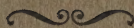

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community House in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Ways and Means committee.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectment to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes; and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to sell any available lots in the Town cemeteries; to see if the Town will authorize the said Trustees to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchasers of such lots. All sums received from the sale of such lots shall be used for the general care and maintenance of Town cemeteries.

6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a V-type snow plow and wing suitable for plowing the town roads; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) to pay for the same.

7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be set aside and added to the accumulative Library Fund for building purposes.

8. (By Petition) To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for a series of Band Concerts.

9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand dollars (\$3000) for the oiling of at least two miles of the North Pembroke Road and the Road leading to Pembroke Hill, starting at the four corners on the North Pembroke Road and going as far as Willis Hutchinson's place, about one mile, and starting at the four corners on the North Pembroke Road and going towards Pembroke hill as far as the appropriation will allow.

10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of Mr. George Lappas of a small tract of land 40 feet wide to be used in making a street from Prospect Street to Lindy Street.

11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to authorize a committee of five legal voters to investigate the financial condition and setup of all departments of the Town. This committee shall also investigate the possibilities of a Town Manager form of government and report back to the people at the next Town Meeting. This committee shall be appointed as follows, one member by the Moderator, one member by the Democratic Town Committee, one member by the Republican Town Committee, one member by the Board of Selectmen, and one member by the Chamber of Commerce.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to build a sidewalk on the south side of Glass Street starting from the corner of Church Street to the double decker

bridge. Said sidewalk to be constructed between curbstone and black road.

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum to extend the street line from the corner of Sanitorium Road to the corner of Borough road; to install a minimum of four (4) twenty-five hundred lumen street lights—one at Hobbs Corner, one at the corner of Brickett Hill Road and Pembroke Street, one at the corner of Borough Road and Pembroke Street and one in front of the Levesque residence, as these are all bus stops.

14. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install three hydrants on Dearborn Road for the protection of residents on said road.

15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote for the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200) to build a cement sidewalk starting from the residence of Norman Smith to the opposite side of Driscolls.

16. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200) to build a sidewalk from the Armand Lamy dwelling to and including the dwelling of Estate of Joseph Monty on Front Street.

17. (By Petition). To see if the Town will vote to oil the road starting at Foster's corner to French's corner and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand (\$3000) or have the use of T. R. A. money for this purpose.

18. To see if the Town will vote to confirm the action of its Trustees of Trust Funds in accepting the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

a. Gift of Thomas Brasley of One Hundred Dollars (\$100), the income to be used for the care of the Brasley lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

b. Gift of the heirs of Albert P. Mason of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), the income to be used for the care of the Mason lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

19. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

Help Your Forest Fire Warden Prevent Fires — It Pays!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who leads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy chief wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, con-

sistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
5. **HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES** — his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Pembroke:

It is with pleasure that I present to your Board my thirteenth annual report of school organization and of health and educational activities. Such recommendations, as are included in this report, are prompted by the unprecedented and increasing scarcity of teachers and the growth of pupil enrollment particularly at the vitally important level of the primary and intermediate grades.

By closing the Borough School, last September, the teaching staff has been reduced to seven full-time and two part-time teachers.

In the Suncook School Mr. William John Belcher of Newmarket replaced as principal Mr. William O. Frazer who is now teaching in the Marlboro high school. Mr. Belcher graduated from Norwich University in 1941. While in the armed forces he served as an instructor for nearly four years. He has since taken graduate courses in Education at the University of New Hampshire. His training and experience make Mr. Belcher a valuable addition to the school and community.

You are fortunate to have regained the services of two pre-war teachers: Mrs. Anne W. Gladysz of Manchester in the Fifth and Sixth Grades, and Mrs. Madelaine W. Hyde of Pembroke Street in the Seventh Grade.

Mrs. Mabel E. Reed of Manchester was selected to succeed Mrs. Martha F. Gale as Supervisor of Music in the elementary grades. Mrs. Reed is a graduate of the music supervisor's course at Keene, and has taken graduate

courses at Boston University. She formerly supervised music in the schools of Peterborough and more recently in the elementary and secondary schools in this Union.

In September 1946 the enumeration of children between the ages of five and sixteen years totaled 439. Of this number 171 were attending public elementary schools in Pembroke. Twenty-one children between the ages of five and eight years were not required to enter school this year; one was excused from school attendance. The remaining 246 were enrolled either at the Academy, or in public or private schools in other towns.

In the Suncook School the present enrollment by rooms is normal for grades Three to Eight inclusive. More children could be accommodated in the 7th and 8th Grades. The number—thirty-nine—in the 1st and 2nd Grade Room is excessive. At this grade level the enrollment should not exceed twenty pupils to a teacher.

The delayed opening of schools in September, due to the prevalence of poliomyelitis in the state, and the excessive teacher load are reflected in the average achievement of the primary grades. The achievement in the intermediate grades continues high. These Metropolitan Achievement scores, expressed in "Grade and Month", are shown for a period of three years.

