Annual Meeting

Town of Allenstown

The annual meeting of the Town of Allenstown was held on March 17, 1979. Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by George P. Guertin who welcomed everyone in attendance and introduced the town officers.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

This Article was taken care of on March 13, 1979. The results are known.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance by adding the following to Article X, Section 1001 (c), which presently provides that a municipal officer shall not be a member or alternate of the Board of Adjustment:

"For the purpose of this subsection, 'municipal officer' shall mean any employee of the Town of Allenstown or person serving as an elected or appointed official of the Town. The intent of this provision is to prevent conflicts of interest and to spread participation in municipal activities among citizens of the Town. This provision shall not apply to any member or alternate of the Board of Adjustment appointed prior to January 1, 1979, for the duration of the term of appointment being served on that date, but shall apply to the reappointment of such member or alternate at the expiration of such term."

This Article was voted on, on March 13, 1979, the results were 498 yes and 304 no.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance by deleting the present provisions of Article XI, Enforcement, Section 1101, and inserting in its place the following:

ARTICLE XI ENFORCEMENT

Section 1101. In addition to any other remedies authorized by law, in case any building or structure is erected, reconstructed,

altered, repaired, converted, or maintained, or any building, structure, or land is used in violation of this Zoning Ordinance, the owner or owners of the building, structure, or land, and any other person violating the provisions of this Zoning Ordinance may be punished by a fine of not more than ten (\$10) dollars for each day that such violation continues after the conviction date, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 31:88 as amended."

This Article was voted on, on March 13, 1979, the results were 481 yes votes and 301 no votes.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance by adopting the following provisions, which were recommended by the Federal Insurance Administration of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in order for the Town to qualify under the National Flood Insurance Program.

Add the following Subsection 902(e) to Article IX, Administration, Section 902, Zoning Permits Required:

"e. Any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations."

Add the following Article VII-a.

ARTICLE VII-a FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS

Section 1. The Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps for the Town of Allenstown, effective, April 2, 1979, compiled by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Federal Insurance Administration, are adopted by reference and declared to be a part of this Article. Those maps are National Flood Insurance Program Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps, Community Panel Numbers 330103-0005-B and 330103-0010-B, and National Flood Insurance Program Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Community Panel Numbers 330103-0005-B and 330103-0010-B.

Section 2. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements (meaning repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred) to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistent to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

Section 3. The Building Inspector shall require in all flood hazard areas where base flood elevation data has been provided (i.e., for all numbered "A" Zones - "A1" - "30"), the following specific standards:

- a. Residential Construction New construction or substantial improvement of any residential structure shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to or above base flood elevation.
- b. Non-Residential Construction New construction or substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial or other non-residential structure shall either have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to the level of the base flood elevation or, together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, be flood-proofed so that below the base flood level the structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water and with structural components having the capability of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and effects of buoyancy. A registered professional engineer or architect shall certify that the floodproofing methods are adequate to withstand the flood depths, pressures, velocities, impact and uplift and other factors associated with the base flood. Such certification shall be provided to the Building Permit Officer.

Section 4. The Building Inspector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and

(ii) all new construction and substantial improvements of nonresidential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.

Section 5. Within areas designated as floodways, the following standards shall apply:

- a. Prohibit encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements and other developments unless certification by a professional registered engineer or architect is provided demonstrating that the encroachment shall not result in any increase in flood levels during occurrence of the base flood discharge.
- b. Prohibit the placement of any mobile home, except in an existing mobile home park or existing mobile home subdivision.

Section 6. The Building Inspector shall require within flood hazard areas new and replacement water supply systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems.

Section 7. The Building Inspector shall require that all mobile homes placed within Zone A of the Town's Flood Insurance Rate Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring one additional tie per side, (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side, (iii) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds, and (iv) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.

Section 8. For new mobile home parks and subdivisions; for expansions to the exisiting mobile home parks and subdivisions; for existing mobile home parks and subdivisions where the repair, reconstruction, improvement of the streets, utilities and pads equals or exceeds 50 percent of value of the streets, utilities and pads before the repair, reconstruction or improvement has commenced; and for mobile homes not placed in a mobile home park or subdivision:

a. stands or lots shall be elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level;

- b. adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler shall be provided; and,
 - c. in the instance of elevation of pilings:
 - a. lots shall be large enough to permit steps;
- b. piling foundations shall be placed in stable soil no more than ten feet apart, and
- c. reinforcement shall be provided for pilings more than six feet above the ground level.
- Section 9. The Building Inspector shall notify, in riverine situations, adjacent communities and the State Coordinating Officer prior to any alternation or relocation of a watercourse, and submit copies of such notification to the Federal Insurance Administration.

Section 10. The Building Inspector shall assure that the flood carrying capacity within the altered or relocated portion of any watercourse is maintained.

Section 11. The Building Inspector shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request, for the determination of applicable flood insurance risk premium rates within all areas having flood hazards identified on a Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, any certification of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant.

Section 12. The Building Inspector shall require flood hazard area permit applicants to certify that all necessary permits have been or are in the process of being obtained from those government agencies from which approval is required by federal or state law.

Section 13. The Town of Allenstown agrees to take such other lawful official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the National Flood Insurance Program."

This Article was voted on, on March 13, 1979, the results were 441 yes votes and 372 no votes. Passed.

ARTICLE 5. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance as follows: "We, the undersigned, wishing to control the growth in Allenstown, NH, recommend a two-acre lot minimum per newly-built home. It would increase the valuation of property, homes and reduce your property tax assessment."

This Article was voted on, on March 13, 1979, the results were 392 yes votes and 451 no votes. This Article was not passed.

ARTICLE 6. Do you approve of having 2 (two) sessions for the annual Town meeting in this Town, the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business?

This Article was voted on, on March 13, 1979, the results were 531 yes votes and 292 no votes.

- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- A Motion was made by Roland Landry to accept Article 7 as read. Seconded by Gordon Sasserson and passed.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to give a one (1%) percent discount on all 1978 property taxes paid within thirty (30) days after mailing of the tax bills.
- A Motion was made by Carlton Deane to accept Article 8 as read. Seconded by Roger Letendre and passed.
- 9. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to control the growth in said Town by requiring a two acre lot minimum per newly-built home.
- A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder to reject this Article. It was seconded by Ernest Beauchesne and voted. This Article defeated.
- 10. By Petition. To see whether the Town will pave all the non-paved roads/streets within the limits of Allenstown, which consist of four (4) or more dwellings on the road or street and have been in existence (road/st.) for more than ten (10) years.

Said roads, would have been built prior to 1969; a subdivision requirement. Monies for the upgrading of these roads, shall come from the annual "Additional Gas Subsidy Funds." If said Funds

for one year are insufficient to complete a road/street, then that (road/street) shall be constructed or reconstructed to the extent of the available funding for that year and completed the following year or years, depending on the amount of construction/reconstruction required and funding available in the preceeding years.

