Record of Town Meeting

Held March 10, 1925

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the second Tuesday of March, 1925, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Edward T. Breed, Moderator, also the posting of the checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the checklist, 784.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

For Town Clerk. The whole number of votes given in was 240, upon which Frank H. Peaslee had 240 votes and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by Law prescribed.

For Selectman. The whole number of votes given in was 240. Upon which Asa E. Felch had 1, Charles H. Stafford had 65, Albert J. Nichols had 166, and the said Albert J. Nichols was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by Law prescribed.

For Road Agents. The whole number of votes given in was 240. Upon which Charles Hacket had 1, Arthur Jones had 1, Carlisle Dearborn had 2, Asa E. Felch had 80, Charles F. Bates had 154, Charles F. Bennett had 235 Frank G. Phibrick had 238 and the said Frank G. Philbrick, Charles F. Bennett and Charles F. Bates were declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, Charles E. Bates took the oath of office by Law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor. The whole number of votes given in was 240. Upon which George A. Waterman had 240 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

The Moderator called a recess until 2 P. M.

Met, after recess, at 2 P. M.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to defray town charges.

ARTICLE 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Frank Tucker, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. This being done, the Moderator declared Frank Tucker elected Trustee for three years.

ARTICLE 4. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Alfred Osborne for Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Alfred Osborne elected Trustee for three years.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to repair highways.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise five hundred dollars (\$500) to repair bridges.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise three hundred dollars (\$300) to rail dangerous places along the highways.

ARTICLE 14. Voted to take up Article 14 at this time. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 9. Voted that it be left with the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to approve the action taken by the Selectmen and empower them to employ council to intervene in the action of the Boston & Maine Railroad to abandon the Manchester & North Weare Branch. Voted to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Boston & Maine Railroad has filed a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission asking for leave to abandon, among others, its North Weare Branch; and, whereas, the service rendered on said Branch is important and, we believe, vital to the business interests of Weare and to its citizens generally and, whereas, the proposed substitution of bus and truck service, if furnished, will not be adapted to the transportation needs of the town and will be a constant menace and agency of destruction to its highways; we, the legal voters of Weare, in town meeting assembled, protest against such abandonment and urge that it would be destructive, not only to all of the business interests of Weare, but subversive to the best interests of the Boston & Maine Railroad, to which the North Weare Branch is now, for many years has been and still promises to be, an important feeder for its main lines.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to raise one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to pay the Eben L. Paige bequest of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to the School District for the benefit of the Weare High School.

ARTICLE 13. Voted to accept the Committee's report and adopt the following recommendations:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EBEN L. PAIGE BEQUEST FOR THE BENEFIT OF WEARE FREE LIBRARY.

We have examined library buildings in Bow, Boscawen and Merrimack and have tried to study the whole situation.

We recommend the erection of a one-story brick building, with basement, at a cost of about sixteen or eighteen thousand dollars. In our judgment, this would provide room enough for the Library for many years to come and would leave a fund of approximately ten thousand dollars, which would maintain the building permanently with no expense to the town.

An option has been secured on a lot between the town office and the telephone central office, which we believe to be the best available site.

Voted to build as recommended and the present committee, consisting of Alfred Osborne, Helen E. Nichols, Lucie E. Clough, George A. Waterman and George H. Eastman, be continued to have charge of the same.

ARTICLE 15. Voted to raise four hundred dollars (\$400) for White Pine Blister Rust control.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000) with interest each year until all is paid.

ARTICLE 18. Voted to take up Article 18 at this time. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 17. Voted that it be left with the Selectmen to offer inducements to have a doctor come to Weare.

ARTICLE 19. Voted that the so-called Huntington Road be discontinued, subject to bars or gates.

ARTICLE 20. Voted to raise twenty-five dollar (\$25) for the care of soldiers' graves.

ARTICLE 21. Voted to dismiss.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to raise three hundred dollars (\$300) to repair the bridge on the State Aid Highway at Riverdale.

ARTICLE 23. Voted that it be left with the Selectmen in regard to renting the rooms now occupied by the Weare High School to the Weare Grange, when vacated by the School.

ARTICLE 24. Voted that notice of any Special Town Meeting be given out by telephone.

Voted that this meeting be dissolved.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County
of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in
Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at 10 of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see how much money the Town will raise to repair highways.
6. To see how much money the Town will raise to repair bridges.

7. To see how much money the Town will raise to rail dangerous places along the highways.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
9. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
10. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the purpose of coöperating with the State Goverment in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, such appropriation to be available, until spent, in coöperation with the State Government.
12. To see if the Town will vote to lease the second floor of the Town House to Weare Grange for a term of years, the Grange to make all necessary repairs at their own expense.
13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway beginning at a point at the bottom of the hill on the Robert Oliver road, thence north-west across the main road to Deering, to the site of the Lyman Flanders house.
14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the New Road, so-called, beginning at the south-west corner of the L. D. Peaslee farm, ending where it joins the old road from Deering to Weare and re-open the old road from this point to where it joins the road from Weare to Henniker.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the benefit of the Weare Base Ball Club.

16. To see if the Town will vote to buy one road machine and raise a sum of money for the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to buy a motor fire truck and raise a sum of money for the same.

18. To see if the Town will vote to buy the signal lights erected by the American Gas Accumulator Co. and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the same.

