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APPROVAL OF HASSAN SOLID, LEADS GOP CHALLENGERS; ECONOMY STILL MOST IMPORTANT PROBLEM

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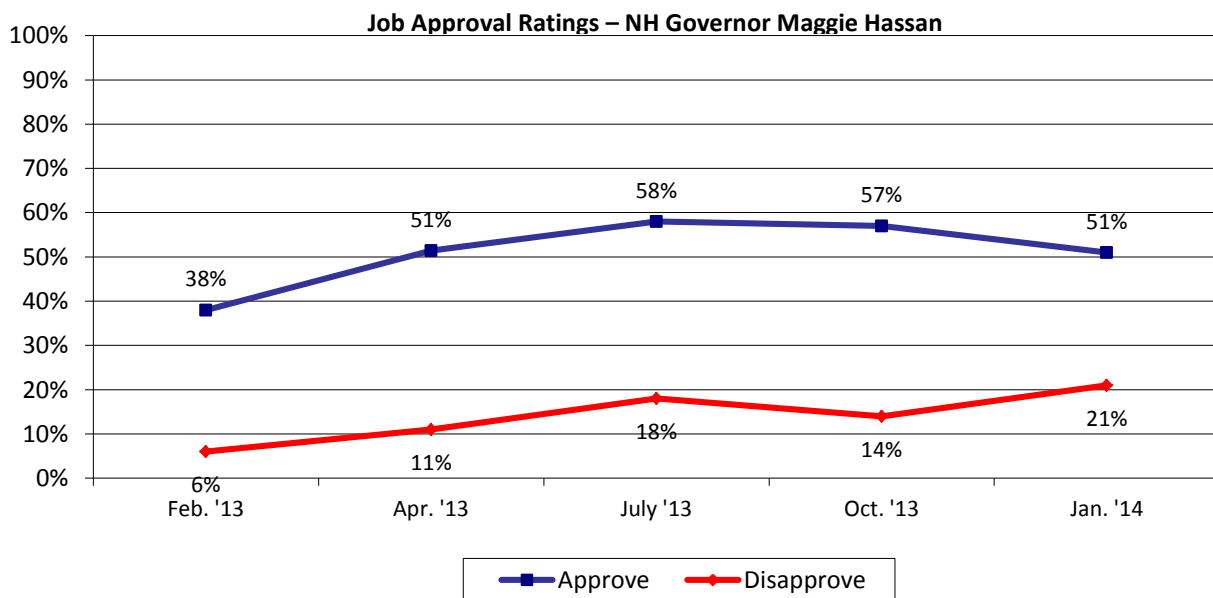
DURHAM, NH – A majority of Granite Staters approve of the job that Maggie Hassan is doing as Governor. Hassan currently leads two potential Republican challengers by double-digit margins. Nearly two-thirds of New Hampshire residents think the state is on the right track, but economic concerns remain the top problem facing the state.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and eighty-four (584) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between January 21 and January 26, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

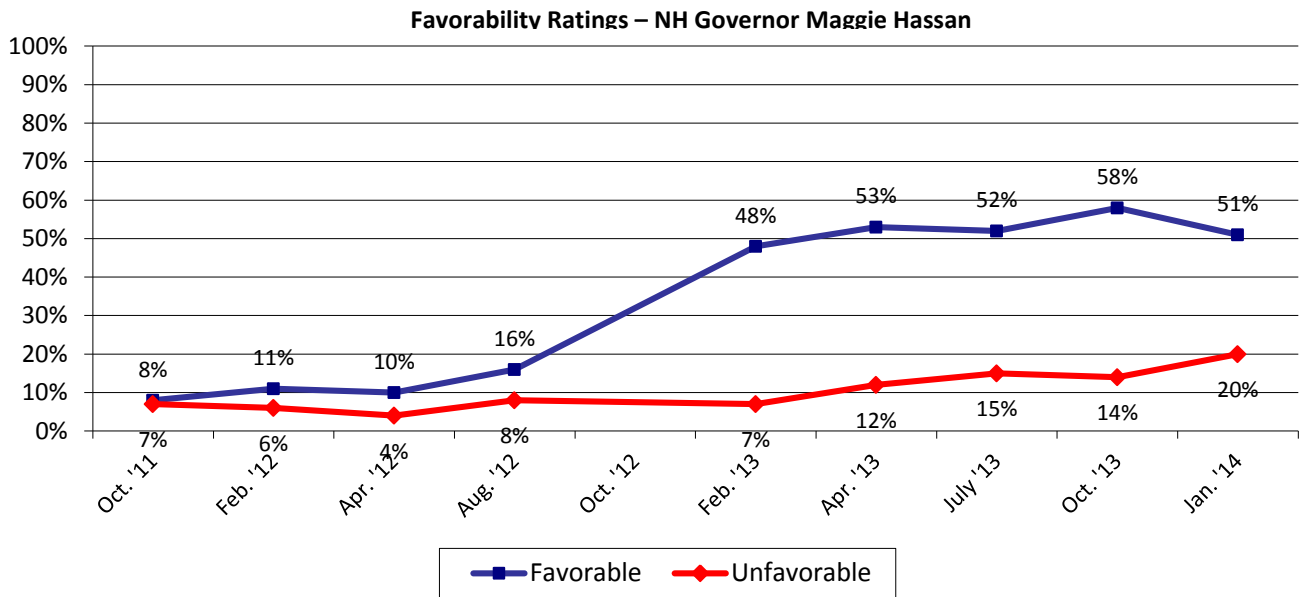
After one year in office, Democratic Governor Maggie Hassan has the approval of a majority of New Hampshire residents. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 51% of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor, 21% disapprove, and 27% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Although Hassan's job approval rating remains high, it is down somewhat from 57% in October.