By using these funds, no additional tax burden will be placed on our fellow townsmen and provide good roads to others.

*Additional Gas Subsidy Funds, may be used for construction and reconstruction of roads. These funds cannot be implemented for salt, snow removal and general maintenance items, the old highway subsidy may be implemented for these. (This article is submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Bernard Riopel to reject this Article. Seconded by Donald Girard. There was a lengthy discussion on this Article. Louise Landry stated that the money would not come out of town funds. There was a general discussion as to whether the town would be accepting roads by paving them. It was noted that the funds could only be used for paving new roads.

A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder to amend this Article to state that work would not be performed by town employees and no additional moneys for this purpose would be raised by tax levies. Seconded by Walter Dobek and defeated.

A Motion was made by Bernard Riopel to amend Article 10 to do work only on town accepted streets. Seconded by Donald Girard and defeated.

A Motion was made by the following people for a secret ballot on the Motion to reject: Donald Girard, Bernard Riopel, Walter Batchelder, Robert Girard and Robert Marier. The result was 98 yes votes and 89 no votes. This Article not passed.

11. By Petition. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of $\$5,000.00 \ (+/-)$; from the "Additional Gas Subsidy Fund*" estimated at \$8,279.48 for 1979; to install two (2) Catch Basins and pave Summers Avenue, a street built under the 1955 Specifications, which is Town Maintained, Lighted and has never been taxed, or taxed paid upon since its construction in 1963.

Said construction cost, is for materials only, as the employees will be paid whether they perform this work or work elsewhere in Town, by using these funds our environment will be up-graded at no additional cost to our fellow townsfolk.

*Additional Gas Subsidy Funds are supposed to be used for

road construction or reconstruction only, and cannot be implemented for salt, snow removal or general maintenance. (This article is submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roland Landry to accept Article 11 as read. Seconded by Nancy Drew.

A Motion was made by Donald Girard and seconded by Bernard Riopel to proceed with a show of hands on this Article. The result was 75 yes and 85 no.

The following people motioned for a secret ballot on this Article: Steve Tierney, Nancy Drew, Louise Landry, Roland Landry, Maurice Ahern, Walter Dobek and Donald Drew. The result was 84 yes votes and 101 no votes. Article defeated.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to authorize the development of the Town of Allenstown Park Property, as recorded in the Merrimack County Registry of Deeds, Book 600 Page 584, consisting of 71,656 Sq. Ft. (1.644 acres). Said property being adjacent to Reynold Street and to be developed in the following manner:

Construction of two (2) tennis courts, said appropriation being contigent upon the Town receiving Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars in State or Federal funds. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Robert Girard to accept Article 12 as read. Seconded by Sharon Aherm. There was a general discussion as to how much the total project would cost and the gas problem on the land. This Article was passed.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Allenstown Recreation Commission to apply for and accept all Federal and other funds available to be applied to the Allenstown Park Property Development, mainly intending to apply for and accept Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR). (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert to accept Article 13 as read. Seconded by Gordon Sasserson and passed.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars for Allenstown's share of the funding of the Juvenile Ser-

vice Officer; said officer working with the Hooksett District Court. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Robert Tarantino to accept Article 14 as read. Seconded by John P. Welch and passed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to build an addition and install a septic system at the Allenstown Highway Garage. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert to accept Article 15 as read. Seconded by Carlton Deane and passed.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to decrease the salary of the part-time building inspector from Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars per year to Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) per year. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Bruce Fogg and seconded by Linda Welch to accept Article 16 as read. Mr. Robert Girard took the floor and suggested an amount of \$3,000.00.

A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder and seconded by Bruce Fogg to amend the amount of the salary to \$3,000.00. Amendment passed. Article 16 amended to read Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars per year.

ARTICLE 17. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred (\$5,800.00) Dollars for the purchase of a 1979 Buick LaSabre State Police Package. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Richard Gaumont to accept Article 17 as read. Voted on and passed.

ARTICLE 18. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars to increase Police full time capability. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Carlton Deane to accept Article 18 as read and Seconded by Richard Averill. There was a general discussion as to the need for an additional policeman.

A Motion was made by Larry Bernard to increase the amount to Nine Thousand (\$9,000.00) Dollars and seconded by John Welch.

This amendment war rescinded.

A Motion was made by Roger Letendre and seconded by Peter Austin to enable Sgt. Roland Lamy (a non-resident) speak on this Article. Voted on and passed.

A Motion was made by Henry Bourgeois and seconded by Bruce Fogg to increase the amount to Eighteen Thousand Seven Hundred (\$18,700.00) Dollars. This amendment defeated.

A Motion was made by Larry Bernard to amend this Article by setting the yearly salary in the amount of Ten Thousand One Hundred Sixty-eight (\$10,168.00) Dollars. Seconded by Walter Batchelder and passed.

A Motion was made by the following people for a secret ballot on this Article: Roger Menard, Robert Girard, Donald Girard, John Welch and Robert Marier. The result was 107 yes votes and 63 no votes. Article 18 passed as amended.

ARTICLE 19. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-Nine Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty (\$69,750.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a 1979 1000 GPM pumper tanker fire truck and that this amount to be raised from Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and bond issue. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

The Moderator stated that this Article could not be acted upon since the amount to be raised under this Articlewould exceed the additional amount which can be raised at this meeting (10% of the total appropriations recommended by Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 20. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Five Thousand (\$45,000) Dollars for the purpose of reconditioning the 1964 Farrar Pumper and that this amount to be raised from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and bond issue. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by James Boisvert and seconded by Richard Averill to accept Article 20 as read. This Motion was rescinded.

A Motion was made by Donald Peloquin to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars at this time to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck. Seconded by John Welch. Amendment passed.

A Motion was made by Roger Menard to adjourn the Meeting to

Monday at 7:00 p.m. since by law there could be no further business conducted after 12:00 midnight. Seconded by Larry Bernard and voted.

The continuation of the annual meeting of the Town of Allenstown was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by George P. Guertin, Moderator, on Monday, March 19, 1979.

BALANCE AMOUNT OF REVENUE SHARING IS: \$49,047.87

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for winter and summer maintenance of the highways. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roger Menard to accept Article 21 as read. Seconded by Arthur Girard and voted.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budget appropriation for the Fire Department. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Bruce Fogg and seconded by Roger Letendre that Article 22 be accepted as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for the Police Department. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Linda Welch to accept Article 23 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for street lighting. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Joe Benninghove and seconded by Norman Connor to accept Article 24 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Forty-Seven Dollars and Eighty-Seven

Cents (\$4,047.87) for the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for the Library. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by JoAn Menard and seconded by Arthur Girard to accept Article 25 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.

A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder and seconded by Pauline Auger that we line item the total budget. Voted and passed.

Town Officers' expenses. A Motion was made by Ronald Demers and seconded by Adelard Hebert to decrease this line item by \$5,000 to \$20,500. Voted and passed.

