## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker, on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other committees.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its State Aid and Trunk Line roads.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise, or appropriate for the permanent improvement of the Contoocook Valley Trunk Line road, so called, Chapter 93, Laws of 1915.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate, for the permanent improvement and maintenance of the Weare road, so called.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for the support of the Public Health Nurse Association, or take any action relative thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law for the support of Tucker Free Library.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen, to reinsure the town buildings.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

15. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Old Home Day or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see what action the town will take relative to renewing its contract for lighting streets with the New Hampshire Power Co., which expires July 1, 1928, or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept a gift from Leander A. Cogswell, of the grounds formerly owned by the Methodist Episcopal Church, subject to certain conditions described in deed and pass all votes relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for the improvement of the Goss cemetery, so called, or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to make further improvements on the stage settings and curtains at the town hall, raise money for same or take any action relative thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase or hire a combination Tractor Road Machine, and Snow Removal equipment, raise money for same or take any action relative thereto.

22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a piece of old road easterly of the Electric Light Plant, superseded by the new Trunk Line road laid out in 1927.

23. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting, and raise or appropriate, such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

*Know All Men By These Presents:*

That I, Leander A. Cogswell, of Henniker in the County of Merrimack and State of New Hampshire, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar before the delivery hereof well and truly paid by the Town of Henniker, have given, bargained, granted, sold and by these presents do give, grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Town of Henniker all that tract or parcel of land located in said Henniker and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southwesterly corner of the granted premises at a point on the northerly side of the highway leading from said Henniker to Concord; thence northerly by land of Harry B. Preston (formerly Gibson estate) to land now owned by the Catholic Society (legal title—Bishop of Manchester, Inc.); thence easterly by said Society land to the Methodist Parsonage lot (formerly Hale land); thence southerly by parsonage lot and land of Lillian F. Hale to highway; thence westerly along said highway to point of beginning.

Being the same premises conveyed to me by Wilbur Blaisdell and others, Trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church by their deed dated August 23, 1927 and recorded with the Merrimack County Records, Vol. 492, Page 7. This conveyance is subject to the following reservations contained in said deed—

“Reserving, however, to the Methodist Episcopal Church, a body corporate duly organized under the laws of said State of New Hampshire and located in said Henniker, and its successors and assigns,

the church building upon said tract and the land on which it stands; and reserving also to said Methodist Church, but not to its successors or assigns, the horse sheds, so-called, and the land whereon they stand on the north side of said lot, so long as the church buildings shall be used as a church for the purposes of said church; and reserving also to said Methodist Church and its successors and assigns a right of way for foot passage over the concrete walk leading from said highway across said granted premises to said church, and also a right of way ten feet in width across said granted premises along the easterly side of said granted premises next adjoining the land of said Lillian F. Hale, to and from said church and said sheds and said parsonage for the use of persons on foot or with teams or automobiles; and reserving also to said Church and its members as incidental to any use of said church building for church purposes the right to park automobiles on said granted premises while said church is in actual use during any congregation or meeting of said Church, but not otherwise."

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said granted premises with all the privileges and appurtenances to the same belonging to it, the said Town of Henniker, its successors and assigns, to their own proper use and benefit forever. And I, the said grantor, do hereby covenant, grant and agree to and with the said grantee, its successors and assigns, that until the delivery hereof I am the lawful owner of the said premises, seized and possessed thereof in my own right in fee simple, and have full power and lawful authority to grant and convey the same in manner aforesaid; that the premises are free and clear from all and every incumbrance whatsoever except as above set forth, *provided, however*, that this deed is made upon the conditions that this property shall be known as "Community Park" and shall be properly maintained by said town for use as a public park. The grass shall be kept cut and the premises kept clean. The Park shall be lighted at night, and no permanent parking of automobiles or teams shall be permitted on the Park or on the highway directly in front of the same to mar its attractiveness or interfere with its use other than such parking as is hereinbefore described; and no structure shall be erected thereon at any time; and

that I will and my heirs, executors and administrators shall warrant and defend the same to the said grantee, its successors and assigns, against the lawful claims or demands of any person or persons whatsoever.