Democrats (76%), residents 65 and over (74%), liberals (73%), and people who oppose the Tea Party (72%) are most likely to say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor. Tea Party supporters (42%), Republicans (34%) and conservatives (34%) are most likely to disapprove of the governor.

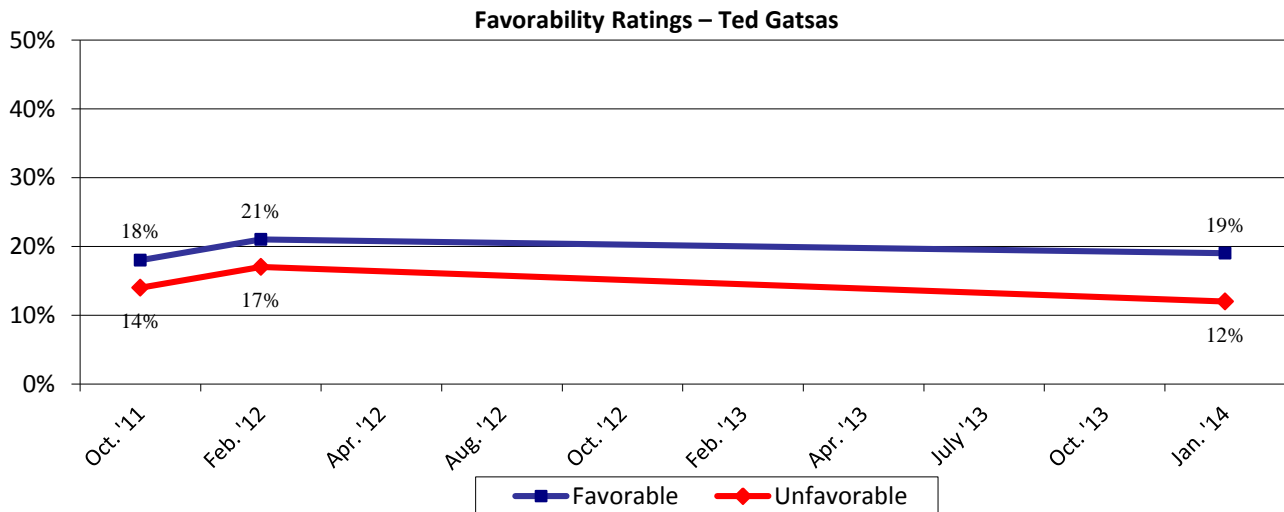
Hassan also continues to enjoy high favorability ratings. Currently, 51% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Hassan, 20% have an unfavorable opinion, 15% are neutral, and 14% say they don't know enough about her to say. Hassan's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is a high +31%, but it has dropped from +44% in October. Hassan's favorability is bi-partisan -- Hassan is very popular among Democrats (+67% net favorable) and Independents (+27%), and is somewhat popular among Republicans (+2%).



