# TOWN WARRANT 1931

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*State of New Hampshire*

*Carroll S. S.*

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll, qualified to vote in town affairs. You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House at Center Conway, N. H., March 10, 1931, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- Section A. Town officers' salaries.  
B. Town officers' expenses.  
C. Election and registration.  
D. Municipal court.  
E. Town Hall and office expense.  
F. Police department.  
G. Fire department.  
H. Health department.  
I. Vital statistics.  
J. Memorial Hospital.

M. Tarvia maintenance.

ART. 3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town the sum of \$60,000, if needed.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State aid for the improvement of its highways as provided by law.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to purchase a Road Grader.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the Federal Road between Center Conway and Fryeburg line.

ART. 9. To see what action the Town will take relative to having one Road Agent in the Town of Conway.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to build a bridge across the Pequawket river at a point near the residence of Dr. C. M. Wiggin, and raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to carry this into effect, agreeable to a petition signed by O. C. Johnson and others.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to repair and tarvia Grove Street in North Conway Village, from its intersection with Maine Street to the M. C.

R. R. crossing, agreeable to the petition signed by F. L. Spencer and others.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to widen, grade and tar the streets of Redstone, agreeable to the petition of C. H. Craig and others, and recommended by the Budget Committee.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to widen and repair Oak Street, in Conway Village, agreeable to a petition signed by George Philbrick and others.

ART. 14. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

To the Citizens of Conway:

This year a most satisfactory report can be presented of the service given by the Conway Public Library. The circulation of books has been much larger than in any previous year. The Reading Room attendance has also increased. The high school students find in the generous collection of current magazines much valuable material for research work. It is noted that this year a larger percent of non-fiction was used.

The Conway Woman's Club again sponsored a very worth while Vacation Reading Course for the pupils of the grammar grades. The Library Extension Committee of this club gave a Webster's Unabridged Dictionary and several volumes of reference books to the Library. This committee has also sponsored a "Story Hour" for the children of the primary grades. This is given once a month during the fall and winter and it has been well attended and greatly enjoyed by the children.

During "Children's Book Week" fifty new books were put into circulation for the boys and girls. An Art Exhibit from the Smead School for Girls in Toledo, Ohio, was displayed during the summer months and

was the center of much interest.

Mr. Clarence E. Eastman from Minneapolis, Minn., sent an interesting collection of Indian relics for the Curio Room, and a beautiful picture of Fujiyama done by a Japanese artist. Mr. Eastman again at Christmas sent One Hundred Dollars for the purchase of books.

The Conway Rotary Club presented the Library with a Sixty Dollar check. It is the wish of the Rotarians that this money be used as a nucleus for a Trust Fund to be known as "The Conway Library Trust Fund" and that the interest of this fund be used annually for the purchase of books.

As regards the building, only minor repairs were necessary this year, these included work on the roof and furnace.

At the Center Conway Library there have been several gifts of books. Mrs. Glackens sent a twenty-four volume set of encyclopedia for the juvenile readers. Mrs. Comstock gave Ten Dollars for the purchase of books. The outstanding need at The Center Conway Library is the refinishing of the ceiling walls and floor. It is hoped that the Library appropriation will allow for these improvements to be made.

Considering the amount of money expended for books, both Miss Pollard and Mrs. Littlefield have assembled a collection of books that can be compared most favorably with that of libraries many times the size of ours. It is hoped that the increased interest in our libraries may continue and that these two institutions may give a much bigger service to our town.

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### NORTH CONWAY PARK COMMISSION

The North Conway Park has lived through its second summer. As in a child so in nature the second summer is one fortunate if survived.

Where \$1,450.39 was expended in 1929 to bring the park into being but \$320.87 was spent to keep it growing this year.

At the beginning of the season the Commissioners hoped to have a wading pool at the south end. Letters asking for donations were sent out. Fifty dollars only was received. Due to the universal condition of business it was deemed wise to let this matter rest for the time being.

