# Record of Town Meeting

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WEARE, N. H., March 12, 1929.

At the legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 12th day of March, 1929, at ten o'clock in the forenoon

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Edward T. Breed, Moderator; also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 816.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The moderator called a recess for one hour.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of votes cast, 369.

Necessary for choice, 185.

For Selectman for three years. Denton Dearborn had 93; Hiram F. Grant had 266 and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Town Clerk. Frank H. Peaslee had 369 and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agents. Fred E. Purington had 172, Elwin T. George had 208, Charles F. Bennett had 354, Frank A. Philbrick had 361, and Elwin T. George, Charles F. Ben-



nett and Frank A. Philbrick were declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting Elwin T. George and Frank A. Philbrick took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor. Henry W. Langlan had 59, Frank Tucker had 306 and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Chief of Police. George E. Dodge had 1, Charles Gilbert had 1, Frank N. Sawyer had 1, Russell B. Flanders had 1, Wilder D. Tenny had 354 and Wilder D. Tenney was declared elected by the Moderator.

ART. 2. Voted to raise three thousand dollars (\$3000) to defray town charges.

ART. 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Allen W. Sawyer for Trustee of Trust Funds. This being done, the Moderator declared Allen W. Sawyer elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 4. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Jennie W. Eaton for Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Jennie W. Eaton elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 5. Voted to raise 45/100 of one per cent of the assessed valuation.

ART. 6. Upon motion of Maurice J. Grant, voted that we raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Highways, under the law passed at January session 1905.

ART. 7. Voted that it be left to the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

ART. 8. Upon motion of Hiram E. Grant, voted to raise one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 9. Upon motion of Frank Tucker, voted that the town raise four hundred dollars (\$400) for White Pine Blister Rust control.

ART. 10. Upon motion of Hiram E. Grant, voted to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200).

ART. 11. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman that the town raise the sum of one hundred dollars. Frank L. Eastman offered an amendment to the motion of two hundred dollars (\$200). The amendment was carried.

ART. 12. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth that we dismiss the Article. The motion was rejected. Upon motion of Henry W. Langlan that the town raise one thousand dollars (\$1000). The motion was rejected.

ART. 13. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) to repair the Stone Memorial Building.

ART. 14. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the perpetual care of the Eben L. L. Paige burial lot.

ART. 15. Upon motion of Hiram E. Grant, voted to raise the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300), and the unexpended amount raised last year for a Grader be used to buy two road machines.

ART. 16. Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted that a committee of twelve be appointed by the Moderator, to act as a Finance Committee. The following committee was appointed: Frank H. Peaslee, Frank Tucker, Charles

A. Drewry, Asa E. Felch, Fred C. Jones, C. Ernest Leeds, Leon W. Watt, Forrest Dearborn, Charles F. Eastman, John F. Tierney, Frank N. Sawyer and Maurice J. Grant

Frank N. Sawyer offered an amendment that the committee act without pay. The amendment was carried.

Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted that the State Aid Road be built by contract, and the contract be at the approval of the State Highway Commissioner.

Charles F. Eastman offered the following resolutions and moved their adoption.

*Resolved:* That a committee of six be appointed to investigate the subject of bringing the Weare Town History up to date, and report at our next annual meeting.

*Resolved:* That the following named persons constitute said Committee: Alfred Osborne, Frank Tucker, Allen W. Sawyer, Hiram E. Grant, Lucie E. Clough and Asa E. Felch.

Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted that the tax bills be printed with the State, County, Town and Highway taxes each on a separate line. Allen W. Sawyer offered an amendment that the poll tax be on a separate line. The amendment was carried.

Voted that this meeting be dissolved.

# NOTICE

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

L. S.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the Conty of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at 10 of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose, by seperate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To see how much money the Town will appropriate to repair highways.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand, two hundred and fifty dollars



(\$1,250) to be used with the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500) to be furnished by the State. This money to be used for the permanent improvement of the Highway between Weare Center and Henniker.

7. To see if the Town will appropriate the amount necessary for the permanent improvement of highways.

8. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

9. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) to be used in coöperation with the State Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of eighty dollars (\$80) yearly for street lights at Riverdale.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for band concerts to be given by the Weare Band.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for the care of soldiers' graves.

15. To see if the Town will vote to sell the farm formerly owned by the Harrison E. Currier Estate.

16. To see if the Town will take any action in regard to disposing of the stone crusher.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

It is gratifying to note that the attendance in most of the Weare schools equals or exceeds the State average of 94%. Only one school—the Buxton—showed an average far below this figure. In the matter of tardiness, the following schools deserve to be commended for improving their records considerably:

The coöperation of parents and teachers in bringing about this improvement is much appreciated.

The smallest school last year, as shown by table I, was the Friends school. This year, the school there is still very small; the Riverside school is also small, having at present only six pupils. For a group of less than eight pupils, it is hardly justifiable to pay the cost of maintaining a separate school.

#### THE HEALTH OF OUR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The work of health supervision in our schools by a school nurse, begun last year by Ruth Whitcomb of Concord, is now being carried on by Edith Walker, whose address is 1492 Elm Street, Manchester. Miss Walker has charge of this work in six adjoining districts—Weare, Dunbarton, Goffstown Town, Goffstown Special, New Boston, and Bedford. Weare is regularly assigned 36 days of Miss Walker's time during the school year, but may be entitled to more in case of emergency, such as an epidemic.