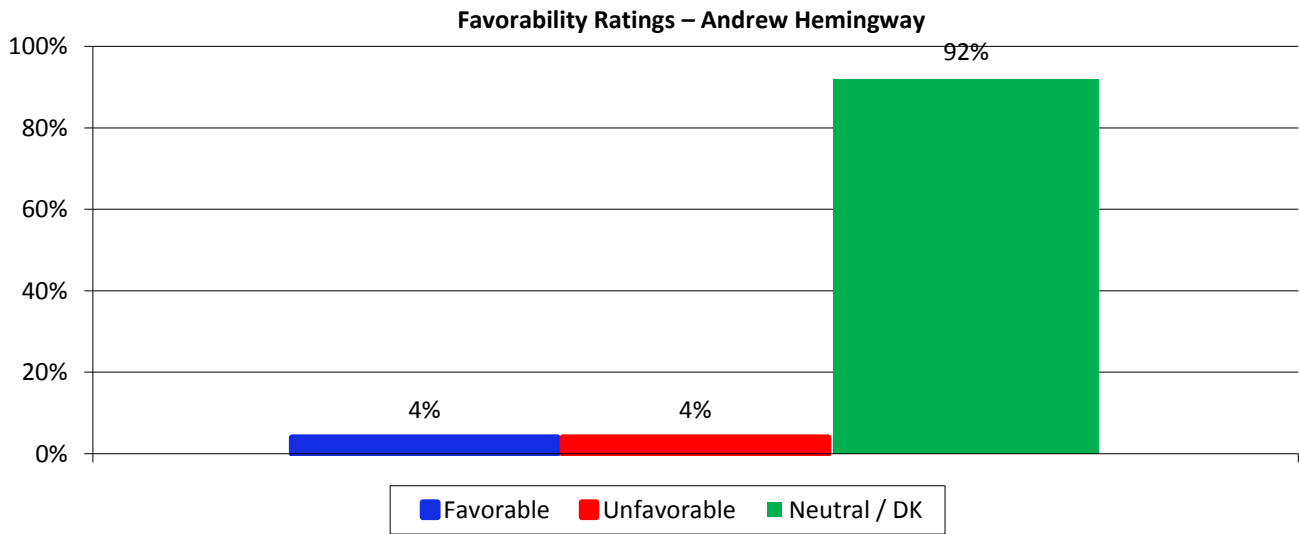
Potential GOP Challengers

In less than a year, Granite Staters will go to the polls to elect the state's Governor, who serves only a two-year term. While Governor Hassan has not made an official announcement that she will seek re-election, most believe she will run for a second term. Governor Hassan does have an advantage over other incumbent Democrats in that she is not facing a well-known Republican challenger. Political Activist Andrew Hemingway (R-Bristol) plans to officially announce his run for Governor tonight and Mayor Ted Gatsas (R-Manchester) has also expressed interest in challenging Governor Hassan, but both are unknown to New Hampshire residents.

Despite being mayor of the state's largest city, only, 19% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Gatsas, 12% have an unfavorable opinion, 9% are neutral and 60% don't know enough to say. His net favorability is +7%.



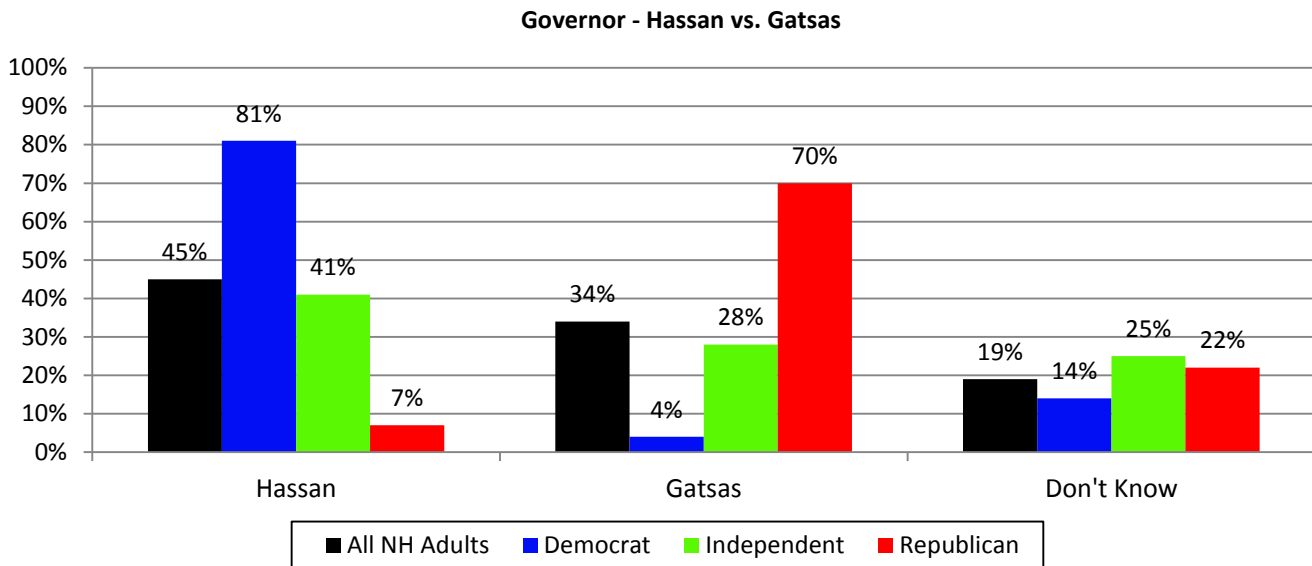
Hemingway is even less known -- only 4% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Hemingway, 4% have an unfavorable opinion, 9% are neutral and 83% don't know enough to say. His net favorability is +0%.



