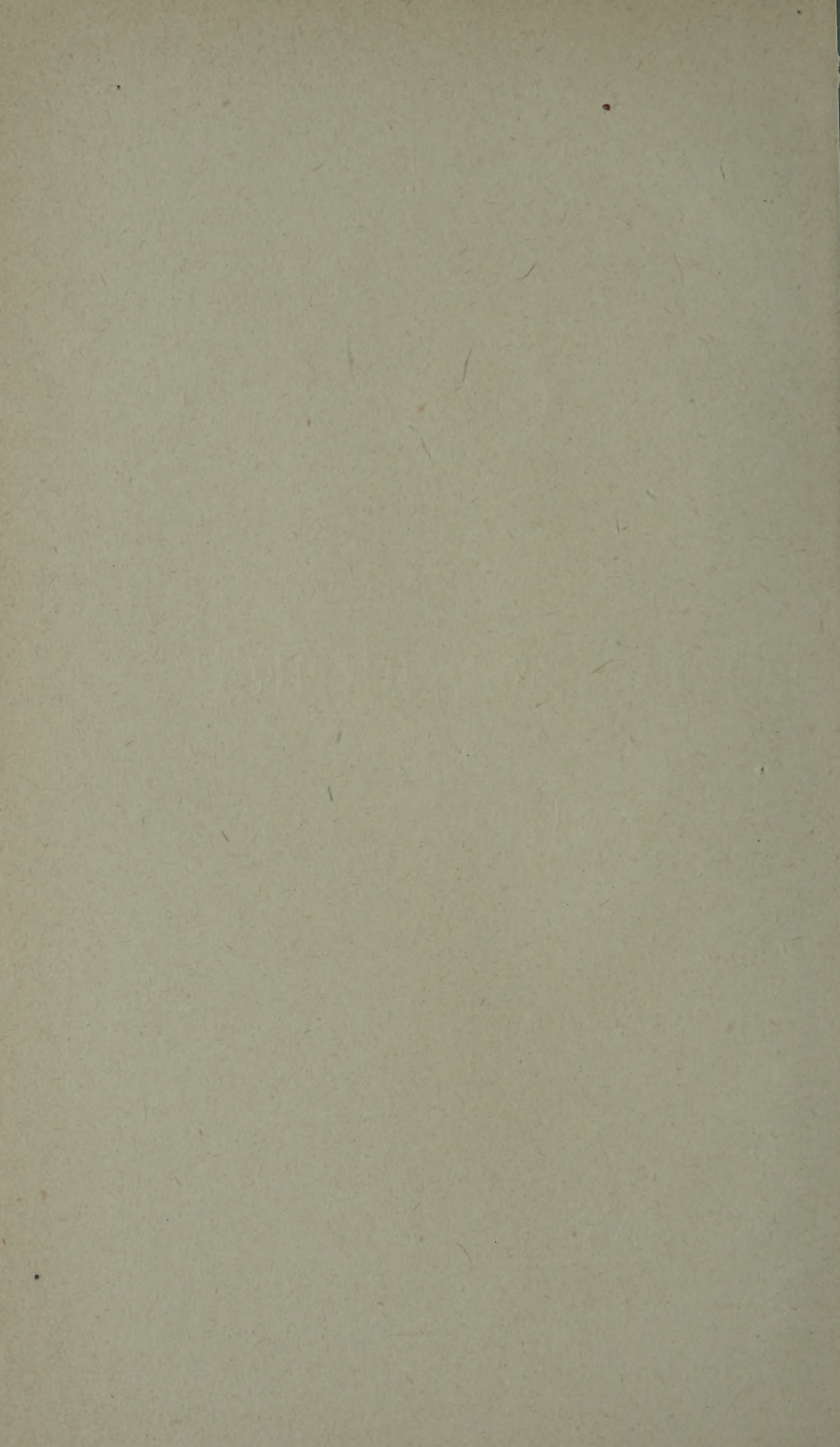

Report of the School Board.

With the school year, closing August 1, 1896 we present the following to the citizens of the Warner school district:

The schools of the town for the past year, have, we think, been well taught and have given good satisfaction generally.

It has been the intention of the school board to secure the services of the best teachers that could be had for the money allowed. Sixteen different teachers have been employed for the thirty-six terms of school during the year. They have labored faithfully to do all in their power to advance the education of their pupils.

The parents generally, have given the schools their generous support; yet we find on the part of some an inclination to criticise the teacher in the hearing of their children. A teacher may make mistakes; who does not? Never under any conditions, condemn the teacher's regulations, in the presence of your children. If you have good reason to believe that an evil exists, go to the teacher in confidence and ask an explanation, if you are not satisfied with the result of your inquiry, ask the school board to investigate the matter; but never destroy the confidence that your children have in their teacher.

We would urge you to visit the school often, see your children in the schoolroom as the term progresses, it gives them the needed encouragement and the teacher really feels that you are interested. The best results are obtained where there is co-operation on the part of parent and teacher.

The Teachers' Institute was attended by our teachers, almost without exception. We believe this is a source of inspiration to the teacher and that many helpful ideas on the improved methods of instruction can thus be gained. No teacher can afford to lose the benefits to be derived from these meetings.

