RESULTS OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 7, 1975

Moderator, W. Douglas Scamman, opened the meeting with the reading fo the remaining warrant. Rev. Andrew Gilman offered a prayer. The moderator read the results of the March 4, 1975 town and school ballots.

### ARTICLE 3.

Laurence Foss, Dhairman of the Budge Committee read the proposed budget. Betty Corbin made motion to accept the budget of \$171,680.07. Richard Scamman seconded the motion. Robert Wiggin made an amendment to decrease budget by \$60,795.00. Motioned seconded. Mr. Foss discussed the Police Department budget. Richard Scamman explained need for it and that we could not expect help from State Police and Sheriff Department because of their lack of manpower. Christopher Rowe explained the need for the Fire Department monies. George Brown explained las years expenditures and income for the Highway Department. Dana Noyes asked how many

roads had been tarred and at what cost. Richard Wiggin asked questions on engineering fees if we were with out the services of George Brown. William Roberts moved the question. No vote on Robert Wiggin's amendment. Ray Wenninger made motion to increase budget by \$1,077.60 to include town's share for the Southeastern Regional Planning Commission. Mition seconded. No vote. Floyd Turner made motion to decrease budget by \$75.00 excluding the Seacoast Regional Association. Raymond Parsons seconded motion Nelson Barker explained function of Association. No vote. Questions were raised on the cost of tarring the portion of Union Road formerly known as Kelly Road. The original motion was moved. A yes vote on the \$171,680.07 budget.

### ARTICLE 4.

John Flynn made the folling amendment to the article. The article read Thirty Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600.00) for the purchase of a police package cruiser. Francis Frasier seconded. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 5.

Betty Corbin asked Miss Tina Marsh to explain function of Newmarket Health Care Center. Betty Corbin moved motion. Richard Scamman seconded. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 6.

Francis Frasier made motion. Betty Corbin seconded. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 7.

John Hutton moved motion. Richard Scamman seconded. No vote.

### ARTICLE 8.

Betty corbin moved motion. John Hutton seconded. Gerald Batchelder described the type of work needed in the old cemeteries and that the Historical Society would donate the labor. No vote.

### ARTICLE 9.

Richard Scamman made motion. John Hutton seconded. Treasurer, Kenneth Lanzillo explained the need for this article. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 10.

John Hutton moved motion. Richard Scarman seconded. No vote.

### ARTICLE 11.

Richard Scamman made motion. John Hutton seconded. Laurence Foss made motion to table article. Rudolph Bume seconded. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 12.

John Hutton made motion. Richard Scamman seconded. Rudolph Bume made an amendment to change it from 1% to 2% discount. No vote on amendment. Yes vote on article.

### ARTICLE 13.

Richard Scamman made motion. Betty Corbin seconded. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 14.

Richard Scamman made motion to table article but to retain the dump committee. John Hutton seconded the motion. Yes vote.

### ARTICLE 15.

William Robinson made motion that the Highway Department and Police Department budget for the coming year be itemized. Francis Wentworth amended motion to include all articles. Amendment accepted by Mr. Robinson. Yes vote.

John Hutton made motion that moderator appoint budget committee for next year. James Scamman seconded. Yes vote.

Meeting adjourned at 10:26 p.m.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lower Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the second day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE 2. Residential-Agricultural District. All residents must have at least two entrances and/or exits (mainly a front and rear door). All homes using the basement area as a living quarters (such as bedrooms) must have two exits (a bulkhead type door as well as stairs from the floor above). The Planning did recommend approval of this article.
- ARTICLE 3. All new buildings used for Commercial purpose shall supon completion have a final inspection by building inspector and issued a certificate of occupancy before opening. The Planning Board did recommend approval of this article
- ARTICLE 4. A fee of \$15.00 will be charged for the inspection and approval of new septic, sewerage or water systems seeking local approval. The fee to be paid to the Town of Stratham. The Planning Board did recommend approval of this article.

- ARTICLE 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the Town; Inv. #53 Union Road station 36tol0 to 65\*65 0.56 mi WDG & S (end of tar to Greenland town line) such sum to be raised through the issurance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, NH RSA, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Stratham.

- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will allow the Stratham Fair Association to build a combination exhibit and recreation building at Stratham Hill Park?
- ARTICLE 8. By petition of Robert M. Hill and ten other voters: To see if the Town of Stratham will vote, by a yes or no ballot, to create, establish, and maintain a Town Mosquito Control District under the provisions of RSA 437-A of N. H. State Laws. The boundary of the District shall be the boundaries of the Town. The goal is to try to eliminate breeding conditions for mosquitoes?
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town of Stratham will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) for labor and materials to conduct a Mosquito Breeding Site Survey during the summer of 1976?

  By petition of Robert M. Hill and ten other voters.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will accept Stratham Hill Fire Tower from the State Department of Resourses and Economic Development, Division of Forests and Lands?
- ARTICLE 11. By petition of Gerald M. Batchelder and twelve other voters. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$1,138.80) as payment of the Town of Stratham's membership dues in the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission for the year 1976?
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for repairs to the Wiggin Memorial Library?
- ARTICLE 13. By petition of Barbara J. Simmons and eleven other voters. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be used for the support of the Newmarket Health Center Inc.?
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum fo Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to purchase one acre of land from Marion Cole adjacent to existing town land?
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of building an addition to the existing fire station and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payments of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town?
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum fo Three Thousand Eighty Dollars (\$3,080.00) for the Town's participation in the expenses of the Exeter Area Youth Group Home?

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Three Thousand Dollars (\$23,000.00) for the purchase of a 1962 Gallion Grader such sum to be raised through the issurance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, N.H. RSA as amended and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Stratham?
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center?
- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing and hauling gravel to be stock piled at the town pit for the use of the Highway Department?
- ARTICLE 20. By petition of Robert T. Wiggin, Jr. and nineteen other voters. To see if the Town will vote to elect the members of the Planning Board beginning with the next regular town meeting and in accordance with the procedures set forth in the NH RSA Chapter 36:4 II (2) and (3)?
- ARTICLE 21. By petition of Robert T. Wiggin, Jr. and fourteen other voters. To see if the Town will vote to prevent the selectmne, any organization, or any individual from moving or construction any building on Stratham Hill Park or any other town land, unless approved at a town meeting?
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ITEM E. Resolution A. Sample Resolution to be used when applying for Flood Insurance

Whereas, certain areas of Stratham are subject to periodic flooding from (Streams, Rivers, Lakes, Oceans, etc.) causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and Whereas, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and Whereas, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and Whereas, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, and 156A.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program REgulations; and

2. Vests (the Planning Board or Town Manager or other duly authorized Municipal Officer) with the responsibility, authority and mean to:

- (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain. (c) Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards. (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the developement and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded. 4. Intends to take such other official action

within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 as follows: The Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvemnt (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistent to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes?
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 1% discount on such property taxes as are paid in full within 30 days from the day the Tax Warrant is committed to the Tax Collector, the date to be printed on the tax bill?

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come fefore this meeting.

### HIGHWAY AGENTS REPORT

As Town Meeting nears find a new highway program year starts, it is an appropriate time to plan for the new. As I reported last year the highway program is really a Public Works program consisting of the following: A. Town road and maintenance (these having top priority). B. Town dump and maintenance. C. Parks, playgrounds, lawns and trash disposal and maintenance. D. Cemeteries, graves, burials and lawns and maintenance. E. Public buildings, lawns and parking lots. F. Snow removal (all areas). G. Lawn mowing program (park, cemeteries, school, library, fire house and town hall). There are four seperate sudgets, namely, highway, park dump and cemeteries added together totaling the public works budget.

Several betterment drainage projects were undertaken this year, the largest at Berry's Circle development with 400' of storm drain system with pipe and drop inlet manholes eliminating surface water creating a very wet condition in the summer and ice problems in the winter. This project will be complete when 800' of open ditch is installed this year. A simular project was completed at Kurgan's on High Street where a very icy condition existed every winter due to high water table and fast run off.

