TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the construction of highways in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 59, New Hampshire Session Laws of 1933, amending section 24 of Chapter 84 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

6. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

13. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

16. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a piece of road leading from a point on the westerly side of the Warner road near the Kendall Thomas place to a point beyond the Louis H. Clark place.

17. To see if beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99, section 22 of laws passed in 1933.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see what action the town will take relative to the observance of Old Home Day.

20. To see if the town will vote to approve of the following by-law adopted by the Board of Selectmen: "The playing of baseball shall be legal, in the town of Henniker, on the Lord's Day, in accordance with the provisions of section 5-A, Chapter 385 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended by the session laws of 1931."

21. To see if the town will vote to abolish the Municipal Court within its confines or take any action relative thereto.

22. To see if the town will accept from James G. Rice of Hopkinton, N. H., the sum of one hundred dollars, (\$100.00), the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of his burial lot in New Cemetery so called, south side.

23. To see if the town will accept from Earl J. Rice Administrator with will annexed of the estate of Nellie A. Preston, late of Henniker, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00), as stated in section four of the will of the late Nellie A. Preston.

24. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting and raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

During the past year Henniker had but two cases of Whooping Cough but an epidemic of Measles, none of which was serious.

Quarantined but two houses during the season. I got milk from eight different dairies and sent it to the Laboratory of Hygiene to be analyzed. It was found to be first class. I got water from six places and sent it to the Laboratory of Hygiene.

I recorded sixteen vaccinations. There were sixty-nine children immunized against Diphtheria, thirty-one were preschool age and thirty-eight were school children. I put up fifty-seven Measles Cards where the disease existed and later removed them. I had two complaints about open sewers, investigated and had the cause removed. Inspected one hospital and two nurseries and signed their licenses. Disinfected one place.

Since the last report some 500 feet of 4 inch pipe was laid on Prospect Street, from Pleasant Street to Maple Street. This new pipe replaced old pipe. The new line was connected with the mains on Prospect and Pleasant Streets, thus completing an open circuit, which replaced the old, dead end situation, and furnished better service for several subscribers. Some 100 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ inch pipe was laid on Prospect Street, from Pleasant Street toward High Street, thus completing an open circuit.

Some 300 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ inch pipe was laid on Water Street, replacing old, corroded pipe, furnishing greatly improved service to several subscribers.

The Brick school now has a record of two years without a single absence, and only one case of tardiness. I doubt if any school in the State can claim so good a record.

Henniker's school enrollment, especially at the Central school, is steadily increasing.

HEALTH OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

For several years, little or no mention of this subject has been made in these annual reports. Miss Nichols, our school nurse, is faithfully performing her duties, and as a matter of school routine yearly examinations are made and many defects of eyes, teeth, etc., corrected. Milk provided by the Federal Government is a helpful factor in building strong bodies for our children. Recently an audiometer test was given in all the schools. This is an accurate method of determining how well a child can hear. A few defective ears were found, and steps are being taken to correct them wherever possible.

OUR HIGH SCHOOL

One change in curriculum, affecting the junior high years, has been made. Time heretofore devoted to geography and history as separate studies is now spent on a course called social science; a study which combines the three subjects of history, geography, and civics in an effective and interesting way.

We are proud of our fine new gymnasium, the gift of the Leander Cogswell estate, and are making constant use of it. Much enthusiasm for the game of basketball is being shown, especially among the junior high school girls. We try to economize on the expense of lighting by scheduling practices chiefly during daylight hours.

Our regulations also permit no pupil to enter the gymnasium at any time unless a teacher is there on duty.

A special study is being made this winter, by the teachers and superintendent, of the reading abilities of our high school students. Reading is the basis of all successful high school work, and a poor reader is under a serious handicap. We hope as the result of our study to give more effective help, to those who need it most, in understanding what they read.

Mr. R. H. Leavitt, the State High School Agent, made his annual visit to us in February, and commended the work of the teachers and department of the pupils.

TEACHERS' SALARIES

In order to keep within the appropriation made in 1933 for the current school year, the salaries of our teachers were cut about 14% from last year's figures, which were already below the average of salaries paid elsewhere. Our schedule of salaries is now among the very lowest in the State. For example, by actual count, there are exactly three teachers in New Hampshire working for less than our rural teachers are today.

Economists claim that the process of inflation now in progress is bound to increase prices, and to work the greatest hardship to salaried people. I hope the voters of Henniker will be willing to provide for our teachers during the coming year, salaries not quite so near the bottom of the list.

ADULT EDUCATION

As part of the Federal Emergency Relief program, unemployed teachers are being given work this winter teaching adults in the evening. In Henniker, classes

are being started in woodworking, auto mechanics, mechanical drawing, home economics, business arithmetic, economics, basketry and English. These classes, open to all except pupils in local schools, will be maintained through the rest of the year, provided that the membership in each group does not drop below six.

OUR REORGANIZED SUPERVISORY UNION

In accordance with the economy measure enacted into law at the last session of the General Court, the school districts of the State were rearranged for purposes of school supervision into larger unions, in order to dispense with the services of five superintendents. The schools of Weare were taken from this union, and three new districts to the north added. This union, known as No. 26, now comprises Henniker, Hopkinton, Dunbarton, Bradford, Newbury and Sutton.

CONCLUSION

We of the schools are appreciative of the helpful criticism, the willing co-operation, and the pleasant associations with parents and citizens during the past year.