Therefore the new year begins with this fifty dollars still in the treasury, toward the pool.

The community tree died in March, 1930. This was not replaced but the promise of replacement has been given for 1931.

The need for shade trees for the park is very evident. These will be solicited in so far as is expedient for this season and marked appropriately. It is hoped that clubs, lodges etc., as well as individuals will help make the arbor day one of happiness and cooperation.

Whereas in one sense the commissioners are far from satisfied with the results of 1930, they feel in another that the park was fortunate to come through this year of depression.

The Park is now a part, a necessary part of our Main street. Each year it is being used by more of our



people and guests. Upkeep and care it must have. Dependence upon friends will not do it all so again the commissioners recommend that an appropriation be made covering the necessary care for the coming year.

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### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Conway:

This report is informative and is in the main a joint report of the school board and of the superintendent.

During the summer vacation the money raised for special repairs was expended for these purposes: New curtains were installed at Center Conway and other small repairs made including some changes in the heating system. At North Conway the blackboards were refinished and 120 old desks resurfaced. In the Conway Grammar School there was a small repair job on



the ceilings and in the Kennett High School the laboratory was repainted. A modern ventilating stove was installed at Redstone.

Some outside painting should be done next year and a new stove bought for Kearsarge. At the high school one room should be refinished each year.

The Parent-Teacher Association of Conway presented the high school with the Encyclopaedia Britannica, and refinished and furnished the office at the Conway Grammar School for the proper care of pupils who may become ill in school. A similar room was provided by the Parent-Teacher Association at North Conway two years ago.

The Red Cross has been very cooperative with our school health and has sponsored a hot lunch program at the Conway Grammar School. Hot lunches are served by the Senior Class at Kennett High School at recess.

The principal items of our school expenditures for the year ending June 30, 1931, are approximately indicated at percentages of the total expenditure in this table:

(1) Teachers' salaries,	54%
(2) Transportation,	12%
(3) Maintenance of buildings,	6%
(4) Janitors,	5%
(5) Fuel,	3½%

Roughly 80% of the school expenses comes under these five schedules.

The school district is employing twenty-six teachers and the salaries paid are neither high nor low. They are fairly comparable with the salaries paid in other towns of equal population and resources. It is not a safe rule to assume that in every particular case the salary paid bears a direct relation to the teacher's value. However, when we consider the average of a

large group, it is true that we get about what we pay for. The school district cannot enter into competition with larger and richer towns and pay salaries which would retain every teacher whom we would like to keep; neither can it afford to engage teachers at a salary level so low that we must employ the misfits of other school systems.

The item of transportation is and will remain large. Conway has a township high school and transportation for the villages of North Conway, Redstone, and Center Conway is an obligation voluntarily assumed and morally binding. Further we have eight elementary routes which the law and the geography of the town compel us to maintain. If we had no elementary transportation we should have at least five more rural schools.

The Grammar School at Conway has been unusually large for two years and it has seemed best to add another teacher. Otherwise we should have over ninety pupils in the upper grades for two teachers to care for. With the extra teacher we now have what is practically a 4-grade school (5-8 inclusive) of ninety pupils taught by three teachers with departmental instruction. It is an ideal form of organization for this particular situation.

We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. A. W. Evans for gratuitous instruction and free use of equipment in manual training at Conway.

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## REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

Superintendent John H. Fuller:

The following is a brief survey of the work of the

Kennett High School for the past year.

We have had in mind three major objectives: school citizenship, scholarship, and recreational training. It is to be recognized that there are other objectives which arise from time to time, and with varying individuals; but these three are the large problems of our school year.

