

Record of Town Meeting

Held March 11, 1924

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the second Tuesday of March, 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Edward T. Breed, Moderator, also the posting of the checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the checklist, 738.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

For Town Clerk. The whole number of votes given in was 170, upon which Frank H. Peaslee had 170 votes and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Selectman for three years. The whole number of votes given in was 170, upon which H. O. Chase had 1, Forrest Dearborn had 1, George A. Waterman had 166, and the said George A. Waterman was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agent The whole number of votes given in was 170, upon which Arthur Jones had 1, John Fuller had 1, Carlisle Dearborn had 11, Frank C. Philbrick had 158, Charles F. Bennett had 165 and Elwin T. George had 167; and the said Frank C. Philbrick, Charles F. Bennett and Elwin T. George were declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed. For Overseer of the Poor. The whole number of votes given in was 170, upon which H. O. Chase had 1, George A. Waterman had 169 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

The Moderator called a recess until 1.15 P. M.

Met after recess, at 1.15 P. M.

Voted to take up Article nine first.

ARTICLE 9 Voted to raise thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500) to re-surface, with tar, the state roads n the town.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to defray town charges.

ARTICLE 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Frank Eaton, M. D., Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done, the Moderator declared Frank Eaton elected Trustee for three years.

ARTICLE 4. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, District Delegates and Alternates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, held for nomination of President and Vice-President of the United States of America.

At the presidential primary in Weare, N. H., March 11, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, votes of the inhabitants present and qualified to vote for senator, were by them in open meeting given to the Moderator, who, in the presence of the Selectmen and Clerk and assisted by them, sorted and counted said votes and, at the close of the poll, made public declaration of votes given in, as follows:

Total Republican votes, 83.

Total Democratic votes, 43.

Democratic Alternates-at-Large: Mary J. Gagne 30, Albert E. Holmer 32, Margaret C. Martin 31, Mary Louise Mayo 32, Fortunat E. Normandin 31, Mary W. Piertersz 29, Ruth Ralph 30, Joseph A. Seymour 31.

Republican Alternate Delegates: Burt E. Warren 68, John W. Pearson 66.

Democratic Alternate Delegates: George Conrad Brummer 31, Frank A. Rogers 31.

ARTICLE 5. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Helen E. Nichols for Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Helen E. Nichols elected Trustee for three years.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to repair highways.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise five hundred dollars (\$500) to repair bridges.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise three hundred dollars (\$300) to rail dangerous places along the highways.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 11. Voted that it be left with the selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to raise one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 13.Voted to dismiss.ARTICLE 14.Voted to dismiss.ARTICLE 15.Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to build a new bridge over the river near Frank E. Cuttings, it to be of Iron frame and cement floor. The style and price of same to be left with Selectmen, and hire the money for one year.

ARTICLE 17. Voted to raise four hundred dollars (\$400) for White Pine Blister Rust control.

ARTICLE 18. Voted to adopt the following resolutions offered by Alfred Osborne.

RESOLVED:—That the bequest of the late Eben L. Paige for the benefit of the Weare High School be accepted, and the treasurer is hereby authorized to receipt for the same.

ARTICLE 19. RESOLVED:—That the bequest of the late Eben L. Paige for the benefit of Weare Free Library be accepted, and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to receipt for the same.

RESOLVED:—That a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to report at the next annual town meeting as to how said bequest may be best applied.

The Moderator appointed the following committee: Alfred Osborne, George A. Waterman, George H. Eastman, Helen E. Nichols and Lucie E. Clough.

RESOLVED: That the Selectmen are instructed to sell by public auction the real estate known as the Eben L. Paige place at North Weare, N. H.

Immediately following the passage of the above resolutions, the Moderator requested the voters present to unite in silent prayer, as evidence of our respect to our late Eben L. Paige for his gift to the town, which request was then reverently and universally respected.

ARTICLE 20. Voted to raise fifty dollars (\$50) for the care of soldiers' graves.

ARTICLE 21. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 22. Voted that all small bridges with iron stringers, when plank floors are worn out, to be replaced with concrete.

ARTICLE 23. Voted to raise one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Old Home Day. The Selectmen to appoint a committee to have charge of the same.

ARTICLE 24. Voted to raise one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) to shingle the north side of the Town Farm barn.

Voted that this meeting be dissolved.

NOTICE

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at 10 of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To choose, by separate ballot, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose, by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To see how much money the Town will raise to repair highways. 6. To see how much money the Town will raise to repair bridges.