2014 Governor Trial Heats

Very few voters have decided who they will vote for in the 2014 gubernatorial election as 7% have definitely decided on someone, 6% are leaning toward someone and 87% are still trying to decide.

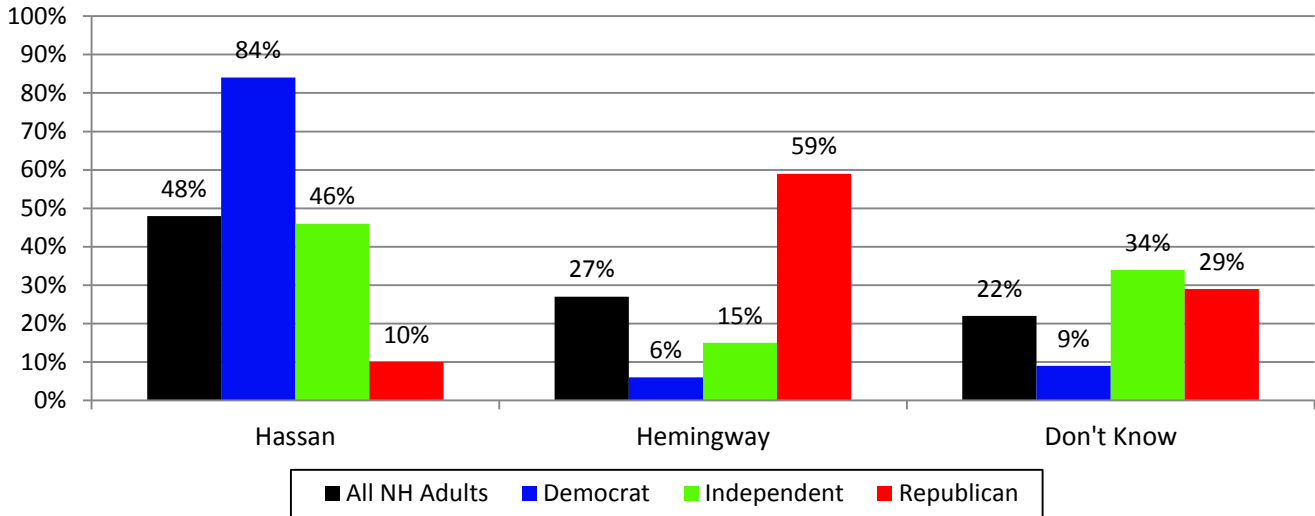
If the 2014 gubernatorial election were held today between Hassan and Gatsas, 45% of likely voters would vote for Hassan, 34% would vote for Gatsas, 2% would vote for someone else and 19% are undecided.



If Andrew Hemingway were the Republican nominee, 48% of likely voters would vote for Hassan, 27% would vote for Hemingway, 2% would vote for someone else and 22% are undecided.

As would be expected in hypothetical matchups this early, Democrats and Republicans largely support their party's candidate and many Independents are undecided. Currently Hassan leads both challengers among independents by double-digit margins.

