TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Veteran's Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect one Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Auditors, and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the maintenance of trunk line and state aid roads, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, of the Board of Health, for the expense of the town halls, for the support of libraries, for payment to the sinking fund, for state and county taxes, for the observance of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for play ground purposes, for co-operating with the state and federal governments in control of the white pine blister and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of co-operating with the state in the permanent improvement of

its highways in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 84 of the Public Laws entitled "State Aided Highways", and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of improving and tarring the Windham Road, so-called, leading from the Windham line to the Rockingham Road, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of building a sidewalk in Derry Village extending from the bridge on South Main Street to the southerly line of the school property, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money by taxation or otherwise for the improvement of the road leading to and through the East Derry Cemetery, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to enter into contracts with any parties who may wish to provide for perpetual care of cemetery lots in East Derry Cemetery, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue certain portions of the town or county highways known as the Rockingham Road between Derry and Windham and the Hudson, Derry, Raymond Road between Derry and Chester, the use of such portions of said highways being no longer required by reason of the relocation of said highways in the course of the reconstruction of same; and to authorize the Selectmen to petition the Superior Court for its consent to such discontinuance if such procedure is necessary, and to do all other things necessary in connection therewith.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of co-operating with the State in the improvement of the Hampstead and Chester Road, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the negotiable notes of the Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their Taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library,
The 28th annual report is herewith presented:—

The public library is an institution which provides for the leisure time of the community. It promotes education and gives pleasure to those who use its resources. It thrives in depressions and many who have not, in previous years, had the time to read are now enjoying this opportunity and while there are no profits that we can record the citizens of our town are constantly testifying to the profits they have received from the library.

Our circulation has steadily increased. On top of last years gain of 14% we again report a gain, this year of 7.4%. Nearly 22% in two years has taxed the

resources of the library in many ways. We trust the town will recognize this situation and will at least continue the appropriation made us last year. More money could be well spent in meeting this increased demand but an equal appropriation is necessary if the standard of your library is to be maintained.

We repair many books at the library and buy re-sewed books for the juveniles and many fiction but with the best of care 500 books have been worn out and discarded. As our circulation is over 66,000 this means only one book discarded for 130 circulated, which is a good showing.

The reference work done by the students of our schools has increased. We have not been able to give them the assistance we could wish many times but as far as possible their questions have been answered or they have been directed to the material required.

The number of books which have disappeared from our shelves is not as large as last year but it is still larger than it should be in view of the easy rules for taking books legitimately.

The Vacation Reading Club had 53 members during July and August, of these 30 were awarded diplomas for completing the course laid out for them.

Herewith is the fifty-fifth annual report:

The Library has been open regularly, as usual, on Wednesday afternoon and Saturday afternoon and evening of each week.

The circulation increased twenty per cent over that of the previous year and a larger demand for non-fiction was very gratifying.

A vacation reading class was formed during the summer in which fourteen children completed the requirements and received diplomas.

A story hour for children on Saturday afternoons has proved very popular and by familiarizing the

young folks with the Library has increased the circulation of children's books.

The Historical and genealogical collection of the Library has been enriched by valuable books and magazines received as gifts from, Miss Sylvia Clark; The Alumnae Association of Adams Female Academy; Rev. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Derry:

The following report covers the school year from July 1, 1931 to June 30, 1932 and gives a very close estimate of the finances of the current year which will end June 30, 1933.

FINANCES: The three-column summary shows the major subdivisions and totals of payments and receipts for these two years and in addition gives the budget for the next school year. Column I as its heading indicates gives the actual payments and receipts of last year: Column II shows the estimated items for the current year which will end June 30, 1933: Column III is the budget for next year (July 1, 1933 to June 30, 1934). This last is the basis for the appropriation to be asked for at the forth-coming school meeting.

SUMMARY: The following condensed summary is provided so that those who are interested may compare past, present, and proposed expenditures for schools.

It is unwise to assume that emergencies cannot arise and its is equally unwise not to provide for a small balance of cash-on-hand at the end of the school year 1933-1934, it is for these reasons that I suggest that a tax levy of \$60,000.00 be asked for.