19. To see if the Town will vote to buy the necessary equipment for keeping the main road open for automobile traffic.

20. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Since the last report the High School Building has been completed, with the exception of the playroom in the basement, which as yet has no floor.

The committee unanimously decided that electric wiring ought to be installed during construction, both for economy and safety and, we believe, the district will approve of this decision, tho the cost was six hundred dollars (\$600). This and liability insurance and some other items were not included in the estimates.

Lumber and all material for the building was bought well within the estimates, but the cost of labor overran quite seriously. Exact figures cannot be given yet, as there is still some lumber, etc., yet to be sold, but the entire cost to date is about twenty-five thousand four hundred dollars (\$25,400), which is about four thousand more than was available. To complete the building, some members of the building committee raised four thousand dollars (\$4,000) on their personal notes and, at the annual school meeting, the District will be asked to authorize notes to cover this amount.

Superintendent's Report

I herewith submit my fourth annual report. The accompanying statistical tables should be of interest to every citizen. It brings out some very pertinent facts concerning your schools.

The enrollment by school section reveals a problem upon which some action is rapidly becoming imperative. The North Weare and Center schools have already outgrown our power to handle them efficiently. (I do not need to mention the question of the two-room school, that has been thoroughly discussed and rejected.) The Rockland school is also becoming a serious problem of numbers and grades. As time goes on, we will find it impossible to keep first-class teachers in these large schools, where all grades are represented.

The new High School offers a practical solution of the problem. You are now in a position to do what neighbouring towns have been doing successfully for a number of years. Namely, combining grades seven and eight in a Junior High School, making your total work at the High School cover a period of six years instead of four. This plan could be carried out with no extra expense for heating and other up-keep of the building. There would be, however, a first cost of about three hundred dollars (\$300) for necessary equipment. Another teacher's salary would also add a little to the annual budget. On the other hand, if the schools mentioned above find relief from this problem, the expense involved in making this improvement is entirely justified. Experience has proven conclusively that the Junior High plan is a great help to the High School by

bringing pupils into intimate touch with it for the crucial two years before they actually take up the High School work, and by giving the entering class, as a whole, intensive training in special preparation for the High School work. It is, furthermore, a great help to the elementary schools by taking away two grades that require more time and energy from the teacher than any other three grades.

The Weare High School occupied the new building November 30, 1925. We find it admirably adapted to every need. The facilities, so generously provided, are greatly appreciated by pupils and teachers. On their behalf, I wish to acknowledge our debt, in a special sense, to the taxpayers of Weare and to Frank Tucker, J. L. Hills, Chas. D. Dalzell, Building Committee, coöperating with George S. Dannells, Allen W. Sawer, Alfred Osborne, School Board, for their interest and untiring efforts that have made our new building such a splendid reality. They have done a great public service, not only for coming generations in Weare, but for the cause of education throughout the state.

The present outlook is for a steady growth in numbers and also in scholastic standing. The pupils are interested in the up-keep of the building and are more than willing to do all possible to help in furnishing the several rooms and departments. For example, they have made a manual training bench, tool closet and several pieces of laboratory apparatus. Many similar projects are being planned. They are also planning to grade and beautify the grounds around the building as soon as weather and soil conditions permit.

Once more it should be noted that the Weare High School won first place at the Hopkinton Fair and carried off the grand sweepstake prize for general excellence. This fine showing was made in a larger and much more closely contested field than we have had for the preceding three years.

During the past year all school activities have been more fully correlated and placed more definitely under the guidance and direction of the teaching staff. Athletics, dramatics, the social life and the annual school publication are now considered a vital part of the High School program. Our teachers cheerfully accept this extra responsibility and consider it an opportunity to teach, in a very practical manner, lessons of good sportsmanship, honesty, fair play and coöperation. All of these, added to the regular High School work, have a large part in making the good citizen for the better tomorrow. Much credit is due Headmaster Chas. D. Dalzell and his loyal assistants, for the success of the Weare High School in all its varied activities.

With the hearty coöperation of the School Board, we have been able to hold, at the High School, teachers' meetings, including all teachers in the town. These have been very helpful in creating a feeling of good fellowship and coöperation between officials, High School and elementary teachers. I earnestly hope that we may have at least two of these meetings every year.

Your presence, in such large numbers, at the annual school exhibition, is an ample testimonial of your appreciation of and interest in the work of the schools. The exhibition work and your appreciation of it, is a great stimulus to the different teachers and pupils in their mutual efforts in the individual schools. I consider it one of the great events on the school calendar.

The school buildings are generally in good condition. The Riverdale building, occupying such a prominent position on the main road, should be painted and kept in fairly good repair. In all probability, a school will have to be opened there very soon; possibly the coming school year. If the Riverdale school is opened, it may be good business to close the River Road school. At the present time both these sections combined can furnish children sufficient for one good school.

The Friends building needs painting. The Center building is greatly in need of new steps and improved toilet arrangements. The Rockland yard, during the spring season and some times in the fall, presents a very serious problem. The children are unable to do much out-of-doors in their recess and noon periods, without getting into the standing water or the resulting mud hole. I recommend, that the matter be investigated and some plans be made for proper drainage as soon as possible.

In closing, I wish to express appreciation of the generous, wholehearted support of parents, pupils, teachers and all who have participated in the work of maintaining better schools.