Following recent investigations of the relation between handwriting and proficiency in acquiring reading skill, a modified form of manuscript basic handwriting has been adopted in the First Grade. It is intended eventually to

continue this system through the Second and Third Grades. In the intermediate and upper grades the Zaner-Bloser Correlated Handwriting has replaced the Houston System for which materials are no longer available.

Through the excellent film library now maintained by the University of New Hampshire, and with the Bell and Howell SOUND-ON-FILM projector, purchased by Pembroke in conjunction with four other districts in this Union, visual education is made a part of the classroom procedure in teaching geography, history, health, music, safety and science.

The annual spelling contest, that was discontinued by restricted transportation during the war, has been restored this year. This contest is open to all pupils in grades three through eight in the schools of this Union. A trophy cup is held for a year by the district whose team of three members has the highest total score. Any district, having won the contest three times, holds the cup permanently.

During the year ending in June a total of 168 children were examined by the School Nurse, Miss Adonia A. Douillette. Of this number, 145 were given the T. B. Patch Test, and later six were X-Rayed by Dr. Kerr. Five out of 8 cases of defective vision were corrected. The diphtheria toxoid treatment was given to 35 school children. Communicable diseases were confined to 7 cases of Chicken Pox, 2 of Skin disease, and one each of Measles and Whooping Cough. Of 144 dental defects more than forty per cent were corrected. Over sixty percent of the tonsil-adenoid cases were corrected. The frequency with which poliomyelitis appears, where dental conditions are poor, has resulted in closer attention to dental defects both by the home and by the school.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Monty and Mrs. Chase, members of the School Board, school lunch service at the

Suncook School was opened in December under the direction of Mrs. Marion A. Lea of Suncook.

Mrs. Lea's duties include the planning of menus, ordering supplies, preparing the lunches, and the keeping of accounts with the state and federal agencies. The recently adopted program of federal aid enables her to serve a complete lunch at a "below-cost" price to school children.

The lunch, consisting of a hearty dish, vegetable, cooked or fresh fruit, bread, and milk, actually costs more than 20 cents. For this the children pay 15 cents, and the government contributes 9 cents for food and labor. The government also shares the cost of non-food materials, such as refrigerators, ranges, gas and electric units, kitchen utensils and dishes.

The estimated budget for the coming year calls for approximately \$6,000 more than the appropriation made in 1946. Of this increase more than \$5,000 represented under the three items — teachers' salaries, academy tuition, and transportation. The remaining increase is chiefly absorbed by elementary tuition. For the next year this has been raised by the Concord School Board to \$135 per pupil. This tuition is required for several children who live in a section of North Pembroke, located on the Concord-Dover highway. It has been suggested that this very small area between the town lines of Chichester and Loudon might be set off for school purposes into Concord.

The enactment of House Bill No. 12, now before the legislature, or similar legislative bills to be presented, eventually may reduce the local share of school appropriation by approximately \$13,000. However, it is not anticipated that these bills will receive final action by the legislature before the date of your annual school district meeting. It appears that the total financial means for the maintenance

of your public schools ,during the year of 1947-1948, must be raised and appropriated by the district of Pembroke.

For the present year Pembroke is maintaining two of the 196 one-room schools now operating in the state. The Hill School has the distinction of being the only one-room school in this Union now open to all eight grades. You have in these schools conscientious and experienced teachers, capable of rendering greater educational service to your community if given larger groups of children and less grades.

The erection of a modern building on or near Pembroke Street may eventually become practical. The scarcity of materials and labor must defer any new construction for the present. In the meantime several modern school buildings have been studied by your committee and the architect's preliminary plans made both for a new four-room building and for an addition to the present Suncook School. Tentative plans for the Suncook addition and an application for government money to finance completed plans, specifications, and contractor's estimates were presented in December to the Federal Works Agency and approved by the Agency for the sum of \$6,550. This is a loan without interest, available — if accepted — for four years, and not repayable to the government until contract is made for the actual construction.

This action was immediately prompted by the increasing enrollment in our primary grades. Today with only one teacher in charge of approximately forty children in the first two grades ,these beginning pupils are not getting what belongs to them. They are entitled to more individual attention from two teachers and to an additional classroom. A public kindergarten is almost a necessity today. The room is not available. To these conditions we must add the rapidly growing cost of teachers and the

fact that, no matter how large the salary offered, New Hampshire simply hasn't additional teachers who will consider teaching a school of more than one or two grades.

The plans, presented to the Federal Works Agency, also emphasize the need for a public meeting place of adequate size in Pembroke — an auditorium-gymnasium that will seat at least 450 people. Being a part of the school building, this auditorium is intended to serve daily the regular classes in music, visual education, and physical instruction and will provide ample room to serve noon lunches to approximately 100 school children.