Resurfacing by ceiling and sanding was accomplished on the following roads: Depot, Sandy Point, Stratham Lane and Guinea Roads. Stratham Heights to Guinea Raod was done by the State wherein they are responsible for summer maintenance of that road. Resurfacing of Union Road and High Street and some of Berry's Circle needs to be done this year. Stratham Heights from Newcombs to Bunker Hill will be done this year by Audley Construction Co. for the damage they caused during the gravel hauling last year. Some thought should be given to shim and hot topping (one mile) per year on a program so that eventually probably (15 years) all town roads will be updated. This hasould not be accomplished from the regular budget funds, but from a special article in the warrant each year. The cost would be in the vicinity of \$20,000.00 per mile (contracted out to bid). All preparatory work such as drainage and shoulder work done by the town highway department prior to resurfacing.

Now about equipment the town ownes one dump truck, 1971 International, a 1970 John Deere bucket loader, 544 and a 1946 Adams Grader, a John Deere lawn mower (1972, 14 horse) a Swanson sand and salt spreeder, and various snow plows and wing attachments and necessary hand tools. As you can see the 1946 Adams grader is 30 years old and the Adams Company is no longer in existance so it is most impossible to precure replacement parts. In December the engine blew and is inoperable To fix the motor it will cost approximately \$5,000.00, but repairing the motor will cause something else to go and it is still a 1946 machine-money to repair would be wasted. Now the machine is parked and in order to cover the town for snow removal a 1962 Gallion Grader was leased for three months, Jan., Fet., and March, from R. C. Hazelton & Co. This was a buyer, rental lease which means that if the town wants to purchase the grader at town meeting by approving the article to purchase a grader the leasing cost would apply to the purchase price which is \$25,000.00. The turn-in value of the old grader would be \$2,000.00. Thus the cost fo the 1962 grader would be \$23,000.00 to the town. A grader is one of our most important pieces of machinery. We normally have plowed at least half the town roads with the grader plus winging

back the snow for all roads. Not only in the winter but used considerable the rest of the year, approximately 400 hours total. In 1966 the town missed by one vote to buy a new grader. The cost of a new machine today is \$60,000.00.

This winter has been hard on all roads, so much freezing and thawing, rains and ice and below zero weather, the surfaces are breaking up everywhere even state roads where the asphalt is 4" thick. We have tried hard to keep your roads accident free.

#### REPORT OF STRATHAM VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

This year your Volunteer Fire Department had a considerable number of accomplishments, despite the unexpected financial burden of replacing the 2000 gallon tank on our primary fire water supply unit.

A new Fire Emergency Phone System was installed to aid in faster response and to provide a SINGLE fire call number. Residents are reminded that the new FIRE EMERGENCY ONLY number is 772-3113. For other business, call Chief Hutton at 772-5708 or 772-2366.

This year the Department has also purchased 12 sets of protective coars, helmets, and boots, a floating portable pump, and an additional fire truck with their own funds.

A Truck Study Committee, headed by Chris Rowe, determined the need for additional water, space for transporting support equipment, and a high pressure fog fire pump.

A 1962 International Fire Truck with a 750 gallon tank, high pressure fog pump, and ample space for additional equipment was located at the Green Village Volunteer Fire Department in New Jersey. After investigation, the unit was purchased for \$5800.00 by a vote of the Department with Department funds. This incurred no cost to the Town.

The unexpected tanker repair sharply curtailed purchasing any additional equipment with Town funds this year.

Training continued in 1975 with 16 members completing courses in various Fire Fighting Aspects at Meadowood Fire Training School. Also, two members completed a second phase of fire officer training at Iaconia, N.H.

This year members have given many hours to perform maintenance in an effort to hold down the rising costs of repairs. The increased activity of members at the Fire Station had a surprising effect in rapid responce to many fire calls during the year.

A highly effective Fire Prevention Program was conducted at the schools in Town, and Department members hope to increase Fire Prevention Programs in 1976.

The Department responded to 67 fire calls in 1975, 15 oil burner permits were issued and 15 inspections performed.

#### EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. is a Community Health Service providing health care to individuals and families in their home or in ambulatory care settings for purposes of preventing disease and promoting, maintaining or restoring health or minimizing the effects of illness or disability.

The nurse gives care and treatments as ordered by each person's physician, assists with the rehabilitation of persons of all ages, handicapped or ill. The nurse instructs designated persons in giving necessary care between nursing visits, teaches individuals good nutrition and understanding of special diets, accident prevention and how to cope with illness; advises new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies; provides tuberculosis and psychiatric follow up and refers to other agencies when appropriate.

The Physical Therapist establishes and supervises a program to return each person to his maximum potential, working under a plan established by each patient's own physician.

The Home Health Aide works under the supervision of the Registered Nurse or the Registered Physical Therapist. She provides personal and unskilled care to patients such as baths, exercises, light housekeeping and meal preparation.

The service provides: 1. The service of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital to assist in planning continuing care for patients after hospital discharge. 2. A Well Child clinic twice monthly for physicals to infants and preschool children of eligible families and immunizations. 3. Sponsors screening programs in cooperation with the N. H. Department of Public Health. 4 Blood Pressure clinics and Flu Vaccine clinics for Senior Citizens.

During the past year this agency has made a total of 220 visits to families in this community. #### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

This committee has met many times since elected and have investigated practially every method of waste disposal.

We have discussed a yolk with Greenland, Rye, and Exeter and have had meetings with them. The town was turned down by Exeter. We have considered trucking our waste to Wheelabrator-Frye's recycling plant near Lynn, Mass. Based on information given us by them our cost would be about \$62,000.00 annually based on our present population.

It is the unamious opinion that this and every other method investigated is more costly than Stratham can afford.

At a recent meeting it was agreed to request the state authorities to approve our present dump to be used as a sanitary land fill. Also to request Wheelabrator-Frye, Inc. to consider a recycling plant in or near Rockingham County which we could patronize at a lower transportation cost. This is under consideration by them.

It is our feeling that all methods investigated are too costly for a town of our size and that solid waste should be handled on a county or multi town basis, each town shaing the cost based on population.

We feel after several years of study that the disposal of solid waste is very much in the embryonic and experimental stage.

Costly mistakes have been made by some towns and we wish to avoid this for Stratham. We undoubtly will have to request an extention of time for further study.

#### WIGGIN MEMORIAL LIBRARY - 1975

This has been another year of change and progress in your library. New drapes were purchased with money earned from the sale of histories, plates and tiles left from the town's anniversary and from the sale of used books at the Stratham Fair. Also purchased with these same funds was a second typewriter to aid us in the typing of cards. From three to six catalog cards have to be typed for each book placed on the shelves. A new card file has been ordered as the fifteen drawer file we have now is almost full. New ceilings were installed in the bathroom and the closet at the foot of the stairs in the children's room.

From January through May and from October through December, story hours for preschoolers were held on Wednesday afternoons. With an average attendance of between fifteen and twenty, we had busy but rewarding afternoons.

During National Library Week in April, a book jacket contest was held for students through the eighth grade. The winners in each grade were presented with a silver dollar at a special Family Film Night. Also during this week a tea was held for the teachers to familiarize them with the library services and facilities. Many teachers borrow books for special studies from the library on a continuing basis.

The theme for the Summer Reading Program this year was "Bells of '76" featuring books with a Bicentennial theme. Story hours and film programs were held each Wednesday morning through July and August. Over a hundred children attended the performance of "The Little Red Wagon" in August.

With other members of the Hampton Film Cooperative, your library purchased one of twelve National Geographic films in the "Decades of Decision" series. All twelve of the films are available to town clubs and organizations for programs, as well as any other films owned by the cooperative. We are also a member of Aesop, a story hour cooperative set up with Federal funds and which owns films, projectors, film strips, and film strip projectors, all of which we can borrow for use in our story hours or film programs.

Many of our magazine subscriptions are contributed by many townspeople and town organizations. We would like to thank all those who help the library in this way.