And I, unmarried, do hereby release all rights of homestead under any statute, and all other rights and interests therein.

**BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS REPORT**

Henniker Fire Department, since its organization has borne a good reputation, for its prompt response to alarms and its work in the extinguishment of fires. However, at this time, its good work is greatly handicapped by lack of

transportation. It is far behind our neighboring towns in equipment and needs at once an up-to-date motor piece. One half the price of an efficient motor engine was lost in one fire during the past year because of the delay in getting an auto truck to haul apparatus.

We furnish transportation for men and tools to the other Town departments, should we do less for our fire fighting force? This matter should command attention at the forthcoming town meeting and ways and means found whereby the department can have the apparatus necessary to give our residents the protection to which they are entitled. It should also be considered that only by keeping somewhere near the standard set by other towns of our class in the matter of fire fighting equipment; can we enjoy the low rate of insurance which we now have.

Your Board of Fire Engineers would further make a request; that autoists do not park or block streets and highways in the vicinity of a fire nor try to "beat" the fire apparatus on its way. The law in this particular will be strictly enforced hereafter.

The Department desires to thank the citizens for their co-operation and for the favors received during the past year.

At the request of the State Board of Health, a survey was made of the sewage from the two villages to learn how much directly or indirectly drained into the Contoocook river, and report was made to State Board of Health, showing result of survey.

A more extended survey was made for the town, in order to learn how the sewage from every dwelling, factory and business block was disposed of, in the two villages, and the

town has a copy of this survey.

Every child entering school for the first time, this school year, excepting one, were vaccinated, unless found unfit. This is a good record, and both parents and Public Health Nurse deserve much credit.

One of the most valued gifts of the year is an oil painting of the Henniker Stone Bridge, painted by Berniss Little Cory and presented by Mrs. Helen H. Dowlin. This has been hung in the reading room, where it is much admired by library patrons and visitors. Another welcome addition to the reading room gallery is an excellent portrait of Mr. Edward N. Cogswell, son of the founder and first librarian of Henniker Free Library, and himself a faithful trustee of the Tucker Free Library for many years.

Presented by Mr. Charles E. Cogswell:—Several valuable mementoes of the Civil War, formerly the property of the late Col. L. W. Cogswell, including the comfort kit, testament, and medicine kit carried throughout the war by Col. Cogswell; also tobacco box, clay pipe, and bullets of historic interest; a photograph of the prison camp for rebel prisoners at Elmira, N. Y., 1864-5.

Pieces of the first Atlantic cable.

China bowl once owned by Mrs. Ruth Rice, wife of the first settled minister in Henniker.

Pre-Revolutionary iron teaspoons once owned by Rebecca Ramsdell.

Piece of silk from the wedding dress of Hannah (Cogswell) Proctor, 1783, grandmother of Edna Dean Proctor.

All the museum gifts have been on exhibition in the reading room for a period of several weeks, and will be permanently exhibited in the museum room as soon as a place can be provided for them. The present museum cases are now crowded to overflowing, and one of the most pressing needs of the library today is that of an additional case for our valuable relics, curios, and antiques. Another equally vital need is for a locked, glass bookcase for the preservation and display of the library's numerous collection of local publications, manuscripts, autographed books, ancient volumes, etc. These are much too valuable to be placed in the open stacks, and are now preserved in a locked chest, thus being invisible and inaccessible to the public.

During the past year frequent exhibits have been held in the reading room of interesting pictures, books, programs,

curios, etc., from the library's collections or kindly lent by individual friends. Our thanks are extended to all who have aided us in this way, and to Professor Francis L. Childs, who has supervised the gathering and arranging of the exhibits. They have resulted in an increased attendance at the library, and it is purposed to continue them from time to time.