Reappraisal of Property. A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder and seconded by Sophie Keefe that we reduce this line item to \$2,500. This Motion defeated.

Police department. A motion was made by Norman Connor to increase this amount to \$64,825 and seconded by Eugene Maltais. This Motion defeated. The following persons petitioned for a secret ballot: Carlton Deane, Walter Batchelder, Ronald Demers, Walter Dobek, Sophie Keefe, Bruce Fogg and Adelard Hebert. The result was 40 yes votes and 79 no votes. The amount stays at \$62,915 as amended.

Fire department. A Motion was made by Roger Letendre to increase this line item to \$39,250, seconded by James Boisvert. Voted and passed. A Motion was made by Debbie Martel to change this amount from \$39,250 to \$29,250. Seconded by Diane Adinolfo and defeated. A Motion was made by Donald Girard to change this amount to \$40,750. Seconded by Roger Letendre and defeated. A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder to reduce this line item by \$4,733.82. Seconded by Walter Dobek and defeated.

Blister rust and care of trees. A Motion was made by Carlton Deane to strike this line item. Seconded by Maurice Ahern and defeated.

Planning and Zoning. A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert to increase this line item by \$1,500, making a total of \$5,000 and seconded by Don Chaput. This Motion was defeated by a show of hands, 36 yes votes and 56 no votes.

Damages by Dogs. A Motion was made by Carlton Deane and seconded by Donald Girard to delete this line item. This Motion defeated.

Town Maintenance. A Motion was made by Joe Benninghove to raise this amount by \$5,000. Seconded by Carlton Deane and defeated.

Library. A Motion was made by Walter Batchelder and seconded by Carlton Deane to raise this amount to \$10,000. This Motion passed.

Town poor. A Motion was made by Robert E. Campbell and seconded by James Severance to reduce this amount by \$12,000 to \$8,000. This Motion defeated by a show of hands, 28 yes votes and 54 no votes.

Soldiers' aid. A Motion was made by Don Girard and seconded by Carlton Deane to delete this line item. Voted and passed.

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Carlton Deane to accept the amended budget as read in the amount of \$725,750.35. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A Motion was made by Roger Menard to adjourn the meeting at 10:00 p.m. Seconded by Asher Kneeland. Voted and passed.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Allenstown Elementary School in said Allenstown on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. (A) To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance Article IV, Open Space and Farming Zone by deleting the present Section 401 (a), which requires a minimum of 200 feet frontage and 40,000 square feet lot area for single family and two family dwellings and inserting in its place the following:
 - "a. Single family and two family dwellings provided that no such dwelling shall be located on a lot with less than 200 feet frontage along one street, no single family shall be located on a lot measuring less than 2 acres in area, and no two family dwelling shall be located on a lot measuring less than three acres in area."
 - (B) To see if the Town will vote to amend the Allenstown Zoning Ordinance Article VIII, Section 813 (c) (1) regarding mobile home park permits, by deleting the following sentence: "The annual cost of this permit shall be \$25.00 for each mobile home space within a mobile home park." Said article and section to read as follows:
 - "c. Mobile Park Permits.
 - 1. Permit Required: It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, maintain, operate or alter any movile-home park within the limits of the Town of Allenstown unless he or she or any firm holds a valid mobilehome park permit issued annually by the Selectmen in the name of such person or persons or firm for the specific mobilehome park. All initial applications for mobilehome park permits shall be made to the Selectmen, who shall refer the application to the Planning Board for recommendations. Issuance of the permit by the Selectmen shall be contingent upon compliance with all ordinances

and regulations of the Town of Allenstown and all statutes and regulations of the State of New Hampshire." (This article, at the conclusion of the second public hearing on October 17, 1979, was recommended by the Planning Board.)

- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to give a one (1%) per cent discount on all 1980 property taxes paid within thirty days (30) after mailing of the tax bills.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$6,000.00 to install inground gas tank for the use of town vehicles and school busses. Said gas and diesel fuel to be purchased through state bids at a savings to the Town of Allenstown of approximately 30 cents per gallon. (This article not recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of installing two street lights at the following locations:
 - 1. Park Street Lt. Co. Pole No. 2
 - 2. Howe Street Lt. Co. Pole No. 4

(This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of installing two street lights at the following locations:
 - 1. Dodge Road Lt. Co. Pole No. 5
 - 2. Dodge Road Lt. Co. Pole No. 8

(This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following as Town streets: Park Street and Howe Street as shown on the official Town of Allenstown Property Tax Map.
- To see if the Town will vote to accept the following as Town streets: Martinson Lane, Summers Avenue, and Riverside Drive as shown on the official Town of Allenstown Property Tax Map.
- To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for engineering costs and the construction of a

storm drain system to alleviate existing surface water problems on Lubern Avenue and Bailey Avenue.

(This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will change the term of office of the road Agent from a one year term to a two year term.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$3,500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to authorize the completion of two tennis courts on Allenstown Park Property being adjacent to Reynold Street.

Said appropriation being contingent upon the Town receiving Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars in State or Federal funds. (This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Allenstown Recreation Commission to apply for and accept all Federal and other funds available to be applied to the Allenstown Park Proerty Development mainly intending to apply for and accept Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR). (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to select one of the following to audit the Town's books: (a) a private certified public accountant, or (b) the State of New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration.
- 16. (By Petition) To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to appear as a line item in the Selectmen's Budget for 1980, said sum to be used to assist the Green Meadows Child Care-Kindergarten, Rte. 3, Daniel Webster Highway, Hooksett, N.H. which amount would be matched 4 to 1 for federal dollars. (This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute an indemnification agreement on behalf of the Town of Allenstown indemnifying Cities Service Oil Co. for any cause, claim, expense, demand or liability which may be asserted by the Town of Pembroke in connection with the alleged gasoline seepage on Ferry Street and to pay all costs

and fees in defending against any claim brought by the Town of Pembroke connected with said Ferry Street seepage problem.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred (\$1,400.00) Dollars for the purchase of a steamcleaner. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town collect property taxes on a semi-annual basis.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars for Allenstown's share of funding a juvenile officer. Said juvenile officer will work through the Hooksett District Court. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 21. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-Five Thousand (\$95,000.00) Dollars for the purchase of a 1980 fire truck (1000 GPM Pumper).
 - A. To expend from the Capital Reserve Fund \$20,000.00 for an initial payment.
 - B. To raise the balance of \$75,000.00 through a bond issue for five years at \$15,000.00 per year.

