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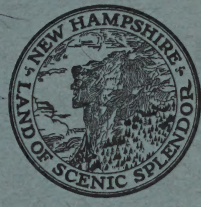

## *Town Warrant, 1927*

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at Nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

Sec. A. Town Officers' Salaries.

Sec. B. Town Officers' Expense.

Sec. C. Election and Registration.

Sec. D. Municipal Court Expense.

Sec. E. Town Hall and Office Expense.

Sec. F. Police Department.

Sec. G. Fire Department.

Sec. H. Health Department.

Sec. I. Vital Statistics.

Sec. J. Tarvia Maintenance.

Sec. K. Trunk Line Maintenance.

Sec. L. Town Maintenance.

Sec. M. Breaking Roads and Snowing Bridges.

Sec. N. Libraries.

Sec. O. Town Poor.

Sec. P. Memorial Day.

Sec. Q. Damage and Legal Expense.

Sec. R. Interest.

Sec. S. State Tax.

Sec. T. County Tax.

Article 3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounting taxes.



Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town, the sum of \$40,000, if needed.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State Aid for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Flashing Beacon now in operation at Mechanic St., North Conway, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$290 to pay for the same.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Scarifier Attachment for the Steam Roller, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$850 to pay for same.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the school house near the Frank Dolloff place to the Madison road near the Will Keefe place.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to repair the Davis Hill Road in South Conway, agreeably to a petition signed by Reuben J. Marvel and others.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350 to re-surface the road in East Conway, agreeably to a petition signed by J. Waldo McIntire and others.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to repair the Green Hill Road, agreeably to a petition signed by Bert E. Smith and others.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to put in repair and tarvia the highway in Kearsarge Village, from C. J. Philbrook's to the Bartlett line, agreeably to a petition signed by George W. Russell and others.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to repair and tarvia Seavey Street, from Main Street to Kearsarge Street, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for the same, agreeably to a petition signed by Neil C. Cates and others.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to prepare and tarvia Mill Street in Conway Center from Main Street to Mill Bridge agreeably to a petition signed by Myron L. Smith and others.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to purchase suitable snow plows and tractors to be used in breaking its roads in Winter, agreeably to a petition signed by George A. Yeaton and others.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to repair and tarvia the road beginning at Saco River Bridge to the so-called Lovejoy Brook Bridge, on the road which leads to Echo Lake and Diana's Baths, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for the same, agreeably to a petition signed by Arthur O. Lucy and others.

Article 18. To act upon any other business that can legally come before said meeting.

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### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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School Board of Conway:

I am writing my report as a part of your general report and including the reports of Headmaster McKeen and the school nurse.

At the beginning of the school year an arrangement was made with the school boards of Madison, Eaton, Freedom and Effingham to unite with Conway for the support of a school nurse. The four towns first mentioned pay a little less than one-third the cost and receive a proportionate share of the service. For this year the state will reimburse Conway at the rate of one dollar for each elementary pupil.

The equalized valuation of Conway has been raised from 3,381,073 to 4,854,015. The \$5 tax for elemen-



tary schools this year was \$16,905.00. On the new valuation it would be \$24,270.00. In 1924-25 the cost of elementary schools was \$24,539; in 1925-26 it was \$23,771. The present budget anticipates an elementary expense of \$25,070. From this it will be seen that after next year Conway will receive little if any aid from the equalization fund. The amount received this year was \$4,720.

During the summer the school house at North Conway was reshingled. An adequate and reliable water system has been installed at Conway Center, and changes made in the heating plant which are expected to minimize the danger of freezing and other troubles which have been prevalent there.

The program for repair next year should include:

- (a) Inside and outside painting at East Conway.
- (b) Rebuilding toilets at Redstone, West Side and Kearsarge.
- (c) Inside painting at Kearsarge and West Side.
- (d) Securing a water supply at West Side.

The clerical and administrative work of the superintendent in this union is necessarily great, and does not permit him to give as much time to class-room supervision as the need demands. An office with adequate equipment should be installed at the Kennett High School where a great deal of clerical work could be done as office practice by pupils of the commercial department.

I wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation and loyalty of the teachers and school officials.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

---

Superintendent John H. Fuller:

In compliance with your recent request, I submit the following report of the activities of Kennett High School.

The High School opened in September with the following faculty:

E. W. McKeen, Headmaster, Mathematics.

F. C. Marston, Sub-master, Athletics, Science and History.

Mrs. B. C. Butterfield, English.

Miss Grace E. Smith and Miss Mary E. Rines, Commercial Subjects.

Miss Marion F. Brigham, Languages.

Miss Margaret R. Ward, History and English.

All of the above corps are teachers of experience, ranging from one to twenty-one years. They have shown a markedly high morale, and form one of the ablest groups that the High School has enjoyed. Under their direction the scholastic development of the school has been marked, and the school discipline, in the main, excellent.

