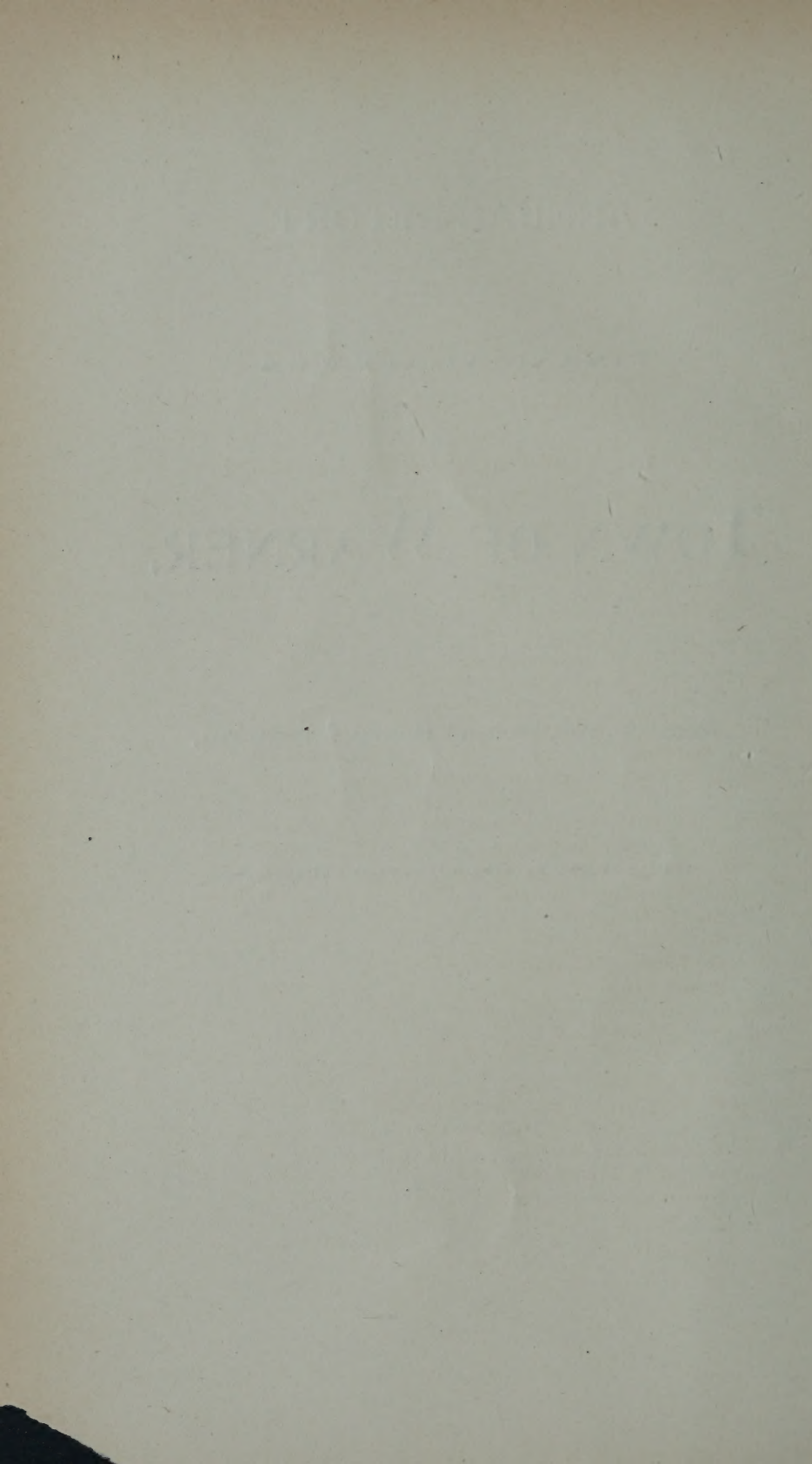

The balance sheet for the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1898, shows an increase of town liabilities of \$1602.66 and while the itemized account of the Town Treasurer shows in detail both cause and effect, the selectmen offer the following further explanation which shows that a lack of sufficient appropriations caused the increase of debt.

This year's tax rate of \$1.32 on one hundred dollars is one of the lowest rates in the State of New Hampshire and is too low considering expenditures as shown.

## Report of the School Board.

---

Since the date of our last report, but few changes have been made.

In the opinion of the board the schools of this year will compare favorably with those of preceding years.

Twenty different teachers have been employed. It affords us pleasure to report the fact that we have in town several excellent teachers, who are employing thorough methods in imparting instruction and have morally left a lasting impression for good. Most of our young teachers have done good work and by diligent efforts will not fail of becoming successful instructors.

Thirty-eight terms of school have been taught with an aggregate of 360 weeks.

Some of our schools are quite small. The population of our town being spread over so large a territory, the number of schools (twelve) cannot be diminished with the present condition of things without placing considerable hardship upon small scholars. We have aimed, as far as practicable, to give all of our children equal privileges. Two additional schools were organized in the fall: one, a term of 10 weeks in the "Howe division." Another was opened for the year at "School-dac" to better accommodate quite a number of beginners in that part of the town. The three scholars in the "Burnap division" were conveyed to the village schools for the spring term, at one third of the cost of supporting a school, giving the pupils increased advantages.

We have for some time felt the need of a modern Geography; the book now in use is not what it should be. The board has decided to make a change, but has not determined what particular series to adopt. In so doing, we believe we are acting for the best interest of the present scholars and those who are to come after them. Text-books must meet the demands of the times.

