

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING 1981 TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN

The annual meeting of the Town of Allenstown was held on March 14, 1981. Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Roger Letendre.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

This Article was taken care of on March 10, 1981. The results are known.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 1 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 by adding the following to Article VIII, General Regulations:

"Section 814. Obnoxious Uses Barred. Not withstanding any other provision of this ordinance, no use shall be permitted in any zone which is injurious, noxious, offensive, or detrimental to the neighborhood or to the public, by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration, or noise, or because of pollution of ground water or surface water, or for any other reason."

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 2 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 as follows:

Delete Article IV. Section 401(e), which permits public utilities in the Open Space and Farming Zone.

Renumber Article IV, 401(f), which permits golf courses in the Open Space and Farming Zone, so that the golf course provision is designated Article IV, Section 401(e).

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 3 as recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 as follows:

Delete all of Article X Section 1001(c), which bars all municipal officers from serving on the Board of Adjustment. Insert in its place the following new Article X. Section 1001(c): "No person may serve as a regular or alternate member of the Board of Adjustment while simultaneously serving in one or more of the following offices in the Town of Allenstown: Board of Selectmen; Planning Board (regular or alternate member); Building Inspector (regular or assistant); Fire Chief; Fire Prevention Officer, or Sewer Commission."

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 5. Too see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 4 as recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 as follows:

Delete Article II, Section 202(f), which defines "lot".

Insert the following new Article II, Section 202(f), Defining frontage. "Frontage: The length of the lot bordering on a public right of way."

Add the following Section 815 to Article VIII, General Regulations: "Only one residential building, together with such buildings which are customarily accessory thereto, shall be located on each lot." If Zoning Amendment No. 1 is defeated but this amendment is adopted, this provision shall be designated Section 814 rather than 815.

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 5 recommended by the Planning Board. Whereas Article VIII. Section 813(c) of the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 requires that each mobile home park owner obtain an annual permit, and whereas Section 813(c) further requires that mobile home park owners shall annually pay to the Town a fee of \$25.00 for each mobile home space, and whereas such fee may be discriminatory and illegal, and whereas doubt regarding the legality of that fee has impeded enforcement of other provisions of the zoning ordinance designed to protect the health and safety of mobile home park residents, the Zoning Ordinance is amended as follows:

Delete the following language from Section 813(c)(1) regarding annual mobile home park permits: "The annual cost of this permit shall be \$25.00 for each mobile home space within a mobile home park."

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 6 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 as follows:

Delete all of Article IV. Section 402(h), which permits industrial uses in the Open Space and Farming Zone by way of a special exception from the Board of Adjustment.

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 7 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 as follows:

Delete Article III, Section 305, entitled Nonconforming Uses, which presently provides as follows: "Prior lawful uses, which are rendered nonconforming by this Odinance, may be continued to the extent that such uses are protected under RSA 31:62."

Insert the following as Article III, Section 305:

"Prior Nonconforming Uses. Prior lawful buildings and uses, which are rendered nonconforming by this Ordinance or any amendment thereto, may be continued indefinitely to the extent that such buildings and uses are protected under RSA 31:62, and may be maintained and repaired provided such action does not increase the degree of noncompliance, but may not be:

- a) moved, enlarged, altered or extended;
- b) changed to another nonconforming use:
- c) Reestablished if such use has been discontinued for a period of one year or has been changed to, or replaced by, a conforming use; or
- d) -restored to other than a nonconforming use after damage from any cause, unless the nonforming use is substantially reinstated within two years.

In the case of buildings which are lawfully nonconforming because of setback, lot frontage or lot size, the Board of Adjustment may grant a special exception allowing expansion of the building up to twenty (20) percent greater than its size at the time it became nonconforming, subject to the standards for special exceptions contained in Section 1002(2) of

this ordinance and subject to such conditions as the Board of Adjustment may impose."

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 8 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 by inserting the following as the second to last section in Article VIII (renumbering the last section of Article VIII accordingly):

"Waste disposal sites. No trash or garbage dump, sanitary landfill or hazardous wast disposal facility shall be located in any zone, except such municipal or governmental uses as are immune from this zoning ordinance under state law, and then only to the extent required by state law."

This article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 9 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 by adding the following to Section IV, regarding land located in the Open Space and Farming Zone:

Section 403. Dimensional restrictions. No building or structure shall be closer than twenty feet from any street or closer than thirty feet from any rear lot line, or closer than fifteen feet from any side lot line, except that:

- a) A swimming pool need not set back more than fifteen feet from the rear lot line;
- b) A garage accessory to a one or two family dwelling need not be set back more than ten feet from the rear lot line; and
- c) A utility shed or greenhouse not larger than one hundred square feet with a height not greater than seven feet need not be set back more than one foot from any side or rear lot line."

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Building Ordinance Amendment No. 1 recommended by the Planning Board.

"LIFE SAFETY CODE ORDINANCE"

Section 1. Adoption of Code by Reference.

Pursuant to RSA 156:1 and 156-A:1, the Town of Allenstown adopts the following code by reference:

The 1976 Life Safety Code (NFPA No. 101), recommended by the National Fire Protection Association.

Section 2. Administration.

The provisions of this ordinance and code shall be administered by the Building Inspector and the Fire Department, who shall report violations to the Board of Selectmen. No building permit shall be issued unless the building complies with this code.

Section 3. Board of Appeal.

The Allenstown Board of Adjustment shall serve as the Board of Appeal under this ordinance and this code.

Section 4. Penalty.

Whoever violates any provision of this ordinance or code shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$25.00 for each separate offense. Each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation is committed or continued shall be deemed a separate offense. The Selectmen are also authorized to enforce this ordinance and code by seeking injunctive relief or any other apropriate legal remedy.

Section 5. Fees.

The Board of Selectmen shall prescribe the fees for any permits or certificates issued under this code, and each application for a permit shall be accompanied by the prescribed fee.

Section 6. Separability.

If any provision of this ordinance or code or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and code and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 7. Other Provisions.

Nothing in this ordinance or code shall be construed to prevent the enforcement of other laws or regulations which prescribe more restrictive limitations

This Article was voted upon and passed on March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

A Motion was made by Roger Menard and seconded by Al Levesque to accept Article 12 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to give a one (1%) per cent discount on all 1981 property taxes paid within fifteen (15) days after mailing of the tax bills.

A Motion was made by Roger Menard and seconded by JoAn Therrien to accept Article 13 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars from Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a 1980 fire truck (1000 GPM Pumper) at a sale price of Ninety-Five Thousand (\$95,000.00) Dollars and to raise the balance of Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars by issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. RSA 33:1, et seq., as amended), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Allenstown. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roger Courtemanche and seconded by Linda Welch to accept Article 14 as read. There was a general discussion as to what effect this Article would have on local taxes. It was also mentioned that last year's Article 21 regarding the purchase of a fire truck was ruled illegal. Voted and passed by a show of hands, 94 "yes" votes and 4 "no" votes.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a 1981 police cruiser. Total price

of such cruiser is Seven Thousand Eight Hundred (\$7,800.00) Dollars. (This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roger Courtemanche and seconded by John Welch to accept Article 15 as read. There was a discussion as to the amount of mileage on the two vehicles and the need for a new one this year. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 16. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a street light at Post #355 on Library Street. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Rudy Plourde and seconded by Sharon Ahern to accept Article 16 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Fifty (\$450.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing three (3) street lights at the following locations:

Letendre Avenue and Granite Street
River Road and Route 28
Riverside Park and Route 28
(This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by John Welch and seconded by Raymond Hamel to accept Article 17 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 18. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a fire detection system in the municipal building as required by the Life Safety Code and the Fire Prevention Code. (This article is not recommended by the Budget committee.)