Our registration to date has been 143, of which 72 are girls and 71 boys, divided as follows: 1 Post Graduate, 16 Seniors, 23 Juniors, 52 Sophomores, and 51 Freshmen. Ten of our students come from outside of Conway, as follows: Albany, 1; Freedom, 1; Bartlett, 3; Berwick, 1; Eaton, 2; Minot, Maine, 1; Manchester, 1. In subjects, they are divided as follows: English, 137; Mathematics, 100; History, 95; French, 74; Latin, 49; Science, 32; Typewriting, 60; Shorthand, 18; Bookkeeping, 62; Commercial Geography, 22.

During the fall term, 28 pupils maintained an average grade of 85% or better, entitling them to certification to college without the necessity of taking entrance examinations. The group of colleges, recognizing this certification, includes Amherst, Bates, Boston University, Bowdoin, Brown, Colby, Massachusetts Agricultural College, Middlebury, Tufts, Wesleyan, and Williams. This number of students is almost exactly 20% of the fall registration; a very excellent record, but one which should be and can be considerably improved by closer cooperation between parents and school.

Turning to the dark side of the picture, 83 courses out of a total of 631, or 13 1-3%, were failed. Of this number only a small part of failures were unavoidable, and the matter should receive close consideration of the school authorities and parents. The scholastic work of the school is on a sound basis, but only constant thought and work on the part of the teaching corps and townspeople will keep it abreast of the other schools of the state and country.

In regard to attendance, the school register shows 47 pupils with perfect attendance, neither absent, tardy, nor dismissed, during the fall term; just a trifle over one-third of the students, and another fine record. For the month of January, this figure is considerably too high, for several reasons: Transportation troubles, especially from Redstone, North Conway, and Intervale; a feeling that our local students should be exempted from any hardships which, had they occurred in the path of pleasure, would fail of consideration; illness incident to our winter weather. Several pupils have walked from North Conway to school upon missing the train. They are to be commended for their

efforts, rather than censured for their tardiness. A more general practice of such determination throughout town would be well repaid. When one stops to consider that at best we have only 180 days of school, and that holidays cut that close to or below 170 days, each absence becomes of importance. There were 81 instances of tardiness during the fall term, largely among the students from Conway village. This should be stopped, as in nearly all cases it is unnecessary, and leads in a vicious circle to carelessness and license.

So far this year we have lost seven pupils; two of whom are attending other schools, one has returned to the grades, and another left because of illness. It is probably true that students who do not want to go to school will do consistently poor work; but it is still truer that they are a real menace to the town unless they are in school, or otherwise employed. The townspeople should aid the school in impressing these young people with the fact that the competition of life will probably deal roughly with the unfit, and the habitual failures. The problem of these boys and girls is one of the most perplexing in school administration. Individually they may be better off in school, but the influence of these drifters upon the upper ninety percent of the student body is entirely bad, regardless of the personal good qualities which they may have in no small abundance. At present, it has seemed best to allow them to leave quietly, hoping that later they may see their mistake and return, which unfortunately, they seldom do.

Student activities may be grouped under the head of Athletics, Music, Debate, Drama, and Societies. The record of athletic teams for the current season seems destined to be one of our best, and the activities them-



selves are reaching a large number of students. About fifty boys have reported to Mr. Marston for football or basketball; and this total should increase during the spring term, when baseball comes into its own. About thirty girls have reported for basketball, of which number some eighteen or twenty are regular in attendance at practice. In all, we have active participation in organized play of better than half of our student body; the best record for the school as yet. As fine as this record is, we are far from content. The teaching corps believes this should be nearer 100% than 50%, and to that end, I should advise the inclusion of track as a major sport for boys, field hockey and track for the girls, and the construction of two or three tennis courts for general use. Further, I believe that one of the women teachers should have control and supervision of the girls' activities; although this would call for the employment of a specialist in this line.

For the first time, a school orchestra and a glee club are in prospect. Miss Russell has twelve students reporting once a week for the orchestra, and about sixty for the chorus. We expect to see results before the close of the year. It is unfortunate, due to the schedule enforced by the running time of the Boston and Maine Railroad, that more time cannot be given to this side of our school life.

After having been members of the debating league for three years, and suffering handicaps due to our position and grouping, a new grouping was announced from the University and a new plan, which called for some six or eight debates, with a total expense of from two to three hundred dollars. This seemed too expensive of both time and money; hence debate will



be limited this year to class contests, and possibly debate with our natural rivals.

The Senior class will present a drama in March; the Juniors early in the spring term; and it is hoped that during the spring term, a production from the entire school may be given.

Socially the school life is dormant. The Kennett Keys, a strictly scholastic society of the Senior and Junior classes, is the only active group. The K Club, the membership of which is limited to those who have won the school letter in athletics, is inactive.

