Record of Town Meeting

WEARE, N. H., March 8, 1927.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 8th day of March, 1927, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Edward T. Breed, Moderator; also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the checklist, 784.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

Whole number of votes cast, 351. Necessary for choice, 176.

For Town Clerk. The whole number of votes given in was 351, upon which Andrew A. Eastman had 13 and Frank H. Peaslee had 335 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Selectman for three years. The whole number of votes given in was 351, upon which Forrest Dearborn had 1, George E. Dodge had 2, Harry Langdell had 2, Russell B. Flanders had 106 and George A. Waterman had 225 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agents. The whole number of votes given in was 351, upon which Wilfred I. Bowie had 1, Charles H. Eastman had 6, Asa E. Felch had 106, Ned B. Purington had 168, Charles F. Bennett had 170, Elwin T. George had 231, Frank G. Philbrick had 325, and Frank G. Philbrick

and Elwin T. George were declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor. The whole number of votes given in was 351, upon which Maurice Grant had 1, Frank Tucker had 3, Russell B. Flanders had 4, H. E. Grant had 4, George A. Waterman had 181 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

The Moderator called a recess for one hour.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for one Road Agent.

Second ballot for Road Agent. The whole number of votes given in was 266, upon which Charles F. Bennett had 102, Ned B. Purington had 164 and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting took the oath of office by law drescribed.

ART. 2. Voted to raise three thousand dollars (\$3,000) to defray town charges.

ART. 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for George S. Daniels for Trustee of Trust Funds. This being done, the Moderator declared George S. Daniels elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 4. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Helen Dearborn for Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Helen Dearborn elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 5. Voted that we raise one half of one per cent of the assessed valuation.

ART. 6. Voted to dismiss the Article.

ART. 7. Voted that it be left with the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

ART. 8. Voted to raise one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 9. Upon motion of Ernest A. Paige, voted that the Town raise four hundred dollars (\$400) for White Pine Blister Rust control. Standing vote, yes 121, no 71.

ART. 10. Voted to discontinue the road as stated in the Article, subject to gates or bars.

ART. 11. Voted to raise five hundred dollars (\$500) to buy a road machine.

ART. 12. Upon motion of H. W. Langlan, that the Town raise twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for a suitable building to house town property. The motion was rejected.

ART. 13. Voted that it be left with the Selectmen to sell the snow rollers.

ART. 14. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, that the Town raise three hundred dollars (\$300) to buy a tractor. This motion was rejected.

ART. 15. Voted to raise fifty dollars (\$50) for the care of soldiers' graves.

ART. 16. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted that the balance of the amount raised for fire truck be expended for a pump for the fire outfit and a committee, consisting of Charles F. Eastman, George A. Waterman and Elwin T. George were chosen to purchase the same.

Voted, that this meeting be dissolved.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at 10 of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To chose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see how much money the Town will raise to repair highways.
6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

7. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
8. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the purpose of cooperating with the State Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust; such appropriation to be available until spent, in cooperation with the State Government.
10. To see if the Town will vote to buy another tractor and snow plow and raise a sum of money for the same.
11. To see if the Town will vote to buy a road machine or grader and raise a sum of money for the same.
12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for its resident physician, such sum not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000).
13. To see if the Town will vote to take over and maintain the street lights at Riverside Village.
14. To see if the Town will vote to buy one or more fire pumps and raise a sum of money for the same.
15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a piece of road beginning at a point on the main road near the Harry Wilson place leading easterly to the Goffstown line.
16. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town House and raise a sum of money for the same.
17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Weare:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report.

The statistical tables presented as a part of this report give a brief review of the work and general condition of the schools. Owing to epidemics of whooping cough and measles in different sections of the district the attendance record is below the standard of the past two years. It is not however poor record. In spite of all difficulties a great majority of the Weare children were attending to their school duties nearly every day.

The enrollment by schools table shows that 179 pupils, or 71 % of the total enrollment for the current year, are members of the more centrally located schools: namely the High, Junior High, North Weare, South Weare (store), East Weare, Weare Center and Rockland. All of these except the High and Junior High are now rapidly approaching the crowded stage. In these schools, if the room is suitable, with only six grades represented, 20 to 25 pupils can be handled efficiently. East Weare, with 25 pupils enrolled distributed through eight grades, is our most difficult problem at the present time.

The enrollment in the more remote sections of the district, as shown by the table previously mentioned, is very uncertain from year to year. At the present time all of these schools have a fair number of pupils for efficient administration. The present outlook is for a very small number at the Friends School next year. If this proves true, it will be good business policy to combine with the Clinton Grove School at Clinton Grove. The old academy building used in this section, is, in its present condition, very poorly adapted to the needs of a primary school. The light there is very poor especially on cloudy days and during the fall and early winter afternoons. The furniture is also in poor condition and very much out of date. I recommend

that a smaller room be portioned off from the large room now in use, and a much larger window space provided. The present ratio between window and floor space is far below generally recognized standards.

The window in the front of the Buxton School room is a source of real danger to the children's eye sight. We find it difficult to shut out all the light with the shade as at present arranged. I therefor recommend that this window opening be permanently closed.

Grange Hall at East Weare presents a peculiar lighting problem by reflecting a very bright light into the school room every afternoon when the sun is shining. This is especially annoying when the sun's rays are at a certain angle in the fall and spring. Since Halestown Grange is willing to coöperate in solving this problem, I recommend that the offending side of Grange Hall be painted some neutral color, which will not reflect the sunlight, as at present, at the expense of the district.

If the River Road School is to be continued, it will soon be necessary to either move the building or make extensive repairs on the present foundation. In any case new toilet facilities will have to be provided.

I must not neglect to mention as a matter of record, that the High School boys under the efficient leadership of Headmaster Leslie S. Cummings planned and built a school farm shop which is greatly to their credit, and which adds at relatively small cost, to the practical efficiency of the High School plant and work. The successful completion of this project is further evidence of the practical worth of the Weare High School to the community now, and to the future citizens of the town.

The High School grounds are in good shape, and the matter of having shrubs and small trees for purposes of protection and adornment should receive immediate attention. Here again the teachers and pupils are willing to help and do all the work necessary to carry out any plans which are

feasable and generally acceptable. I recommend that this project be given immediate attention so that a beginning of the good work may be made before the close of the current school year.

I further recommend that the High School walks be covered with cement. The foundations are without doubt in good condition for cement construction. This work could be done by the boys in connection with the regular class procedure as a practical project in cement construction.

The general exhibition of school work held at the South Weare Hall last November was well attended and evidently much appreciated. Having the exhibition here instead of at the Center this year was a distinct advantage to the schools of the Southern section of the Town and is a great convenience to many in that section who are much interested in the schools. Since the Town of Weare is so much divided, it would seem from our experience last fall, advisable to have many school functions in different parts of the town, wherever adequate facilities could be provided. I would therefore suggest that some of the graduating exercises of the Weare High School be held at East Weare next June, and the following year at South Weare, and thus bring these very interesting exercises to people who would otherwise be unable to attend.

The State Board of Health in accordance with the State Law has given instructions that all children in the public schools shall be vaccinated. Under modern conditions with so much freedom of travel between states and communities the enforcement of the vaccination law is absolutely necessary. The smallpox epidemic in Connecticut emphasizes the importance of this protective measure. Without doubt all unvaccinated children who have not complied with the law will be excluded from the public schools next September. It will be best for all in so far as possible to be vaccinated before the end of the current school year. The

State Board of Health is willing to give free service by one of their own experts according to the bulletin already distributed.

In closing I wish to express appreciation of the loyal and hearty support of all concerned in the work of Public Education.