A Motion was made by John Welch and seconded by Richard Averill to accept Article 18 as read. Voted upon and defeated.

ARTICLE 19. (By Petition) To see fi the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Trust Fund for the purpose of future purchases of motorized fire apparatus and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars for this purpose. (This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by John Welch and seconded by Richard Demers to accept Article 19 as read. Voted upon and defeated.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to deed to the State of New Hampshire, the Town's interest, if any, to Black Hall Road so-called which runs easterly from Deerfield Road to the Town line of Epsom, New Hampshire.

A Motion was made by Roger Courtemanche and seconded by Joe Benninghove to accept Article 20 as read. It was explained that there was merely an old bridge there and the Town would be responsible if anyone was injured. Also, it was said that if the State took over there was the possibility they would repair it. Voted upon and passed.

BALANCE AMOUNT OF REVENUE SHARING IS \$47.134.00

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation of the fire department. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by John Welch and seconded by Richard Averill to accept Article 21 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation of the library. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roger Courtemanche and seconded by John Welch to accept Article 22 as read. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve-Thousand One Hundred Thirty Four (\$12,134.00) Dollars from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set-off against the budgeted appropriation of the Town Office Expense. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

A Motion was made by Roger Menard and seconded by Norman Connor to accept Article 23 as read. Voted and passed.

Attorney Richard Therrien took the floor and said there was a very important Article that was left out of this year's Town Warrant. As a result the town budget could not be voted upon.

A Motion was made by Asher Kneeland and seconded by John Welch to recess until notice is given to the citizens of the Town to reconvene to discuss the budget. Voted and passed. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

The continuation of the annual meeting of the Town of Allenstown was held on April 4, 1981. Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Roger Letendre.

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.

A Motion was made by Roger Letendre and seconded by John Welch to go by line item.

EXPENSES TOWN HALL AND OTHER BUILDINGS. Mr. Hebert asked what was the reason for the large increase. Mr. Bettez stated that the exit from the basement was inadequate; the furnace needed insulation; and the fire extinguishers and smoke alarms were needed. He said they were hoping to take care of these things for less than \$5,000.00.

POLICE DEPARTMENT. A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Donald Girard that we accept the figure recommended by the Budget Committee of \$81,552.20. Police Chief Connor spoke on the need to increase this amount, citing vacation and sick days for the policemen would cost at least an additional \$3,500. A Petition for a secret ballot was signed by Rudy Plourde, Dick Raymond, Don Chaput, Don Girard, Gail Raymond and Adelard Hebert. There were 22 yes votes and 28 no votes. Motion defeated.

A Motion was made by JoAn Therrien and seconded by Roger Bilodeau to increase this line item to \$85,052.20. Voted and passed.

FIRE DEPARTMENT. A Motion was made by Linda Welch and seconded by John Welch to raise this line item by \$3,000.00 Voted and passed.

DAMAGES BY DOGS. A Motion was made by Clyde Erno and seconded by Sharon Ahern to increase this line item by \$1,000 to 3,425.00. Voted and defeated.

TOWN POOR. A Motion was made by Arthur Bettez to increase this line item by \$10,000 to \$40,000 and seconded by Linda Welch. Mr. Bettez stated that since theis budget was submitted, the town had gotten two juvenile placements, ordered by the Hooksett District Court. He said there was no way the Town could pay for these two placements at an estimated \$16,000 plus, and still operate within the \$30,000 budget. Voted and passed.

MEMORIAL DAY - OLD HOME DAY. A Motion was made by John Welch and seconded by Richard Averill to increase this line item by \$10,300. Someone asked if an amount could be inserted when there was a "0" amount recommended by the Budget Committee. Attorney Therrien ruled that the line could be increased. By a show of hands there were 22 yes votes and 16 no votes. Motion passed.

PARKS & PLAYGROUNDS: A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Charles DeFelice to increase this line item by \$5,600 to \$6,400. By a show of hands there were 16 yes votes and 22 no votes. Motion defeated.

A Motion was made by Asher Kneeland and seconded by John Welch to see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as amended in the amount of \$964,565.15. Voted and passed.

ARTICLE 2. To transact and other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A Motion was made by Adelard Hebert and seconded by Richard Averill that next year we go back to the standard size town report. Voted and passed.

A Motion was made by Ed Cyr and seconded by Richard Therrien to adjourn the meeting at 8:20 p.m. Voted and passed.

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Allenstown Elementary School in said Allenstown on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 1 recommended by the Planning Board. Whereas the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 and the mobile home moratorium adopted at the 1978 Annual Town Meeting prohibit owner-occupied mobile homes anywherein the Town, and whereas RSA 31:118 as inserted by N.H. Laws of 1981, Chapter 406, requires that mobile homes on individual lots be permitted in at least a portion of the Town, the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance is amended by adding the following to Article IV regulating uses in Open Space and Farming Zone.

"Section 403. Mobile Homes. Manufactured housing shall be permitted in the Open Space and Farming Zone outside of mobile home parks, subject to all restrictions and provisions of this ordinance which apply to conventional residential dwellings in that zone (Including two and three acre minimum lot sizes). For the purpose of this section, manufactured housing means any and all forms of modular, unitized, or prefabricated housing, as well as mobile homes which are brought to and assembled on a building site, placed on a foundation, and tied into all conventional and necessary utility systems which are intended to be used as a permanent dwelling unit. Manufactured housing does not include housing or mobile homes which are fully constructed on the site. The Mobile Home Moratorium Ordinance adopted at the 1978 Annual Town Meeting shall not apply to manufactured housing located in the Open Space and Farming Zone outside of mobile home parks."

- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following, which is Zoning Amendment No. 2 recommended by the Planning Board. Amend the Town of Allenstown Zoning Ordinance of 1978 by adding the following to Article VI regulating uses in the Open Space and Farming Zone:

 "Section 404. Dimensional Restrictions. No building or structure shall be closer than 20 feet from any street, or closer than 30 feet from any rear or side lot line."
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to give a one (1%) percent discount on all 1982 property taxes paid within fifteen (15) days after mailing of the tax bills.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

MECHANICAL AMUSEMENT DEVICE ORDINANCE

1. Authority:

This ordinance is promulgated under the authority granted by RSA 31:39 as amended.

2. Definitions:

- A. "Mechanical amusement device" shall mean any machine which, upon the insertion of a slug, token, plate, disc, coin or any other form of currency may be operated by the public generally for use as a game, entertainment or amusement, whether or not registering a score. It shall include, but not be limited to such devices as electronic video machines, pin ball machines, skill ball, mechanical grab machines, and all games, operation or transactions similar thereto under whatever name they may be designated or described. This definition, however, does not apply to juke boxes.
- B. "Owner/Operator" shall mean any person who owns any mechanical amusement device; the person in whose place of business any mechanical amusement

device is placed for use by the public; and the person having control over any mechanical amusement device.

