THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the different items to be voted on separately as follows:

(1) Town officers' salaries and expenses, including election and registration expenses and care of Town Hall.

(2) Police Department.

(3) Fire Department.

(4) Vital Statistics.

(5) Cemeteries.

(6) Town Poor.

(7) Interest on Notes.

3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law. (\$4,182.18)

4. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for general expenses of highway department and street lighting.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Forty Dollars for trunk line maintenance. The state to pay Five Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Seventy-five Dollars for State Aid Maintenance. The State to pay Four Hundred Seventy-five Dollars additional.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Thirty Dollars and Fifty Cents, the State contributing Two Thousand Five Hundred Thirty Dollars, for State Aid Construction of the road from Contocook Village over Academy Hill toward West Hopkinton, or, instead of said road, for State Aid Construction of the Jewett Road from the Turnpike toward the Dunbarton line.

8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue and close to travel the follownig intersecting streets in Hopkinton Village:

- (1) Beginning at a point on the Webster Road, so called, near the Congregational Church, running diagonally across Route 103, connecting with Route 9 at a point nearly opposite the residence of Mrs. Edward N. Devereaux.
- (2) Beginning at a point on Route 103 near the Congregational Church and connecting with Route 9 at a point nearly opposite the residence of Mrs. Edward N. Devereaux.
- (3) Beginning at a point on Route 9 near the Flanders Store and connecting with the South Road, so called, at a point near the Red Barn.
- (4) Beginning at a point on Route 9 near the residence of Mrs. Edward N. Devereaux and connecting with the South Road, so called, at a point near the Red Barn.

And that the Selectmen shall and are hereby authorized and instructed to erect suitable barriers so that traffic by vehicles on these several streets may be prohibited.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed, subject to the provisions adopted at Town Meeting of March 1925.

From the Estate of Ellen A. W. Hoyt, . . . \$100.00

From the Estate of Mrs. Henry H. Crowell, 100.00

From the Heirs of Parker M. Flanders . . . 100.00

10. To see if the Town will vote to set aside all monies received from the sale of Cemetery lots into a Trust Fund for the Cemetery from which the lots were sold, same to be administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, the income from same to be expended for the general up-keep of the respective cemeteries.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of the Hopkinton Village Cemetery.

12. To see if the Town will vote to have one highway agent in place of two.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars to buy a tractor, plough and grader, or the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-two Dollars without the grader. Seven Hundred Dollars has been paid for rental of the plough and tractor and will be deducted from the purchase price if the town votes to buy.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay miscellaneous expenses.

(1) Discounts and abatements.

(2) Attorneys and other legal expense.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the employment of a District Nurse and other health department expenses.

18. To see if the town will vote to allow two per cent discount on all taxes paid on or before July fifteenth, 1931.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks not earlier than April first.

20. To act upon reports of town officers, library trustees and committees.

21. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

To the School Board and Citizens of Hopkinton:

This is my third annual report. It deals briefly with the following topics:

It will be noted from Table I that the percentage of attendance for Hopkinton as a district is practically as good as the average of the state. Our pupils, however, seem to have difficulty in getting to school on time, as our record shows exactly twice as many tardiness per pupil as the state average. Comparison shows that almost every school made a poorer record of tardiness in 1929-1930 than the year before, Hopkinton Village School being one notable exception.

I am sorry to note an apparent decrease of the interest of parents and other citizens in our schools, as shown by the number of visitors, which is less than for several years past. We are always glad to welcome parents and neighbors at our public schools. Their visits help in many ways, especially by developing a better understanding between parents and teachers.

The question is often asked, "Why does our high school enrollment increase so rapidly when our town's population remains practically the same?" Tables II and III partly answer this question. The fact is, it is becoming the custom for all to go to high school who can possibly do so. Any of us who are over thirty years of age can remember the time when only a few pupils went to school beyond the eighth grade. Now there are only a few who end their schooling at that point. This increased demand for higher education is found all over our nation, and has made necessary the extension of high school facilities in town and city throughout the land.

OUR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

A thorough job of improvement was done on the West Hopkinton school last summer. Additional windows were put in on the north side, enough to make the glass area equal to one-fifth of the floor area. The interiors of both rooms were refinished in a light color. Chemical toilets were also installed.

The high school building is inadequate to house comfortably the number of pupils now attending school there. This is not news to the people of Hopkinton, as in previous reports of school superintendents, this condition has been mentioned from time to time. This year's high school enrollment crowds the building more than ever before. It is the earnest hope of those who have to work as teachers and pupils in this building that some plan may be devised to provide more working space before next year.