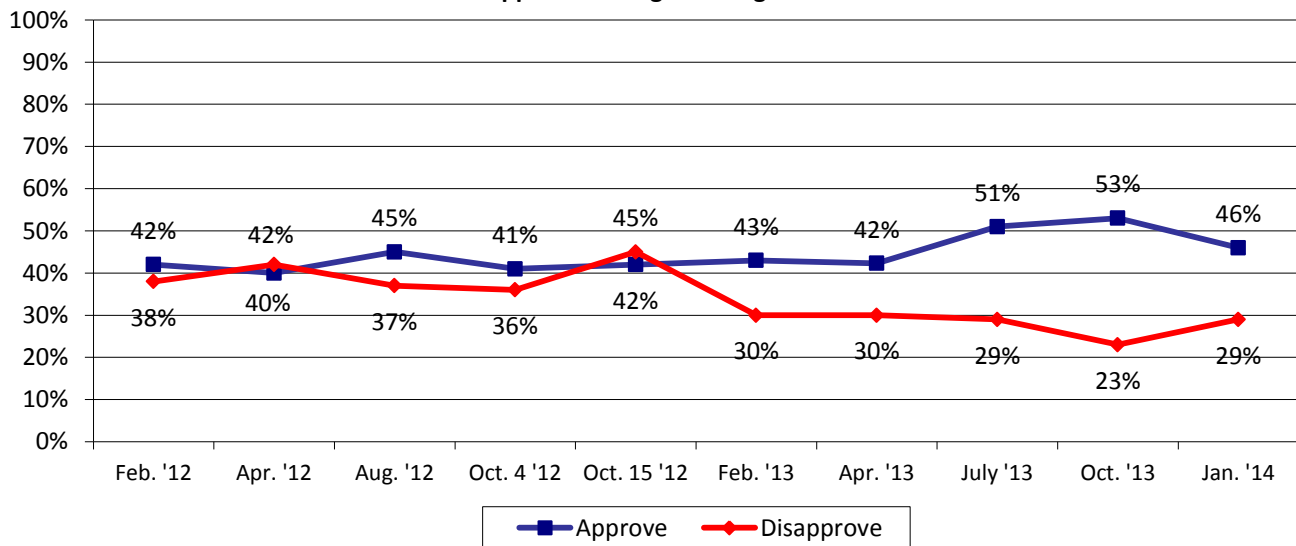
Governor - Hassan vs. Hemingway



Approval of NH Legislature

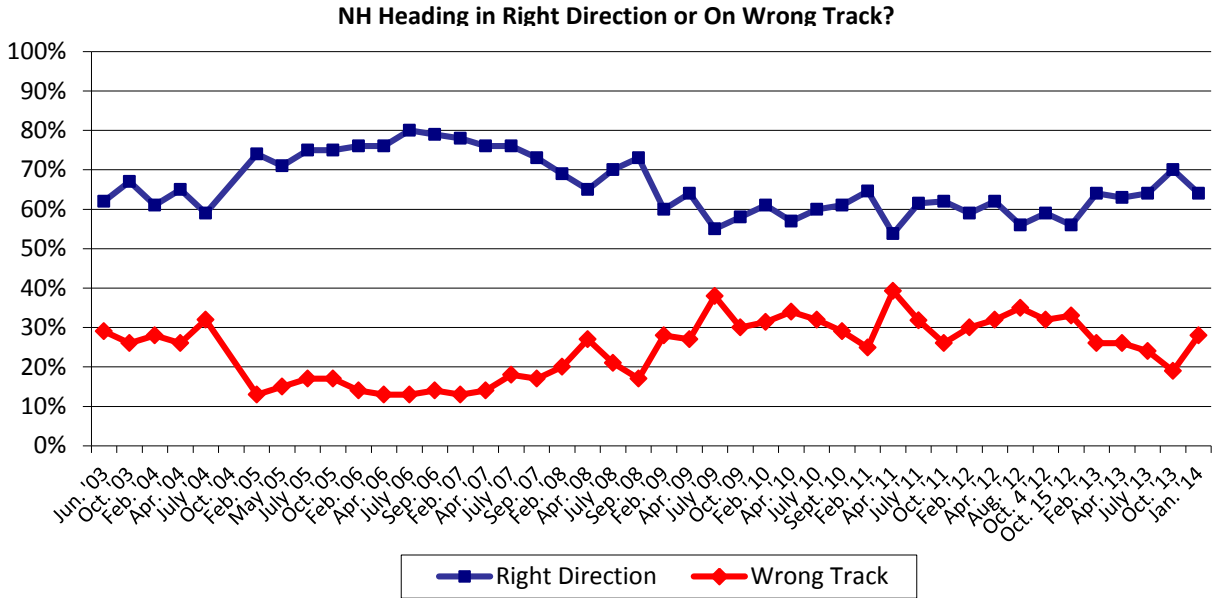
A plurality of New Hampshire residents approve of the job that the state legislature is doing. Currently, 46% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the State Legislature is doing its job, 29% disapprove, and 26% are neutral or don't know enough to say. This represents a 7-point decrease in approval since October. While a majority of Democrats (55%) approve of the state legislature, only 42% of Republicans and 36% of Independents approve of the job it is doing.