- C. "Minors" shall mean a person under the age of sixteen (16) years.
- D. "Nuisance" shall mean and shall include but not be limited to the following:
 - a. Nuisance as defined by RSA 544:1
 - b. Common nuisance as defined in RSA 318-B:16
 - c. Repeated violations of law which are against the interest of the public health, safety and welfare.

3. Minors prohibited from playing mechanical amusement devices;

No Owner/Operator shall permit persons under sixteen (16) years of age to play any mechanical amusement device as herein defined unless accompanied by his or her parents, guardian or other suitable adult person having the care and custody of said person.

4. Hours of operation: Minors

No Owner/Operator shall permit minors unless accompanied by a parent or guardian to enter any place in which a mechanical amusement device is kept between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on days in which public schools are in session. This section shall only apply to any place in which the primary business is the operation of mechanical amusement devices.

5. Gambling devices prohibited:

Nothing in this division shall in any way be construed to authorize, license or permit any gambling devices whatsoever, or any mechanism that has been judicially determined to be a gambling device, or in any way contrary to law, or that may be contrary to any future ' laws of New Hampshire.

6. Seizure and destruction of gambling devices:

If the Chief of Police shall have reason to believe any mechanical amusement device is used as a gambling device, such machine may be seized by the police and impounded, and if, upon trial, a person allowing the operation of such device is found guilty of allowing the same to be used as a gambling device, such machine shall be destroyed by the police, without compensation to the Owner/Operator.

7. License and fees:

No Owner/Operator shall keep any mechanical amusement device in the Town, except for private use, unless a license therefore in writing is obtained from the Board of Selectmen specifying the place in which it is to be kept. The fee for any license issued pursuant to this section shall be Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars per device per year.

8. Expiration date of license:

Any license issued to an Owner/Operator shall expire on the 31st day of December of each year.

9. Nuisance:

If the Chief of Police, or his duly appointed representative, upon investigation has reason to believe that any premises containing mechanical amusement devices licensed under this ordinance is a public nuisance the Owner/Operator so licensed shall be ordered to appear before the Board of Selectmen within thirty (30) days of written notice by certified mail or hand delivered to the owner or his agent by a law enforcement officer of the Town of Allenstown specifying the nature of the charge. If it is determined that a public nuisance does exist, the Board of Selectmen may revoke the license(s).

10. Violation:

Any Owner/Operator who owns, maintains, or is in control of any premises in which a mechanical amusement device is kept in violation of this ordinance or allows a minor to operate the mechanical amusement device in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars. Every day that a violation continues after the Owner/Operator has received notice of the existence of the condition that constitutes the violation shall be deemed a separate offence.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

VEHICLES FOR HIRE (TAXICABS)

1. Authority.

This ordinance is promulgated under the authority granted by RSA 31:40 as amended.

2. Applicability.

Any motor vehicle for hire, used or to be used for

the conveyance of persons from place to place within the Town of Allenstown shall be deemed a taxicab within the meaning of this section, and as further defined in RSA 31:40 as amended.

3. License for driver required.

No person shall operate or drive a taxicab within the Town of Allenstown unless he has been granted a license therefor by the Board of Selectmen. The fee for each operator's license shall be \$1.00.

4. Expiration date of license for drivers.

Any license issued to a driver of a taxicab shall expire on the 31st day of December of each year.

5. Licensing of minors as drivers prohibited.

No license to drive a taxicab shall be granted to a minor under the age of eighteen (18) years.

6. Licensing of undesirables as drivers prohibited.

No license to drive a taxicab shall be granted to a person whose character references, as submitted with his application, distinctly indicate that he should be disqualified from operating such a vehicle.

7. Display of license of driver required.

The license of a driver of a taxicab shall at all times be conspicuously displayed in the cab operated by the driver so that it can be seen by a passenger in either day or night.

8. Failure to display license of driver grounds for revocation of his license.

The failure of the driver of a taxicab to display the license conspicuously in the cab operated by him shall be grounds for the revocation of his license.

9. Violation of traffic laws by driver grounds for revoking license.

The violation of any of the provisions of the highway laws of New Hampshire or of the ordinances of the Town of Allenstown regulating traffic by the driver of a taxicab shall be grounds for the revocation of his license.

10. Violation of ordinance by driver grounds for revoking license.

The violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance by the driver of a taxicab shall be grounds for the revocation of his license.

11. License for vehicle required.

No person shall operate, or cause to be operated a

taxicab business within the Town of Allenstown unless a license has been issued for the taxicab by the Board of Selectmen upon their finding that public convenience and necessity require the operation thereof.

12. Information contained on application.

The application for a license to operate a taxicab business shall set forth the name and address of the applicant, the trade name under which the applicant does or proposes to do business; where proposed stands and garages are to be located, the number of vehicles the applicant desires to operate, with a clear description of each vehicle and such other facts as the Board of Selectmen may require.

13. License fee for vehicle.

The license fee shall be Fifteen (\$15.00) yearly for each taxicab operated within the Town of Allenstown.

14. Liability insurance required before issuing license for vehicle.

- a. Every applicant for a taxicab license shall file with the Board of Selectmen before the license is issued an insurance policy covering the period of license, issued by an insurance company having a permit to issue such policy in New Hampshire, in the usual form of liability insurance issued by insurance companies for injury to persons and property from the use and operation of such vehicles.
- b. The policy of insurance shall be for a principal sum not less than will provide indemnity for personal injury in an amount of not less than fifteen thousands dollars (\$15,000.00) or injury to one person and thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for any injuries arising out of one accident, and for property damage to the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
- c. The Board of Selectmen shall reject any application in the event the insurance policy presented by the applicant is not satisfactory to them.

15. Duration of license for vehicle.

Each license for a taxicab shall be issued annually beginning the 1st and expiring the 31st each year.

16. Rates for fares established.

No owner or driver of a taxicab shall charge any

passenger or passengers any rate for service within the limits of the town other than as provided for in this section.

17. Issuance of rate cards.

Upon the issuance of a license for a taxicab, the licensee shall receive from the Selectmen a card upon which the established rates shall be plainly printed.

18. Display of rate cards required.

Each rate card issued, setting out the established schedule of rates, shall be conspicuously displayed in every taxicab so that it can be seen by a passenger in either day or night.

19. Failure to display rate card grounds for revocation of license of driver and owner.

The failure to display a rate card in a taxicab shall be grounds for revoking the license of the driver and the owner of the taxicab.

20. Over or undercharging grounds for revocation of license of driver and owner.

The demand by an operator of a taxicab of any amount in excess of or below the established rates shall be grounds for revoking the license of the driver and owner of the taxicab.

21. Penalty.

The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$25.00 for each offense.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a street light at Pole #29 located on Granite Street between The Family Bank & Trust and Leon's. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 10.