(This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 22. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred (\$15,700.00) Dollars from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new backhoe, which purchase price is \$15,700.00 plus trade-in. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 23. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

"FAIR RENTAL ORDINANCE" "Section 1. Statement of Purpose

A growing shortage of housing units resulted in a critically low vacancy rate constitutes a serious public emergency affecting the lives of a substantial proportion of those Allenstown residents who reside in rental housing or mobile home parks. This emergency condition endangers the public health and welfare of the Town of Allenstown and especially the health and welfare of low and moderate income persons and the elderly. The purpose of this ordinance is to alleviate the hardship caused by this

emergency and at the same time to guarantee a reasonable return on their investment to landlords and property owners to establishing a fair rental board empowered to regulate residential housing and rentals in the Town of Allenstown.

Section II, Coverage

The provisions of this ordinance apply to all rental units in the Town of Allenstown including rented lots in mobile home parks, except:

- 1) A rental unit in an owner occupied two family house;
- 2) Rental unit in hotels, motels, inns tourist homes and rooming or boarding houses which are rented primarily to transeint guests for a period of less than thirty (30) days;
- 3) Rental units the construction of which was completed on or after January 1, 1980, or units which are created by conversion from a non-housing use or or after said date, provided however that such units shall become controlled rental units subject to this ordinance five years and one day after the date of initial occupancy;
- 4) Rental units which a governmental unit, agency or authority either owns, operates, manages or subsidizes;
 - 5) Rental units in non-profit cooperatives;
- 6) Rental units in any hospital, convent, monastery, extended medical care facility, asylum, non-profit home for the aged, or dormitory owned and operated by an institution of higher education.

As used in this ordinance, a rental unit means any building, structure, or part thereof or land appurtenant thereto or any other real property rented or offered for rent for living or dwelling purposes, including houses, apartments, rooming and boarding house units, mobile homes, and lots on which mobile homes are to be situated, for living or dwelling purposes, together with all housing services connected with the use or occupancy of such a property.

Section III. Fair Rental Board

The Fair Rental Board shall be composed of two owners of property rented for residential purposes, one of whom shall be an operator of a mobile home park; two tenants, one of whom shall be a resident of a mobile home park; and one person who is neither the owner of rental property nor a tenant of residential property who shall be appointed by the other members of the

board and shall be the chairperson of the board. The two landlord board members and the two tenant board members shall be appointed by the selectmen. All members of the board shall serve terms of one year. They shall serve without compensation, but such materials, storage and other expenses necessary to perform their duties as enumerated by this ordinance shall be paid by the town.

Section IV. Powers and Duties

- A. The fair rental board is empowered to set maximum rents for all residental rental units in the Town of Allenstown with the exception of those units exempted under Section II. The board is empowered to roll back rents to a base rent established under Section V. The board is empowered to rule upon proposed increases in maximum rents after conducting appropriate investigations and hearings as provided in this ordinance. The board may make such studies, investigations, conduct such hearings, and obtain such information as is necessary to carry out its powers and duties.
- B. The fair rental board shall issue and follow such rules and regulations, including those which are contained in this ordinance, as will further the purposes of this ordinance. The board shall publish its rules and regulations prior to promulgation in at least one newspaper with general circulation in the Town of Allenstown. All rules and regulations and written correspondence explaining the decisions and policies of the board shall be kept in the board's office and shall be available to the public for inspection and copying.
- C. Three board members shall constitute a quorum. When a quorum is present, a majority vote is necessary for a decision, including all motions, orders and rulings of the board.

Section V. Base Rent

The base rent shall be the rent in effect on January 1, 1980. If the rental unit was unoccupied on January 1, 1980 but was occupied at any time prior to the acceptance of this ordinance, the maximum rent shall be the rent charged therefor for the month closest to January 1, 1980. If the maximum rent is not otherwise established, it shall be established by the board. Any maximum rent may be subsequently adjusted under the provisions of Section VI.

Section VI. Maximum Rent Base

A. Conventional Tenancy

The board shall make such individual or general increases of the maximum rent established by Section V for any controlled rental unit as may be necessary to assure that rents for controlled rental units are established at levels which yeild to landlords a fair net operating income for such units. The board shall receive petitions from tenants in opposition to such increases and shall conduct hearings in accordance with the provisions of Section VIII to rule on said petitions.

In reviewing such petitions in opposition to maximum rent increases the board shall consider relevant factors including but not limited to the following:

- a) increases or decreases in property taxes;
- b) unavoidable increases or decreases in operating and maintenance expenses;
- c) capital improvement of the rent controlled unit, as distinguished from ordinary repair, replacement and maintenance;
- d) increases or decreases in living area, furniture, furnishings or equipment;
- e) substantial deterioration of the rent controlled unit other than as a result of ordinary wear and tear; and
- f) failure on the part of the landlord to provide adequate housing services.

B Mobile Home Lots

The board shall not approve a rent increase for a lot in a mobile home park which increase is greater than:

1) one half of the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index on January 1 for the year in which the increase is sought over the Consumer Price Index on January 1 of the prior year. (As used herein, the Consumer Price Index is the cost of living index published by the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics for the New England Region.)

Example: Lot rent is \$100 per month. Consumer Price Index on January 1, 1981 is 10% higher than it was on January 1, 1980. The

maximum rent increase allowable in 1981 is one half of the 10% increase or \$5.00 per month. Or

2) the mobile home park tenant's proportional share of an increase in the real estate taxes or town for the year in which the increase is sought over such taxes or assessment for the previous year. The proportionate share shall be determined by taking the total increase and dividing it by the number of rental units, including any unoccupied at the time the increase is sought, and any unit occupied by the owner or his agent. If however there is a decrease in such taxes or assessments, the tenant may petition the Board for his or her proportional share of the decrease in taxes or assessments.

Whichever Is Greater

Notwithstanding any other provision of this ordinance, in the event that a park owner has encountered the need for unavoidable capital improvement which is essential to maintain the safety, welfare, or habitability of the mobile home park, the Board may in its discretion approve a rent increase in excess of the maximum rent increases established above. No such increase shall be allowed however if the Board finds that such capital improvements were primarily caused by the negligence of the parkowner or his agents.

C. In addition to its consideration of the factors set forth above, the Board may refuse to approve an other wise lawful rent increase, or may conditionally approve such increase if it determines that the affected rental unit does not comply with the minimum standards for health and safety set forward in RSA 48-A or any other state or local statute, code, ordinance, or by-law, concerning the fitness of dwellings for residential failure of the landlord to provide normal and adequate repair and maintenance.

VII. Procedures for Proposed Increases

A. When a tenant has received notice of a proposed rental increase which the tenant believes is greater than the maximum rent allowable under Section VI of this ordinance, he or she may request that the fair rental board inquire of the owner as to the basis for the increase, which inquiry shall be made by the board within ten (10) days from the date of the tenant's request. The owner shall have seven days to respond to the inquiry on forms provided by the board. If the owner fails to adequately respond to the board's request for information, without good cause, it shall be presumed that the rent increase exceeds the maximum level allowed under Section VI.

B. If a tenant requests the board to make an inquiry within seven days of receiving notice of the proposed increase, the increase shall not be effective until a final decision has been rendered by the board. If a tenant requests an inquiry after seven days of receiving notice of the proposed increase, the rent increae, if approved by the board, will be effective as of the date set out in the landlord's notice of proposed rent increase.