REDUCTION OF EXPENSES. The savings of this year have come from various sources: Teachers salaries were reduced 10%, the Excess salary of the Superintendent 56%, Salaries of District Officers 36%, Janitor's salaries were not reduced. But by far the greater part of the reduction of almost \$15,000.00, is due to the application of the most elementary principles of common everyday business management; such as buying at bottom prices, eliminating all non-essentials, reduction of the number of school rooms used, close supervision of the distribution of supplies, in a word, from reducing the out-go as low as possible without decreasing the efficiency of the schools. In this work I have had the most generous support of janitors, teachers and pupils, as well as the constant

advise and support of the School Board.

The cost of almost every item of out-go has been carefully considered; fuel, transportation, tuition, books, supplies, office administration, teacher's substitutes, upkeep of buildings etc., have been reduced; but in my opinion in no single one or in all combined, has the curtailment reduced the educational efficiency of the schools in the slightest degree. However, to guard against self-deception I have had state and federal inspection of the class room work from the first grade to the eighth: From verbal reports of these inspectors, I am convinced that the teachers with a few exceptions, are dilligently and enthusiastically working in approved ways and are securing a very satisfactory type of response from the pupils.

Of my own personal knowledge I am certain that the quality of the work throughout the local school system is high but, I am equally certain that it can be made better, and this without additional expense.

A perfect school has never yet been discovered therefore there is always a possibility of improvement.

The number of teachers employed has been substantially reduced but even so, the number of pupils per teacher after the readjustment is only 37 in the graded schools and 16 in the rural schools: If we combine the two groups the average enrollment is only 32.

These facts and figures are a sufficient answer to the criticism occasionally heard, that rooms are over crowded and teachers overloaded. The largest enrollment in any room is 51;—and this room is one of the three most efficient schools in this Supervisory district.

If our school buildings were better located and arranged the 670 pupils now taught by 18 teachers could be equally well served by 16 teachers in which case the

average enrollment would be only 42 per room.

There is one disappointing and unexpected development which, in itself, would seem to discourage further efforts in the line of economy, it is this,—as a direct result of reducing the number of teachers employed to a reasonable relation to the total enrollment, Derry has lost about \$2,000.00 of State Aid, however, this is not a serious matter for in losing the \$2000.00 the town has to its relief an offsetting reduction of expenditures amounting to nearly \$15,000.00.

There are a number of ways in which further economies may be accomplished, now that the elusive hope of state aid is definitely eliminated.

PINKERTON ACADEMY. My supervisory duties with respect to the High School work, which is carried on at Pinkerton, are regulated by a contract which, in itself, limits my opportunity to be useful but, under a liberal interpretation of that contract and by the very cordial relations between Principal Bell, the teaching staff and myself, there has been established a working plan whereby the grade schools and the Academy are in complete harmony, each successfully adjusting itself to the other.

The chief defect in Derry's educational program, however, is in a lack of opportunity for boys who are skillful in handwork, to continue the Manual Training of the Oak St. School, in a Mechanic Arts course in High School. Plans are now in progress to remedy this defect.

The plan, adopted several years ago, whereby the 7th and 8th grades in Derry Village have been sent to the Oak Street School has been continued the current year. It is a worthy plan and certainly, from an educational point of view, ought to be continued.

The advantages which these pupils gain from the Domestic Arts and Manual Training courses are of sufficient importance to more than justify the small increase in cost.

If the plans that are maturing for developing a Mechanic Arts course materialize the Manual Training now received in the grades will become a necessary preparation for enrollment in the advanced courses in Cabinet work, pattern-making, forging and Machine Shop practice. If these courses are made available to the students it will open new opportunities for those who desire to enter institutions of Collegiate grade, but whose tastes, talents and inclinations do not tend toward Liberal Arts courses.

There has been in the past and will be in the future a constant demand for men with technical training and these will in the long run be found among those who by nature and training have acquired skill in hand-work as well as head-work.

I hope the present plan will be continued so that there may be no break in the continuity of Manual Training and Domestic Arts courses for Derry Village boys and girls.

Dear Sir:

In addition to the outline, I would say that milk is being served in the town schools during the months of January, February and March, this is sponsored by the Derry Woman's Club, hot lunches in the rural schools are served these months also.

With the help of the cooking classes in the Junior High School, food in the form of soups, and escalloped dishes, have been given to thirteen families, which included seventy-nine children and twenty-nine adults.

This food and milk in the school, is a great help, during this time where the wages have been reduced to a very small amount or perhaps no money at all coming into the house.

Through different clubs and the sewing-class at Pinkerton Academy, dresses have been given to children, 100 pairs of mittens, were made and given out.

We have had donations for glasses, shoes, rubbers also for tonsil operation.