(By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety Three Dollars and Eighty Two Cents (\$1,793.82)

for the purpose of installing new "Mud and Snow tires" on the Allenstown Fire Dept. Tanker #1. (This article is not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the expenditure of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) for new construction of Pease Brook Bridge.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to post East Webster Street the posting of "No Through Traffic".

ARTICLE 13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to have Martinson Lane paved during the Summer of 1981. (No appropriation requested by petitioners and 1981 budget did not include this expenditure.)

BALANCE AMOUNT OF REVENUE SHARING IS: \$42,538.00

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty
Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) from the Federal
Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set off against
the budgeted appropriation of the Fire Department.
(This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Nine Dollars (\$5,559.00) from the Federal Revenue Trust Fund for use as a set off against the budgeted appropriation of the Town Hall. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Sixteen Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-Nine Dollars (\$16, 979.00) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for use as a set off against the budgeted appropriation of the Police Department. (This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TRANSMITTAL AND COMMENTARY LETTER

Board of Selectmen Town Office Allenstown, New Hampshire 03275

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Allenstown for the year ended December 31, 1980 and have issued our report thereon, dated April 24, 1981. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe to be material weaknesses.

Purchasing Procedures

We recommend the following modifications to the purchasing system to strengthen internal control:

- . All purchase orders should be prenumbered and sequentially issued.
- . A record should be kept of all open purchase orders.
- . Invoices should be sent directly from suppliers to the Selectmen's office where they should be checked against purchase orders and receiving reports for terms, prices and quantities.

Tax Collector's Cash Receipts

We noted that tax receipts were not turned over to the Town on a timely basis. We also observed that the Tax Collector's books were not closed promptly at December 31. State law (R.S.A. 41:35) provides procedures for internal control over tax receipts and for a timely cuttoff of the Tax Collector's bookkeeping activity at year-end. We strongly recommend that the Tax Collector adhere to the procedures established by State law to maintain sound internal accounting control over tax receipts and bookkeeping activity.

Sewer Enterprise Fund

As noted in our auditor's opinion, we issued an "adverse opinion" on the financial statements of the proprietary type funds because the enterprise fund does not conform to generally accepted accounting principles in the following areas:

- A complete record of utility plant in service is not maintained and accordingly, the financial statements do not include the related depreciation expense thereon.
- . Inventory type purchases are expensed when purchased.

Cost of operations including depreciation and interest on sewer debt are usually recovered through user charges in enterprise funds. We recommend that the Sewer Commissioners consider structuring user charge rates to recover these costs in the future.

Other

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgment by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control for the year ended December 31, 1980 which was set forth in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system.

Other areas not directly related to internal accounting control but merit your consideration are discussed in the following paragraphs.

Inventory of Fixed Assets

As is the practice with many New Hampshire municipalities, the Town has not maintained a record of its fixed assets. In order to adequately maintain control of its existing fixed assets, we recommend the Town conduct an inventory of these assets as soon as is practical. Cost or consideration given is the generally accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded on all new acquisitions. In this respect, we also recommend the establishment of guidelines which would distinguish between capital and expense type items. Where adequate documentation of cost is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate or original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting principles for governmental entities. Once records are established they should be maintained on a current basis and reconciled to the ledger controls annually. The existence of fixed assets records will not only aid Town officials in their control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool for long-range planning.

Issuance of Tax Deeds

In our review of the tax sale records we noted that parcels of property for the levies of 1976 and 1977 have not been deeded to the purchasers at tax sale. We recommend that the Tax Collector and the Board of Selectmen jointly review the past due amounts and either deed the properties or abate the old taxes. All unredeemed taxes should be deeded within a reasonable period of time after the two year redemption period expires.

Minutes of Selectmen's Meetings

We observed that the Board of Selectmen did not have minutes available for a number of its meetings. We strongly recommend that the Selectmen take steps to insure that minutes of its meetings are permanently on file within 72 hours after the meeting.

Publication Requirement

The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:21 require that only this letter be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We recommend that you also publish the accompanying financial statements, footnote disclosures and auditor's opinion in their entirety in your next report. If you decide to publish the accompanying financial statements, you must include both footnote disclosures and our auditor's opinion as part of the Town report. In addition, the auditor's report may not be published without the accompanying financial statements and footnotes.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town of Allenstown for their assistance during the course of our audit.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

Board of Selectmen Town Office Allenstown, New Hampshire 03275

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Allenstown for the year ended December 31, 1980, listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As is the practice with many New Hampshire municipalities, the Town of Allenstown has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

The Town has not maintained complete records of the Sewer Department's utility plant in service and, accordingly, related depreciation thereon is not included in the accompanying financial statements as required by generally accepted accounting principles. The Sewer Department records disbursements for inventory type items as expenses in the period purchased rather than as expenses in the period in which they are used as required by generally accepted accounting principles. The amount by which the financial statements would change if these amounts were included, while material cannot be determined.

In our opinion, except that the omission of a statement of general fixed assets described in the second paragraph results in an imcomplete presentation, the financial statements of the governmental and fiduciary fund types and the general long-term debt account group present fairly the financial position of those funds of the Town of Allenstown at December 31, 1980 and the results of their operations for the year then ended. In conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

In our opinion because of the effects of the matters discussed in the third paragraph the financial statements of the proprietary type fund do not present fairly in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, the financial position of the Sewer Commission as of December 31, 1980, or the results of its operations and changes in its financial position for the year then ended.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of Allenstown conform to generally accepted accounting principles for local governmental units except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of Accounting

The accrual basis is used for all fiduciary and proprietary funds. Governmental funds utilize the modified accrual basis whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred (accrual basis) except:

- a. Disbursements for inventory items (materials and supplies) are considered expenditures at the time of purchase.
- b. Prepaid expenses are not normally recorded.

General Fixed Assets

Fixed assets acquired or constructed for general government services are recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. Funds used to acquire general fixed assets and/or debt service payments on borrowings in connection therewith are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made. Generally accepted accounting principles require that general fixed assets be capitalized and accounted for in a separate fixed asset group of accounts.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Fixed assets in the proprietary funds are stated at cost. Interest during construction is not capitalized. (Description of assets, related lives and depreciation methods would be disclosed next).

Continuing Appropriations

Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end are carried forward as continuing appropriations to the next year in which they supplement the appropriations of that year. At year-end, continuing appropriations are reported as a component of fund balance and are detailed as follows:

General Fund: Town Construction	\$15,86

Taxes Collected For Others

The Town collect taxes for the Allenstown School District and Merrimack County which are remitted to them as required by law. These funds are accounted for as agency funds.

Inter-Fund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds including expenditures and transfers or resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Proprietary funds record operating subsidies as other income, whereas the governmental fund paying the subsidy records it as a transfer.

Other General Accounting Policies

Retirement System

Only members of the Police Department and Highway Department are members of the New Hampshire Retirement System. Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by law and dependent upon age when contribution begins. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan as of June 30, 1978, and has been set at 7.61% of annual compensation. The amount, if any, of the excess vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Allenstown is not available. The Town has no past service cost obligation. The total pension cost to the Town for the year was \$2,825.87.