We find a desire on the part of parents to have their children enter the high school as early as possible. We feel that this is a great mistake and an injury to the scholar. That is, scholars do not get the full benefit of the four years training in high school

work. At the age of twelve, or even fourteen years, they have not acquired studious habits, their power of reasoning necessary for higher mathematics and science is not sufficiently developed to get the best good in these branches. Consequently the teachers are obliged to do most of this work, the pupils looking on and merely observing how it is done, with little or no lasting benefit to themselves. We urge upon pupil and parent, the necessity of age, habit of thinking and thorough mastery of rudimentary principles before entering upon a high school course.

We have paid out during the year \$247.00 for permanent repairs on school buildings. This amount was expended on the Davisville, Lower Village, and Dimond's Corner buildings. The Davisville house was shingled and painted outside and inside, new seats and such other repairs made as to put it into good condition. The Lower Village house was overhauled inside, this room was sheathed up to the windows, with new floor, painted and papered. It is now a very pleasant room. New seats were placed in the Dimond's Corner building in place of the old-fashioned wooden benches. A portion of the money voted for repairs at the last annual meeting will be laid out on this house before the fall term begins.

Near the commencement of the spring term, Mr. Jewell, feeling that he could not take from his business the time necessary for the proper management of our schools, sent in his resignation as a member of the school board. The remaining members appointed Mrs. Persis H. Melvin to fill the vacancy.

Simonds Free High School.

After a full quarter of a century of work done in the lines of a higher education in the Simonds Free High School, it is needless to enlarge on the benefits of having such a school in our midst; the amount of good it has accomplished is simply incalculable. And we are pleased to know that the future success, and increased prosperity of the school is assured beyond a doubt.

At the end of the summer term, in June, 1896, after graduating a fine class of five young ladies and five young gentlemen, Prof. Barton and Miss Hancock severed their connection with the school, taking with them the best wishes of their many friends. After a good many applicants had been seen and examined, the Prudential Committee engaged the services of Prof. A. L. Saben, A. M., as Principal, Miss Elsie K. Jackson, as 1st Assistant, Miss Luella M. Chase, 2d Assistant, and Mrs. E. H. Carroll as Teacher of Music. From a large number of applicants for admission to the school at the beginning of the Fall Term, fourteen were admitted to the Preparatory year, one to the special course, and two to the Junior year. Also two have been admitted to the Preparatory class during the Winter Term, and five Post Graduates are taking special studies to assist them in their work as teachers. Those admitted to the Preparatory course were not too young or too little advanced to enter existing classes in the Preparatory year, and by admitting them, they will receive double the benefit they would have obtained from remaining in the town schools.

It has been strongly urged by several former Superintendents, that a third teacher be engaged to give special attention to the beginners in high school work, and at my suggestion, and in entire harmony with their opinions, the Prudential Committee engaged Miss Chase to carry on this work. The result of this change has more than proved the wisdom of the plan, and I earnestly recommend a small appropriation by the District to meet a portion of the expense of this department, as it meets a long felt want in connection with our town schools. Scholars coming from other towns are almost invariably fitted to begin the Junior year, and thus it is our own town which is concerned in the welfare of the preparatory department. Both your Committees have been very much alive, during the past year to the interest of the school, and have put a good many things into "ship

shape": the piano has been repaired and improved at a cost of some \$35.00; new catalogues have been printed; a new pump has been provided for the well; some changes made in the smaller recitation rooms; a new book case has been placed in the Principal's room for reference books; and everything possible done to encourage the pupils and teachers in their good work, so that now we have a live, prosperous school of about fifty-five pupils, thoroughly equipped for doing excellent work. Prof. Saben proves to be a good disciplinarian, well qualified for all school work, specially thorough and apt in teaching mathematics and the sciences, and a thorough gentleman of unexceptional deportment whom it is always a pleasure to meet. Miss Jackson delights in Literature, teaches French as though it was her native tongue, is full of energy, controls her classes perfectly, and is admired by all. Miss Chase is giving good satisfaction in her work. In the department of vocal music, Mrs. Carroll is doing very thorough work, and is laying the foundation for greater success in the near future. We recommend that some measures be taken to furnish the school with some singing books more modern and practical than those now in use. Vocal music is something we cannot afford to neglect in our schools, and the services of so competent a teacher as Mrs. Carroll should be gladly secured. The discontinuance of the Simonds Echo, this year is a matter of regret; but seemed unavoidable under the circumstances. We may hope to see it again in due season.

The Lyceum is still prospering and the members have been doing very good work, notably in the matter of debate and in the character of the original articles for the Scholars' Gem. The musical programme has also been a pleasing feature. The financial part has been well managed, some funds going for the payment of some arrearages, and some to purchase a nice cover for the piano. The officers have received many compliments on the manner of their presiding and the general order which prevails. Study hours during the year have been better observed than heretofore, and we are glad to say that the school in every way is climbing the ascent to eminence and distinction. We earnestly hope that all the citizens will continue to work early and late for the continued prosperity of this our high school which we all prize so much.
