- To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:
- Section A. Town officers' salaries, 1800
  - B. Town officers' expenses. 450
  - C. Election and registration. 125
  - D. Municipal court. 350
  - E. Town Hall and office expense. 650
  - F. Police department. 1 500
  - G. Fire department. 500
  - H. Damage and legal expense. 75
  - I. Health department. 250
  - J. Vital statistics. 100
  - K. Memorial Hospital. 500
  - L. Breaking roads. 1000
  - M. Town maintenance of roads. 11,000

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town, the sum of \$60,000.00 if needed.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State Aid for the improvement of its highways, as provided by law.

3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or appropriate and hire upon the credit of the Town, a sufficient sum of money to repair the Morrill Bridge over Saco River.
- To see if the Town will vote to discontinue certain portions of the Town Highway known as the East Side Trunk line, between Conway and North Conway, the use of such portions of highway being no longer required by a much reason of the relocation of said highway in the course of reconstruction of same; and to authorize the Selectmen to petition the Superior Court for its consent to such discontinuance if such procedure is necessary, and to do all other things necessary in connection therewith.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue. subject to gates and bars, the road at South Conway leading easterly from the Gulf road, so called, to the Maine and New Hampshire State line.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds during the present fiscal year.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the highway leading from West Main street to the Boston and Maine Railway Station, which lies between said West Main Street in an extension Southerly, of the Westerly line of the Boston and Main Park, now owned by Lora Kennett, in accordance with a petition signed by Arthur G. Lord and others.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the payment of the balance of the funeral expenses of Bessie Miller, in accordance with a petition signed by Cecil R. Head and others.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to move the Jail or Lockup in Conway Village from Washington Street to a location where it will be less objectionable and raise and appropriate the necessary money therefor, in accordance with a petition signed by Perley McLellan and others.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a lot on which to locate the Conway Village Lockup, also to sell and convey the lot on which said lockup now stands, or to sell and convey the building and lot and purchase another lot and erect a new lockup, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see what action the Town will vote to take with reference to Zoning Regulations, as provided in Chapter 42 of the Public Statutes.
- 16. To act upon any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

To the Citizens of Conway:

Miss Pollard has made a brief resume of the service given by the Conway Public Library. It is as follows:

"The closing year brought to a conclusion the largest yearly business ever completed by the Conway Public Library. 626 borrowers and about fifty transients were registered. To these were issued 22,-622 books and periodicals, an increase over last year of approximately 3,500. This is more than double the output of 1928.

"5,225 persons used the Reading Room, which was open 307 days, making an average daily attendance of 17, which is a number far in excess of any previous year. All of this goes to show what an important part the Library plays in these days of enforced idleness on the part of many people. Increased use, and a decreased appropriation have made it difficult to supply the books which are the life blood of the Library.

"In this matter, the generous 1931 Christmas check of Mr. Clarence Eastman, of California, his occasional packages of books, and the 125 books which the Conway Woman's Club contributed from their stores have been of immeasureable assistance.

"It was necessary to make several minor repairs in the building, one was the painting of all the outside wood work. The largest expense for the year was the installation of a new furnace. It is hoped that this will mean a reduction in the fuel bill. Mrs. Eliza Hale Tibbets was instrumental in having the Conway Woman's Club improve the Library grounds by the planting of perennial shrubs near the entrance to the building. It is hoped that each year some addition can be made to this initial planting, so that the Library lot may soon be an attractive part of our town.

"At the Center Conway Library, Mrs. Comstock

gave her usual generous amount of money for the purchase of books. Mr. Frank Philbrook gave a collection of 25 books which have proved of interest. This Library has been greatly improved by refinishing all the walls, floors, and book cases.

"To briefly state the greatest need of our town libraries it is necessary to use only three words—MORE GOOD BOOKS."

# AVON LITTLEFIELD,

#### CONWAY VILLAGE PARK COMMISSION

Since up to the present time no report on the Village Park has been called for and therefore none given, it might be well to state a few facts.

About forty years ago as one entered our village from the north an unkept spot met the eye: the little triangle that is now the Village Park was a swampy place covered with a tangled growth of bushes, and at the apex was a little old red shop. Ten of our public-spirited citizens, realizing the aesthetic and financial value of a more beautiful entrance to our village, purchased the above-mentioned plot of land, moved the shop, leveled the land, planted trees and thus improved our village.

As time went on and one after another of the original owners passed away, the remaining owners purchased their shares until the plot was owned by only four people. These people, wishing to perpetuate the park and not to have it revert to anything unbeautiful, gave the same to the town, the only condition being that it should always be used as a park and that the town should annually donate twenty-five dollars for the upkeep of the same.

In addition to the annual twenty-five dollars, four hundred dollars was given by the town in 1928, and an extra twenty-five dollars in 1932. From interested friends and organizations two hundred and three dollars and ninety-five cents has been donated. This has all been expended in replacing dead trees, setting out the hedge, putting in the fountain, grading and conditioning the land, and general care. There is a plan toward which we are working to still further beautify the park and it was intended to use the extra money donated this last year toward that plan. It has for various reasons been impossible to carry out that plan until the early spring.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Conway:

After a careful checking of income and of expenditures made and anticipated for the current fiscal year, I expect a cash balance on June 30 sufficiently large to make it safe to reduce the assessment to balance next year's budget by \$4.500. This favorable situation has been effected because of the voluntary relinquishing by the teachers of three weeks' pay aggregating \$2.600; there was also on hand July 1, a balance of nearly \$2,000 due in part to a saving of \$600 in the amount appropriated for the ventilating system in the high school and due also to various economies which the superintendent and school board were able to make. In the current year there has been some saving through the closing of the Kearsarge school, a rearrangement of the transportation routes and by careful buying and planning on the part of the school officials. While all this is gratifying it should be noted that we are approaching the limit of ways and means of reducing the expense of school maintenance. It is clear also that a policy of omitting appropriations for repairs, painting and roofing can only be temporary.