Property Taxes

Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatements, discounts and refunds of property tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to overlay.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 11% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

2. PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS:

The Town reports its activities in numerous individual funds to comply with the limitations and restrictions placed on both the resources made available to the Town and the services provided. Individual funds and account groups summarized in the accompanying financial statements are classified as follows:

A. Governmental Funds

These funds are intended to provide recurring general services. They are controlled by a budget approved by the voters.

General Fund - used to account for all revenues and expenditures which are not accounted for in other funds or account groups.

Special Revenue Funds - used to account for specific restricted revenues and expenditures for various purposes. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by the terms of contractual agreements, statutes or local law.

Capital Project Funds - these funds are used to account for resources designated to contruct or acquire fixed assets. Such resources are derived principally from proceeds of general obligation bonds, notes, Federal or State grants.

B. Proprietary Funds

Enterprise Funds - these funds account for operations of entities that provide services on user charge, or other basis to the general public.

C. Fiduciary Funds

Trust and Agency Funds - these funds are used to account for assets held by Town in a fiduciary capacity for various purposes including cemetery operations, and taxes collected for other governmental units. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by statutes or local law.

D. General Long-Term Debt Account Group

This group is used to account for the outstanding principal balances of general obligation bonds or notes.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

3. BUDGET:

The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary.

4. CHANGES IN LONG-TERM DEBT:

Bonds Payable at December 31, 1980 are comprised of the following individual issues:

\$1,120,000 sewer serial bonds due in annual installments of \$55,000 through 1994 and \$50,00 from 1995 through 2001; interest at 5.1 percent. (This issue is being funded partially by the unexpended balance of bond proceeds and partially by General Fund revenues. The State of New Hampshire has historically funded a portion of this issue).

General obligation bonds are direct obligations of the Town for which its full faith and credit are pledged, and are payable from taxes levied on all taxable property located within the Town. The debt is reported in the Sewer Enterprise Fund.

5. EXPENDABLE TRUST FUNDS:

Expendable trust funds, held by the Trustees of Trust funds at December 31, 1980 were in the form of Capital Reserve Funds in the amount of \$25,150.

6. SPECIAL REVENUE FUND BALANCES:

At December 31, 1980, the Special Revenue Fund balance of \$49,411 consisted of the following:

7. CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND BALANCE:

The balance of \$709,520 in the Capital Project Fund at December 31, 1980 represents the remaining balance of the Sewer Waste Treatment Construction Project. At December 31, 1980, the project has been substantially completed. State law provides that the remaining balance be used to reduce principal of the debt or reapportioned for a project of similar life as the period of the bond.

8. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES - ENTERPRISE FUND:

The Town of Allenstown is currently involved in a breach of contract suit with the contractor of the sewer facilities in the amount of approximately \$250,000. Town council informs us that the Town's potential share of this liability is limited to 35% of any judgements against the Town.

9. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS:

Approximately \$10,000 of insurance coverage was obtained from an elected town official.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners are pleased to report that instead of an increase in our rate structure we look forward to some decrease for the year 1982.

This rate change is due to competitive bidding for some of our supplies and materials, which ensures their quality and the quality of service to the plant. This combined with a decrease in the total operating budget, specifically in the area of sewer line maintenance, as well as a reduction in the present use of plant chemicals, makes a decrease in our sewer rental charge possible.

The plant costs have been shared with Pembroke at a rate of 52.1% for Allenstown and a 47.9% share for Pembroke. The percentage shares are determined by the total water usage derived from sewer rental charges for both Towns.

We are always open to suggestions to improve our service to you and invite you to attend one of our meetings, which are held on the first Tuesday of each month. Thank you for your confidence and we hope to continue to serve you to our best ability.

ALLENSTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT

TO THE CITIZENS OF ALLENSTOWN:

In our report that was submitted to the Town in 1980 it was stated, "...It will only be through your continued support that the Allenstown Police Department will be able to maintain its overall effectiveness...".

Another year has passed into history and I am happy to report that we have been able to fulfill our promise to you. During this past year we have actively sought the advice of citizens regarding the better utilization of police personnel. Suggestions came from all sources - some ideas never saw the "light of day" but many suggestions were implemented, if not in their entirety, to some degree.

As a result of new patrol procedures that were instituted during 1981 we were able to *reduce* our incidents of burglaries by a dramatic 54%. In 1980 a total of 65 burglaries were reported. In 1981, this figure was reduced to 30. In December of 1981, through the combined efforts of the Allenstown Police Department. New Hampshire State Police and the Merrimack County Sheriff's Office four individuals were arrested and charged in connection with these burglaries. These arrests culminated several months of investigation and I would be remiss if I did not take this opportunity to single out for special recognition Trooper Thomas Sexton of Troop D, NH State Police for his most valuable assistance in this investigation.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank those citizens who called the police when they observed suspicious activity in their neighborhood. Through these calls we were able to identify individuals who have a known propensity for burglaries. I am quite confident that those individuals who are known burglars have passed the word to their associates that Allenstown is not the place to commit this crime. We are striving for a further reduction of this figure and with your continued cooperation we will be successful.

In compiling our statistics for this Annual Town Report we must rely on figures that have been submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the form of the monthly Uniform Crime Reports (UCR). These statistics are supplied to the State Police and FBI and are complied annually in the FBI UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS. The FBI has changed their requirements for what constitutes a particular incident. For example, in 1980 we had 409 domestic complaints. In 1981, according to current FBI standards, we reported only 59 - not that there were any less only that more had to take place to be classified as a "domestic disturbance".

As you can determine from the enclosed statistical review of the year it has been an extremely busy one for us. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the department for their outstanding cooperation and dedica-

tion to duty. All members of the department have contributed freely of their time and expertise in order to meet our goal of making Allenstown a safer and better community in which to live.

Again, to the citizens of the town I wish to express my gratitude for your concern of not only the Town but of your neighbor. It will only be through your continuing effort that our goal will be reached.

In 1981, training sessions were offered to members of the department in various fields of firefighting. Included were courses in ladderwork, breathing apparatus, CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation), oxygen therapy and advanced first aid, thus enabling 50% of the department to become certified and the remaining 50% in the process of certification.

A 1564 gallon tanker was obtained through Civil Defense at minimal cost for the purpose of fighting forest fires. Members of the department donated many hours in preparing the vehicle for use. Also purchased through Civil Defense were two ¾ ton trucks which were turned over to the forestry department.

Needed to complete each members winter gear were bunker pants. These recently purchased with the monies donated by local merchants as well as fund raisers.

1981 has proven to be a very successful year. A recent letter from the Concord Fire Department showing statistics indicates Allenstown has the fastest respond time amongst the 14 mutual aid compact towns aside from Concord with an average of 2.0.

THE TRI-TOWN VOLUNTEER EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE, INC.

To the Residents of Allenstown:

1981 was a very busy year for Tri-Town, the busiest since it was formed in 1972. From January 1 - December 31, 1981, Tri-Town responded to 798 calls for "medical assistance" - 33.5% in Allenstown, 35.8% in Hooksett and 30.7% in Pembroke. More than half (57%) were home emergencies (responses to private residences), 33.5% were road emergencies, 3% were transfers (transport to/from area hospitals or homes) and 5.2% other types of calls, including industrial or school accidents.

