

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the own will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

ART. 3. To see what action the town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town, the sum of \$40,000, if needed.

- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State Aid for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to buy the flashing beacon for use at Mechanic Street in North Conway, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$290 to pay for same.
- ART. 8. To see what action the Town will take in regards to observing "Old Home Day" in Conway for the year 1928 and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the same.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to demand a flagman for the Maine Central Railroad crossing at Intervale for the entire year and to extend the hours of the crossing tender at the crossings in North Conway Village on the Maine Cenral Railroad to cover the evening trains.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to put in repair and tarvia the highway in Kearsarge Village from C. J. Philbrook's to Bartlett line, agreeably to a petition signed by George W. Russell and others.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to study the advisability of the establishment of an aviation field and report at the next meeting, agreeably to a petition signed by Clifford H. Craig and others.

- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the snowplows and tractors now operating in Conway on lease and raise and appropriate \$5,187.50 to pay on same and hire the balance of \$5,000 on the credit of the Town, agreeably to suggestion of the Budget Committee.
- ART. 13. To see what other action the Town wishes to take in regards to purchasing or leasing snow removal equipment and hire a sufficient sum of money to carry this article into effect.
- ART. 14. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Citizens of Conway:

The accompanying statistical reports of the Librarians at Center Conway and Conway show a larger circulation of books than in any other previous year. The interest in our town libraries could be materially increased were there enough money to allow the purchase of more and better books.

It has been the custom each year to allow \$100 to the Library at Center Conway for the purchase of books. Occasionally there have been individual gifts. This year Mrs. Mary Comstock gave a generous check. Mrs. Littlefield, the Librarian at Center Conway sends to the schools in South Conway and Center Conway a supply of library books that the teachers in these schools use for supplementary material. There is need of a reclassification of the books in this library, also more book shelves are needed.

The Conway Public Library, given to the town by the heirs of Thomas L. Jenks of Boston, was opened to the public in June, 1901. From that time until 1927 there has been but minor repairs made to the building. In January of last year the walls and ceilings of the Reading Room, Alcove and Vestibule were refinished. This work was most satisfactorily done by H. L. Robinson and F. A. Rawson. There are yet three rooms in need of similar repair. It was hoped that the appropriation of 1927 would permit this to be done, but the money in excess of the running expenses had to be used to replace worn out parts of the furnace. It would be economy to make these repairs soon.

The records of the Librarian, Miss Pollard, show that in the last ten years the circulation of books has increased 100%, and the Reading Room attendance has increased on an even greater scale. Since the opening of the Kennett High School there has been a greatly increased demand for reference books. The books that have been added to the Library at Conway have been contributed by various agencies and individual donors. These gifts have always been most acceptable, but to permit this Library to adequately serve the town there is need of an annual appropriation for the purchase of worth-while books. We have a most creditable building, but altogether too many empty book shelves.

This year Miss Pollard has established two deposit stations, one at the West Side School and one at the Kennett High School. There should be a greater cooperation between the town libraries and the schools, and to permit this it will be necessary that an adequate sum of money be included in the Library Appropriation for the purchase of such books.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Conway:

As a result of the increase of valuation Conway receives this year no allotment from the state equalization fund. About \$1,400 will be derived from tuition but practically the entire cost of school maintenance has to be met by local taxation.

For the purpose of comparing our school costs with other towns we submit the following tables. Current School costs for \$1,000 of Equalized valuation

Chemical toilets have been installed at Redstone, West Side, and Kearsarge at a cost including installation of about \$300 each. These were necessary in order to remedy sanitary conditions. The portico of the Kennett High school has been painted and the interior of the West Side, Redstone, Kearsarge and East Conway schools completely renovated. The East Conway school was also painted on the outside.

The grammar school buildings at Conway and North Conway have been equipped with automatic exit fixtures as required by state law.

A well was driven at West Side and water is brought into the school now by a hand pump. Changes were also made at Redstone so that water is again available at that school.

The value of all school buildings is roughly estimated at \$150,000. A private owner would expend each year a fixed percentage to offset depreciation. This is better business than to allow deterioration to proceed so far that extensive repairs have to be made at great expense in one year.

Attendance at Kennett High School increased this year by about twenty pupils. Next year's entering class will be large and the enrollment will with certainty reach 180 and very likely 200. Class room space this year with 160 pupils is barely adequate. It would be possible to move the laboratory into the unused primary building and then have a large room available for classes. The ninth grades could, of course, be kept in the grammar school buildings but

that would be undesirable unless it were done under Junior High School organization.

