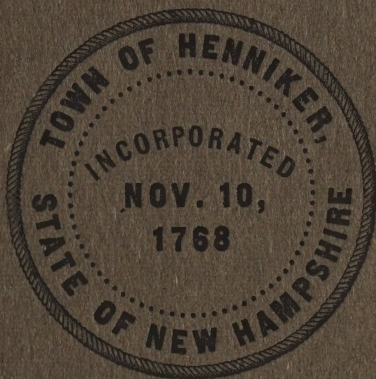

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its State Aid and Trunk Line roads.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

7. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

10. To see if the town will vote to reimburse the Trustees of the Tucker Free Library for money expended in 1932 for insurance of said library.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

15. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness.

17. To see what action the town will take relative to renewing its contract with the New Hampshire Power Co. for street lights or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase and install traffic lights at the junctions of Maple and Pleasant streets with Main street, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to permit the Trustees of the Cogswell Benevolent Trust to enlarge the auditorium of the Cogswell Memorial School substantially in accordance with the original plans of Chase R. Whitcher, Architect, without expense to the town.

20. To see if the town will vote to assist the owners of the K & C Manufacturing plant in establishing a manufacturing business therein or take any action relative thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To see what action the town will take relative to the observance of Old Home Day.

23. To see what action the town will take relative to purchasing or hiring land for a town dump in a new location, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.

24. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting and raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Henniker was very fortunate the past year in having so few cases of contagious diseases, there being but one case of Scarlet Fever, and but few cases of Measles, but there were several cases of Mumps and Whooping Cough, none serious.

Quarantined but three houses during the year which is a very low record. I got water at five places and sent it to the Laboratory of Hygiene for chemical examination. Our public water is the equal of any in the state. Got milk at eight places and sent it to the Laboratory of Hygiene.

Recorded twenty-seven vaccination cases. Examined two nurseries and one hospital and signed their applications to continue their work for another year. Fumigated in two places, and buried one dead animal.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Henniker:

This, my fifth annual report, will deal briefly with the following topics:

- (1) Statistics of our schools.
- (2) Our school buildings.
- (3) Our high school.
- (4) Age of entrance to first grade.
- (5) The trend toward centralization of schools in New Hampshire.

Especial credit should be given to the Brick school for its unusual record of attendance during the past year. Not a single absent mark appeared in the register—and only one case of tardiness, when a girl did not feel able to walk to school one afternoon, and her father brought her in his automobile, arriving a few minutes after one o'clock. The record of no tardiness at the Westboro Corner school also deserves commendation.

Enrollment in the first grade at the central school has been large for several years past, necessitating the services of an assistant in the primary room. As each large class has been promoted, the result is a crowded condition in the grades above. The situation this year has made necessary a division of the first four grades into three groups instead of two. We are now using four of the rooms in the Central building; last year we used only three.

OUR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The Central elementary school received a new coat of paint outside during the past summer. Little other repair work was done on any of our buildings.

Our present greatest need is for new or repaired toilet tanks in the West Henniker school, as those in use have rusted out. The Quaker Street school should be repainted inside, and the Central school roof needs attention. Further major repairs or jobs of remodeling can be postponed for a year at least.

OUR HIGH SCHOOL

The condition of the new and beautiful Cogswell Memorial building is excellent, and school authorities have worked conscientiously to instill in the pupils their responsibility in keeping it so. In this connection, and

also for the purpose of building a better school morale, a student council, elected from the several classes, is functioning. Through the council have come several worthy suggestions for the improvement of traffic movement within the building, and the training of several responsible boys to see that the younger children of the elementary school get safely across the road on their way home at noon and night. Mr. Rush has kindly cooperated with us in training the volunteers in this traffic work. It is well not to wait for a serious accident to teach us that prevention is needed in these days of careless driving.

The home economics department is continuing the policy of previous years of attempting to furnish the best hot lunches possible at a minimum expense to those, from forty-five to seventy in number who eat their dinners at school. Two nourishing dishes are served at a total cost of five cents. Somewhat of a business is done by means of barter, various vegetables, milk, or other food commodities being exchanged for the lunches in many cases. Parents are again urged to have their children take advantage of the prepared foods offered.

The mechanic arts department has added this year for the first time a course in auto mechanics and repair. With two dilapidated cars to work upon, the junior and senior boys in this class are gaining a practical knowledge of the working of the gasoline motor and other mechanical features of the automobile. With motor vehicles becoming a necessity for many people today, we believe this type of instruction will be very helpful to the boys.

The problem of vocational guidance, of helping our students to choose a suitable life-work, is facing every high school today. Our faculty, and especially our

headmaster, are undertaking to give our boys and girls definite instruction about vocations that will be helpful to them in choosing which they prefer to follow.

In physical education, a twenty-four minute morning recess period is devoted in the spring and fall, when weather conditions are favorable, to an outdoor program which includes various track and field events and mass games such as field hockey and baseball for girls, and soccer or tag football for boys.

In contests with other school teams in basketball and baseball, our record of games won in recent years is not impressive. There are various causes for this. Many nearby schools have larger enrollments, and consequently more material from which to develop teams. In the case of basketball, our playing surface compares very unfavorably with that of most of our neighbor schools. As for baseball, last spring it was hard to find players for Saturday afternoon games. Some of our boys had work to do on the farm, and other good ball players seemed to prefer to spend their time in other ways. As a result of this and other causes, baseball will probably be curtailed to interclass games during the coming season.

The most pleasing feature of the athletic situation is that, win or lose, Henniker teams have upheld high standards of sportsmanship and are genuinely popular with their opponents.

AGE OF ENTRANCE TO FIRST GRADE

Each year, parents request the privilege of sending to school some children who are too young to do well the work of the first grade. These parents make the mistake of thinking that if the child gets an early start, his

chances of progress through the school course will be improved. The opposite is likely to be the case; for the child usually finds new tasks coming to him from year to year that are just a little too hard for one of his age to grasp, while the more mature members of his grade can learn them easily. The result is frequently a failure to be promoted at some point in the course, with resulting discouragement; or more often a case of being just a little behind the others all the way along, and barely making the grade. If no pupil entered school until after he had passed his sixth birthday, the chances of success by all would be improved; in fact, a child would seldom if ever lose by it, if he should wait until he were seven years old before entering.

THE TENDENCY TOWARD SCHOOL CENTRALIZATION

During the past twelve years, the number of one-room schools in New Hampshire has decreased from 803 to 512. The number of pupils transported has in six years increased more than 60 per cent. The present public demand for economy in school expenditures seems to accelerate this tendency to close the small one-room school and transport the pupils to larger centers. As improved highways and better vehicles for transportation are provided, the greatest objections to centralization are being overcome.

Henniker is at the present time running three transportation routes from outlying sections to the Central school, thereby saving approximately \$500 over what the cost was for last year. The two new routes added this year, however (those from Westboro Corner and Hemlock Corner), were not instituted by the school board for the sake of economy. They were put on at the re-

quest of the majority of parents in those neighborhoods, who preferred to have their children transported to the village rather than send them to the one-room school nearby. We are maintaining at present only three rural schools—Quaker Street, West Henniker, and Brick schools.

CONCLUSION

For the faithful work of the teachers, the willing cooperation of parents and school board members, and the friendly help of many people in the work of carrying on our schools during the past year, grateful acknowledgment is here made. In our efforts to carry on during these hard times, and to make our tax dollars go farther than ever, let us not forget that our children can grow up but once; and that whatever luxuries or conveniences we ourselves must do without in these days, we must take no action that will stunt the physical, mental or moral development of those who will have to shoulder our burdens when we shall lay them down.