In 1981 the residents of Allenstown, Hooksett and Pembroke each approved an allocation of \$4,000 for Tri-Town. This came to a cost of \$14.98 per call to the residents of Allenstown. The fee for this service on a commerical basis would be \$65 per call plus the cost of oxygen and supplies and a mileage fee. In 1982 we are again requesting an allocation of \$4,000 from each of the three municipalities.

On behalf of its members, the Tri-Town Executive Board would like to extend its appreciation to the residents of its service area for the continued financial and community support it has shown. We would also like to thank the other agencies who help us in the delivery of our service, the police and fire departments of all three towns and to Hooksett Dispatch Center for continuing to receive and dispatch calls for Tri-Town.

As in the past, we are seeking caring people to apply for membership. We need not only people who are trained or willing to take training courses to become ambulance attendants, but management and administratively inclined residents. For not only do we require attendants to respond to emergencies, but we also need members who can help administer the organization and its functions.

As always we are very grateful to the residents of Allenstown who are members, for it is because of their dedication and service to the community that we can maintain a caring and growing organization.

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., continued to service Allenstown for this past year. They have provided skilled nursing care for anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurse's visits.

Therapy services; such as, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, and nutritional guidance have been given by the therapists in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of homemaker/home health aides is available to give physical care, do light housekeeping, and assist with meal planning and meal preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition, sickness, and accident prevention.

Anyone in Allenstown may request these services-doctor, family, pastor, friend, or the patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing home care can be provided only under a doctor's orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9:00 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Fees may be scaled for those unable to pay the charge if that person has no other funding source available, such as insurance coverage. The patient will be responsible for remainder of bill.

As of August 17, 1981, the Suncook C & Y became a part of the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association. This decision was necessitated by the advent of block grants and federal and state cutbacks.

Major changes which have occurred at C/Y as a result of trying to continue services on less than $\frac{1}{2}$ of the former budget are:

- 1. There is now an income guideline of \$14,000 for a family of 4.
- There will no longer be any funds available to pay for acute care of clients carried.
- 3. Less staff time will be available to service clients.
- 4. Clients will be discharged from the program once the youngest child in the family is in 1st grade.
- 5. The clinic will be closed on Fridays.
- 6. Present enrollment as of 12/30/81 is 293 children. 154 children have been discharged since 8/17/81. 97 of these discharges occurred because all children in the family were in school. 36 children were discharged as the family income was over the income guideline and 21 children had moved. 97 children have been admitted to the program since 8/17/81.
- 7. The Tri-Town Advisory Committee is remaining actively involved in discussing community health needs and trying to come up with ways of meeting these needs.

In spite of these changes, we feel we can continue to deliver an effective, necessary, quality service to the residents of Pembroke, Allenstown, and Hooksett.

ANNUAL REPORT ALLENSTOWN WELFARE

1981 saw a decrease in Welfare expenditures in Allenstown at a time when budgets were increasing statewide at an alarming rate. We spent \$27,399.29 for welfare in 1981, a decrease of \$20,412.67 from the sums expended in 1980.

We have given assistance to 227 persons; 63 families, 114 children, 5 elderly, 8 single residents, 3 juveniles and 2 foster children.

I have been pushing the Workfare program but as of this date, the only department heads willing to use able bodied help are the Road Agent and the School. Both departments are enthusiastic about the extra manpower they receive at no extra cost to their budgets. I am happy with this program because it allows those who need assistance due to no fault of their own to retain their dignity by working and eliminates those who want a free pass through life.

In 1981, I testified before legislative committees to push for legislation beneficial to our town. One such bill that was passed enabled us to require the **recipient** to pay back his/her assistance when they were able. We (the New Hampshire Local Welfare Administrators Assoc.) were also able to push through a bill mandating the courts have to give the towns financial information about the parents of court committed juveniles so we can determine whether we are really financially liable. Prior to August 1981, the towns would be sent a court order to pay but were not allowed any information (even the parents'

names) to be able to make a determination whether the juvenile was our legal liability. (In 1980, the Town of Allenstown paid \$9,300.10 for a juvenile that was the legal liability of Merrimack County due to the refusal of the court to supply us with the information we needed to determine liability. I am attempting at this time to recover these monies from the County.)

Welfare recipients have repaid the Town of Allenstown \$3,172.51 during 1981. This is approximately 12% of all monies expended this year, a recovery percentage that is one of the highest in the state. We have placed a large number of liens on property in the last year. A few of these have been paid off already.

The Allenstown Welfare Dept. can be reached daily by filling out an application at the Selectmen's office and calling me at 485-3345 after 7 P.M. An appointment will be set that is convenient to both parties.

MINUTES OF THE ALLENSTOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The Allenstown Annual School District Meeting was called to order at 7:10 p.m., on Friday, March 6, 1981, by William Smith; School District Moderator. The meeting proceeded according to the Articles as presented in the Allenstown Town Report for the year 1980.

The first order of business was:

ARTICLE 1-TO DETERMINE AND APPOINT THE SALARIES OF THE SCHOOL BOARD AND TRUANT OFFICER, AND FIX THE COMPENSATION OF ANY OTHER OFFICERS OR AGENTS OF THE DISTRICT.

The Moderator requested that we pass over and take motion on this article after article 12 has been reviewed.

ARTICLE 2-TO HEAR THE REPORTS OF AGENTS, AUDITORS, COMMITTEES, OR OFFICERS CHOSEN AND PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO.

There were no committee reports to be presented.

ARTICLE 3-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO ACCEPT FUNDS IN THE AMOUNTS SET FORTH BELOW WHICH MAY BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE DISTRICT THROUGH THE FOLLOWING FEDERAL PROGRAMS:

FURTHER, TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO APPLY FOR AND EXPEND THE SUM OF \$268,205.00 FOR SUCH PURPOSES PROVIDED THAT THE SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL NOT BE THEREBY REQUIRED TO RAISE ANY MONEY BY LOCAL TAXATION IN THIS OR SUBSEQUENT YEARS AS THE RESULT OF SUCH EXPENDITURES OF \$268,205.00. This Article was approved by the Budget Committee.

A motion was made by Roger Menard to approve the Article as read and seconded by Morris Emond. This article was declared passed on voice vote.

FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION FOR THE 1980-1981 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR. A motion was made by Frank Danieli and seconded by Linda Welch that this article be accepted as read. On a voice vote, this article was declared passed.

ARTICLE 12-TO SEE WHAT SUM OF MONEY THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE FOR THE SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICERS AND AGENTS OTHER THAN BENEFITS AND SALARIES PAYABLE TO TEACHERS AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

A motion was made by Frank Danieli and seconded by Ed Duschene that the appropriated amount of money be \$1,587,754.14, the amount recommended by the Budget Committee.