Section VIII. Hearings

When the information is provided by the landlord in a complete manner within the requested time, it shall be given to the tenant within seven (7) days of the receipt by the board. The tenant shall then have seven (7) days to request a hearing, the increase shall be given final approval by the board. If the tenant does request a hearing, the fair rental board shall set a time and place for hearing to be held no later than 20 days from the date of the request. Written notice to the landlord and tenant of the time and place of the hearing and of their rights concerning such hearing shall be provided.

At the hearing the tenant and the landlord or their respective representatives shall present their respective cases. They each shall have the right to submit documents and information t use to the board, question each other, and present witnesses where the board determines that such witnesses will be helpful to the board in determining the issue of the validity of the rental increase. The formal rules of evidence will not apply and the board may accept any evidence which in its judgment is competent. The board shall render a decision, approve all, part, or none of the proposed rental increase based solely on the information presented at the hearing. All decisions shall be rendered within seven (7) days of the hearing and shall be in writing.

IX. Evictions

No property owner or landlord shall bring any action to recover possession of a controlled unit where such action is in retaliation for the tenant exercising his or her rights under this ordinance. Any action for possession instituted within 6 months of the time that a hearing under this ordinance has been held shall create a rebuttable presumption that such action was brought in retaliation for the tenant pursuing his or her rights under this ordinance. Such presumption, however, shall not be in effect where the tenant actually owes the landlord the equivalent of one

week's rent or more, has substantially damaged the rented premises, or has violated any material provision of the rental agreement.

X. Penalties

It shall be unlawful for any person to demand, accept or receive any rent for the use or occupancy of any controlled rental unit in excess of the maximum rent determined by the fair rental board under the provisions of this ordinance. Any person who accepts or retains any rent in excess of the maximum rent detrmined under this ordinance shall be fined \$100 for each excess rental payment received.

All rents established in excess of the maximum rent established under this ordinance shall be void ab initio.

XI. Appeal

A landlord or tenant aggrieved by any action or decision of the board may seek review by appealing to the Board of Selectmen. The decision or action of the fair rental board shall be overturned, modified, or altered only if the selectmen find that such decision was clearly erroneous in law or fact. No appeal shall be heard by the selectmen unless a written request is received in their office within 30 days of the mailing of the decision by the fair rental board.

XII. Partial Invalidity

If any provision of this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, this invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Balance Amount of Revenue Sharing Is: \$50,352.86

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for winter and summer maintenance of the highways. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off agains the budgeted

appropriation for Fire Department expense. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

- 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for street light expense. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for Police Department expense. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Two Dollars and Eighty-six cents (\$5,352.86) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation for Library expense. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

RSA 76:11 provides for delivery of the list (warrant) to the collector within thirty days of receipt of approval of the tax rate unless for good cause the time is extended by the department. The collector shall within thirty days after receipt of the warrant from the selectmen (assessors) send out the tax bills unless for good cause the time is extended by this department.

RSA 76:11-a Information Required. The tax bill which is sent to every person taxed, or his agent, if known, is provided in section 11, shall show the rate of municipal, school and county taxes separately, and each bill shall also show the assessed valuation of all lands and buildings for which said person is being taxed. The 1978 rate breakdown reflects a proportionate share of the Reimbursement a/c Property Exempted by 1970 Special Session for each unit of government.

RSA 76:13 provides that interest at 9% per annum shall be charged upon all taxes except resident taxes not paid on or before Dec. 1, except that in the case where a tax bill was sent to a taxpayer on or after Nov. 2 and before April 1st, interest shall not be charged until 30 days after the bills are mailed. The collector shall state on the bill the date from which interest will be charged.

The tax bill which you mail must contain the date from which interest will be charged and this date is determined by the date you sent the last bill on the list committed to you. It is also required by statute that you notify this department in writing of the date on which you sent the last bill. There is enclosed a form for this purpose.

Members of the Board:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of Eugene J. Vallee, Jr., Tax Collector of the Town of Allenstown, which was made by this Division in accordance with your request. The examination covered the period from March 14, 1978 thru August 12, 1978.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records for the period audited were limited to the cash remittance advices from the Tax Collector to the Treasurer and signed receipts of payment approximating one-half of the total dollar amount remitted to the Treasurer. In addition to these, we used as proof of payment, the additional receipts furnished to us by the tax-payers. No postings were made to warrants and no cash book was maintained.

Exhibits 1,2, and 3 were prepared by using copies of the warrants committed to Eugene J. Vallee, Jr. on March 14, 1978, and posting all monies that were substantiated by proof of payment.

Submitted herewith is the report on examination of the financial statements of the Town of Allenstown for the year ended December 31, 1978, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town.

One of the enclosed audits must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the Town's permanent records.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Analysis of Change in Fund Balance. (Exhibit A-2)

Special Revenue Funds:

Federal Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit C-2)

The Town received \$48,908 of Federal Revenue Sharing and interest during the current year. The Town transferred \$52,437 to the General Fund for expenditures, leaving an unexpended balance of \$48,626 for future uses which must be appropriated within 24 months of receipt.

Enterprise Funds:

Sewer Department: (Exhibits E-1, E-2 and E-3)

The Town does not maintain a complete listing of property and equipment on the Sewer Department and does not record related depreciation charges against current revenues. Therefore, we are unable to express an opinion as to the fairness of the Sewer Department Balance Sheet, Statement of Operations and Retained Earnings or Statement of Changes in Financial Position for the current year.

Long-Term Debt Group of Accounts:

Statement of General Long-Term Debt - December 31, 1978: (Exhibit F)

The outstanding long-term debt of the Town has decreased by \$55,000 during the year ended December 31, 1978.

Debt Service Fund:

Statement of Revenues, Transfers and Expenditures For The Year Ended December 31, 1978: (Exhibit G-2)

The Town appropriated \$55,000 for principal and \$64,133 for interest payments for the current year. The Town received from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission the amount of \$99,599 under the provisions of Grant No. C-330104-01, approved December 24, 1975. Of this amount, \$46,612 was transferred to the Town of Pembroke, thus providing a net balance of \$52,987 for long-term interest and debt reimbursement.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of the Municipal Budget Law:

As indicated in Exhibit A-4, Comparative Statement of General Fund Appropriations and Expenditures For The Year Ended December 31, 1978, expenditures exceeded appropriations, resulting in a net Town appropriation overdraft of \$85,147.

Permission for authority to expend \$32,327 in excess of original appropriations was obtained from the Commissioner of Revenue Administration in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated).

GENERAL COMMENTS (Continued)

Therefore expenditures exceeded appropriations by an unauthorized amount of \$52.820.

In towns operating under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, R.S.A. Chapter 32, Section 10 stipulates that the total amount expended for all purposes cannot exceed the total amount appropriated at the Town Meeting for all purposes.