Our Children's Room and Reference Room were used for meeting by the Historical Society, the Cub Scout Committee and for conferences with parents by counselors at the Group Home.

Bats were a constant problem throughout the year. In March, the arched beams which are hollow from the top were filled with insulation and moth balls, the only known bat repellent. The moth balls had to be replaced in late summer and seem to be only a temporary deterrent.

Our staff included Virginia Turner, page; Dorothy Cole, librarian's assistant and Barbara Senko, librarian. All are willing and available to help people and

organizations, clubs or groups find pleasure reading, special material, show films or plan programs.

Our special appreciation and gratitude to everyone who donated time or effort to our library.

# Stratham Annual School District Meeting March 3, 1975

The annual School District Meeting of Union 16 was held at the Stratham Memorial School on March 3, 1975 with approximately 200 people. The meeting was brought to order at 8:00 p.m. by W. Douglas Scamman Jr., David Noyes led the group in prayer. A letter was read by the clerk from the Moderator William P. Roberts explaining his absence and appointing Scamman to serve in his place.

The Moderator announced that unless there were objections, the minutes of last years meeting would not be read because they were printed in the Town and School Report.

Article I: To see if the District will vote to authorize the construction of an addition to the Stratham Memorial School, including furnishings, equipment, architectural and other fees, site development and any other items incidental to and necessary for such construction, on land presently owned by the Stratham School District, and further to authorize the Stratham School Board to raise a sum not to exceed \$300,000 by the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the School District in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 of the RSA as amended. The time and place of payment of principal and interest, the fixing of the rate of interest, provisions for the sale of notes and for bonds and all other matters in connection therewith, to be left to the discretion of the School Board.

Russel Granton, Chairman of the building committee, moved to adopt this article and was seconded by Nancy Herdecker. The school building committee, Granton, along with Larry Dowling, Lee Robinson, Nancy Herdecker, and the 3 members of the School Board comprised the committee. Discussion and questions followed. Permission was granted for the architect Don Summers, to explain the cost estimate and how \$4.00 a square foot was included to cover inflation costs.

A motion was made by Lawrence Foss "To lay the article on the table" and was seconded by Wayne Haney. The motion failed 118 to 70. (70-yes: 118-no)

A motion was offered by Doug Scamman to amend Article I to read \$273,000 instead of \$300,000, seconded by William Randall. Scamman then reworded the motion to read "\$273,000 instead of \$300,000 for plan 5-A or one similar." Discussion followed. The motion for the amendment lost.

At 9:25, the polls were opened for the vote on Granton's motion to accept Article I and remained open for one hour. A secret ballot was used with 202 registered voters voting. The ballot clerks, Richard Cole, Leslie Barker, Bette Hennebury, and Roberta Brush counted the ballots and submitted the results to the moderator: 97 voted yes, 105 voted no - 134 were needed to pass the motion. The motion failed.

Article II: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers hereto chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. No business under this article.

Article III: To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of an Assistant Superintendent for the Schools of Supervisory Union #16 as provided in RSA 186:11, XXII and XXIII, effective July 1, 1975 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2736. as Stratham's share of the salary, travel, retirement, FICA, health insurance, clerical assistance and office equipment. Richard Wiggin offered the motion "To table Article III." This was voted.

Article IV: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the payment of the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Robert Goodrich moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$523,070 for the support of the schools. Richard Wiggin seconded it. Robert Wiggin moved that the budget be decreased by \$12,864.00 to read \$510,206. Mrs. Durant seconded it. The motion was defeated - 44 to 72. (44-yes, 72-no)

Rosalie Fronczak made a motion to subtract \$6000 from the budget with the recommendation that no pay raises be over 5%. Don Thurston seconded it. Motion passed.

To raise and appropriate \$517,070 for the school budget was passed.

A vote of thanks was unanamously given to the building committee.

Don Allen moved to pass Article I with an appropriation of \$273,000. Russ Granton seconded it.

Doug Scamman moved to lay the motion on the table until March 10 at 8:00 p.m.

This was passed and the meeting recessed until March 10.