Approval Rating – NH Legislature



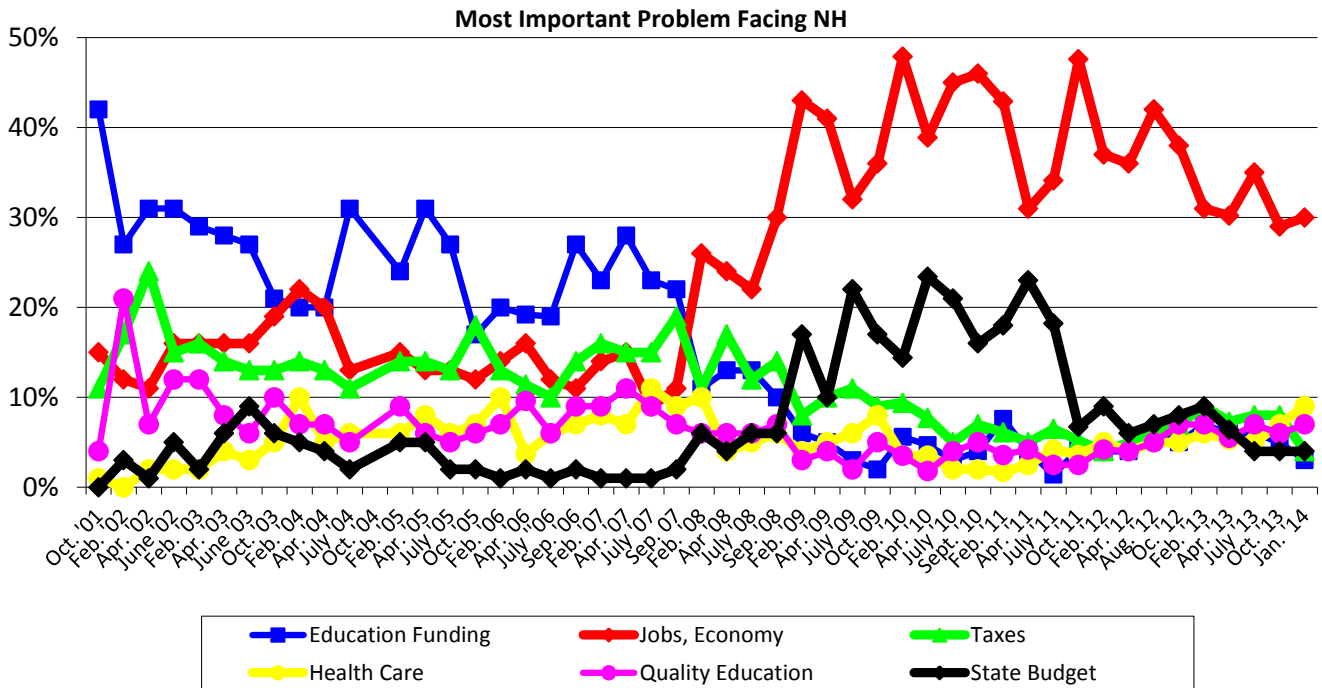
Right Direction or Wrong Track?

New Hampshire residents continue to believe the state as a whole is headed in the right direction. Currently, 64% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 28% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 8% are unsure. The view that New Hampshire is headed in the right direction is bi-partisan -- majorities of Democrats (75%), Independents (63%), and Republicans (54%) say the state is headed in the right direction.



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

The state's economy and unemployment continue to be seen as the most important problem facing the state. Currently, 30% of New Hampshire adults say that jobs and the economy is the most important issue facing the state, followed by health care (9%), education quality (7%), taxes (4%), the state budget (4%), and education funding (3%). There has been little change in what New Hampshire residents see as the most important problems facing the state over the last two years.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and eighty-four (584) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between January 21 and January 26, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may sum to just above or below 100%. Respondent numbers in each demographic may not equal the total respondent number due to respondents choosing not to answer some demographic questions.