DISCUSSION-It was decided to read the budget line item by line item. The increase in 1100-563, Tuition to other districts increased due to the tuition increase at Pembroke Academy from \$1,480. to \$1,760. Item 1100-610, Teaching Supplies: The district combines with other members of the Supervisory Union to bulk order supplies, and get a reduced cost. 1100-Reading: cost increase due to the replacement of consumable workbooks. 1100-Readiness: cost increase due to increased Readiness classes from one to two. 1100-Social Studies: due to replacement of workbooks. According to Eric Knowlton, Principal, it is cheaper to reorder workbooks than to have students use xeroxed copies of material, 1100-741 Instructional Equipment, Science; a motion to eliminate this item was proposed by Linda Welch and seconded by Roger Courtmache, at a savings of \$141. This motion was defeated on a voice vote. 2320-351, District Union Support: the increase in this item was due to the increase in the salary for the Business Administrator, computer, and \$8,000. for the services of a consulting firm to implement more effective management.

On a voice vote, the amount of \$1,587,754.14 was approved for expenditure, and the article was declared passed.

ARTICLE 13-TO SEE IF THE VOTERS OF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO ACCEPT GIFTS AND DONATIONS ON BEHALF OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT.

A motion was made to accept the article as read by Ed Duschene and seconded by Linda Welch. On a voice vote, this article was declared passed.

ARTICLE 14-TO CHOOSE AGENTS AND COMMITTEES IN RELATION TO ANY SUBJECT EMBRACED IN THIS WARRANT. This article was passed over.

ARTICLE 4-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO APPLY FOR AND EXPEND ON BEHALF OF THE DISTRICT FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDS OTHER THAN THOSE SET FORTH IN ARTICLE 3.

A motion to accept the article as read was made by Frank Danieli and seconded by Sharon Ahern. On a voice vote, the article was declared passed.

ARTICLE 5-IF APPROPRIATE LEGISLATION IS ADOPTED AT THE 1981 LEGISLATIVE SESSION, TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO APPLY FOR, ACCEPT AND EXPEND, WITHOUT FURTHER ACTION BY THE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING, MONEY FROM THE STATE, FEDERAL OR OTHER GOVERNMENTAL UNIT OR A PRIVATE SOURCE WHICH BECOMES AVAILABLE DURING THE 1981-1982 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR, PROVIDED THAT SUCH EXPENDITURE BY MADE FOR PURPOSES FOR WHICH A SCHOOL DISTRICT MAY APPROPRIATE MONEY AND THAT SUCH EXPENDITURE NOT REQUIRE THE EXPENDITURE OF OTHER SCHOOL DISTRICT FUNDS. FURTHER, THAT THE SCHOOL BOARD HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING PRIOR TO ACCEPTING AND SPENDING SUCH MONEY.

A motion to accept this article as read was made by Ed Duschene and seconded by Linda Welch. There was no discussion on this article, and it was declared passed on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 6-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SCHOOL BOARD TO TAKE SUCH ACTION ON BEHALF OF THE DISTRICT AS MAY BE REQUIRED TO JOIN AS A PARTY PLAINTIFF IN A SUIT AGAINST THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE AND PROPER OFFICIALS THEREOF TO COMPEL THE STATE TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS FOR THE PURPOSE OF MORE NEARLY EQUALIZING THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE CHILDREN TO RECEIVE A BASIC EDUCATION AND TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL RAISE AND APPROPRIATE \$1,270.50 FOR THIS PURPOSE.

A motion was made to accept this article as read by Ed Duschene and seconded by Roger Menard.

DISCUSSION-A question was asked as to what other town have agreed to be party to this suit. Towns thus far who have agreed to be party include Epsom and Candia, as well as other towns which have agreed to be unnamed parties to the suit. Further, other towns would probably join in the suit after their School District Meetings.

After a voice vote, this article was declared passed.

ARTICLE 7-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO TERMINATE ITS HANDICAPPED STUDENT PROGRAMS FOR THE AGE GROUPS THREE THRU FIVE AND EIGHTEEN THRU TWENTY-ONE IF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE NO LONGER MANDATES SUCH PROGRAMS. FURTHERMORE, THAT IF SUCH HANDICAPPED PROGRAMS ARE NO LONGER MANDATED BY THE STATE, THAT ANY APPROPRIATIONS FOR SUCH HANDICAPPED PROGRAMS IN THE SCHOOL BUDGET FOR THE 1981-1982 FISCAL YEAR BE DELETED.

A motion was made to accept the article as read by Frank Danieli and seconded by Linda Welch.

DISCUSSION-The Federal government allows the State to set its guidelines and the town is looking for direction from the State. The cost for educating these children are \$7,100. (for age group three to five) and \$26,300. (for age group eighteen to twenty-one.) A motion to ammend the article to eliminate age group three to five was presented by Dennis Bailey and seconded by Ed Duschene. This proposed amendment was defeated on voice vote. The question was then moved to a vote, and on a hand vote of forty-six to twenty, was declared passed.

ARTICLE 8-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$415,949.36 TO FUND ALL COST ITEMS RELATING TO TEACHERS' SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR THE 1981-1982 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR, \$43,065.48 OF SUCH SUM REPRESENTING ADDITIONAL COSTS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE LATEST COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO BY THE SCHOOL BOARD AND THE ALLENSTOWN TEACHERS ASSOCIATION. The Budget Committee approved a total appropriation of \$389,739.36 and an increase for the 1981-1982 school year of \$16,944.00.

A motion to approve this article as read by made by Ed Duschene and seconded by Dick Demers.

DISCUSSION-The current base salary for teachers' is \$8,300. The proposed increase would make starting salaries \$9,400., an increase of 13.4%. If the Budget Committee's recommendations are voted in, either two teachers would be eliminated or the School Board and the Teachers would have to renegotiate the teachers' contract, which could cost the town \$5,000. The proposed salaries would put Allenstown's salaries within the range of neighboring towns. Roger Menard, Chairman of the Budget Committee, stated that the Budget Committee pared only \$79,000. from a budget of approximately \$2,000,000.

An Amendment was proposed by Dennis Bailey and seconded by Raymond Hamel to change the amount for teachers' salaries to \$389,739.36. An amendment to the amendment was proposed by Frank Danieli and seconded by Vicki Kneeland to change the amount for teachers' salaries to \$404,949.36. On a hand vote, this proposed amended amendment was defeated 32-35.

On a hand vote, the proposed amendment was passed 41-32. The article was then moved to the question, and on a hand vote was defeated 36-38. (This count was arrived at by two different counters.) At this point, the Moderator declared that there was no monies appropriated for teachers' salaries, and the original article was proposed to be accepted as read by Frank Danieli and seconded by Vicki Kneeland. An amendment was proposed by Mrs. Richard McNamara and seconded by Charlie Currier to amend the teachers' salary funding figure to \$404,949.36, \$43,065.48 of such sum attributable to collective bargaining costs. This amendment was passed on a hand vote, 47-19. A petition was then presented by Charlie Todd to have the question voted upon by secret ballot. This petition was signed by five other registered voters of Allenstown, as well as Mr. Todd. The amended article passed on a secret ballot, 45-33.

ARTICLE 9- TO SEE IF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO ADOPT AND APPROVE THE COST ITEMS AS SET FORTH IN THE LASTEST COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT WITH THE ALLENSTOWN TEACHERS ASSOCIATION FOR THE 1982-1983 FISCAL YEAR.

A motion was made by Ed Duschene and seconded by Frank Danieli to accept the article as read.

DISCUSSION-This article would set the rate of next year's increase of salary for the teachers at 4.2%.