As the district failed to appropriate money to purchase new

text-books of a different series than those now in use, we shall buy only as needed to replace old and worn-out books. This method will make no extra expense to the town, but will take a long time to get all the schools supplied with improved books.

Vertical copy books will be put into the schools at the commencement of the fall term.

Vertical Penmanship is simply a variety of writing that has lately been advocated as meeting the demands of business, possessing advantages in execution, legibility, and great economy of space over the slanting style.

From the appropriation made for repairs at the annual meeting in March, 1896, repairs have been made on the Waterloo, Burnt Hill, Dimond's, Melvin's and Tory Hill houses. The occupied houses are now in quite good condition. The number of children between five and sixteen years, by the enumeration in April, 1897, was one hundred and ninety-six; boys, one hundred and five; girls, ninety-one.

Much interest was manifested by parents, generally, during the year, eight hundred and eighty-four visitors being recorded.

## Simonds Free High School.

---

We are pleased to report a very satisfactory year of work in the Simonds Free High School from March 1, '97 to March 1, '98. The closing term of '97 was especially profitable under the wise management of Prof. A. L. Saben, A. B., and his able assistants, Miss Elsie K. Jackson, Miss Luella M. Chase and Mrs. E. H. Carroll. The pupils were held to their work much better than in the corresponding term of some previous years. On June 18, '97, a fine class of six, two gentlemen and four ladies, was graduated with honors, and to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The examinations of all the classes at the close of the term showed very commendable progress, and the general good order was a matter of great satisfaction to all. In the preparatory department, the pupils showed evidence of having been made to rely upon themselves and seek for the "why and wherefore," instead of taking a thing for granted, without any desire to understand the reason why. The imperfect discipline, variety of training and methods, and the different text-books in the common schools, all tend to hinder the young pupil from being well prepared to enter at once upon a full course of high school work; hence the wisdom of the Preparatory Course, which during the first year brings all into harmony, and into a healthy mental condition for doing excellent work.

We are pleased to find in the report of one of our most able Supts. in the 80s, mention made of this state of things, and stress laid upon the fact that for the first year after entering the High School the pupils were treated "to a thorough review of the common school studies;" so it seems the preparatory course, which has occasioned some talk, is only the continuation and systemization of a system inaugurated ten years ago, and hence need not be regarded as an innovation, but for what it is—a real necessity for starting pupils aright on the road to a higher education. At the beginning of the fall term of '97, fif-

teen applicants were admitted to the school, and afterwards one to the Junior year. The school is now in a very prosperous condition as to numbers, discipline and progress of pupils.

The services of the 2d assistant teacher were dispensed with at beginning of fall term, which could be done, it was found, without detriment to the school, on account of the less number of classical and higher studies in consequence of there being no graduating class for '98. Two who were of the class of '98, were obliged to leave school on account of sickness, and the remaining one decided to attend the Agricultural College; hence, there is to be no class the present year for graduation. It is thought best, however, not to pass by our much prized anniversary and Alumni exercises, and there will probably be exercises of a very interesting character, on the afternoon and evening of June 17, '98, the particulars of which will be announced later.

The average number of pupils for the year, per term, has been 51. The number of pupils attending to different studies is as follows: Algebra, 18; American History, 15; Arithmetic, 26; Botany, 6; Chemistry, 17; Eng. Composition, 18; Eng. Grammar, 15; French, 8; Geometry, 17; Greek, 6; Latin, 20; Moral Science, 5; Music, 46; Reading, 15; Rhetoric, 8; Spelling, 50. This is a good showing, considering the fact that sixteen of the eldest pupils have graduated and left school in the two past years. The number and scholarship seem to be fully maintained, notwithstanding the hard times prevent some pupils from other towns from attending, as well as keeping some of our own scholars from availing themselves of what is their right,—to have a full course in our first-class High School. We hope our citizens will not lose their great interest and enthusiasm for this our favorite educational institution, but ever be watchful over its interests.

We can speak of only a few features, among the many, of special interest during the school year. The class in Greek, numbering six pupils, is the largest class in this study for many years, is a class of much ability and making commendable progress. The class in Geometry is doing grand work and all without any text-book whatever, it being a plan of Miss Jackson's to teach them to be self reliant and "know what they know." The class in vocal music, which includes nearly all the school, is receiving such good instruction from our talented teacher of music, Mrs. Carroll, that no one can begrudge the small expense which the prudential committee wisely concluded to defray.

The Lyceum has made good advancement over the work of

last year in the general character of the programs and particularly in its debating exercises. The financial receipts have not been quite as much, owing to the bad weather on several paying nights; but having been relieved from paying for the music lessons, there has been saved enough to purchase for the school several valuable works on American Literature, and the latest and best Classical Dictionary which alone cost about seven dollars. This shows that the boys and girls are getting ideas that are first class.

A fine addition of chemicals and chemical apparatus has been furnished for the chemical laboratory, so the fine class in chemistry need feel no lack in that department; and on the whole everything has been done by teachers, committees and citizens to make our loved High School as prosperous "as of yore."

The committees and citizens have been very punctual in attending all the examinations of the school and exhibit an unusual interest in its welfare. The school never has been better, and we hope the present board of instructors may long remain to carry on the good work so well begun.

The following report for the year ending February 12, 1898, is respectfully submitted.

Books.—Number of books in the library, not including public documents, 6561. Accessions: by purchase 188; by gifts, including public documents, 281; pamphlets 34; by binding 6.