#### Recessed School District Meeting

The continuation of the 1975 School District meeting opened on Monday, March 10 at 8:00 p.m. with Moderator William Roberts. A minute of silent prayer was given in memory of Robert Corbin.

The meeting was re-convened to take up the motion made by Don Allen to pass Article I with an appropriation of \$273,000. Following about an hours discussion on both sides of the question the polls were opened for an hour. The results were: 316 voted - yes 133, no 183. It was necessary to have 210 votes to pass.

A motion was made by Betty Hennebury that the School Board be authorized to pay the step increase and a 5% cost of living increase if it can be done within the confines of the existing budget. The motion was seconded by Roberta Brush and passed.

# Stratham Report '76 Report of the Superintendent of Schools Frederick B. King

Once again it is my pleasure to reflect on some important matters relating to the education of the Stratham children. Enrollments have not changed drastically from last year but the school still remains crowded to carry on a quality program in all areas. The Cafeteria being used in part for a library does pose some educational problems. Every possible space is being used and any increase in student population will present a serious problem.

National testing continues to show that Stratham children are doing very well, and this is further documented by the fine backgrounds they bring to the Exeter AREA Junior High School. I would like to review some of the curriculum areas for you.

Reading continues as a top priority, and along with it the English and writing skills necessary for a successful life. Good teaching of reading and the language arts can occur in several different settings, no one of which is the best for all children. We continue to use our "level sheets" as the basis for planning a sound educational program. Recently added to this is a new guide for teachers in the instructional areas of English, spelling and writing. Children will be encouraged to write and speak for many different purposes and this in turn will cause them to use different forms and expand their language repertoire needed for future years.

The "new math" remains fundamentally sound, although the impact hasn't lived up to expectations. Computational skills in arithmetic and algebra are needed but we also must make way for computers and calculators to receive increased emphasis in the future. I think the evidence shows great gains in mathematic insight and understanding by the pupils. This along with our "skills" check sheets at each level should provide for a strong program.

The pendulum seems to be swinging back, as it has a way of doing. Appropriately along with basic education is a renewed interest in stressing good character building as a part of values and humanizing education. I feel the school has responsibility for being a part of the programs to train our children to examine values more carefully.

Mr. David Michaud, Principal at the Elementary School, has some additional information about the school. He says "School opened in September with an enrollment of 248. This is not a significant increase over last year, however we continue to feel crowded in terms of space for the extra programs we try to offer. We are attempting, as much as possible, to meet the special needs of our students. To do this we have been regrouping children between classrooms for various types of instruction. With our Continuous Progress Curriculum in reading

and in math, children move from level to level at their own speed. For this reason we have regrouped children for reading and language arts at both the primary and intermediate levels. We have classrooms in which we work with children who have learning problems in these areas. The pupil:teacher ratio in these classrooms is lower and special materials are available to help the students. We have the benefit of the Title I Learning Disabilities program which includes a learning disabilities specialist who comes to the school several days each week and an aide who comes three mornings each week. The school district has also hired a learning disabilities aide who works five mornings each week with these children. In the intermediate grades we also have a special classroom for the children who are experiencing problems with math.

Our Transition class continues to serve a very special need in the community. This year we have 17 children from Stratham and 3 children from other towns in the class. The children are getting an additional year in readiness activities and developmental training so that they can have a positive and successful experience in first grade.

The programs which we run could not be successful were it not for the generosity of our many volunteer aides. Some are in the classroom helping children on a one to one or small group basis. One aide works with the Speech Therapist and several with the Physical Education teacher. We also have a number of library aides which help staff the school library.

This year we have received a great deal of support and help from the Boosters Club. The Stratham Memorial School Boosters Club has generously helped to expand our supply of Audio Visual equipment. The moral support and assistance given by the Boosters Club has been greatly appreciated by the staff as has the help and support of the entire community.

This year we are beginning our fourth season of Environmental Education for sixth graders. Six grade students will be going to Sargent Camp in Peterborough, New Hampshire for a week in June as did the sixth graders last year. As part of the preparation for this week the students engage in a number of fund raising activities. The fund raising is given a great deal of help by many groups and individuals in the community and for this support we are most appreciative."