Through the kindness of Mr. W. H. Bean, the children's doll house, so much enjoyed by the little ones, has been enclosed in glass, thus preserving it from dust and injury.

Our circulation this year has been greater by 1440 than last year, a gain of more than one book per capita for the entire population of the town. This increase is most gratifying, indicating as it does that the library is each year better fulfilling its purpose in the community,—that of furnishing abundant, wholesome, helpful reading to all its citizens.

## COGSWELL SPRING WATER WORKS

The Board of Water Commissioners herewith submit their fourteenth annual report.

During the past year new pipe was laid on Pearl Street from Bridge to Cressy Streets. Four service connections on Pearl Street and five service connections on Cressy were transferred from the old private system, taken over by the Cogswell Spring Water Works at the time of its formation, to the new system. These installations entailed the laying of 586 feet of new pipe, allowed the discontinuance of this much of the old system, and affords improved service to the subscribers affected. Two service connections on Bridge Street were transferred from the old to the new system.

The plant of the Crown Wood Turning Company on Water Street was connected with the Cogswell Spring Water System, under an agreement whereby the Crown Wood Turning Company shared the expense of installation.

During the past summer the reservoirs on Proctor Hill, and the reservoir and catch basins on Patterson Hill were thoroughly cleaned.

In September all pipe lines, connections, hydrants and subscribers services were inspected for leaks and waste, and the hydrants painted.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I herewith submit my sixth annual report.

The statistical tables which form a part of this report give a brief summary of the general condition and progress of the schools.

A study of the attendance record shows that all schools made very satisfactory progress. The most significant fact of all is the good health of our children which made such a record possible. A great deal of credit is due our Public Health Nurse for her untiring efforts and constant attention to the health work of both teachers and pupils. The formation of good health habits by our children is one of the primary objectives of education. Without these they cannot successfully carry on the school program, neither can they win success in the business of living after the school years are passed.

The enrollment in our rural schools is larger by four pupils than that of the previous year. I do not consider this a real or significant increase. The enrollment for the current year is 61 pupils, 2 less than last year. According to present indications 14 pupils will complete the work usually given in our rural schools, in June 1928.<sup>o</sup> Since their places, according to the present outlook, will not be filled, there will in all probability be a considerable decrease in the enrollment of our four rural schools next September. The meaning of all this is that we may have to close another of our outlying schools in the near future, possibly at the end of the current school year. It is not good educational or business policy to run a school with less than 10 pupils. 15 pupils represents the best and most economical minimum number for any school. Times and conditions have changed and we as individuals and communities must face the facts and readjust ourselves to the new conditions as rapidly, and with as little friction as possible.

The pupils and teachers of the central school are to be congratulated on their fine spirit of cooperation in carrying out projects for the good of their school. While I realize that the money, for the school piano, was generously provided by the citizens of our town who pay their share of taxes for all public and community enterprises, it was a good thing for our young people to plan and carry out, by their own efforts, a project of this nature. The money provided from their own funds, and the work done by our High School boys and girls, for the repairs on their Hall

stage furnishings, are very commendable. The manual training boys assisted by others, with material provided by the School Board made wood and wire frames to protect the High school hall windows and shades from injury in basketball practice and games. They also set up the basketball baskets, placed protecting iron frames around the electric lights, and repaired many of the movable seats. All of this volunteer and class work added to the new steel ceiling and walls provided from the general repair funds, have put the school hall in first class order, except for the stage drop curtain. I therefore recommend that a new drop curtain be provided by the district through regular channels.

There is plenty of room in our school building but our problem has been for the past seven or eight years to rearrange the different spaces allotted to the high school so as to best meet the needs of a modern school. One more class room should be provided. I therefore recommend that the main room so called be divided by erecting a partition through the middle of the room with doors at each end, thus providing a first class recitation room and an adequate study hall which would add a great deal to the efficiency of our high school work.

In closing I wish to thank all who have contributed of their time and means which have aided so much in making our work not only successful but very pleasant as well.