The situation at present is complicated by the recommendation of the Commissioner of Education that the primary room (occupied by first and second grades) should not be used as a regular classroom on account of insufficient ventilation. As a temporary expedient, with

the Commissioner's permission, it is now used for a class of 16 pupils, with the requirement that every half-hour the windows shall be opened and the children drilled for five minutes in active physical exercises.

INSTRUCTION IN OUR SCHOOLS

During the past summer a new edition of the "Program of Studies for the Elementary Schools" was issued by the State Board of Education. This volume of nearly 500 pages is the work of committees of teachers and superintendents, who have worked diligently for more than a year to complete this important task. The principal changes made by the new program are as follows:

a. *More emphasis on reading.* The 1921 program of studies stated that most children have become independent readers by the end of the third grade, and that formal instruction in reading need not be emphasized beyond that point. It is now recognized that further instruction for most pupils is necessary. Training in silent reading as well as oral is emphasized.

b. *Less arithmetic for the first two grades.* Certain processes with numbers that seem very difficult for young children are mastered with comparative ease by pupils who are a little older, and whose minds have developed to a point where they can understand such problems. It seems good judgment to postpone the more formal number work until the minds of the pupils are mature enough to grasp it successfully.

c. *More American history, and less European.* There was a time when practically every grade studied some phase of American history, and this plan resulted in much tiresome repetition. In order to avoid this, the 1921 program assigned to Grades 5 and 6 stories of Hebrew, Greek, Roman and English history. While there is much

valuable material in this field, experience has shown that two years of work upon it was too much time, and that one year is probably sufficient. In the new program, the fifth grade is given stories of our own country; the sixth grade studies the European background of American history, and this serves as a basis for a more thorough understanding of our country's development as studied in the junior high school.

d. *More definite standards or goals in each subject.*

Throughout our new program, there are helpful suggestions for teaching different subjects effectively. There are also many specific statements as to the degree of mastery expected in each grade. Both these features should be of help to teachers in securing a higher quality of work on the part of their pupils.

e. *Particular reference to the needs of the rural teacher.* Teaching a rural school has a technique all its own. A teacher who can do a splendid job of teaching in a city school may find herself quite at a loss in a one-room school with six or more grades. It is encouraging to find this fact recognized by the authors of our new program of studies, and to find many helpful suggestions advanced for the use of the teacher in a rural school.

The curriculum of Hopkinton High School was slightly changed two years ago, in a way to provide more variety in choice of studies for our pupils than before. These changes were approved by the Commissioner of Education. Our school is rated, according to the regulations of the State Board of Education, as a six-year approved school in Class A.

In the annual synopsis of statistical reports for the secondary schools of New Hampshire, a comparison is made of the different schools on the basis of the success of those graduates of each who attend higher institutions.

According to this study, the graduates of Hopkinton High School have done very creditable work in colleges and normal schools. Among the thirty-three smaller schools reported in the same list with Hopkinton, only six have maintained a higher average than our own school for the past five years. Last year, Hopkinton was credited with fifth place. The report here quoted is the only comparison known to the writer of the quality of work done by the different high schools in the state. Any person interested to read this study may secure a copy by asking the State Board of Education at Concord for Institute Circular No. 148, entitled "1929-1930 Secondary Reports."

The state high school agent, Mr. Leavitt, visits our school annually, spending an entire day observing the work of various classes. His reports on the quality of work he sees here are usually very encouraging. The teachers of our high school are to be commended for doing a good quality of work under the present crowded conditions, and for their professional spirit as shown by regular attendance at weekly teachers' meetings during the winter.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE COMING YEAR

1. *Visit school one or more times each year.* All parents are urged to call at the school which their children are attending, for at least one class period during the year.

2. *Less tardiness.* Parents can help materially in decreasing the number of tardinesses in our schools, and helping to develop in our children the desirable habit of being on time.

3. *More room at Contoocook.* Some measures for providing more space for children now attending school in the building used by the high school and grades seem

almost imperative. No specific suggestions are given here, as the school board has been instructed by vote of the district to bring in suggestions at the 1931 school district meeting. Suggestions or ideas from any person, which may help in evolving a practical plan of procedure, will be cordially welcomed by your school board and superintendent.

Conclusion

Grateful acknowledgment is here made of the willing cooperation of school board members, teachers, and other citizens of Hopkinton, during the past year.