The reduction of teachers' salaries as a means of lessening tax burdens has appeared to be necessary although it is a measure which has been adopted with considerable reluctance. Teachers' salaries in rural communities have always remained comparatively low, and it is remembered that the salary level of teachers did not advance until several years after wages and salaries had advanced in other lines of work. It is a pleasure to know that the problem has been met by our teachers in a spirit of cooperation, and they accepted this year a voluntary reduction of three weeks' pay or one-twelfth of their nominal salaries.

Because of the economic situation, the gap between school and employment has rapidly widened during the past few years. There are hundreds of thousands of boys and girls throughout the country between the ages of 16 and 21 who have nothing to do. It is a serious social situation. It is desirable to keep these boys and girls in school as long as possible and any curtailment of high school opportunity at this time adds to the gravity of the problem. I am convinced that quality of teaching is more important in keeping pupils in high school than the content of the course of study. The margin between the cost of good teachers and the cost of inferior teachers is surprisingly small.

The report of the school nurse will be instructive to those who are not well acquainted with this activity. The systematic and frequent inspection of 700 pupils is but a part of the work. It is important, of couse, but the follow-up work, the visits in the home and the securing through one agency or another assistance for needy and underprivileged children is an indispensable service. During the past year this need has been felt more than ever.

Undoubtedly sacrifices must be made to maintain the quality of our schools in a time of economic stress. The situation, however, must be met and faced with courage. A disposition to share these sacrifices fairly and equitably is the only patriotic attitude. This applies to parents, tax-payers and teachers alike.

#### REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Superintendent John H. Fuller:

I am glad to offer an annual summary of the activities and work at Kennett High School for the current year, September 1932 to February 1, 1933.

The total registration to date has been 210, of whom we have lost 12. Of these 12, 2 have been ill, 7 found the work too difficult to be interesting, 2 transferred to other schools in Massachusetts, and 1 moved out of town and I do not know whether or not she continued school elsewhere. The following is the distribution by classes: Post graduates, 4; Seniors, 37; Juniors, 51; Sophomores, 58; Freshmen, 60. We have 28 pupils from towns other than Conway, Bartlett sending the largest number of these.

The figures on attendance are rather interesting, and give more information as to the size of the school than do figures of enrollment. We have had 17,187 pupil-days of attendance the first half-year. A pupil attending school for one day counts as one pupil day; while two pupils attending for 90 days are counted as 180 pupil days. We have had 697 cases of absence. The average attendance has been 190 pupils, and the average absence, 7.7 pupils. The percentage of attendance has been 96.96. There have been 65 cases of tardiness, confined largely to five students; more than 50% of tardiness being due to this group. We have had 56 students neither absent nor tardy for the half-year.

We have the same teaching corps as we have had for the past year, but have suffered to considerable extent by unavoidable absence due to illness. There are eight teachers, including the headmaster, who hold 229 class periods each week. The average teaching load is 5.7 periods each day, out of a possible 7, not including 7 periods of duty each day in the study hall, or 3 afternoon sessions each week. The study hall and afternoon sessions are divided among the teachers as best may be, Each teacher averages 104 pupil periods each day, and the average size of the class is 19 pupils; but the range is from 5 to 43 students. A few of these classes might be combined, but the majoritiy must be continued unless our curriculum is to be cutailed. None of the above figures applies to athletics, clubs or study halls; these would increase the average figures greatly, perhaps doubling them.

There were 788 pupil courses at mid-year, of which 69 were failed, or 8.7%. The normal failure list is from 5% to 10% of enrollment, so this figure is not excessive. 35 pupils achieved grades of 85% or better in three or more subjects for a total for 129 courses in the group just mentioned, or 16.4% of all the courses in school. No attempt has been made to list the total number of individual courses in this group, but it seems to me a very creditable showing.

In November the average grades of those boys and girls taking part in football and field hockey were figured in comparison with the rest of the school, and the average of the school. The figures follow: Average of the school, 79.7%; average of the athletes, 82.3%; average of the non-athletes, 79%. These figures are probably of no value beyond indicating that our athletes do not neglect their studies in comparison with those students who do not avail themselves of the opportunity for organized play.

The school continues to be the most important agency in the town to occupy the free time of boys and girls. Our program is far from as extensive as I should like, but is, I believe, decidedly worthwhile. For the past year, we have equipped about 40 boys in football and baseball, 25 boys in basketball, 36 girls in field hockey, and 30 girls in basketball. We organized a hiking club last spring, which drew about 40 girls. We have a commercial club of 53, a debating club of 10, a dramatic club of 24, a Latin club of 21, the staff of the school paper consists of 10, and the Kennett Keys 4. In these various clubs nearly all pupils should find something of interest and profit beyond the scope of their classes.

We have been able to continue our athletic program only because of the interest and support of our friends. The North Conway P. T. A. provided us with funds to increase our bath facilities. A group of parents, students, teachers and friends gave a series of card parties which netted about \$100. A Christmas dance and auction directed by Mrs. F. E. Kennett and Mrs. A. J. Goldberg, wonderfully supported by the business people of the town, netted about \$150. We have also received a gift of some \$80. Our total present debt is \$355.31, with cash on hand of \$90.35. With good fortune in equipment we should close the year with an outstanding debt of less than \$150.

May I thank you for your frequent courtesies and help?