Trust Fund Records:

R.S.A. 31:34 states: "The trustees shall keep a record of all trusts in a record book, which shall be open to the inspection of all persons in their town."

The Trustees do not maintain a record book and we recommend that they do so immediately.

Fire Department Account:

R.S.A. 41:29 states, "The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys belonging to the town and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the selectmen..." The Fire Department maintains a checking account for the purpose of paying wages.

We recommend that the account be terminated and all future wages be paid by the Treasurer to individual employees, upon order of the Selectmen.

School District Tax Payable:

The Town's liability to the School District for taxes as of December 31, 1976 was \$403,358. This amount represented the balance due on the 1976-77 appropriation. However, during 1977 the total amount paid on the 1976-77 appropriation was \$418,718, giving rise to an overpayment. This overpayment, a continuing error from a prior year, should be corrected by a reduction in payments to the School District of \$15,360.

During 1978 an additional \$12,900\$ was paid and should also be applied to the current year's appropriation. Thus the school tax liability at December 31, 1978 is computed as follows:

Purchasing Procedures:

The Town does not have a centralized purchasing system, purchasing generally being a function of individual department heads as required. Such a system, although adequate in the past, does not keep pace with the present growth of government and its improved practices and procedures. We believe the town administrators (Board of Selectmen) have a responsibility to preserve proper separation of duties by participating in the purchasing function of government. Therefore, we recommend the Town adopt a purchasing system incorporating the following procedures:

- 1. Use of prenumbered, sequentially issued purchase orders properly approved by both department heads and selectmen, and maintenance of a record of open purchase orders.
- 2. Preparation by Department heads of receiving reports on all items received after inspection of items for condition and quantity. (A copy of the purchase order may be used for this purpose.)
- 3. The sending of all invoices directly from suppliers to the selectmen's office where invoices are checked against purchase orders and receiving reports for terms, prices and quantities followed by submission to selectmen for final approval before payment.
- 4. Effective cancellation of all invoices and supporting documents upon payment by the person signing the checks.

We are willing to assist you in the implementation of these procedures as time will allow.

Yield Taxes:

R.S.A. 79:3 states: "A normal yield tax at the rate of ten percent on the stumpage value at the time of cutting shall be assessed by the assessing officials within thirty days after receipt of a report of wood or timber cut is filed with said officials in the town in which said operation took place. Said tax shall become due and payable within thirty days of receipt of the bill from the tax collector." Thus, the full amount of tax should be committed to the tax collector.

The Town of Allenstown commits to the tax collector, generally, an amount equal to the full tax less any deposit received. This procedure is incorrect since the full amount has not been committed. Thus, any deposit received should be returned to the taxpayer at the time he pays his tax. The taxpayer may then use this deposit as a partial payment at his option.

GENERAL COMMENTS (Continued)

Bond and Coupon Account:

Cancelled bonds and coupons were not returned to the Treasurer and a bond and coupon register was not set up during the year as required by R.S.A. 33:12 and recommended by previous audit reports. However, during May of 1979 steps were taken to initiate these procedures.

Highway Subsidy Funds:

R.S.A. 251:14 and R.S.A. 241:15 authorize the Commissioner of public works and highways to pay funds to towns to be used only for the purpose of maintenance, construction and/or reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways. Records should be maintained by the town as prescribed by the commission. Also, reports to the commission of receipts and expenditures should be filed annually by the town. The town of Allenstown did not account separately for the expenditures of such funds nor were copies of the reports sent to the Commissioner retained. Thus it was not possible to audit these highway funds for legal compliance. We recommend that a separate accounting of Highway Subsidy funds be maintained in the future.

Record Keeping Procedures:

The town maintains the general fund cash receipts, cash disbursements, payroll journals and general ledger on computer at a service bureau. Printouts of these records were supplied monthly to the Town. The town did not make use of these records during the year, since it was necessary to assemble them in usable form for audit. Information contained in these records was not reconciled at all during the year to accounting records maintained by the treasurer and tax collector, resulting in a substantial increase in audit fees. Also, general ledger balances are incorrect since beginning balances were never supplied by the town to the computer center. We recommend that steps be taken to reconcile general ledger balances to detailed information on at least a monthly basis, and that the computer center be supplied with correct balances.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 19-III, require that the auditor's summary of findings and recommendations shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

Board of Selectmen Town Office Allenstown, New Hampshire 03275

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Allenstown for the year ended December 31, 1978 listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As is the practice with many New Hampshire communities, the Town of Allenstown has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

Also, as discussed in Note 2 to the financial statements, the Town has not capitalized the cost of all property and equipment purchased by the Sewer Department, nor taken any depreciation thereon. Generally accepted accounting principles require that property and equipment of enterprise funds be capitalized and depreciated over the useful lives of the assets. The Town's records do not permit the application of adequate procedures to enable us to determine the cost value of capital assets or related depreciation expense on them.

Since we were unable to determine the cost value of property and equipment and depreciation charges for all capital assets in the Sewer Department, as noted in the above paragraph, the scope of our work was not sufficient to enable us to express, and we do not express, an opinion on the Sewer Department financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents, other than the financial statements of the Sewer Department, present fairly the financial positions of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Allenstown at December 31, 1978 and the results of

operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental schedules included in this report, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations of such funds and group of accounts, are presented primarily for supplemental analysis purposes. This additional information has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the aforementioned examination of the basic financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

AUDITOR'S OPINION ON REVENUE SHARING COMPLIANCE

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Allenstown, account number 30-3-007-001 for the year ended December 31, 1978, and have issued our report thereon dated June 1, 1979.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In connection with our examination, we also (1) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulations as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the Audit Guide And Standards For Revenue Sharing And Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients (Guide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury, and (2) compared the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-8 with the audited records of the Town of Allenstown as required by Sections II.C.4. of the "Guide". Our findings are set forth below:

- (a) The Town has failed to comply with the provisions of Section 52.44 which require that ARFA funds be appropriated or obligated within six months of their receipt. The funds received totalling \$818 have not been appropriated or obligated as of the date of this report.
- (b) A memorandum record was not maintained of voucher numbers and amounts of expenditures.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. SIMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

Fund Accounting

The diverse nature of governmental operations and the necessity of determining compliance with legal provisions requires modification of accounting systems commonly used by commercial enterprises. Rather than establishing a single unified set of accounts to record and summarize all financial transactions. the accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate entity with self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balances, revenues and expenditures or expenses, including interfund obligations and transfers.

There are two general categories of the Town's operations. The first consists of operations supplying the basic services of a general government nature which are controlled by legal budgets. These operations are accounted for in the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds and Capital Projects Fund. The second consists of those operations which are similar to commercial enterprises. These operations are accounted for in Enterprise Funds.

