In accordance with a vote of the town at the last annual meeting we have expended quite a sum of money in improving

the appearance of the cemeteries. The grass and bushes were cut in the Baptist yard, a new fence built on the west side, the wall rebuilt on the highway, and all of the gravestones straightened.

In the Hill yard all of the stones were straightened, grass and bushes cut, walls repaired, and a substantial gate erected. In the Valley cemetery, the grass and bushes were cut, fences repaired, and the gravestones in part of the yard straightened.

The foregoing account shows a balance of \$424.57 in favor of the town. One member of the school-board has not been paid and there are a few small bills outstanding. Most of the bills for the November snow storm have been paid, but only a few of the bills for the storm of the 13th inst. have been settled.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Officers and Citizens of Londonderry :

In compliance with the laws, we would present at this time a few words of explanation as to the condition of the schools during the past year, with perhaps a few suggestions for the coming year, then will follow by the use of tables of statistics, receipts and expenditures, a more extended description of the school work of the year.

It has been the constant aim and purpose of your committee that the schools of Londonderry should be improved, and made more efficient in their work of educating the rising generation.

Ten schools have been maintained during the year, each having a spring term of twelve weeks, and a fall term of fourteen weeks. In most of the schools the teachers are residents of the town, and their continued services throughout the year, as well as in former years, has again proved the wisdom of retaining the services of those well tried in the work.

The exception to the foregoing has been in Nos. 2 and 8, where strangers were engaged for teachers. In No. 2 the spring term was ruptured by a change of teachers during the term, which almost invariably results in a loss to any school. The fall term was more fortunate, though, as expected, a large portion of the time had to be expended in recovering lost ground, yet the examination at the close proved that excellent work had been done, with a commendable progress in the studies.

No. 8, it will be noted by an examination of the statistical tables, ranks the *lowest* in the attendance of its pupils of any school in town, both in the spring and fall terms, and more especially in the latter term where it reaches quite a low decimal (61 per cent.). No doubt it will readily be seen that this is a matter almost entirely beyond the control of the teacher, or even your school board, and would seem to be a matter for careful consideration by the residents or this district; and that in the future we hope for, and even we will expect, the parents and all others having charge of the pupils to apply the remedy.

In No. 10 there is no school room owned by the town, and in the first of the year there was an attempt made to convey the scholars by team to No. 9, where there is ample room for all, but it did not prove feasible. Therefore, a school room was rented of the "Derry School Board" at seventy-five cents per week, and the pupils received the benefit of twenty-six weeks' schooling, as other schools throughout the town. The spring term was in the charge of an experienced teacher, and proved to be time well spent. The fall term was placed in charge of Mr. George W. Robie, a beginner in the art of teaching. At the first visit of the committee there was noticeable a good amount of tact and adaptability on the part of the teacher, with a corresponding feeling of harmony and obedience manifested by the pupils, all of which gave promise of a successful school. At the close of the term the committee was unable to be present. But from the well kept register with its long list of visitors, of parents and citizens, during, and at the closing of the school, we feel justified in asserting that the bright prospects appearing at the opening were fully realized at the closing of the term.

During the fall term an appeal came from the "Lafayette Memorial Commission," at Washington, D. C., for a penny collection by the pupils of the schools, to aid in carrying out the design of the Commission, and also at the same time to especially become an object lesson of patriotism among the children. The teachers kindly gathered the collections in the several schools, and two dollars and thirty-four cents (\$2.34) was forwarded to Washington, and your committee now holds a receipt for the same from Hon. Charles G. Dawes, treasurer of the Commission.

It will be noticed that the expenses for repairs the past year have been of only an ordinary amount, (with the exception of a few new seats in No. 2) and in the whole have not reached the 5 per cent limit. The town may not be so fortunate the coming year. The school buildings in No. 6 will need to be resingled. And while speaking of repairs, we wish to urge upon the tax payers and citizens the importance of keeping the buildings and grounds in thorough repair and condition in and about the school rooms, to the end that the same spirit of neatness and order may be infused into the minds of the pupils, and become to them a part of their education and habit through life.

No change has been made in text books during the year. But your committee are of the opinion that a change from the geography now in use is very much needed, and that funds should be provided for that purpose.

The "Vertical System" of writing has been introduced in some of the schools to a limited extent, and more especially among the beginners in penmanship. This method of teaching the use of the pen is thought to be fast displacing the "Slanting System," so much so that some dealers in copy

books are eager to make the change with schools free of charge, giving book for book.

The readers will observe that a winter term of school of four weeks was taught in No. 1. This was caused through the generosity of one of the residents of that district. And it is now fitting that the thanks of the school board, with the pupils and parents of the district, be given, and are hereby extended to Mr. Rosecrans W. Pillsbury who so kindly paid the expenses of this extra term of school.