7. To see how much money the Town will raise to rail dangerous places along the highways.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

9. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to intervene in the action of the Boston & Maine Railroad to abandon the Manchester and North Weare Railroad, now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission, to employ counsel and such experts as may be deemed necessary to defend and protect the interest of the Town and to approve and ratify the action already taken by the Selectmen; to raise and appropriate money for such purpose and to take any action that may be deemed advisable in respect to said proposed abandonment.

11. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

12. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Eben L. Paige bequest of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to the School District for the benefit of the Weare High School.

13. To hear the report of the committee on the Eben L. Paige bequest for the Weare Free Library and take action on the same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to buy or hire one or more tractors for use on the highways.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the purpose of coöperating with the State Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, such appropriation to be available until spent in coöperation with the State Government.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising money for the payment of the Cutting bridge.

17. To see what action the Town will take to get a doctor to come to Weare.

18. To see if the Town will vote to hire a District Nurse for certain months of the year and raise the sum of money necessary for her salary.

19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Huntington Road, so called, beginning at a point at the bottom of the Thomas Eaton hill, so called, on the road leading from East Weare to Barnard hill, westerly to the Abraham Melvin road.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the care of soldiers' graves.

21. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day and appoint a committee to have charge of the same.

22. To see what action the Town will take in regard to repairing the bridge on the State Aid Highway at Riverdale.

23. To see if the Town will vote to rent the rooms now used by the Weare High School to Weare Grange, when vacated by the school. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

After purchase of the building site, a narrow strip of land was bought of Chase Brothers to provide an entrance on the main street toward which the building will face.

On account of a ruling of the State Board of Health, filter beds had to be built between the septic tank and the drain outlet.

It was decided to make the north end of the basement about two feet deeper than planned (all that drainage conditions would allow) in order to give better height in the play room. To meet this extra expense, pledges were secured from interested persons, amounting to about four hundred dollars.

The foundation has been completed and the first floor laid. Lumber, doors, and windows for practically the whole job except clapboards, finish, and flooring are on the ground and paid for.

Superintendent's Report

I herewith submit my third annual report.

The record of attendance and general achievment for the year ending June 30, 1924, was much more satisfactory than for the previous year. We were able to keep all schools open 175 days out of the year of 180 days provided for by state law. The attendance averaged nearly 93%, which means that all children averaged 162 days actual time spent in school.

Thus far the record for the current year shows a substantial gain over that of last year. Every one should realize that perfect attendance every day is an important factor in eliminating waste and promoting the efficient expenditure of the tax payers' dollars. School attendance and school work are of the utmost importance in the life of every child.

While you have found it necessary to open three new schools in as many years, the number of pupils enrolled in the district, as a whole, during the past four years, has been about the same. If there is a real increase, it is in the lower grades.

The first grade for the current year numbers 31, which equals the whole number enrolled in that grade last year. The number in the eighth grade for the current year is 11, exactly the same number that entered the High School in September. The enrollment in the seventh grade is 21, in the sixth grade 14 and the fifth grade 21. There are changes in all grades from year to year, due to families coming and going.

The present tendency is for practically all who complete the eighth grade to enter the High School. Therefore we may safely count on a High School enrollment of from 40 to 50 every year, providing present conditions remain fairly constant.

When the new High School building is completed, there will be ample accomodation for a Junior-Senior organization, covering six years instead of four, as at present. This arrangement would make it possible for every child in town to have the advantages of superior training and discipline during the difficult period of transition from the sixth grade to the 'Senior High School. In fact, they would be a vital part of all the High School life and activities. The three High School and ten Elementary School teachers unanimously favor this plan, believing that the High School will receive great benefit from the extra teacher and enlarged numbers, and that the Elementary schools can do infinitely better work with six grades than they could possibly do with eight grades, as at present organized.

Health work for school children is becoming increasingly important. Before the end of the present school year Miss Myrtle Flanders, of the Concord Red Cross, will have examined all children in the schools. She visits the homes of the children, where conditions observed in school make it advisable. This type of examination is very good as far as it goes, but it does not go very far. The best solution of the problem is, a resident physician with definite school duties, or a district nurse, giving as much time as possible to health supervision in the schools.

Along this same line, experience is proving that, under present conditions, the admission of children under the age of six years is not for the best interests of the children themselves nor of the schools. I therefore recommend that no child under six years be admitted to the schools, except by special permission of the School Board.

The general repairs made during the past summer have raised the sanitary and safety standards of the most needy buildings. The addition of a play ground at Sugar Hill, is worthy of special commendation. I recommend that extensive repairs be made on the interiors of the Buxton and North Weare buildings as soon as possible.

In closing, I extend appreciation for the fine spirit of coöperation of parents and others who have taken such a vital interest in furthering the cause of education in Weare.