The outstanding results of last year's health work included (1) a clinic for dental work at Weare Center, at which 27 children were treated, and (2) several cases of defective vision that were corrected.

Further work on the correction of poor eyesight is being attempted by Miss Walker, also an inquiry into the causes of the unusual number of cases that show symptoms of enlarged glands or goitre.

### OUR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

In accordance with a vote taken at the school meeting last April, the Rockland school has been remodeled into a thoroughly up-to-date building. It has a new floor, a new roof and a new chimney; the windows (all but one) have been moved to the left side and increased in number to equal one-fifth of the floor area; the schoolroom is refinished in a light color, has white canvas window shades and additional blackboard space; and chemical toilets have been installed. It is now one of the lightest and most pleasant study rooms in town.

The Riverdale school has also received some attention. Two windows have been moved from right to left, and new seats, movable and adjustable, have been purchased.

I hope the policy of improving one school a year may be continued until all the Weare buildings are a credit to the town.

### INSTRUCTION IN OUR SCHOOLS

It is difficult to describe clearly and briefly what goes on in school, and most parents have only a hazy notion of the processes of modern education. Instruction, however, is the thing for which we pay taxes, and as a fundamental aim of the whole school system, deserves some space in this report.

Reading is the first and most important single subject taught in our schools. Recent studies by psychologists have shown that there are distinct differences between *oral reading* and *silent reading*, and that each of these processes should be thoroughly taught in schools. It is also true that the habit of moving lips (i. e., whispering the words) while reading silently, is a serious hindrance because

it prevents rapid reading. Teachers today give emphasis to proper enunciation and expression of oral reading, also to drill on meaning of words and sentences, and to training in getting the thought quickly from textbooks in history, geography, etc. Even an occasional reading lesson from the arithmetic textbook is helpful, for much of the difficulty pupils have in solving problems can be traced to imperfect understanding of what they read.

Music is a subject not often classed among the "fundamentals," but one which deserves more systematic attention than it is apt to receive, especially in rural schools. For better instruction in this subject, new textbooks and phonograph records are being supplied, and music has a regular place on the school program.

No matter how thoroughly a subject has been mastered, time will help one to forget it; and practice is necessary to keep it fresh in mind. This truth is sometimes forgotten by high school teachers, who deplore the poor spelling, arithmetic and punctuation of their pupils but who have often neglected to attempt a cure. This year, definite time is being devoted each week to drill on these and other fundamental subjects. The new high school report card also recognizes the requirement of good usage in order to receive a mark higher than D.

In order to assist teachers in solving their problems, a series of meetings for discussion and study is being held this year. Each teacher is asked to attend three meetings during the year. We are teachers deserve credit for their willingness to travel, some of them long distances, to attend these meetings. Another institution which is proving helpful to teachers is the professional library, circulated from the superintendent's office. This consists of recent books and magazines dealing with school and classroom problems. Over sixty volumes are now in circulation among the fifty-one teachers in the union.

## RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE COMING YEAR

## 1. A longer school year.—

You will note by referring again to table I, that the Weare schools were in session last year, on the average, only 348 half-days, while the average for the State is 355.4 half-days. This means that the pupils in Weare, because of holidays and other non-school days, lacked nearly 4 days of having a full school year according to the State average. I believe we should follow the plan now in use in many districts, of adopting a school year of 180 days, with the provision that teachers' institute days and visiting days may be counted as school days. Such a regulation permits the proper celebration of our numerous holidays without depriving our children of their full share of educational privileges.

## 2. Less tardiness and absence.

The coöperation of parents is earnestly urged, that we may cut down still more the amount of tardiness and absence which we still have in Weare. The situation at the high school for the present year is serious; if the record of tardiness is not improved during the remainder of the year, we will be likely to lose our approval by the State.

## 3. Correction of visual defects.—

Glasses may not be becoming to children, and they are certainly expensive; but neither the appearance nor the expense should stand in the way of improving our children's ability to see clearly. To those parents whose children's eyesight is reported to be poor, this reminder is addressed, in the earnest hope that they will make an effort to correct the defects at once.

## 4. Remodeling of one school building.

It seems to me that the Buxton school is the building most in need of remodeling this year. It has windows on four sides, lacks blackboard space adequate for its needs, and has unsatisfactory toilet facilities. The South Weare

school also stands in need of improvement, and serves more children than the Buxton. I think we should vote to improve one of these two buildings this year.

5. Eight grade pupils should attend Junior High School.

Throughout the school course, pupils derive some advantage from being in a group with others of the same grade. The competition helps interest them in their studies. This advantage increases as soon as pupils grow older, until in the upper grades it becomes a necessity. A pupil in the eighth grade, alone in his class, or with only two or three, suffers a great handicap. This fact led to the establishment of a junior high school at Weare several years ago, and I firmly believe parents should take advantage of the privileges offered in the junior high school: for seventh graders whenever it can be arranged, and for eighth grade pupils without exception. At the present time there are seven eighth grade pupils in the junior high school, and four at South Weare. It is hoped that next year, every eighth grade pupil will be enrolled at the junior high school.

#### CONCLUSION

I am glad of this opportunity to express my appreciation of the generous coöperation I have received during the past year from pupils, teachers, school board members and other citizens.