If, as John Dewey has said, "school is life and not training for life," then it is our belief that conditions in and about school should duplicate to a large degree the conditions we shall meet outside when we leave. To us it has seemed that this calls for a democratic form of government, where each has his or her part to play for the benefit of the whole group. We have made no attempt to organize our school into a form of student government ruled by an autocratic if hidden hand, but we have granted every liberty that seems to have no effect upon the individual's neighbor, understanding that when any activity does so interfere, it is bad manners and bad form. I believe that we have met with some success, as you were kind enough to suggest last June. A school so conducted comes far from meeting the ideal of the old disciplinarian, but at least it is an attempt to meet a real situation. Our students have been noted as quiet and orderly by our state inspectors, and I believe they have conducted themselves in public and private in a highly creditable manner.

The second objective, scholarship, was often the only aim of the old school, and is of necessity of major importance. By scholarship we have in mind not deep learning but a real effort to acquire the tools of an education, and to learn to use them with a fair degree of accuracy and facility as far as our abilities permit us to do so. Reports of our graduates at schools and colleges would indicate that our school compares favorably with similar schools in the state, although we are far from satisfied with our results as yet. We are a

member of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board, and hold special privileges from Dartmouth and Worcester Polytechnic Institute. At mid-year better than 20% of our student body were maintaining an average of 85% in all of their subjects.

Recreational training for all is probably the least realized of the three objectives. Recreation is bound to become more and more important as time passes, and it should feature not competitive sports so much as those games and recreations we may have opportunity to pursue in after life. At present we are limiting ourselves to those sports which offer the greatest opportunity for gate receipts, as we have no other large source of income for this purpose. Baseball, basketball, track and football, have real value from an educational point of view, both for the player and the school as a whole, but none of them promises us much recreation in adult life. We should play tennis and golf, should swim, hike, trap shoot, and the like. Unless our future citizen has some means of spending his leisure time profitably and with interest, he is bound to become a problem.

Our athletic program is being continued with more games for more teams. New sports are being added as opportunity presents itself. We have continued to decrease our athletic debt in spite of heavy expense for new and larger amounts of equipment last year. This has been made possible by the loyal support of our townspeople and student body. One feature of our money-raising program of the past year has been the trial of a so called "Work Day," during which every student was to get some sort of a job and turn the proceeds over to the fund for the use of all. We believe this idea well worth while from every point of view. The North Conway Parent-Teachers' Association made a very welcome contribution to our treasury this fall, the first of its kind we have ever received. Our teams



for the past year have won more than half of their contests and all, with one exception, with competition well within or above our class, from a numerical standpoint. This is an excellent record and is perhaps as great a percentage of victories as we should expect or even wish to attain. We all like to win, but too many victories are as bad as too few in their affect upon the school.

Last June we graduated a class of 23, and of that number 15 have continued their education, 7 in institutions of college grade, 5 in normal and other training schools, and 3 in schools of secondary grade. We also had 5 other graduates of former years enter colleges or training schools for the first time. We have students spread from Bates on the north to North Carolina on the south, and Colorado on the west.

No report of the school could be complete without mention of the gift of a new set of Encyclopedia Britannica, made by the Conway Parent-Teachers' Association.

Co-operation of school board, students and citizens mean a successful school, and I have never experienced this spirit to a greater degree than while at Conway.

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## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

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Mr. John H. Fuller,  
Superintendent of Schools:

The following is the report of the health work done this year:

Seven hundred and twenty-seven children have had the routine examination and in addition to this



many individual and class room inspections have been made for symptoms of communicable diseases.

In May and June, 1930, Toxin-Antitoxin clinics were conducted in several schools, Dr. Wiggin and Dr. John Shedd, School Physicians, giving the treatments in their respective districts. About ninety children were inoculated against Diphtheria, thirty-two of these being pre-school children, proving that many parents wish to protect their children during the most susceptible years to this disease.

A Dental clinic was held in Conway Grammar School, under the auspices of the local chapter, American Red Cross and much Prophylactic and corrective work was done.

The Red Cross is conducting hot lunches, under the supervision of the teachers, in several schools. Many of the children take their dinners to school and hot soup or cocoa adds much to the enjoyment of this meal as well as being a material benefit to the child.