In addition to the two general categories of operations, a further distinction from accounting in commercial enterprises exists with respect to capital expenditures. Capital expenditures made for the revenue-producing assets which are employed in operations that are accounted for in the Enterprise - Sewer Fund should be capitalized at historical cost and depreciated over estimated useful lives by the straight-line method. Other capital expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts primarily for control purposes. The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

Fiduciary activities of the Town are accounted for in a Trust and Agency Fund.

General obligation bonds supported by general revenues are obligations of the Town as a whole and not its individual constituent funds. Accordingly, such unmatured obligations which are backed by the full faith and credit of the Town are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Group of Accounts.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Budgetary Accounting and Encumbrances

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations.

Appropriations in budgetary funds are encumbered upon issuance of purchase orders, contracts or other forms of legal commitments. Even though certain goods and services have not been received, the transactions are accounted for as a reduction of budgeted appropriations in the year that the commitment is made.

Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General Fund, Enterprise - Sewer Fund and Capital Projects Fund are maintained and reported on an accrual basis. All other funds included in the financial statements are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis.

Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when received in cash, except in cases where they are both measurable and available, and therefore are resources which may be appropriated. Expenditures, except for interest on general long-term debt which is recorded when it becomes due, are recorded when certain goods or services are received and actual liabilities are incurred.

Other General Accounting Policies

Materials and supplies of the Enterprise Fund are stated at the lower of cost or market with cost determined by the first-in, first-out method.

2. WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT:

The costs of the Waste Water Treatment Plant situated in Allenstown were jointly paid by the Towns of Pembroke and Allenstown in the following proportions:

> PEMBROKE ALLENSTOWN 35%

Actual operations of the plant were started in 1977. Costs of sewer lines and supporting expenses within the geographical limits of each town were paid in whole by the respective towns. The amount of \$1,322,547 shown in Exhibit E-1 for Investment in Jointly Owned Plant, represents only the cost of the construction contract for the plant. Incidental expenses relating to the construction of the plant could not be separated between plant and sewer lines; hence all incidental expenses are included with Sewer Lines (\$1,669,803 on Exhibit E-1).

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT: (Continued)

Operational expenses of plant for the year ended December 31, 1978 were shared 48.5% by Pembroke and 51.5% by Allenstown.

Neither Town maintains a detailed record of fixed assets of the Enterprise Fund. Therefore, a proper determination of depreciation expense to be charged against operating revenues could not be made for the year under audit.

3. SEWER BONDS:

The Town of Allenstown receives annual payments from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission under the provisions of Grant No. C-330104-01 approved December 24, 1975 for reimbursement of principal and interest of the 1971 Sewer Bonds. Thus, during 1978 Allenstown received \$52,987 for such purposes.

4. PENSION PLAN:

All full-time police officers of the Town participate in the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by statute and dependant upon age when contributions begin. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan, and has been set at 8.04% of compensation at December 31, 1978. The cost for the year ended December 31, 1978 was \$1,045.00. The amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Allenstown is not available. The Town has no past service obligation.

5. ALLOWANCE FOR UNCOLLECTIBLE TAXES:

An allowance for uncollectible taxes was established for taxes to be abated in 1979 as follows:

Planning Commission

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission has been in existence since 1970 and during this period has continued its involvement in studies of both a regional as well as a local nature. The Commission acts as an advisory body to its member municipalities and as such is often invited to participate in local planning projects. As a part of the ongoing technical assistance provided, the Commission has been pleased to be able to assist the Planning Board in the following areas: review of changes to state laws, information regarding industrial zoning and discussion of master plan procedures. At the request of the Town representatives to the Commission the Commission provided data and conducted a meeting regarding the problems of sludge disposal from treatment plants.

The Commission, this past year, hosted seminars on capital improvements programming and the fall legal seminar series.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member municipalities in the future and appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Allenstown.

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., continued to service Allenstown for the nineth year. They have provided skilled nursing care for anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurse's visits.

Special services; such as, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, and nutritional guidance have been given the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of homemaker-home health aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping, and assist with meal planning and meal preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition, sickness, and accident prevention.

Anyone in Allenstown may request these services - doctor, family, pastor, friend or the patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided only under the doctor's orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

The annual meeting of the Allenstown School District was held on March 3, 1979 at the Allenstown Elementary School Gymnasium Hall, Main Street at 1:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Mr. George Guertin at 1:12 p.m. where upon he commenced and completed reading of the warrant. The moderator then brought our assembly to a slight delay due to voters' checklists having been delayed in arriving at meeting. As soon as Louise Letendre supervisor of checklist arrived with checklist she and supervisor Ella Bellerose proceeded in checking out present voters at assembly.

Upon completion, Walter Batchelder brought a point of order asking head table introduction. Moderator allowed introduction of officers present as well as suggesting usage of loudspeaker system at all times. We then proceeded in carrying out the twelve warrant articles.

Article 1:

TO DETERMINE AND APPOINT THE SALARIES OF THE SCHOOL BOARD AND TRUANT OFFICER, AND FIX THE COMPENSATION OF ANY OTHER OFFICERS OR AGENTS OF THE DISTRICT.

Moderator requested we pass over and take motion on this article after article 10 has been reviewed.

Article 2:

TO HEAR THE REPORTS OF AGENTS, AUDITORS, COMMITTEES OR OFFICERS CHOSEN, AND PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO:

Passed over as no action required on this article.

Article 3:

TO CHOOSE AGENTS AND COMMITTEES IN RELATION TO ANY SUBJECT EMBRACED IN THIS WARRANT.

Passed over.

Article 4:

TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO ACCEPT FUNDS IN THE AMOUNTS SET FORTH BELOW WHICH MAY BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE DISTRICT THRU THE FOLLOWING FEDERAL PROGRAMS:

Further, to authorize the school board to apply for and expend the sum of \$250,000.00 for such purposes provided that the school district will not be thereby required to raise any money by local taxation in this or subsequent years as the result of such expenditure of \$250,000.00. Approved by the Budget Committee.

The motion to accept this article was made by Edmond Duchesne and seconded by Joanne Therrien. No discussion followed; on voice vote, motion passed unanimous.

Article 5:

TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO APPLY FOR AND EXPEND ON BEHALF OF THE DISTRICT FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDS OTHER THAN THOSE SET FORTH IN ARTICLE 5.

Mr. Gerald Lavoie, school board member, pointed out last word in this article should be 4, not 5. Mr. Lavoie moved to accept this article as amended, seconded by Mr. Duchesne. Mr. Walter Batchelder then asked school board members and chairman of Budget Committee, Mr. Roger Menard, if accepting these funds in article 5 may cause us increased tax appropriations. Superintendent, Mr. Croteau, explained Federal Funds Articles as written up for articles 4 and 5 reassuring voters that this would be impossible. Mr. William Smith also had a question on such and school district attorney gave further explanation on federal funding. No further questions, on voice vote motion passed unanimous.