But more than this it offers facilities for the civic and social life of the people of the town. Modern kitchen facilities, shower and locker rooms, approved sanitary equipment, and ample stage and seating equipment are included in the estimated cost.

The acceptance or rejection of this government proposal must be decided by vote of the school district.

In conclusion, I wish to commend most heartily the services being rendered by the principal and teachers, and by the school nurse to your schools and thus to your Community. Your janitor has taken keen interest in the care of the school buildings and in the improvement of the heating facilities in the Suncook School. The spirit of loyalty to the American system of education has been shown by the parents and citizens. The cooperation, extended to the superintendent, principal, and teachers, by the members of your Board and the people of the community, is sincerely appreciated.

Teaching Staff and Enrollment

Due to the prevalence of polio in the vicinity, school did not open at the Academy until Monday September 16, 1946. There were eight regular and two part time teachers and 170 pupils. This number was later increased to 177.

Mr. Currier succeeds Mr. Lloyd Creighton who is working at Boston University for his Master's Degree in Education. Miss Ann McCushing succeeds Miss Sally Colletto who left the profession to be married. Miss Rosamond Batchelder succeeds Mrs. Frances Waldo, and Miss Pitraszkiewicz succeeds Lorna Ann Jillson in Home Economics. At present writing Mr. Claude Lacouture has tendered his resignation which was received regretfully by the trustees to become instructor in the rehabilitation program of the veterans in Togus, Maine. In his place the trustees have hired Mr. Ernest Proulx a New Hampshire graduate of Raymond High School and of Keene Teachers' College in the class of 1947. Mr. Proulx was a member of the

Marine Corps and spent eighteen months in the South Pacific. He is also a graduate of the Officers' Candidate School at Quantico, Virginia. Because of the large number of pupils each teacher's load is very heavy and does not permit much extra curricula work in guidance, testing, etc.

Miscellaneous

Basketball: The boys have been fortunate in having several men to help coach them in basketball. Mr. Lewis and Mr. Currier have worked with the varsity and junior varsity teams and Mr. Lacouture has spent at least a day a week with the Freshmen teams. The boys have won 8 games and lost 5 to date while the girls have won 10 and lost 3. John Carr is captain of the boys' team and Frances Chroniak is the girl's captain. The final league game—the all star game—will be played at Hillsboro the first week in March. Miss Pitraszkiewicz has charge of the girls' basketball and there is a good number of girls reporting for practice each day.

Social Activities: A memory prize speaking contest under the direction of Mrs. Morrill was held December 12, 1946. The English teachers conducted the preliminary contest and eliminated all but twelve for the finals. The Winners were Barbara MacLean, first; Shirley Beal, second; Judson Sanderson, third; and Phyllis Johnson, fourth. Mrs. Morrill will have charge of the school play in the spring, or help with the production of the operetta.

Early in the fall a Halloween Ball was held under the auspices of the Freshmen class. This event was socially and financially successful and should encourage the Freshmen to

even greater heights in the future. A Valentine Ball organized and run by the various classes in the school will be held on Saturday February 15. In November the Senior class presented the three act comedy "Jumpin' Jupiter" to a large audience which was enthusiastic in its approval of their work.

Music: Mrs. Mabel Reed is with us again this year. Her choral groups have presented numbers at the prize speaking contest and at the Christmas assembly. Last spring she directed a large group in the operetta "Rose of the Danube". In this she was assisted by Miss Frances McCushing and Mrs. Morrill.

Fire and Traffic Laws: Fire drills have been held regularly at least once a month. All extinguishers in the building have been refilled and in the near future we are planning to fireproof the curtains on the stage. Safeguards are taken in avoiding fire hazards when decorating the gym for dances and similar functions. In my report of a year ago, I mentioned the hazard of being compelled to walk in the streets because the side-walks are not plowed regularly. When walking in the street pupils should stay on the left-hand side, the side of approaching traffic and should be careful not to walk arm in arm. In keeping with the physical program for all, I hope to organize a play day for all pupils in the spring and do more with winter sports another year. This is difficult to do when teachers live and work out of town.

Regular diplomas have been issued to the following boys for sufficient credit gained while in the service toward completing the sixteen units of credit necessary for graduation: Gerald Gardner, James Cormier, William Edmonds, and William Welch.

This year completes my tenth year of service at Pembroke Academy. Progress has been gradual, and marked

in certain fields. There is much work to be done in the guidance and social service fields as well as in Physical Education. An active alumni Association could help materially in the solution of some problems.

In closing may I say that it has been a pleasure to work with you Mr. Harmon, and with the trustees and teachers of Pembroke Academy. High standards are not easy to attain but they certainly are worth every effort that we all can give. The cooperation of parents is earnestly solicited at all times. Pupils have so many home, church and community interests outside of school that it is a real task at times to find time so necessary to the attainment of desired goals.
