

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This year we have a different supervisor and six of the eleven teachers are new. A change of this kind always means some lost time. It is especially hard when the new teacher comes in the middle of a term, as has happened in two of our schools. No school can do its best with two or three teachers in one year. We believe the time taken for readjustment has been as short as possible and that nearly all the teachers are doing high grade work. For all except one we receive state aid.

It is our desire, and we know by their expressions of interest the parents' desire, to make the Swanzey schools the best possible. To help in this we would suggest that the parents visit schools oftener and talk over school problems with the teacher. Many of the new methods that seem useless and perhaps foolish when told by the children at home would be made clear and worth while when explained by the teacher. Also remember to give the word of praise when deserved.

We are asking for an appropriation of \$350 for furnaces, at Nos. 1 and 2. The furnaces at No. 1 never have been much good. Day after day they have to be run with all the drafts open on account of smoke, and even then the rooms are not comfortably warm. Also look at the fuel bill. It seems to us that a building as large as No. 2, and so large a school, needs something better than the stoves now there. These stoves cannot heat the rooms properly. Again look at the fuel bill.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROPRIATIONS.

The board recommends that the district appropriate under Article 7 of the warrant, in addition to the amount required by law, \$1,200. This sum includes the estimate for support of schools, repairs and superintendent's salary. The board recommends that the district appropriate under Article 9, \$350.

To the Selectmen:

In conformity to law the board recommends the following assessments for the ensuing year:

For high school tuition,\$700 00For books and supplies,300 00For flags and appurtenances,25 00

The sum required by law to be raised for support of schools in Swanzey is \$2,242.50.

REPORT OF

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Board of Education, Swanzey, N. H.:

I hereby submit for your consideration my first annual school report.

Upon assuming the duties of supervision of the schools here on the first of last December, I was pleased to find them in so satisfactory a condition. I found them in charge of able, enterprising teachers, the discipline (with one exception) excellent, the children respectful, interested and happy, and reasonably satisfactory progress being made in all the schools.

We have lost the services of three teachers since the opening of the fall term. In November, Miss Alice Loughlin, principal of No. 11 school, owing to poor health, was obliged to abandon teaching altogether for a time, and Miss Ida D. Mann, a Normal trained teacher, with eight years' experience, was engaged to fill the vacancy. Miss Catherine M. Willoughby, because of sickness in her family, was unable to return to her school after the Christmas recess, and her position was filled by the choice of Miss Leone M. Thorne, a highly recommended Normal graduate with two years' experience. During the Thanksgiving recess, Miss Conrad, at School No. 2, resigned to accept a more lucrative position in Massachusetts.

But while we have lost the school room services of these teachers, the character building results of their labors, though not measurable by any fixed standards,

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represent the permanent values given to school children by teachers of intelligence and high character.

The public school system of a town is a business enterprise, and as in any other business the efficient conduct affairs is necessary to its highest success. of its "Efficiency is the slogan of the world of business and of achievement. Both have arisen out of the desire to avoid waste, to make every motion, every minute, and every bit of material count. The movement seems so reasonable and so necessary that we are likely, unless we stop to consider carefully, to impose it upon phases of activity to which it cannot possibly be applied. In purely mechanical processes waste in any form is undesirable and should as far as possible be eliminated. In growth, in life processes, in the development of human personality, there must always be more or less of what seems to us waste. Nature is always wasteful. Her methods are not direct and simple, but round about and complex." The school is concerned with both kinds of work, that which is purely mechanical and that which stimulates and nourishes life processes.

The addition and the multiplication tables, for example, should be learned mechanically, the more machine-like the better. The same is true in writing and spelling and in learning the correct use of language.

But to stimulate and nourish the growth of the higher powers of the child, his reason, his feelings, and his will must ever be the most important duty of the school. Such growth is never mechanical and must always involve seeming waste.

The work of the schools often suffers because of the confusion of methods, and because nature's wasteful method has been followed in teaching the mechanical processes.

It becomes advisable therefore to get together and systematize the facts that make up the body of work of a formal character that they may be taught by drill methods until results can be given by the class *instantly* and *correctly*.

The number of arithmetical facts that should be learned in this way is not large; the sum of any two digital numbers, the reverse facts of subtraction, the multiplication tables, the corresponding facts of division, denominate numbers, aliquot parts of 100—these are about all.

Three ways are open to the teacher in securing the rapid drill necessary in order to secure the child's unthinking, automatic action; arithmetical games, perception (flash) cards, and drill sheets. To furnish these sheets in a cheap, durable and convenient form we have purchased the so-called "minimum essential" test sheets prepared by Supt. Thompson of Leominster, Mass. These sheets have been used by him and in other school systems with excellent results. The flash cards we expect to construct as soon as the necessary material can be obtained. The games are already in use. The drill sheets are arranged in pairs, one the child has for oral drill, the other arranged in a different way for the written test.

With the opening of a new school year we should introduce a course in manual training, including in the upper grades cooking and sewing for the girls and woodwork for the boys.

Handiwork is a valuable factor in the training of children. It rounds out the child's education by teaching the more facile use of the hand, and reacts favorably upon other lines of school work, and while a special teacher is desirable, valuable work can be done without one. The regular teacher is frequently trained to the work, and the untrained teacher too, if enterprising, can accomplish much good work, provided she is willing to start the work as best she can, and through her mistakes to learn to do better.