Article 6:

TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO APPROVE THE USE OF PROJECT SECOND START AS AN ALTERNATIVE HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION PROGRAM.

Ed Duchesne made the motion to accept this article as read and it was seconded by Frank Danieli. Explanation of this article was requested by Theresa Connor. Ed explained Project Second Start applies to those high school age students who have dropped out of school or will be dropouts. This program is designed to take over in another type curriculum, conducted in Concord, to help them adjust or finish towards obtaining a diploma. This article allows school district to take the appropriated tuition money allotted said student and reroute it to pay for Second Start Project so covering the cost of conducting this special type education. It has been the school board's past experience that there becomes few students participating in this program. No further questions, upon voice vote, passed unanimous.

At this point in our meeting Mr. Charlie Todd had a point of order for moderator. Asking if our school district budget is legal due to two signatures being absent from it. Moderator replied affirmative since majority of board signed the budget. We then proceeded to article #7.

Article 7:

TO SEE IF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO ADOPT AND APPROVE THE COST ITEMS AS SET FORTH IN THE LATEST COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT WITH THE ALLENSTOWN TEACHERS ASSOCIATION FOR THE 1978-1979 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR.

Before motion could be brought on article 7, school board member. Ed Duchesne asked to be recognized and proceeded in explaining board's agreements. He reassured voters we were agreeing on a good package for townspeople as well as teachers. He asked for voters' support of this package. Motion made to accept article as read by Joanne Therrien and seconded by Larry Bernard. Discussion followed on cost items' increases as answered by Superintendent, Mr. Croteau. Mr. John Welch wanted to know if we were voting funds for next three years; Mr. Croteau agreed the Collective Bargaining agreements are for the next three years, however school district funds can only be legally voted upon for one year at a time. Today's voting is for only the coming school year contracts. Mr. Walter Batchelder wanted to know if the arbitration costs would be a separate cost item and it was replied NO that it is merely an administrative expense. No further questions, by voice vote approved as read and passed unanimous.

Article 8:

TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$335,773.37 TO FUND ALL COST ITEMS RELATING TO TEACHERS' SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR THE 1979-1980 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR, \$11,933.47 OF SUCH SUM REPRESENTING ADDITIONAL COSTS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE LATEST COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO BY THE SCHOOL BOARD AND THE ALLENSTOWN TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.

Approved by the Budget Committee. No questions asked, all had been made clear in previous article discussions. Motion made to accept article as read by Ed Duchesne and seconded by Donald Boisvert. By voice vote article passed unanimous.

Article 9:

TO SEE IF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO ADOPT AND APPROVE THE COST ITEMS AS SET FORTH IN THE LATEST COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT WITH THE ALLENSTOWN TEACHERS ASSOCIATION FOR THE 1980-1981 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR.

Motion made to accept article as read by William Smith seconded by John Welch. By voice vote, passed unanimous.

Article 10:

TO SEE WHAT SUM OF MONEY THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE FOR THE SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICIALS AND AGENTS OTHER THAN BENEFITS AND SALARIES PAYABLE TO TEACHERS, AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

Mr. Frank Danieli, board member, made a motion to change wording of article 10 in order to clarify the exact amount the town's tax moneys are being raised, aside from moneys in article 4 and 8. Mr. Danieli's motion was seconded by Ed Duchesne and will now read: I MOVE THAT THE DISTRICT VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE \$847,231.63 FOR THE SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICIALS AND AGENTS OTHER THAN BENEFITS AND SALARIES PAYABLE TO TEACHERS, AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS OF THE DISTRICT. Mr. Danieli pointed out we already approved \$335,773.37 in article 8 as well as \$250,000.00 of federal funds in article 4 and now the balance of our \$1,433,005.00 budget will be \$847,231.63 from article 10.

Moderator then opened discussion on line item budget and asked assembly if we wanted to take each line item separately or take the budget as a whole thereby answering individual item questions as they come up. Mr. Asher Kneeland moved we take budget as a whole and this motion was seconded by Jerry Lavoie. This motion passed on a yea vote and moderator proceeded in accepting discussions. No requests came to change appropriations on any given line item amount of budget after various line item questions came up for discussion. After discussions came to a close, moderator reread reworded article. By voice vote, article passed unanimous.

Article 11:

TO SEE IF THE VOTERS OF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO ACCEPT GIFTS AND DONATIONS ON BEHALF OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Motion made by Armand Dupont to approve as read and seconded by Mary Kneeland. Article passed unanimous.

Article 12:

TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE SAID MEETING.

Chairman of school board, Edmond Duchesne brought recognition to Mr. Gerald Lavoie who is not seeking reelection as school board member after six years of service. Mr. Lavoie thanked all present for the cooperation he received while in office

The moderator then returned to article one — no further action was needed or changes requested. It is a line item in budget.

Asher Kneeland made a motion to adjourn, Joanne Therrien seconded, motion passed. The meeting came to a close at 2:25 p.m.

Further, to authorize the school board to apply for and expend the sum of \$275,000.00 for such purposes provided that the school district will not be thereby required to raise any money by local taxation in this or subsequent years as the result of such expenditures of \$275,000.00. Approved by the Budget Committee.

- 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for and expend on behalf of the District Federal and State Funds other than those set forth in Article 5.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to make a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$39,297.33 for the 1979-1980 school fiscal year. Approved by the Budget Committee.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of \$5.607.45 by taxation and to appropriate that sum of money and an additional sum of \$16,823.00 to be received by the District from the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of funding tuition costs incurred by the District in sending students to the Concord Regional Vocational Center. Approved by the Budget Committee.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to establish the position of "Special Education Coordinator" as a service to School Administrative Unit #53 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,724.22 as the School District's share. Approved by Budget Committee.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of the Statutory Obligations of the District.
- 9. To see if the Voters of the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept gifts and donations on behalf of the School District.
- 10. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Elementary School Lunch Program:

R.S.A. 197:23-a Treasurer's Duties, states in part "The treasurer shall have custody of all monies belonging to the district and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the school board"

At the present time, School Lunch Funds are maintained in the custody of the School Lunch Director. Funds received from the sale of meals and milk, as well as federal reimbursement funds received through the School District, and in some instances, District appropriations, are deposited by the School Lunch Director and all payments for food and supplies, as well as some equipment purchases and payrolls, are made by the School Lunch Director. The Treasurer is not involved in the transactions, nor are invoices or manifests approved by the School Board.

We believe this to be a serious weakness in internal control due to the lack of proper segregation of duties of the School Lunch Program Director. Therefore, we strongly recommend that School Lunch Funds be handled by the Treasurer to strengthen internal controls and comply with State law.

Upper Elementary Student Activity Fund:

The activity funds for the Upper Elementary School were not kept in such a manner as to be audited. The custodian has been informed as to the proper method of accounting for these funds and has set up a system for the year 1979-80.

Conclusion:

The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditor's summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Allenstown School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.