Conway's costs for transportation are large because of the town's geography. Possibly they could be cut if the board advertised for bids. It is not, however, a service that can always be let to the lowest bidder. Consideration for the safety, health and conduct of the pupils are paramount.

People everywhere in the country are asking the question, "Is it not possible to have efficient schools for less money?" Most of them ask the question in good faith. The school board has given the problem careful study. No one is disposed to deny that the tax problem in America is serious. No one, however, believes that we can have schools without buildings, fuel, janitors, books, and teachers. When we go through the different items in the cost of schools, we pass from one to another, baffled in our search for relief. The word "frill" has been loosely used by critics for that which appears ornamental rather than useful. In Conway, however, we have no "frills" unless one so considers the employment of a music teacher, a nurse, and the maintenance of a high school. Teachers' salaries in Conway are not higher than in other towns of the same size and not so high as in many. If we should discharge our teachers and fill their places with others who would accept less, the loss in effectiveness and morale would be so great that the public judgement would disapprove.

The return on our investment in education is, of course, a real one, but it is intangible and is in part deferred to the coming years. In the present we sometimes fail to realize how great it is. However, the vast sums of money which America each year devotes

to its schools shows conclusively that as a people we are determined to carry on the ideals which we call American.

I include the report of the Headmaster and the report of the nurse as part of my report.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Conway, N. H., January 25, 1928

Superintendent John H. Fuller:

In accordance with your recent request, I submit my report as Headmaster of Kennett High School for the current year, and recommendations for the next school year. Much of the detail which I included in my report of last year it seems may well be omitted.

We opened school on September 12th, and have registered to date 171 different pupils, the largest membership we have ever had, divided as follows: 86 girls and 85 boys, with 156 of the total coming from Conway. When considering the costs of the high school, it would be well to compare the number of students that are going to high school now with that of ten years ago: contrast also the number of boys and girls who attend high school from towns which do not support a high school and are served by nearby towns or by Academies.

Of the above enrollment we have lost twelve, six boys and six girls. This number will increase and constitutes a real problem; one that should be studied carefully that a remedy may be found if one exists. One field of study would be the enrichment of our program of studies that we might catch the interest of a greater proportion of our students.

We have thirteen tuition students, as follows: Bartlett, 4; Brownfield, Maine, 1; Eaton, 4; Minot, Maine, 1; Tamworth, 1; Albany, 1; Bangor, Maine, 1. With our present membership, it is not desirable to increase this number to any great extent, as a growth would result in the necessity for a larger teaching corps, as well as for more room.

Our attendance has been only fair so far this fall; about 96% to date. I believe that few of the parents realize how important regular attendance really is to the student. Classroom association with classmates and teachers is the only important difference between high school and the correspondence school. Why pay a teaching corps and then not use it? It should be borne in mind that every citizen of Conway is paying for such instruction, and the only way that one can realize upon his investment is to see that his pupils are in attendance every possible school day.

Our registration by courses is as follows: English, 160; Mathematics, 125; History, 120; Commercial subjects, 116; French, 78; Latin, 57; and Science, 71. The most expensive in both time and money are the Commercial and Science subjects, but neither can be dropped from our program; rather, they should be increased in number. Our language department must soon have help, for it is already overloaded in spite of our offering language as an elective subject in most years.

I believe that school activities are well enough advertised without more than mention of their various

branches. The Athletic Association sponsors Football, Basketball, and Baseball for boys, and Basketball for girls. These teams have creditably represented the school; and the boys and girls have learned some very important lessons from this competition. We fail, however, to reach as large a percentage of the student body as we should.

The Headmaser's Council has been recently formed to meet and confer with the Headmaster. The school orchestra of eleven pieces shows great improvement over last season. The school paper; the Kennett Keys, the honorary society; the Latin and Commercial Clubs; and the Dramatic Club constitute our other social activities.

The largest addition to the school plant in the history of the school was made this last summer by the completion of our athletic field. This field is one of the finest that any school of our size boasts, and the town and school may well be proud of the spirit that made it possible. The school is paying its note of \$350, for the completion of the field. Our unstinted thanks are due to Mr. John Potter, under whose direction the work was done, to the Committee which cooperated with him, and to all of the townspeople who helped in the project.