The Kennett Kommet, the school paper, will be issued during the spring term under the editorship of Miss Doris Perkins.

Among our former students and alumni, there are 14 at the University of New Hampshire; one each at Springfield, Y. M. C. A. college, Boston University, Dartmouth, and the University of Florida. Of this group that has gone to college, only one student has failed to make a creditable showing, and that one has since made good. At the University, Mr. Davis and Miss Lord are members of the varsity debating teams. Of the four pupils at the University as Freshmen from Kennett, the average grades range from 78.5 to 90.5, Miss Towle being credited with the latter very excellent mark. The average of these grades is 84.2%.

Such in general is a brief survey of Kennett High School. Our objectives to date have been the establishment of a firm scholastic foundation, especially for our boys and girls who wished to go on with their education, to build up a school spirit and morale, to develop trustworthiness and dependability, and to aid in rousing the ambition, both physical and moral, of our boys and girls. None of these can ever be neglect-

ed, but other objectives should be added, as these become more and more nearly realized. It seems that the time is with us when we should more closely consider the groups of students who will never leave town for further education. It would seem that a survey of present and prospective students should be made to determine if the time for the re-establishment of the course in Domestic Arts has not arrived. The Commercial and Business Curriculum should be enlarged and brought more up to date. It should not be necessary for the graduates from our commercial course to leave town longer than a few weeks, in order to qualify for any position open to a graduate of a business college.

It is more or less agreed that the Social Science subjects in general are as poorly organized and taught as any in our school systems throughout the land, and this has been especially true at our school. The subject has been assigned as last resort courses, and results of this carelessness are very evident, especially in History I. In four years, we have never been able to present even a creditable record in this course. If History is important, and it is generally so recognized, it seems to us that it is entitled to more consideration; and I should suggest that one teacher be hired to organize and direct this department, and be made responsible for its development.

A high school without an efficient, but not necessarily extensive library, cannot be geared in high speed. We have been promised from time to time in the past definite appropriations for such use, but the money has never been forthcoming. I should suggest an annual budget of at least seventy-five cents per

pupil. From time to time a part of this will need to be expended for shelves.

In closing, it might be well to urge that a fair estimate of the success or failure of a school can be judged only by personal observation; hence we believe more townspeople should visit our class rooms.

I want to thank the student body, the teaching corps, townspeople and School Board, and especially you, for the many courtesies I have received, and for the spirit of cooperation and loyalty that has been shown at all times.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

---

To the Townspeople of Conway:

My duties as school nurse here commenced Oct. 5, 1926, and this report includes some of the introductory work up to the latter part of January, 1927, but at best it is rather an incomplete account. Much of the work done is not that which shows in a statistical report.

590 school children have received the routine examination which includes weighing and measuring. In some of the schools the school physician has made his examination.

With two exceptions every school has its underweight group. Some of these I feel are due to remediable physical defects, but in many cases it is relieved by change in diet and amount of sleep.

A few suggestions were given to one underweight group in one of the grammar schools and with very little supervision they all made some gain, due to some change in their usual regime; and several showed very worthwhile improvement.

I feel that more can be done for the younger underweight children as I become better acquainted with the parents.

The one thing needed by the greatest number is dental treatment.

The longer I work here, the more I realize how much the physicians have done for the children. I think the community most fortunate to have doctors who are so interested and willing to do for the school child as these men are.

## WATER SYSTEM

### CENTER CONWAY SCHOOL BUILDING

In order to maintain the original heating and toilet system in this school building a new water system had to be installed. The old system consisted of a two inch pipe and well-point driven into the sand twenty-seven feet, and located one hundred and forty feet west of the building. The Power Unit consisted of a single action power and hand pump, and a two horse power motor. Due to the quick-sand conditions below the water level in the driven pipe it was impossible to pump sufficient water to supply the heating and plumbing equipment.

After careful investigation it was decided to sink a thirty-six inch diameter Tile Casing to a depth necessary to obtain a necessary flow and storage of water. In sinking the casing, quick-sand and a quick flow of water was encountered at twenty-three feet below the surface. This made the work difficult and hazardous. In order to overcome the quick-sand a large quantity of crushed rock had to be placed around the outside of the casing to follow down and to form a filter and reservoir at the bottom of the well twenty-eight feet from the surface.

The water flow at the time the well was completed amounted to about six gallons a minute, which is considered a good average at this locality.

A pipe line from the well to the boiler room consists of three hundred feet of one and one-half inch galvanized pipe, buried five feet below grade.

The Power Unit consists of a double action four hundred gallons an hour "Duro" pump and motor, automatic control, and directly connected to a Pneumatic System with pressure range of twenty-five to forty-five pounds.

The installation of this new equipment provides for an approved sanitary plumbing system.