As you may have noted the Exeter AREA High School is crowded. It is interesting to note that nearly 50% of the students there are from the sending towns. I would like to express at this time my special thanks to Doug Scammon, Jr. for his excellent endeavors as Chairman of the Region #18 Vocational Center Committee. The group worked very hard. It is fitting and right that the community and its businesses, professions and the wide variety of the world of work join with education in planning future programs for our youth. Important as work is, preparation for it has not, until recently, been given the attention it deserves. The public schools must take a more active role in the future.

Again in closing I would like to thank the principal and excellent staff for their dedicated hours of service to the Stratham youth. I have enjoyed my association this past year with the Stratham School Board and look forward to future years of planning with them in getting "dollar for dollar" a quality education for other children of Stratham.

#### REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

#### DANIEL C. DURGIN

March is a critically important month because it is during the month of March when most of New Hampshires school districts hold their annual town and school meetings. Decisions reached at these meetings often have far reaching implications and decisions of a financial nature always have a direct impact on property taxes.

Speaking specifically of the School District Meeting, perhaps the most important question before the voters each year involves the school budget for the succeeding year. I fear that many people view the hudget as a financial document that is only indirectly related to the education of the districts' children. Nothing could be further from the truth. The School Budget, if properly formulated, should represent the educational plan of the School District translated into dollars. The hudgeting procedure in all districts of Supervisory Union # 16 is designed with this in mind.

Rather than simply building on the previous year's budget, our process involves what is becoming popularly known as "zero budgeting". This new concept has been the basis for our budgeting process for many years. It requires fresh thinking and careful planning by all staff members and discourages the practice of building on the previous years budget merely because "we have been".

The budgeting process begins in September at the teaching staff level. Budget requests are entered on special forms designed for the purpose and are submitted up through the normal administrative channels where they are screened at each level. All non-routine requests, require written justification outlining such considerations as need for the item or items being requested and what is hoped to be achieved by their purchase. Requests for new programs and/or additional staff are also submitted on special forms which ask for complete justification and require evaluation of the cost versus the educational benefit.

After all educational requests have been carefully reviewed at all levels concluding with the S.U. # 16 Central Office administration, the budget forms are turned over to the Business Administrator for inclusion in the first draft of the proposed budget. The Business Administrator is responsible for drafting the final budget which will include many other costs such as salaries and related expenses (fringe benefits, Social Security, Retirement), insurance, transportation, tuition, utilities and payments on any outstanding debt.

The completed draft of the budget is then presented to the School Board for review, modifications and approval before being presented to the voters for finalization. In some districts, budget committees also play a significant role in the process replacing the School Board as final authority before presentation to the voters.

Although not required by law, each school district in S.U. # 16 holds at least one public hearing on the budget prior to district meeting. This gives the citizens of the district the opportunity to hear the hudget explained in detail and to ask questions and offer comments relative to the proposed budget.

Frequently the attendance at these hearings and even the district meetings is poor. These are your meetings and you have a major role to play. Please make every effort to take part in this most important process.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES Stratham Memorial School

To the Superintendent of Schools:

During the past year routine health screening measures have been carried out on all students in addition to special testing as requested by the staff. I have provided classroom instruction in areas of hygiene, safety, nutrition, family life and first aid at appropriate grade levels, and continue to work as a resource person for teacher-originated health units. I have tried to meet individual health needs of students by providing health counseling when appropriate and acting as a liaison between the school and outside diagnostic facilities when necessary.

Once again our school was fortunate to be able to participate in the State sponsored dental program. Also, thanks to the support of the local Boosters Club, all students were offered a chance to take advantage of a dental cleaning and fluoride treatment clinic last spring.

I have continued to take courses and attend workshops to fulfill requirements for school nurse certification.

I would like to express my thanks to the volunteers who have helped with the School Health Program. I would also like to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal David Michaud, members of the Staff and Dr. John Tuthill, school pediatrician, for their continued help and support.