On a voice vote, this article was passed as read.

ARTICLE 10-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$53,981.00 AS A SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION FOR THE 1980-1981 SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR. This article was approved by the Budget Committee.

A motion was made by Dick McNamara and seconded by Roger Courtmache that this article be accepted as read. This article passed on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 11-TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE \$37,000.00 AS A DEFICIT APPROPRIATION

ARTICLE 15-TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE SAID MEETING. Charlie Todd lead a round of applause of the School District Officers for the work that they had done. A Motion was proposed to cap next year's school spending to 5%, but this was declared out of order. Mr. Smith announced that he would consider write-in votes for the position of School District Moderator, and also announced that there is no candidate for the position of School District Treasurer.

A motion to adjourn was made by Frank Danieli and seconded by Ed Duschene, and the Moderator adjourned the meeting at 10:35 p.m.

TRANSMITTAL AND COMMENTARY LETTER

The School Board Allenstown School Board Suncook, New Hampshire 03275

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Allenstown School District for the year ended June 30, 1981 and have issued our report thereon, dated September 11, 1981. As part of our examination we reviewed and tested the District's system of internal accounting controls to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon to determine the nature, timing and extent of such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe to be material weaknesses.

General Accounting System

Our review of the District's general accounting system disclosed the following material weaknesses in internal accounting controls.

- No cash receipts journal is maintained as part of the accounting system.
- Additional manual analysis of the system's output is necessary to reconcile with cash balances.
- Unremitted payroll deductions are not accounted for by the system.

We strongly recommend that District officials seriously consider the establishment of a comprehensive system that will alleviate the deficiencies as discussed. Such a system would provide District officials with a higher level of confidence that local government resources are being properly used. In addition, the present fragmented system *must* be integrated into a complete accounting system.

Payroll Procedures

Currently, changes to the payroll system require operating personnel to

make certain decisions. We believe this to be a serious weakness in internal accounting control. We recommend that S.A.U. No. 53 establish standardized personnel action forms for new hires, terminations, changes in pay rates and authorized leaves signed by appropriate supervisors. Such forms should reflect all information necessary to update the payroll system. The recommendations made in the preceding paragraphs were also made in last years audit report. We strongly recommend that steps be taken in the near future to remedy these weaknesses.

Student Activity Funds

As noted in our opinion some Student Activity Funds were not auditable. We urge the District officials prepare auditable reports of these funds in order to assure you that the District's fiduciary responsibilities to the students are being fulfilled.

Other

The objective of internal control is to provide reasonable but not absolute, assurance as to safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition; and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurances recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgements by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect to the estimates and judgements required in the preparation of financial statements. Further projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

The following conditions, while not material weaknesses in internal accounting control merit your consideration.

Our study and evaluation of the District's system of internal accounting

control for the year ended June 30, 1981 which was set forth in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system.

1. Inventory of Fixed Assets

As is the practice with many New Hampshire School Districts, the School District has not maintained a record of its fixed assets. In order to adequately maintain control of its existing fixed assets we recommend the District cause an inventory of these assets as soon as practical. As part of their long-term policies, District officials should initiate fixed asset records. Cost or consideration given is the generally accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded on all new acquisitions. Where adequate documentation of cost is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate of the original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting principles for governmental entities. The existence of fixed asset records will not only aid District officials in their control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool in long-range planning.

2. Gross Budgeting

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1981, budgeted federal projects fund revenues and expenditures exceeded actual federal projects fund revenues and expenditures by 1,012%. Sound management practice requires that realistic budgets be prepared for all projected operations.

3. Expenditures

During our review we noted that several invoices were not effectively concelled so as to prevent their reuse. In addition, all invoice footings and extensions should be reviewed before approval.

4. School Lunch Sales

Very little control exists over School Lunch Sales receipts. We recommend that the District investigate the feasibility of implementing control mechanisms at the point of sale.

5. Student Activity Funds

Included in the Student Activities Funds is the athletic account, sums are transferred from the General Fund to this account and individual checks are issued from the athletic account to referees and umpires at the time the games are played. This activity should be accounted for under the General Fund.

The unissued checks of all Student Activity Fund checking accounts are

not pre-numbered. We recommend that pre-numbered checks be ordered when the present supply is depleted and we suggest the acquisition of a hand stamp which could number the unused checks in consecutive order. Once this has been done, all issued checks should be accounted for as used or voided before a new supply is issued.

Publication Requirement

The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:21 require that only this letter shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

However, we suggest that you consider the publication of the entire report which includes auditor's opinion, financial statements and notes to financial statements. No portion of either the auditor's opinion, financial statements or notes to financial statements may be published separately.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of Allenstown School District for their assistance during the course of our audit.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

As your new Superintendent of Schools, I have been impressed with the cooperative efforts between the school administration and staff, the community, and the members of the School Board. Honest efforts are being made to provide the best educational program possible for all of our students within the limits of the resources provided by the community. The most outstanding resource we have is people. Several volunteers from the community allow us to provide portions of programs we could not otherwise provide. School Board members have shown their interest in and commitment to the school program by the many hours they have spent on behalf of our students and by their very real assistance in dealing with issues which arise.

My observations of all teachers within the school district have been very encouraging to me. I saw a good program, competently taught by professional educators. You can feel proud of the dedicated staff you have, they represent a real asset to your school. Their staff development efforts, required by the state, are quite good. As I have reviewed their plans and their in-service training programs, I have been impressed with their efforts.

Mr. Knowlton, School Principal, has been doing an excellent job of educational leadership with the staff. His efforts at improving communication with the parents and other community residents reflect the importance we attach to keeping people informed about our school programs. Major efforts to establish a system of curriculum review and revision have been started. It is important that we assure that what we teach and the way we teach really meets the educational needs of our students.

The district is making significant progress in its goal of educating all possible special needs students within our school district or in a collaborative program within our own School Administrative Unit (SAU) #53. It's very rewarding to see the progress being made by these youngsters. Jaclyn Adams, Special Education Administrator for our SAU, has worked closely with the staff, to plan appropriate programs for these students. The district has also realized some cost savings due to this approach.

Federal funds for the district are used exclusively for programs within the district and are managed by the SAU office. These monies allow us to supplement our program at the school. Facing a time of declining federal and state revenues, we shall have to review our needs and resources very carefully to continue to meet our students' educational needs.

Dr. Gerald Croteau, former Superintendent of Schools, resigned late in the year and moved to another Superintendency in another state. The SAU Board

hired Ms. Patsy Baugh to be Interim Superintendent until the position was filled. Following an extensive selection process, I was hired and began as your Superintendent on October 5th. I believe that schools, communities, and parents should be partners in educating our children. All of us, together, educate our children. How well we do that depends, in part, on our ability and willingness to work together on our children's behalf.

So part of a review of some of the services we provide, a comprehensive study of the SAU office is currently being performed by staff from the Center for Educational Field Services from the University of New Hampshire. It is my sincere hope that this study will assist us in providing cost effective services required of the SAU office for all towns with the SAU district.

I very much appreciate the efforts of the School Board, staff, and community residents in assisting me to get started in a new job and look forward to working with you on behalf of our students in the future.
