as her pupils, and right here we desire to say

#### A WORD TO TEACHERS.

We are sorry to enter any complaint against any of the excellent young ladies who as a whole, have done their work so well during the year; but some of their number have not' been sufficiently careful in making out their registers. To return a register only partially filled out we regard as a serious failure on the part of a teacher, and one that tends to injure her reputation as a teacher. Life is made up of little things and "Straws show which way the wind blows." A word to the wise ought to be sufficient. We sincerely hope that hereafter no register will be returned till every question has been answered. The above complaint does not apply to all our teachers.

We desire also to remind the teachers of the importance of taking good care of the school supplies. See that charts, books and flag are carefully used during the term and packed away properly at the close. We desire also kindly to make

#### A SUGGESTION TO PARFNTS.

We believe that you are each desirous of having a prosperous school in your respective districts and we trust that you will be mindful of the fact that whether the school is successful or otherwise depends largely upon yourselves. We think it may be safely said that, in nine cases out ot ten, when a pupil goes home with a complaint against his teacher, the blame rests mainly upon the pupil, but if the parent listens to the complaint and takes sides against the teacher, that child may be encouraged in a wrong course, and both he and the school be injured in consequence. And if you go so far as to remove your child from the school you encourage others to do the same and so still greater injury is done to both teacher and school. Would it not be better by far, in all such cases to pay little attention to the child's petty complaints and insist upon his going to school until you can take time to investigate the matter for yourself. We really

wish that all parents would regard it as their duty to visit their school occasionally. If they could see the teacher as she is engaged in her responsible work, and notice how laborious and perplexing is that work, we think they would have more sympathy for her who toils so faithfully and kindly for the welfare of the young committed to her care, and would be less inclined to listen to complaints against her.

Parents may not only promote the welfare of the school by exercising great charity toward the teacher, but also by seeing that their children attend school regularly and that they are never needlessly tardy. The temptation to keep the larger children out of school a day or two now and then we know is sometimes great, but to do this is such a serious injury to the child that parents ought to be willing to suffer great inconvenience rather than do it. If your boy gets all the schooling there is for him he will surely get none too much. Every American youth should have, at least, a good common school education. This may be all you can give your child. Be fully determined to give him this at any cost. The mother of Martin Luther carried bundles of faggots from the forest to the village on her own back that her boy might be spared to attend school. So doing, she, through her son, greatly blessed the world. Your child may not fully appreciate the value of what you give him now but in future years he will bless you for that which will be worth more to him than gold.

If we would have our children do good work in the school room, we must, so to speak, furnish them with good tools, with which to do that work. With this thought in view we have introduced the past year

#### A NEW SERIES OF READERS.

The readers long in use were quite unsatisfactory, and we think that both pupils and teachers highly appreciate the change. More attention has also been given to the study of history during the past year than heretofore. Every school has its flag, and we desire that every child should learn to love and prize the "Star Spangled Banner." A careful study of his own country's history

will surely tend to awaken in his heart a love for his country and her flag. We have also recently introduced a "Language chart," the use of which can but be a very great help to our pupils in their efforts to learn to speak and write the English language correctly. Our schools are now well equipped for service and we trust the future will show happy results. Our school buildings also are now in a good state of repair except that one or two of them need some slight repairs within, with additional black boards. This is the case with school No. 9, The friends in this district have raised funds and purchased a clock for the school room.

This is surely a commendable act and it may be that it will inspire the friends of some other needy school to similar good works. We trust that, next to the christian church, our common schools will ever have the first place in the affections of the good people of Londonderry, and that as they have devised liberal things for them in the past, so will they continue to do in the future.


