REPOTR OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF WASHINGTON: The following report of the schools in this town for the past year is respectfully submitted.

The past year has been one of prosperity in most of the schools in town. Generally, as far as could be learned, there has been a harmonious feeling between teachers, scholurs, and parents, without which no school can prosper. In general, experienced teachers have been employd, there having been but one teacher who had not had previous experience. In six of the districts of the town a teacher was retained throughout the year to the great advantage of the schools. It is suggested that prudential committees secure their teachers for the school year as far as possible, as considerable time is required at the begining of a term for a strnager to acquaint himself with the condition and needs of his pupils.

No changes have been made in the text books used in this town. Too frequent changes of books, unless we except readers, are a positive injury to pupils of ordinary capacity. To keep up an interest in reading, however, it is necessary to present, from time to time, fresh material. A change of readers, in the near future, is suggested.

In order to raise, or even to keep up the standard of excellence in our schools, increased attention should be given them. The school room should be neat and home-like, adorned with a few pictures, and supplied with a globe,

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dictionary and several maps. The outside of the house and the play ground need more attention than they generally receive. A few shade trees around a school-house, set at small expense, would in a few years add marked beauty to the place, and silently teach a lesson.

Teachers should be obtained who are *adapted to their* work, and not hired because they are "cheap." A few extra dollars contributed by the citizens of districts where there is little school money would greatly improve the condition of the schools. "Reward sweetens labor," and as a rule, the labors of teachers are measured by "value received." A report of the several districts and the roll of honor are appended.

GEORGE N. GAGE. SUPT.

District No. 1 .

Both terms were taught by Miss Belle C Hoyt of Hillsboro'. Miss Hoyt is one of the quietest of teachers, and under her care the school appeared finely and excellent progress was made. This district deserves praise for the enterprise which it has exhibited the past year in the erection of by far the finest school edifice in town. It is a model for convenience, and is appreciated by teacher and pupils.

District No. 2

The school for the year was taught by Miss Phebe E. Wood of Washington, who labored hard and successfully for the good of the school. The record of attendance was one of the best in town.

District No. 3

Two terms of school in this district were taught by Miss Jennie S. Hill of Washington. The school, though very small, appeared exceedingly well at examination.

District No. 4

The first term in this district was taught by Miss Agnes L. Barney of East Washington, a young lady of rare accomplishments, and one destined to rank among the best of our teachers. She not only won the love and respect of her scholars, but succeeded admirably in her work of instruction.

The second term was taught by Miss Sophin R. Pike of Newport, a lady of large experience as a teacher, who continued very successfully the good work of her Predecessor. The good work done in this district was in part due to the intelligence and rectitude of the scholars. They knew what was right and did it.

District No. 5

Three sessions of school were held in this district, all taught by Miss Eva M. Fletcher of Greenfield, a very practical and successful teacher. Miss F. labored diligently and earnestly for the good of her school, and merited and received the love of all her pupils. Her examinations showed thoroughness of instruction. The teacher and scholars, during the past year, generously presented the district, for the use of its school room, an elegant copy of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary.

District No. 6

The summer term was taught by Miss Annie B. Hazen of Hillsboro'. The instruction and discipline in this school were excellent. Miss Hazen has a dignity of manner and a faculty of imparting instruction which combine to render her one of the very best of teachers.

The second term was taught by Miss Fannie G. French of Hillsboro', an experienced teacher, and one who, in every way, continued the good work of her Fredecessor. The school-house in this district has been thoroughly repaired and presents a very neat appearance.

District No. 7

Two terms of school were taught in this district. The first was taught by Miss Jennie S. Hill, who labored earnestly and well for the wellfare of the school. There was a lack of interest apparent on the part of the scholars and a slight laxity of government.

The second term was taught by Miss Emily J. Wood of Washington. This was Miss Wood's first attempt at teaching. Miss W. is well qualified for the work of a teacher, and did her part well.

There were noticable, however, the same faults which belonged to the first term, by which I am led to infer that the fault is less in teachers than in scholars. Some repairs upon the school-house might be made to advantage.

District No. 8

Both terms in this district were taught by Miss Cora E. Tandy of Washington. The school was small, but equaled in appearance any in town. The record of attendance was almost perfect, and the order and instruction were equally good.

District No. 9

Both terms were taught by Miss Abbie E Hall of Unity. Miss H. is a young laby of excellent education, and labored for the good of her school. A stricter discipline would have improved the school. The school-house in this district could be improved at small expense.