Such is a brief survey of our school life, and now to consider the problems of the future.

If, as I understand, our entering class of next fall is to number fifty or better, it seems probable that our student body will number between 180 and 190 pupils. Such a number will necessitate several changes of administration. Our Language teacher, as I have said, is already overburdened, and some means of helping her must be found, either by hiring another teach-

er or by rearranging the present teacher assignment.

I should suggest that we need to be supplied with some forty or fifty new home room desks, in order that every pupil may have a place for his school property.

Our present laboratory is too limited in size to be satisfactory for the large class that has elected Chemistry, and the offering of elective subjects in its place has not eased the pressure. It would seem to me that a transfer of our laboratory work and equipment to the small building adjacent to the grade school in this village, removing the partition now in that building, and building closets for the care of the equipment, might offer a satisfactory and economical solution of this problem. The suggested closets would soon pay for themselves in the reduction of breakage and loss.

Should the situation of the laboratory be changed, we should have a fine recitation room available in the present laboratory, capable of seating from thirty to forty pupils, when provided with chairs. This would allow the removal of all recitations from the study hall, a thing greatly to be desired.

Once again I should like to urge that a definite library fund be provided in the annual budget. It seems to me that fifty to seventy-five cents per pupil for the purchase of new books of reference is little enough for this purpose.

Turning to new lines, would it not be well to make a survey among our students, present and prospective, to see if the demand for Domestic Science is not great enough to warrant its re-establishment? Our boys who go away to colleges and engineering schools are finding trouble with shop and mechanical drawing. If a course could be added in the latter subject, I believe that many of their troubles along this line would be remedied at very little expense.

Our faculty will never be complete until our girls receive the same attention that our boys receive in their physical work. This indicates the employment of a lady teacher to take charge of their physical training and their athletic activities. The girls are probably paying at least 50% of the student tax for athletics, and are getting use of the gymnasium from one to two hours a day two or three times a week, for half of the school year, with a man in charge of them. The boys use the gymnasium nearly every day from December to April, use the athletic fields most of the other times, and finally have the benefit of the direction of two men, who have really participated in their sports.

In our athletic program, I believe it would be well to add regulations and sports to those already in operation. I should suggest that football be limited to six games a season, and that under no conditions should two games be allowed within one week's time of each other. In basketball, I would limit games to one each week for any one player. I should recommend that baseball be limited to fifteen games. I should favor increasing the number of teams in each sport and scheduling double-headers where two teams play, instead of one, particularly in baseball.

I believe that ice hockey should be added to our list of boys' sports, and also track. Both are outdoor sports and soon draw enthusiastic support. Track will not pay its way, but hockey will. The girls' program should be enriched by the addition of field hockey in the fall and baseball in the spring. Tennis courts should be provided on the school grounds for the use of all.

Finally, I am convinced that the high school will never function properly on the present schedule. Many of our boys and girls rise before six, have a hurried breakfast, ride to school for a six hour day, find employment of some sort until late in the afternoon, and then attempt to study after seven or eight o'clock. A superficial survey does not show an eight hour day or a forty-eight hour week. Some provision for transportation by bus or motor coach via rail would put this under our control instead of that of the Boston and Maine R. R. Company.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

With regard to the fall work of 1927, Dr. C. M. Wiggin has examined the pupils of Kennett High, Conway Elementary, Center Conway, South Conway and the West Side Schools. Some follow up work has been done. The parents have had more corrective work done this fall than in the same period last year.

With the exception of several cases in the northern part of town the state vaccination law has been quite generally observed.

New York state has for its slogan "No Diphtheria after 1930" and it begins to look as though this goal might be reached. Since October 1926 Conway has had one case,—until the parents respond 100% to the preventive treatment, there is the possibility of an-

other outbreak, but after each toxin anti-toxin clinic the number of susceptible children is less. The parents who have followed the treatment through to a negative Schick test have very little to worry about, as regards diphtheria.

The improvement in one child alone since Dr. Kerr's Underweight Clinic has made the time and effort spent there worth while. I hope next year, when the Christmas seals are offered for sale, that this work will be better supported.

Early preventive treatment for tuberculosis is well known but I doubt if as many know that modern dentistry interested in work for children places equally as much stress on early dental treatment. Ideal ages to take a child to dentist are 3 years old, 6 years old, and in the third and sixth grades. One trip then to a dentist interested in preventive work is worth ten trips later.


